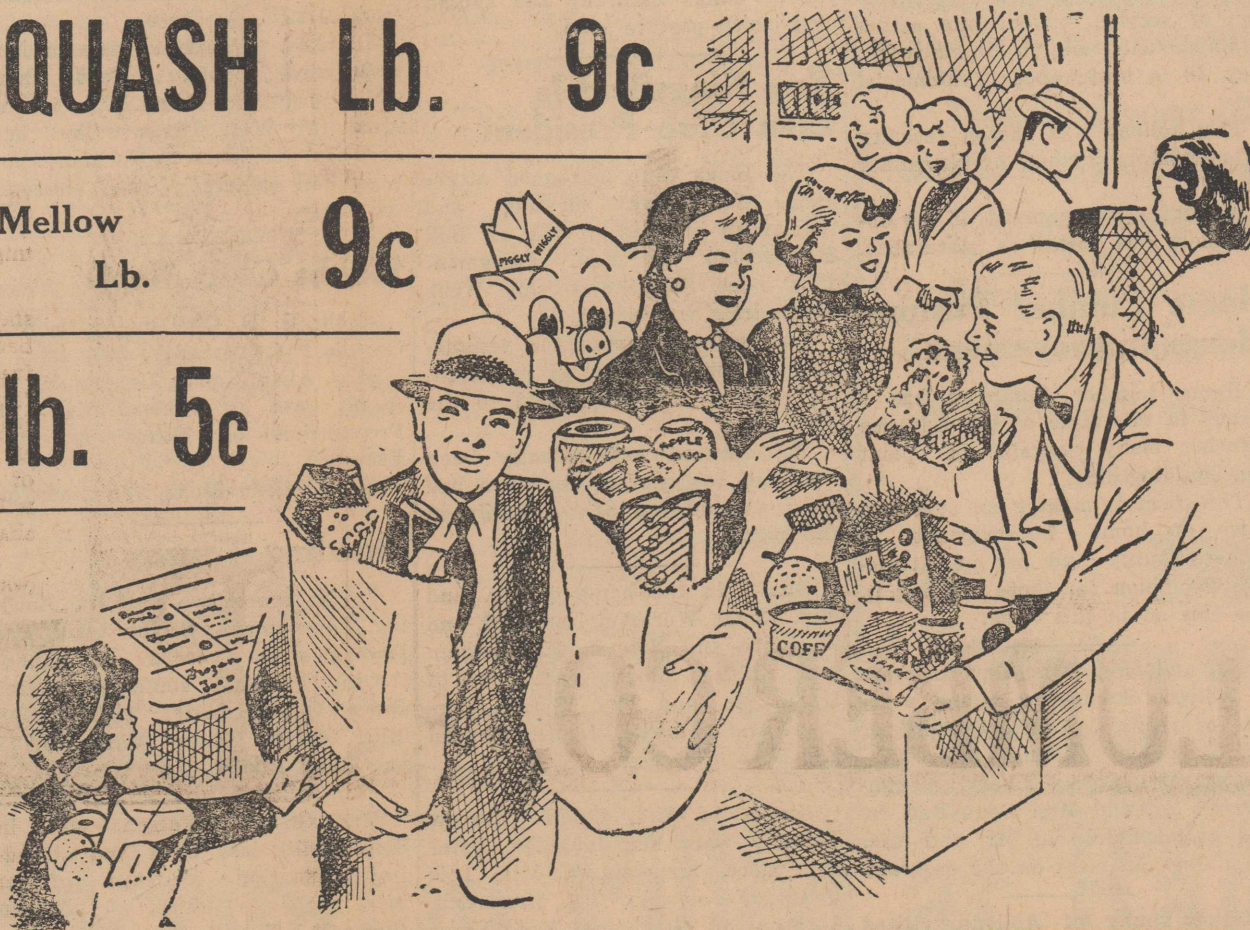

Considerable interest has been shown lately in the use of fertilizers. Some questions asked pertain to use of liquid fertilizers and also the use of fertilizer which is applied to the seed. To date our experiment station has not obtained conclusive information concerning the use of liquid fertilizers. We do not know from demonstrations that some of these solutions when applied to seeds in the proper manner give a fairly fast start to seedlings. According to our specialist there has been no measure of the advantages of this fast start. According to Dr. Coldwell, of the Texas Experiment Station, our best method of handling fertilizers at this time is by applying the fertilizer to the seed bed as we have in the past.

**June Is Dairy Month.** Every dairyman should make it part of his business to encourage the consumption of more milk and milk products. Let's all be boosters for the sale of our dairy products.

**Brucellosis Control, Plan B.** Known reactor animals, after being identified according to law, may be retained in a herd under this plan not more than three years from the date the first reactors were disclosed in the herd.

According to our wildlife specialist, Gulf Redfish survive in the Texas rivers. Perhaps it won't be long before West Texans will be able to catch salt water redfish without the long drive to the Gulf of Mexico.

Recent reports from the Texas Game and Fish Commission show that a 2 pound 10 ounce red was caught in the Pecos river. The Pecos had been stocked two years previously with four to six inch redfish. The specimen caught was reported as being "fat and healthy."

Raising quail, pheasants, chukar partridge, waterfowl and other game birds is getting to be a big business. Game farming is exciting business and therefore an interested person should get acquainted with the problems and opportunities it presents. In general game birds are more difficult to hatch, rear and market than are domestic chickens. One should become familiar with the costs involved in purchasing equipment and feed. License requirements should be studied also before going into the business. Listed below are some publications on raising game birds that might be interesting and helpful:

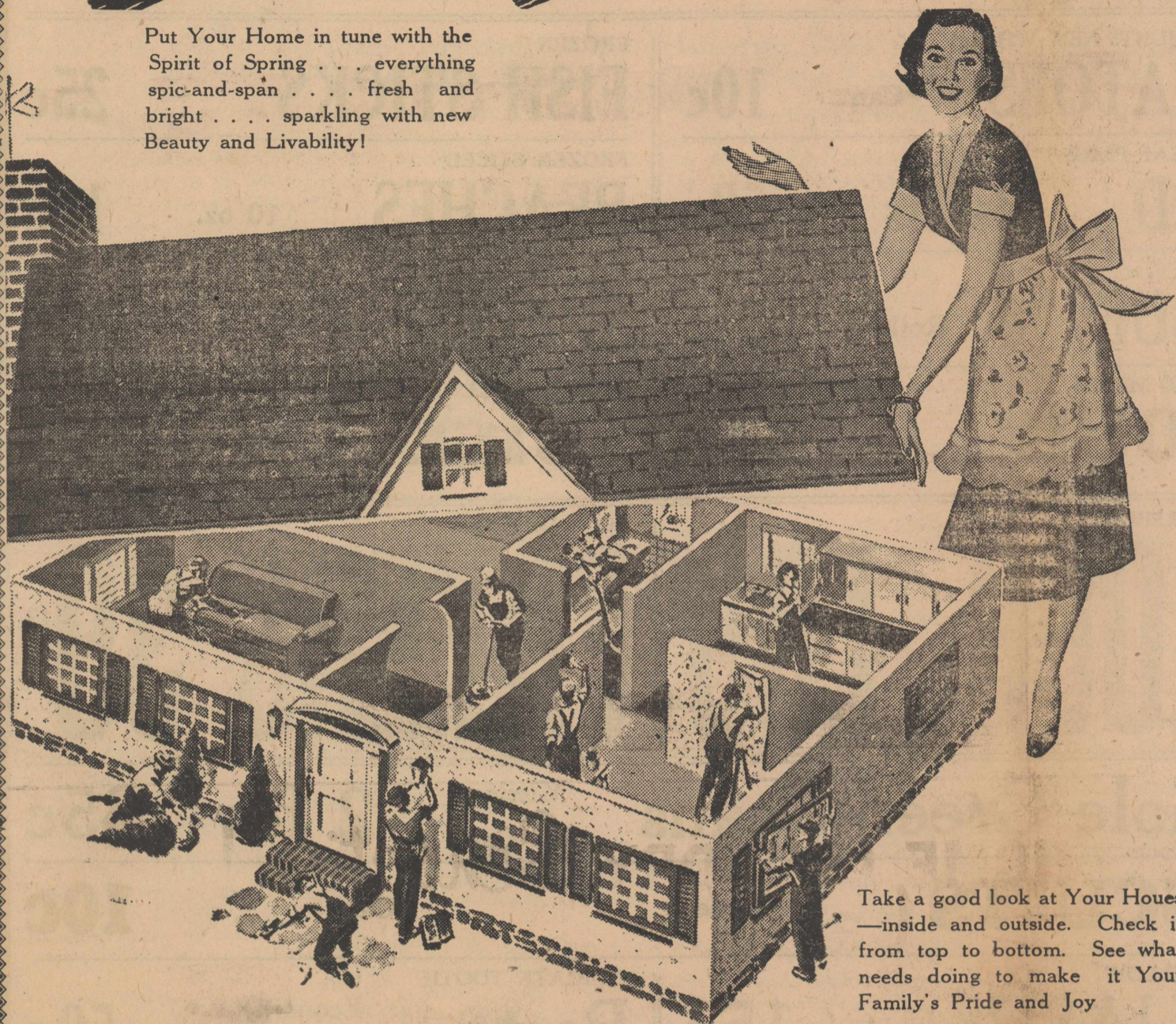

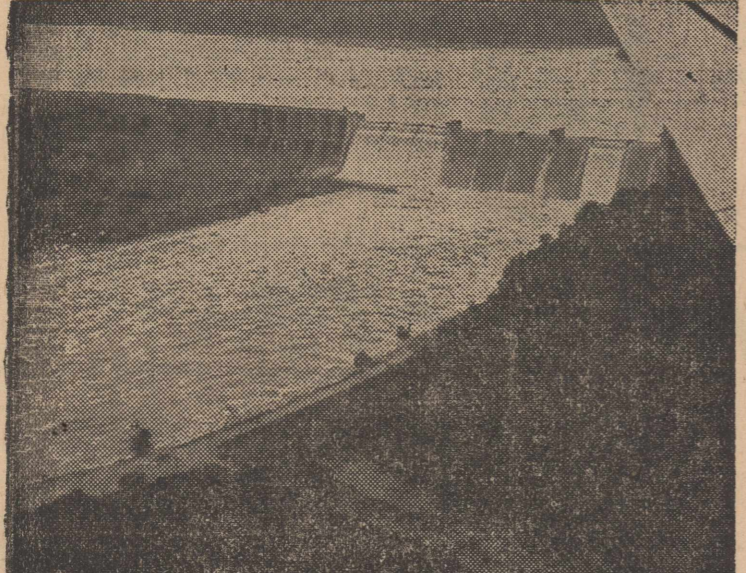

**DROUGHT AND FLOOD**—Texas knows both. Here, at Possum Kingdom Reservoir, an installation of the Brazos River Authority, flood waters are pouring over the spillway. Up to May 21, Possum Kingdom released 1,773,540 acre-feet of water downstream. Meanwhile the dam was holding vast quantities of water. Just a few weeks earlier this was drought-parched land. The U. S. Corps of Engineers estimated that, up to May 6th, the two great flood-control dams—Whitney and Belton—had prevented damage of \$23,700,000 during recent floods in the Brazos River Basin. The B.R.A. master plan calls for many more dams, for flood control and conservation, on the main Brazos and its tributaries.

### What Must I Do To Be Saved

This is the most serious question that has ever challenged the minds of men. One feels the all important responsibility resting upon him in attempting to answer this profound question. Each one of us will give an account to God in the day of judgment for the way we have treated this question. The answer to this question cannot be found in church manuals, creeds, catechisms, confessions of faiths, religious dogmas, for all disagree with each other. There is just one answer to the question, and only one place to find it, and that is in God's Word. Men may teach, and do, conflicting theories, but God's Word teaches one answer.

A man must know the truth of the gospel to be saved (John 8:32), he can be saved and never know the doctrines of men, but he must know the truth of God's Word. Salvation is only for the accountable. There is no Bible example or teaching in the Bible that authorizes INFANT MEMBERSHIP IN THE CHURCH, nor an example where one WAS BAPTIZED AND THEN TAUGHT (John 6:44, 45; Romans 10:17). Or had WATER, AND WATER ONLY, SPRINKLED ON THEM AND CALLED BAPTISM. Nor where ANYONE WAS SAVED AT THE POINT OF FAITH ONLY. Paul says, WHATSOEVER IS NOT OF FAITH IS SIN (Rom. 14:23), therefore, it is a sin to teach infant membership in the church, or sprinkle and call it baptism, or to baptize the untaught and tell one he is saved at the point of faith only.

The question is raised, "What must one believe to be saved? God's Word says that we MUST believe that God is and that Christ is His son (Heb. 11:6; John 8:24). These facts every person MUST believe. He must repent of his sins (Luke 13:3), must confess his faith in Christ (Rom. 10:9, 10), and be baptized for the remission of his sins (Acts 2:38; 22:16; 1 Pet. 3:21).

It makes no difference what your station in this life may be or how much wealth and influence you may enjoy, or what church you attend or preach for, if you are ever saved and saved at last you will have to obey the things set forth in this article. They are not this writers words, but God's. There is no other way. It will not do to say that "Oh, we are all trying to get to the same place, but by different ways." Jesus said, "I am THE way" (John 14:6). He means there is none but by Him. To be saved eternally, one must live a life of influence for good in the church of our Lord (Matt. 16:18). Someday Christ will come for the church.

### 4-H Swine Program Proving Popular

Eight registered Duroc Jersey gilts were distributed to Fisher County 4-H Club members Monday morning May 27 who are participating in the Sears Roebuck 4-H Club Swine program according to James S. Norman County Agent.

Club members receiving these gilts were Larry McCright and Orvel Hill Jr. of McCaulley 4-H Club, George Hicks, Fred Loving and A. C. Snapp Jr. of Rotan 4-H Club, and Gary West, Jim Bob Cave and Charles McCain of the Roby 4-H Club.

A registered boar purchased in Stonewall county was also distributed to Charles McCain.

4-H Club members returning gilts to the program were Gary Floyd, Joel Rains and Weldon Van Liew and Joel Rains to build the program back to the maximum eight gilts per county.

The following is the heavy litter reports for the first litters of the gilts distributed last spring:

First: Weldon Van Liew, 6 pigs in the litter, weighed 341 pounds at 56 days of age, which made an average of 56.8 pounds per pig.

Second: Joel Rains a litter of 7, weighed 313.5 pounds.

Third: Gary Floyd, litter of 8 pigs, weighed 302.5 pounds.

Fourth: R. W. Callan, litter of 6 pigs, weighed 162 pounds.

Fifth: Bradley Brittain, litter of 4 pigs, weighed 76 pounds.

The 4-H Swine program is sponsored by the Sears Roebuck Foundation in practically every county in Texas. This program has been in operation for about 16 years and has shown a gradual increase in both litter size and weight of the litter at weaning age.

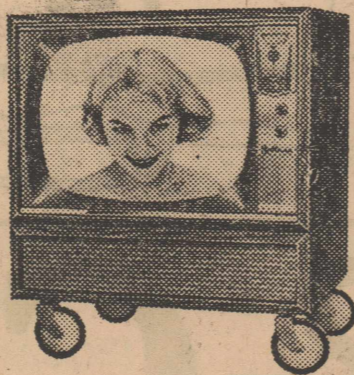

A Message For Memorial Day

## The Price of Freedom

by Billy Graham

MOST Americans are inclined to take their blood-bought freedom for granted. How lustily, in times of war, do we sing songs of patriotism, exhibit due respect to the boys in uniform, and pray for peace. Yet, when the smoke of conflict subsides, our respect and regard for those who bore the brunt of war's perilous sword quickly wanes and dies. But true gratitude for an earned peace should be as perpetual as is our freedom. The young men who gave the best years of their lives, often at the peril of life and limb, should always be remembered by the citizens of our nation. And that memory should not find expression in a shallow sentimentality, but in making adequate provision for these who have so willingly stood in war's gap and subjected their youthful bodies to the onslaughts of the enemy.

Freedom of any sort, it seems, never comes cheap. Our spiritual freedom was purchased at terrific cost by the most splendid youth that ever walked the shores of time, Jesus Christ the Son of God. It hardly seemed right that He of all men should die in the very prime of life and at the peak of His usefulness! But, in the wisdom of God, only those who are ready, able and willing, are called upon to bring life and liberty to those who are unable to secure it for themselves. In the case of spiritual freedom, there was only One in heaven and earth who was equal to the task, and that was Jesus Christ.

When our national freedom was jeopardized, only the young, the strong, the very best of our society, were equal to the task. After World War I, 300,000 men returned home disabled, handicapped, or ill. World War II counted the disabled service men in the hundreds of thousands, and the Korean War added many thousands more. It is estimated that by 1960 there will be 4,000,000 disabled veterans in America.

As a group, they have been self-sacrificing, counting the price they paid as a debt they rightly owed. Most of them are like the recruit who asked the recruiting officer in World War II:

"If I fight, Sir, what will be my reward?"

Swiftly came the blunt answer: "Wounds, scars and perhaps death. But remember, that through your wounds America will remain free."

"That's enough," said the boy, "sign me up."

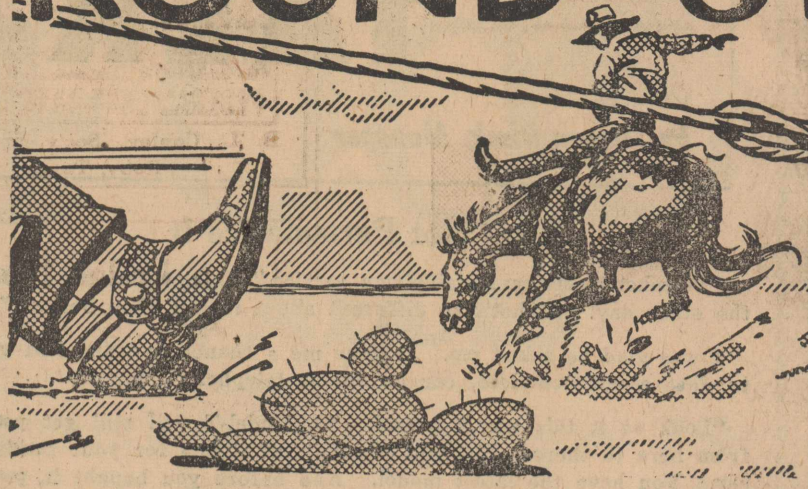
This is the spirit of the veteran—the spirit of the true soldier. But we, who profited so greatly by their sacrifice, must not forget the debt we owe these noble men who bear wounds that well might have been our own.

On this Memorial Day it is fitting and proper that our thoughts should not only be with those who were killed on the fields of battle, but that we should remember those who were disabled in freedom's conflict. We should resolve to pray for them and their families, use every means at our command to make their lives richer and fuller, and finally, that we should rededicate ourselves to the great principles of freedom for which they exposed themselves so willingly; that these Disabled American Veterans shall not have been wounded in vain.

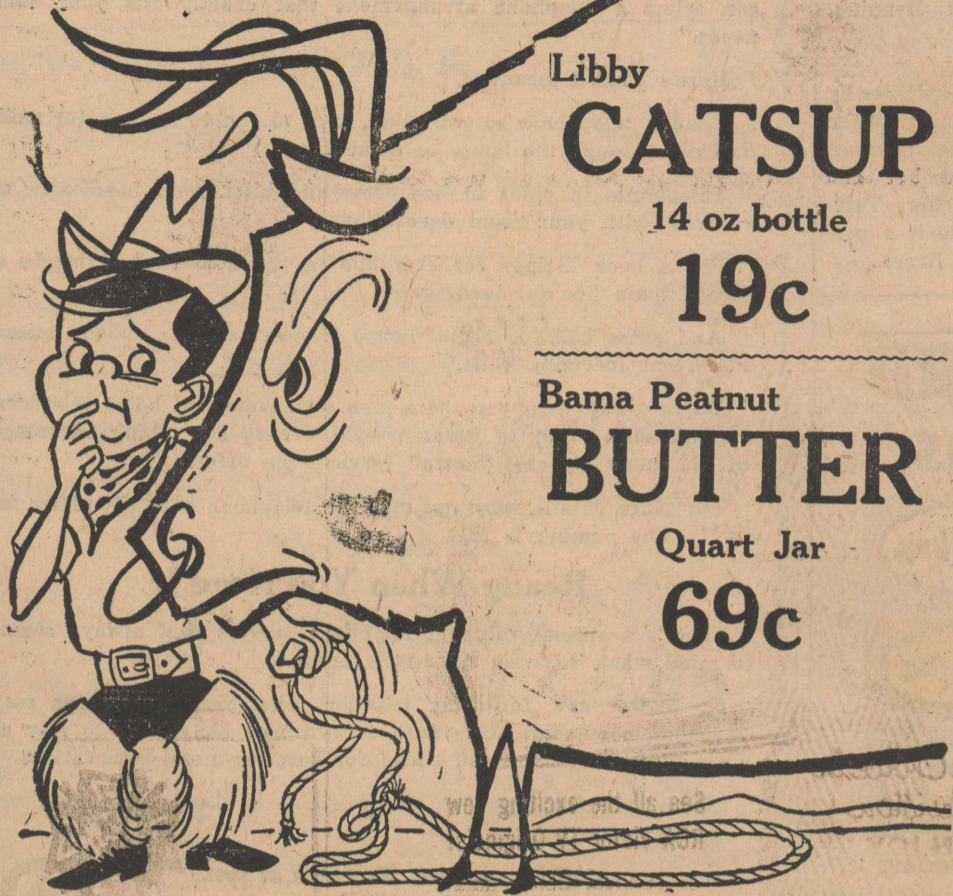

BLUE PANIC GRASS—DR. EWELL JENKINS' RANCH

"Anyone in the cattle business should have some blue panic grass" says Dr. E. C. Jenkins. Dr. Jenkins has been grazing blue panic grass since July 1954. The cattle run in a native grass pasture along with the blue panic.

Dr. Jenkins owns and operates a livestock farm seven miles north of Rotan in the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District. He has been a cooperater with the District since March 1948.

"I have been grazing 21 acres of blue panic since the first of Ap-

ril. Fifty-four head of livestock were kept on the blue panic alone for ten days this year, but generally are on native pasture also," he says. Dr. Jenkins plans to harvest a hay crop from this field this year.

Blue panic is very good in crop rotation. It is a good soil conditioner. The roots penetrate deep and a lot of organic matter is created by them. Soil under a cover of blue panic does not blow.

This grass was planted May 1, 1954. This is the fourth growing season.

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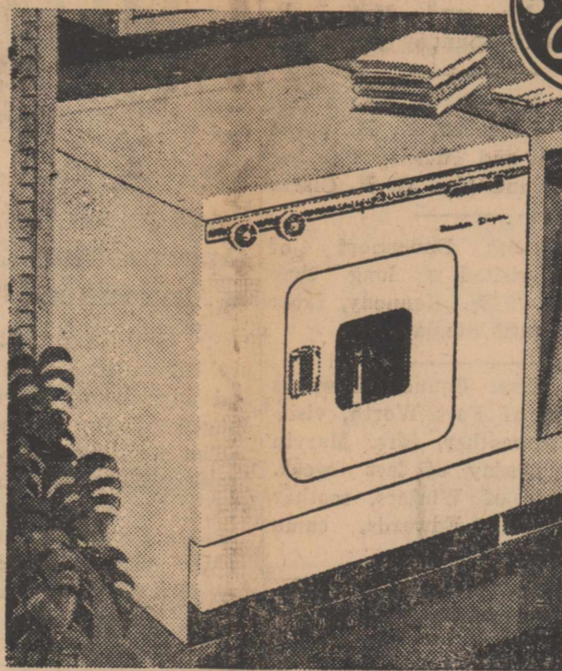

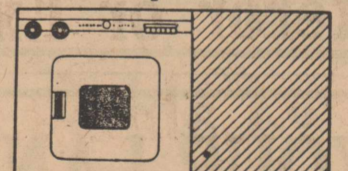
