





The reply given by me was, "There is no such reference."

Since that time some very nice people have written me, suggesting that I turn and read Matt. 3:1. May I say that I have and it doesn't solve the problem one whit! Let us read the passage: "In those days came John the Baptist, preaching in the winderness

In the act of baptism a penitent believer, passes out of the kingdom of the devil into the kingdom of God, which is the family of God, which is the church or house of God. (1 Tim. 3:15).

A person who sins after he is baptized into Christ need only to "repent and pray God" to be forgiven. (Acts 8:22),—see that?



What is the Broadway Plan?

The Broadway Plan is a procedure which has been successfully used by churches for more than 20 years in providing for their building programs. It is widely used by most of the major denominations htroughout the United States and in Alaska and Canada.

What is the Procedure?

Money is loaned to the church by members and friends. In return, the church issues notes in the form of bonds payable to bearer, maturing at 6-month intervals over a period of time.

The Bonds and Interest?

The church agrees to deposit into a special fund in the bank a sum of money each week, which is calculated mathematically to be sufficient to pay the bonds and the interest thereon when due.

Wha Assurance is there that the Required Deposits will be Made in the

Te church has executed a binding assignment of its revenues for this purpose. Further, the church treasurer has made a performance guaranty, binding him to make the required deposits from the first revenues of the church.

What Interest do the Bonds Bear? The bonds bear interest at the terest is paid semi-annually and is evidenced by compons attached to the bonds.

Both the principal and interest holder has no further dealings with the church insofar as his bond is concerned. Bonds and interest cou-Mrs. Dono Darden, district dep- pons, when they are due, are cashed at the bank in a similar manner

Yes. They are bearer bonds, are negotiable and may be sold, transferred, or used as collateral security for a loan.

Suppose I Move out of Town? You may collect your bond and interest coupons by placing them for collection with the bank in the

town to which you move. Can t heBondholder Cash the Bond Before it is Due?

No. In isolated hardship circumstances, however, the church yould probably make every effort to redeem the bond or help resell

Can the Bondholder Cash the Bond Before They Mature?

Yes. The church may redeem all or any of the bonds at any interest-paying period upon 30 days' written notice.

Is the Interest from the Bonds Taxexempt?

No. The interest must be reported as income.

If I should Lose My Bond or if it is Destroyed, What Should I Do? Notify the church immediately in order that payment at the bank may be stopped and arrangements made for its replacement.

Is It Necessary for the Bondholder To Cash His Interest Coupons on the Due Date?

No. He may wait until they are all due, but the interest is not compounded.




