The Cotton Legislative Situation As It Stands

The present law will require cut of 20-25% in all cotton acreage allotments in 1959. This reduction is applicable to all growers whether their allotment is 4 acres or 400. The 4 acre minimum allotment provision expires this year. However, there is no assurance that a "minimum" will not be reinstated even if other legislations should not be enacted.

What the 1959 cut would mean to a farmer with a 100 acre allotment, producing a bale per acre, may be illustrated as follows:

Production (bale per acre) 100 78 Support-1" Midling

Cotton is the worlds finest fiber. With some added emphasis on research and promotion, cotton would have little to fear from its competitors, EXCEPT that the price support program has prevented it from competing pricewise.

Domestically, snythetic fibers are being delivered to the textile mill at 6-10 cents per pound less than cotton. As a result, the annual rate of cotton consumption is more than 1 million bales lower today than it was in 1956. In foreign markets, cotton is not competitive but only because the government, through the cotton consumption is more than 1 million bales lower today than it was in 1956. In foreign markets, cotton is now competitive but only because the government, through the cotton export program, is absorbing the difference between the support price and the market price.

The Secretary of Agriculture has stated that the 1959 national cotton acreage allotment, under present law, will be about 14 million acres-compared with 17.6 million acres this year. The production from 14 million acres will not supply at competitive prices the demands for domestic consumption and exports. This will require spinning mills to use more synthetics and will encourage the renewed expansion of foreign production which has been curtailed, at a cost of \$350 million, by the government export program.

duced acreage results in higher costs, higher (support) prices and lower consumption. Lower consumption, in turn brings reduced acreage under the present law. The eventual death of the cotton industry is a built-in feature of the pres-

To bring about a change, Congress must know that farmers, ginners, and merchants want a change. They will know that only if they receive fetters saying so. It is not necessary that such letters support a specific bill. The details of a bill may change from day to day as it moves through Congress. Letters—especially from farmers, but from others as well-saying that the present program is not working and that more acreage is a necessity in 1959, will do the job that must be done if the cotton industry is to survive and prosper.

WHY IS BAPTISM ESSENTIAL?



The above question was asked this writer the other day, so with the New Testament as our guide let us give a Bible answer. First, let us state that only immersion in water is baptism. The first reason is:

1. One must be born again. Christ said, "Except one be born of water and the spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." (Jno., 3:5). One "MUST" be born again, there is no other way, that makes it essential

2. It is "For the Remission of Sins." Peter says in Acts 2:38, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ FOR THE REMISSION OF SINS, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." 'Here we learn without baptism there is no remission of sins.

3. It is in order to wash away sins. Turning to Acts 22:16 we read, "And now why tarriest thou? arise and be baptized, and WASH AWAY THY SINS, calling on the name of the Lord." Here we learn that it is IN THE ACT OF BAPTISM that one's sins are washed away. It is essential.

4. It's the only way to put on Christ. Paul says, "For as many of you as has been baptized into Christ HAVE PUT ON CHRIST." (Gal. 3:27). Who will deny this truth?

5. To Be In Christ, one must first be baptized into Him. Baptism is the ONLY means whereby one can enter Christ. Paul again writes, "Know Ye not, that so many of us as were BAPTIZED INTO JESUS CHRIST were baptized into his death." The significance of being in Christ is understood better when the blessings that are in Christ are made known.

- (1) There is no condemnation in Christ. (Rom. 8:1).
- (2) One is a new creature in Christ, the old life is passed away. (2 Cor. 5:17).
- (3) Redemption is only in Christ. (Eph. 1:7).
- (4) Every spiritual blessing is in Christ. (Eph. 1:13).
- (5) Eternal life is only in Christ. (1 Jno. 5:11). These make baptism essential.

6. The last reason given it is a command. It read John 14:15. Don't be deceived by those read, "AND HE COMMANDED THEM TO BE BAPTIZED in the name of Jesus Christ." Now head John 14:15. Don't be deceived by those who deny this truth.
