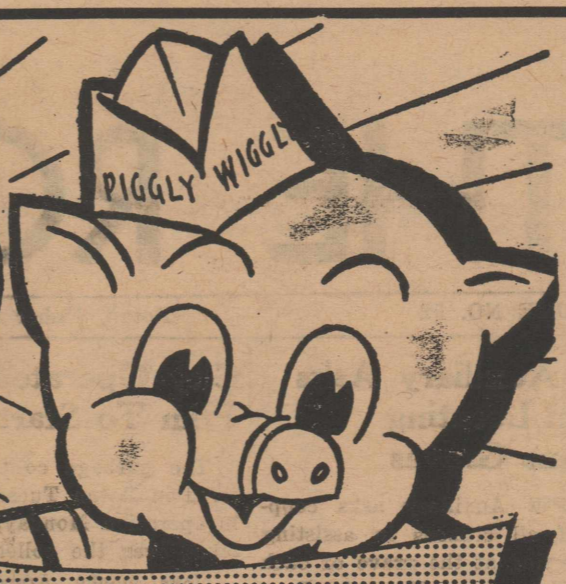

The Cotton Legislative Situation As It Stands

The present law will require a cut of 20-25% in all cotton acreage allotments in 1959. This reduction is applicable to all growers whether their allotment is 4 acres or 400. The 4 acre minimum allotment provision expires this year. However, there is no assurance that a "minimum" will not be re-instituted even if other legislations should not be enacted.

What the 1959 cut would mean to a farmer with a 100 acre allotment, producing a bale per acre, may be illustrated as follows:

Cotton is the worlds finest fiber. With some added emphasis on research and promotion, cotton would have little to fear from its competitors, EXCEPT that the price support program has prevented it from competing pricewise.

Domestically, synthetic fibers are being delivered to the textile mill at 6-10 cents per pound less than cotton. As a result, the annual rate of cotton consumption is more than 1 million bales lower today than it was in 1956. In foreign markets, cotton is not competitive but only because the government, through the cotton consumption is more than 1 million bales lower today than it was in 1956. In foreign markets, cotton is now competitive but only because the government, through the cotton export program, is absorbing the difference between the support price and the market price.

The Secretary of Agriculture has stated that the 1959 national cotton acreage allotment, under present law, will be about 14 million acres—compared with 17.6 million acres this year. The production from 14 million acres will not supply at competitive prices the demands for domestic consumption and exports. This will require spinning mills to use more synthetics and will encourage the renewed expansion of foreign production which has been curtailed, at a cost of \$350 million, by the government export program.

Cotton is in a vicious circle. Reduced acreage results in higher costs, higher (support) prices and lower consumption. Lower consumption, in turn brings reduced acreage under the present law. The eventual death of the cotton industry is a built-in feature of the present law.

To bring about a change, Congress must know that farmers, ginners, and merchants want a change. They will know that only if they receive letters saying so. It is not necessary that such letters support a specific bill. The details of a bill may change from day to day as it moves through Congress. Letters—especially from farmers, but from others as well—saying that the present program is not working and that more acreage is a necessity in 1959, will do the job that must be done if the cotton industry is to survive and prosper.
