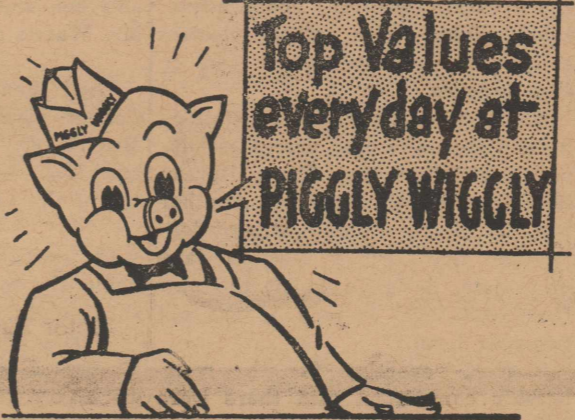

VA To Hold Open House Nov. 10

The welcome mat at the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Lubbock is being dusted in preparation for an open house scheduled for Monday, November 10, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The open house, the first since the official opening of the VA Building on 19th Street in 1948, is being held as a part of the VA's national participation in commemoration of Veterans Day, November 11th.

In announcing the open house, Robert W. Sisson, manager of this VA Regional Office, explained that everyone is invited to come by any time during the designated hours Monday. The purpose of the event is to acquaint the veteran, his family, dependent survivors, and the public with the mission of the VA and to give all visitors an understanding of the VA's program and how it is carried out.

Visitors will be urged to spend a-door by VA employees, who will guide them through the various divisions of the agency and will briefly picture the function of each. Visitors will be urged to spend additional time in any division of special interest to them.

A special invitation is being made to young people interested in future employment in government agencies, who will not only see government personnel at work but can ask questions about job opportunities and how to go about qualifying for appointment.

On the guided tour through the VA, visitors will see first-hand the organizations that handle training, compensation and pension benefits, GI loans, and life insurance premium payments; the huge file room where more than 200,000 veterans' folders are maintained; the mail room where thousands of pieces of mail are sorted and distributed daily; and the office where benefit and dividend checks are certified.

The VA Regional Office in Lubbock was established in 1946 to serve the 79-county area of West Texas, which stretches from the Panhandle border of Texas on the north of the Big Bend border on the south. Currently, more than 45,000 veterans' dependents within the area are receiving benefits which are administered by the Lubbock regional office. At the present time approximately 40 percent of the area's population is made up of veterans and their families, all of whom are affected in some way by the VA. The regional office building in the 1600-block of 19th Street was completed in 1948, and now houses the 200 employees of the regional office as well as several other government agencies.

We welcome this opportunity to acquaint all of our visitors with our work and how we do it, Sisson said. VA is proud of its operations and we want veterans, beneficiaries, their families, friends, and our neighbors in community to join us in our Open House November 10.

**Safety Should
Begin At Home**

The pattern is usually pretty much the same:

The time — July or December. The place — the home. Or, more specifically, the bedroom. The victim — someone 65 years of age or older.

Yes, that's usually the story of home deaths from falls, which take about 14,000 lives annually and rank second only to traffic as an accident killer.

National Safety Council statistics show that about 3 out of 4 persons killed in falls are 65 or older, and that more than 3 out of 4 falls occur in the home. More falls occur in July and December than any other time of the year.

Of the fatal falls occurring inside the house, more than half happen in the bedroom. Next most dangerous spots? The living-dining room, kitchen, stairs and bathroom, in that order.

Why is the bedroom such a booby-trap?

For many reasons, the Council says. One of the most important, of course, is the time spent there by young children and older people, some of them infirm or ill. Also, bedrooms are most often used during dark hours, and lighting isn't always what it should be.

Another reason people fall so often in bedrooms is because of the throw rug — a lethal weapon if unanchored.

"The ideal spot for a throw rug is right beside the bed — if you want an accident," the Council says.

How to remove the hazard? "Sew for the purpose."

A handy bed lamp will help cut down on the night-time trip from falls, too, the Council advises.

Other tips:

1. Light stairs and steps. Keep them uncluttered.
2. Fasten window screens securely. Use guards on windows with low ledges.
3. Use a nonslip rubber mat on the bottom of your bathtub or shower. Tubs or showers are slippery — and hard! Also, provide a vertical grab bar on the wall.
4. Keep ladders repaired. Place them and use them properly. Avoid reaching and makeshift substitutes. Sit in chairs — don't climb on them, the Council says.

Corpus Christi Nov 9-12**

CORPUS CHRISTI — (Spl) — Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, heads a list of widely-known state and national leaders who will be speakers at the Texas Farm Bureau's silver anniversary convention to be held here Nov. 9-12.

Other speakers include John C. White, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture; Ed Lipscomb, public relations director for the National Cotton Council; J. H. (Harrell) West, president of the Texas Farm Bureau; and Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Burney of Corpus Christi.

Shuman and Lipscomb will speak on the afternoon of Nov. 11. Agriculture Commissioner White will speak at the morning session that day. West will make his annual address to the members on the opening day of the meeting, Nov. 10. Mr. and Mrs. Burney will speak on the topic "Russia Refined." The well-known Corpus Christi attorney and his wife will tell of their experiences on a trip behind the Iron Curtain.

Filling A Gap

It's a well-known fact that many high school and college courses in economics and business don't cover the ground adequately. For instance, they often fail to include such basic topics as operations of the stock exchanges, investment banking, and kindred matters that play important roles in the economic life of the present.

Positive steps are being taken to remedy these failings. As an example, a group of 36 teachers, enrolled at Teachers College, Columbia University, recently attended a study conference at the New York Stock Exchange for which they will receive academic credit. This Fall a special course in "Stock Exchange Operations" will be inaugurated by the School of Business of Northwestern University. Each summer the securities industry sponsors a month-long educational forum in New York for business and economic professors. Adult investment courses are attracting enthusiastic attendance from coast to coast.

In past times, when, comparatively speaking, only a handful of people had any direct interest in securities investment, there was small need for educational efforts such as these. But the investment

picture has undergone drastic change. Something like 10 million individuals, most of them in the moderate income brackets, now own stock in corporations. A montly investment plan, familiarly known as

MIP, has made it possible for people to buy stocks of their choice out of income, and has been notably successful. And many millions of people have an indirect stake in stocks and other securities, through

ownership of life insurance policies, and savings accounts.

So it's good news that old gap in the teaching of economics is gradually being filled.

Information On TB

What are the chances of your catching tuberculosis from a pet animal? It depends somewhat on the species, but in general the animal runs more risk of getting TB from you.

There are three major strains of tuberculosis germs human, bovine, and avian. Half a century ago it was only too common for people to be infected with bovine germs by drinking the milk of tuberculosis cows. Today it is exceedingly rare in the United States, although still a serious problem in many other countries.

When a dog develops TB, the infection can more often be traced to man than to another animal. Cats, on the other hand, are seldom infected by their owners. Canaries, too, rarely develop human TB. They're naturally more susceptible to the human strain of germs than to the bird type.

Wild animals in their native habitat are believed to be free of TB, but in captivity, exposed to man, they frequently develop the disease. Monkeys appear to be most susceptible of all animals. Even elephants have been known to die of TB, infected by their human keepers in zoos and circuses. Rodents such as guinea pigs, rabbits, and mice rarely are infected with TB when they're kept as pets. Of course, they can be infected artificially in the laboratory for purposes of scientific investigation.

The modern TB problem is primarily a human problem. If bovine TB can be brought under control and kept that way, human TB can also be controlled. The Fisher County Tuberculosis Association has been saying this for years. You can do your share by making sure no mem-

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Car Check Urged In Safety Drive

Most people don't know that they may be harboring a killer right in their own garage.

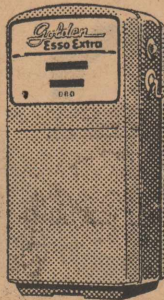

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q— I know the War Orphans Education program is usually for youngsters between 18 and 23, but isn't there some new law that says a child who needs help to overcome a handicap may qualify earlier?

A— Yes. A new law permits

children of deceased war veterans who need training to overcome handicaps to begin special restorative training when they reach age 14.

Q— My husband died recently of a service-connected cause and I am receiving compensation for his death. I am thinking of going to work, but my neighbor tells me if I earn money the compensation will be taken away from me. Is this so?

A— No. Your income from whatever source will not affect your eligibility for compensation payments from VA. Income limitations, however, do apply to VA death pension, paid to widows of veterans who died of nonservice-connected conditions.

Q— I have a Korean GI term insurance policy. Is it possible to convert it to a permanent plan of insurance?

A— If your policy number is pro-

ceeded by the initials "RS", it will be possible to convert to a permanent plan after January 1, 1959.

Q— I understand VA benefit checks can now be forwarded by the Post Office. Is this automatic, or do veterans have to give some sort of notice if they move?

A— Veterans still must give notice. They must file a regular change-of-address form with their local Post Office. And they still should notify VA, so the agency can keep its recurrent current.

New Chapel To Be Dedicated At TB Hospital

SANATORIUM, Oct. 30 — Dedication services for McKnight All-Faith Chapel are set for 4:30 p.m., Nov. 7 at McKnight State Tuberculosis Hospital near San Angelo. Texas Attorney General Will Wilson will speak for the event. U. S. Senator Lyndon Johnson also scheduled will not attend due to pressing Senate committee studies.

The chapel will be presented to the State at this time as a gift from the people. The nine-member Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools will hold its regular monthly meeting at McKnight for this occasion.

Master of ceremonies will be M. M. Miller, senior vice-president, Cosden Petroleum Corp., Big Spring. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. J. L. Manning, J. C. D., chancellor of the San Antonio Arch Diocese, will give the invocation and Dr. B. O. Wood, Minister Emeritus, First Presbyterian Church, San Angelo, will deliver the dedicatory address. The Rev. Boyce Evans, pastor, Bellview Baptist Church, Midland will pronounce the benediction.

An all-faith choir of voices from San Angelo first churches will furnish music. The choir will be accompanied by Millard Allen on the Chapel's electric organ.

The \$70,000 chapel has been built entirely by volunteer contributions from private citizens in the 148 county area served by the hospital. Chapel Chairman M. D. Bryant of San Angelo said gifts ranging from 17 cents to several thousand dollars had been received for the chapel. We know the 17 cents to be the largest proportional giving since it came from a patient and represented all he had, Bryant continued.

About Your HEALTH



A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health. HENRY A. HOLLE, M. D., Commissioner of Health

Do you have a teenager in the house? If you do, in addition to clothes strewn around the house, a continuously occupied telephone, and voracious appetites, you probably listen to complaints about acne—the scourge of teenagers since early times.

There has been much study of acne as a skin disease, but the exact cause is still undetermined. The body's hormonal balance, nutrition, the climate, and certain organisms all play a part. However, there is little doubt that the changes of activity in a youth's physical makeup as he attains adolescence is a major contributor to the problem.

Excess oil is emitted, combining with an overgrowth of skin about the pores, thus obstructing the openings so that oil gland canals become plugged with dried, fatty material causing a local skin obstruction ranging from a tiny blackhead to tender inflamed cysts containing pus.

The two main goals of skin care are improving appearance for psychological reasons and preventing permanent scarring. A good cleansing with hot soapy water and a gentle massage with the finger tips for five to ten minutes each night should be a rule. Never scrub the skin vigorously or roughly as this injures the tender infected dermis. After the skin is rinsed thoroughly with cool water and patted dry, a physician recommended lotion or ointment may be applied. Also pay attention to your scalp, since proper care of the scalp seems to improve the facial acne.

If you have acne, avoid adding more oils in the form of cosmetic creams, lotions or pomades. Also, avoid makeup bases and powders as they may further obstruct the pores.

Some success with ultraviolet light has been obtained, especially in winter months, but such devices should be used only under the care and supervision of your physician. They can be dangerous in the hands of the unformed.

In order to improve the appearance of the skin, some attention must be paid to the acne blemishes

themselves. You are urged to refrain from squeezing blackheads, pustules, and cysts to avoid self-inflicted scar formation and the spread of infection. Hot Compresses, frequent cleansing and the medications prescribed by a physician will usually control the blemishes.

There is some indication that diet is a contributing factor in some instances. A reduction in your intake of nuts, strong cheeses and chocolate should be undertaken in many cases.

Observe the proved rules of good health. Get plenty of exercise and enough sleep. Eat regular, well-balanced meals and drink six to eight glasses of water each day. Frequent baths and shampoos will keep excess oils from accumulating.

Who Will Be Tomorrow's Victim

The newspapers of this country, with few if any exceptions, have closed ranks in denouncing a ruling of the Internal Revenue Service which holds that institutional advertising of private electric companies opposing socialization of their industry is not a legitimate business expense, and so is not deductible for tax purposes. The IRS has applied similar rulings to other organizations and enterprises placing advertising of a comparable nature.

As an example, here is a resolution passed by the Montana State Press Association at its recent annual convention: "WHEREAS, it has traditionally been the unchallenged right of business, through its own paid advertising, to bring to the attention of people whatever may be of proper concern to its own welfare, the interest of its employees, its customers and the general public, and

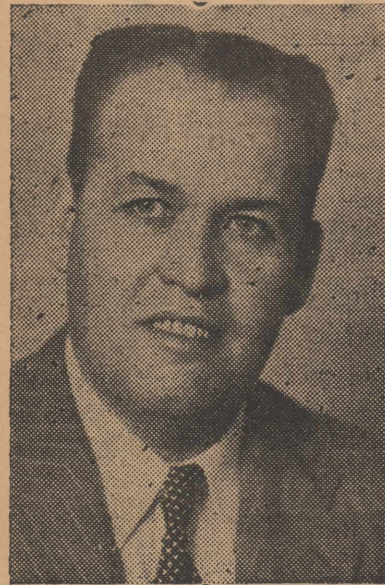
"WHEREAS, the throttling of such advertising by punitive penalty represents a clear handmuffing of our economic system by preventing the right of business to present its own case, in contrast to which non-taxpaying concerns of public bodies are allowed free rein, thus giving them a discriminatory advantage.

WHAT THE BIBLE SAYS

One who attempts to preach the gospel and refuses to present the whole truth on any subject is unfaithful, and is under the curse of heaven. (Gal. 3:10), this is for the eyes and ears of preachers. Take for example baptism, what does the Bible teach relative to it? First, that:

(Matt. 28:18-20.) There are preachers who will not teach this COMMANDMENT.

2. BAPTISM is one of the conditions of salvation. "He that believeth and is BAPTIZED shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." (Mark 16:16). "Then Peter said unto them, repent, and be BAPTIZED every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the REMISSIONS OF SINS, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." (Acts 2:38). There are many people who try to evade this COMMANDMENT.



3. One cannot be born again without being BAPTIZED in water for the remission of sins. "Jesus answered, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man (not and infant) be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the Kingdom of God." (John 3:5).

4. BAPTISM is into the name of the Godhead. "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, BAPTIZING them into the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." (Matt. 28:19.) A denominational preacher CANNOT preach his COMMANDMENT.

5. BAPTISM is a burial, not a sprinkling or a pouring. "Know ye not, that so many of us as were BAPTIZED into Jesus Christ were BAPTIZED into His death? Therefore we are buried with him by BAPTISM into death: That like as Christ was raised up from the death by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." (Romans 6:3,4,5) "Buried with Him in BAPTISM, wherein also the dead." (Col. 2:12.) So "BAPTISM doth also NOW save US." (1 Pet. 3:21.)

Austin — Anticipating a record year, more than 41,000 Texas sportsmen bought hunting licenses during September, according to the Fiscal Director of the Game and Fish Commission. September 1 began the second year of the \$3.15 hunting license fee.

Remitting agents had until October 10 to pay for licenses sold during September; therefore, this does not include money on all licenses sold, the Director explained.

Sales of all types of licenses is expected to increase this year due to the good condition of game and fish populations throughout the state, the Director said.

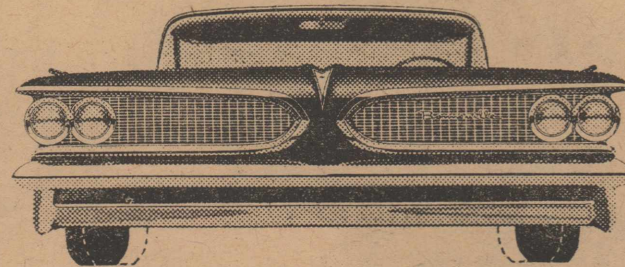

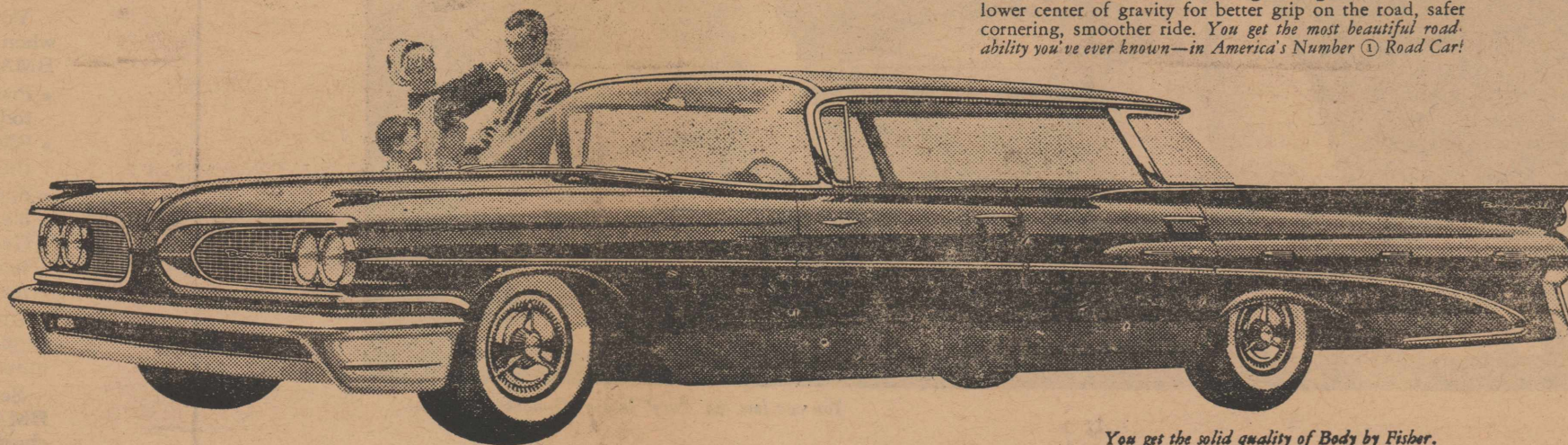
