## Rebelette's Win Cinches District Title

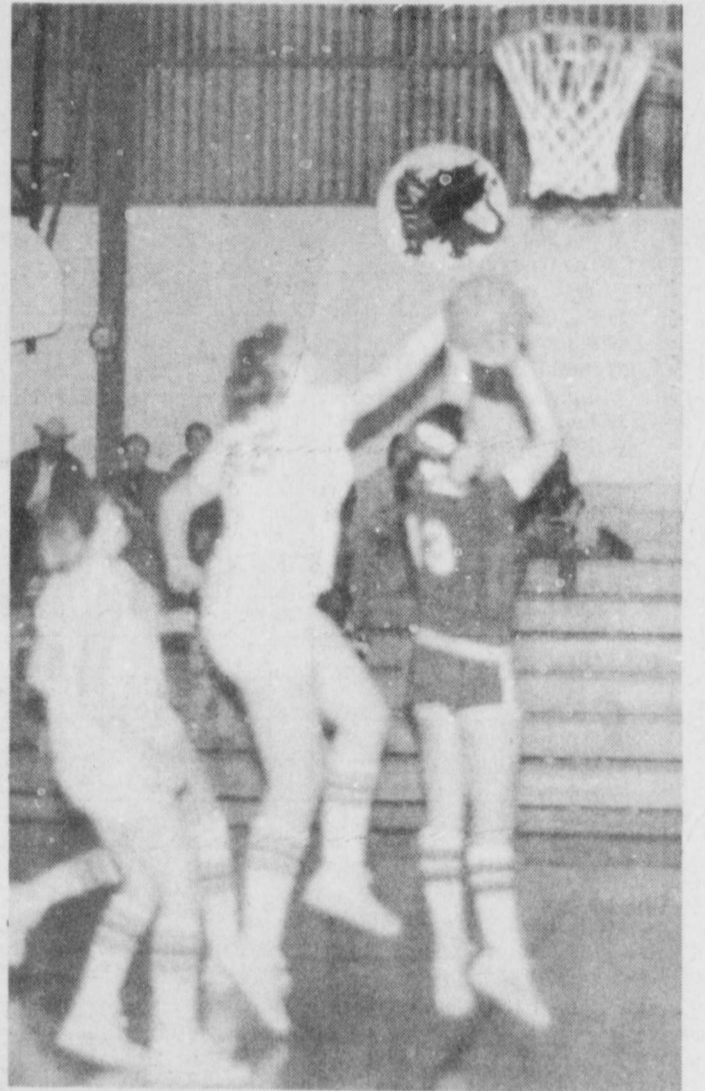

The FFA provides a unique opportunity for young people to learn and develop their potential to the fullest. In its 53rd year, it is still growing, expanding and improving. It really provides a comprehensive, over-all learning experience.

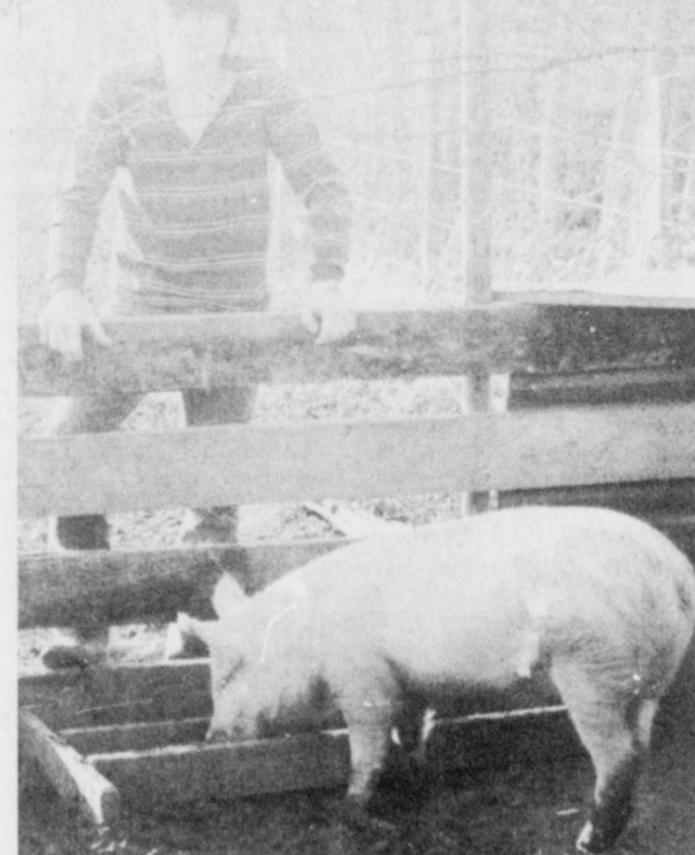
