Mrs. McGowen died Tuesday in Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene. She was the former Lella E. Thaxton. Her husband, John H. McGowen preceded her in death in 1936.

Miss. March 20, 1881. She had been a resident of Baird for the past 67 years. She was the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. M. C. Thaxton, and the town of Thaxton, Miss., was named for her father, a pioneer physician.

She was a member of the First Baptist Church of Baird, Order of the Eastern Star, and the Baird Garden Club. She taught a Sunday School class for many years in the First Baptist Church. She attended Toca-pola College in Mississippi, and later taught school in the state of Mississippi.

Jim Snyder, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Snyder of Baird, has been selected as one of the seven contestants throughout the United States to compete in the National American Junior Hereford Speech Contest, to be held in connection with the annual AJHA Convention in Kansas City, Mo., on Sunday, Oct. 20.

Jim was notified of the honor by Lovell Kuykendall, National Director of Junior Youth Activities of the American Hereford Association, who made the selection of the top seven after hearing contestants in each of the state contests earlier in the year. County Well Flows Oil

A Cook Sand producer looms for the area eight miles southwest of Eula in the regular field.

The venture is Davis Brothers of Abilene No. 1 Albert Betcher Jr., Section 7, Block 6, SP Survey.

A drillstem test taken at 1,784 to 1,813 feet in the Cook Sand surfaced gas in four minutes.

Recovery was 500 feet of free oil. Flowing pressure was 140 pounds; and 30-minute shut-in pressure 500 pounds.

A project was deepened and recompleted as a gas well 10 miles northeast of Abilene.

It is Nueve Operating Co. of Texas, an Abilene firm, No. 2 Edgar Davis. Location is 330 feet from the south and west lines of the southeast quarter of Section 89, Block 13, T. 2 P. Survey.

Absolute, open flow was seven million cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 3,415-29 feet, fractured with 5,000 gallons of water and 5,000 pounds of sand.

The 5 1/2-inch casing is set at 3,474 feet. Total depth was 3,474 feet, plugged back to 3,470.

It was previously completed from perforations at 3,154-65 feet opposite the Palo Pinto Sand.

Twin Mountain Inc., of Graham will drill No. 1 Conlee in the regular field two miles south of Cross Plains.

The planned 800 foot venture is 1,320 feet from the north and 3,000 feet from the east lines of J. Simmons Survey 779, A-543.

C. O. Fleming Attends Austin Conference

C. O. Fleming, Veterans County Service Officer for Callahan County, attended the 21st annual Statewide Rehabilitation Conference for Veterans Service Officers, which was held at the Austin Hotel in Austin, Sept. 23-26.

This Conference was conducted by the Veterans Affairs Commission of Texas, in cooperation with the American Legion, Disabled American Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Veterans of World War I, and the Veterans County Service Officers Assn. of Texas. Purpose of the meeting was to offer Service Officers from the entire state of Texas an opportunity to gain first-hand knowledge of recently enacted legislation dealing with benefits to veterans and their dependents and survivors. Topics discussed during the four-day Conference included disability compensation and pension, Government insurance, GI loans, Education and

training for veterans and children, hospitalization and medical treatment, and veterans employment and reemployment rights.
