Thunder Prairie Publishing is on-line!

Thunder Prairie Publishing is storming through cyberspace! What may very well be the largest chain of small newspapers has gone on-line.

They now have a home page on the internet, available to people worldwide.

"It is the future, but it doesn't change a thing about the way we do business" publisher Nanalee Nichols says. "Right now, we have our information and advertising rates available on the web. We will have our entire classified page on-line, hopefully this week, along with "Nichols Worth" and some other items of interest. If you have internet access, just find us at <http://www.1starnet.com/tpp>. If you aren't on-line don't worry about it, we know lots of people aren't," she continues. "But just think, our on-line classified page can now be read not by thousands, but by hundreds of thousands!" She stresses that the classified page makes it very clear that items for sale and services offered are in North-East Texas. That keeps someone in New York, for instance, from trying to have gravel delivered to them! It does boost the amount of readership the classifieds get enormously.

All five of the Thunder Prairie Publishing papers will, of course, still be published as always. Each week the Deport Times, Bogata News, Blossom Times, Detroit Weekly and Talco Times will roll off the presses and be delivered by mail.

"This certainly isn't going to replace our papers through the mail...instead it's an ADDITIONAL service we offer readers", Nichols smiled. "We've always prided ourselves that we have a great combination of technology and old-fashioned, down-home news" the publisher says. "We still answer our own phones...no

voice mail, we still love to have people's local news, features and photos, but we also like to provide our advertisers and readers with the best possible vehicle for their needs".

Thunder Prairie Publishing went to desk top publishing almost immediately after it was introduced. Because of its affordability, and because of the tremendous advances it offered, it was an easy transition to make.

When it came to going on-line, though "I confess that the whole idea of the world-wide-web was a little scary at first" Nichols admits. "I didn't know a single thing about it. But, thanks to Larry Rhea at StarNet Online Systems in Paris, we looked things over and decided that this would be a logical, easy step. Larry made the whole process simple, easy and cost effective, amazingly cost effective" she finished.

Thomas Nichols was actually the person in the organization that thought going on-line would be a good idea. "I told him that I didn't think many of our readers would be on-line" Nanalee laughs, "the day after we went on the web two people said they had seen us, first thing! That indicates that there are more people in this area on-line than I had thought."

No, going on-line won't change the way Thunder Prairie Publishing does business. "The time may come when you will have a choice as to how you would like your paper...through the mail or over the internet. But, that will be the reader's choice. We're not about to force folks into doing something they don't want to do." Nanalee concludes. "We just want to be part of the changing world as well as keeping a good, solid hold on traditional values."

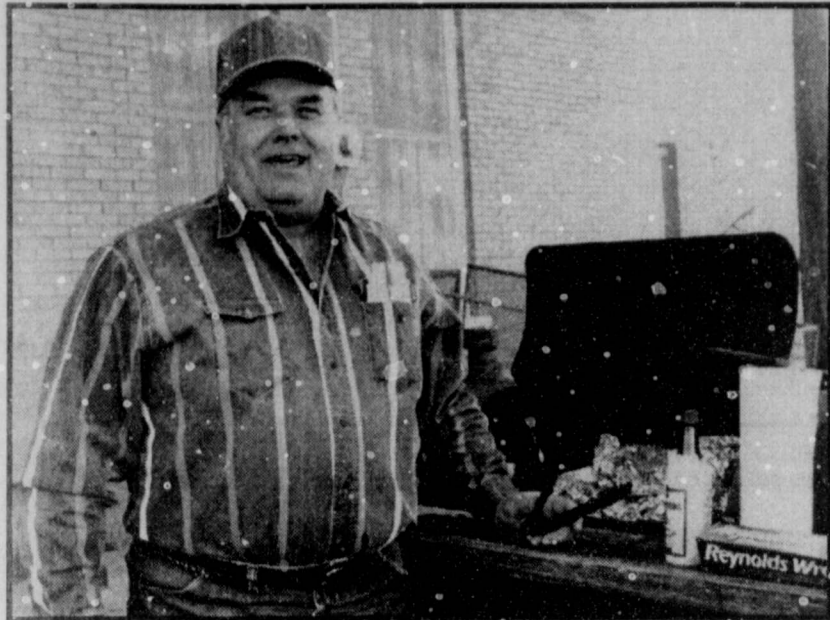

Country Cooking

With Deport's Chili Cook-off coming up this weekend (April 6) and Prairiland's Stew Cook-off (April 13) coming up next weekend, I began looking around for someone who did some outdoor cooking (as in large amounts). Mike Blackburn of Blossom was the answer to this question. He has cooked in both of these events for the past few years and in several others around this area.

He also cooks for the Red River Valley Fair Chili Cook-off and is also called upon to cook for Family Reunions, employee dinners (before retiring from Uarco), Christmas gatherings and family camping trips and many other outdoor activities. He thinks nothing of cooking for a crowd of 100-200. He can often be seen with smoke coming from the hardware store in Blossom, that his

son Craig manages. He leaves the smoker at the hardware store and cooks an occasional meal of ribs, brisket and beans for whoever shows up that day. (I'll remember to be sure and stop in the day I see smoke rolling from that area!)

Mike is married to Becky, a recently featured Cook of the Week and they reside in the Sylvan community.

You ask why Mike cooks in such large quantities? He enjoys outdoor cooking and competing in the cook-offs and if you know the Blackburn family... there is several of them!

Stop by Saturday in Deport and have a bowl of chili with him and see if you can get his Chili recipe from him... he won't give it to me! Men have a thing about keeping their recipes a secret! See you in the kitchen!

Quick Red Beans

2 pounds red beans
2 cans Rotel tomatoes
2 chopped onions
Wash beans thoroughly and submerge in boiling water for 20 minutes. Turn heat down to simmer and add tomatoes and onions. Cook for 1 hour to 1-1/2 hours or until beans are tender.

Hush Puppies

12 packages hushpuppy mix
12 eggs
6 onions-finely chopped
6 bell peppers-finely chopped
1 large can cream-style corn
Mix all ingredients with milk to a spooning texture. Drop by teaspoon amounts into grease at 325 degrees turning once to achieve golden brown color. Approximate serving is for 100 people.

Beef Stew

3-4 pound roast or stew meat
2 quarts water
1 can tomatoe juice or canned tomatoes
1 whole onion
1 Tablepoon salt
1/2 teaspoon black pepper

2 teaspoon worchestershire sauce

1/2 teaspoon chili powder
1 bunch celery-chopped
1 bag carrots-sliced
3-4 potatoes-cut up
1 can whole kernel corn(optional)
Brown meat. Add water, tomatoe or juice, onion and seasonings. Cover and simmer for 2 hours. Add vegetables and cover to cook for 1 hour longer.

Barbecued Ribs

4 pounds meaty loin back ribs
1 cup chopped onion
1/4 cup salad oil
1-8 ounce can seasoned tomatoe juice
1/2 cup water
1/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup lemon juice
3 tablepoons worchestershire sauce
2 tablepoons prepared mustard
2 tablepoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
Cook onion in hot oil until tender. Add remaining ingredients; simmer uncovered 15 minutes. After ribs cook 40 minutes, baste well with sauce. Cook 20 minutes longer or til well done.

ETMC Clarksville names new administrator

Terry D. Cutler will join East Texas Medical Center Clarksville in mid-May as the hospital's new administrator, Jerry Massey, East Texas Medica Center Regional Healthcare System senior vice president-affiliate hospital operations, has announced.

Longtime Red River General Hospital administrator Jim Luft is retiring, but has agreed to serve in an advisory capacity during the Clarksville hospital's transition period.

The 52-bed hospital, located on U.S. Highway 82, west of Clarksville, becomes an affiliate of the Tyler-based ETMC System on April 1.

"Mr. Luft will continue to be an asset to the Clarksville hospital as he devotes his energies to the transition to our rapidly-growing system," Mr. Massey said.

"We are very pleased to have a person of Mr. Cutler's caliber assume the administrator position at ETMC Clarksville," Mr. Massey added. "His background in hospital administration and physician relations will be well utilized at ETMC Clarksville and he is looking forward to becoming a part of the community."

Mr. Cutler comes to the ETMC System from Trinity Memorial Hospital in Trinity, where he has served as administrator and chief executive officer since October, 1990. In this role, Mr. Cutler directed the 22-bed hospital's day-to-day operations, short and long-range planning, physician recruiting and hospital organization.

Prior to assuming administrative duties in 1990, Mr. Cutler served as director of x-ray and central supply at the Trinity hospital, and as an x-ray technician for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice in Huntsville and at the former Houston County Hospital in Crockett, which is now affiliated with the ETMC System as ETMC Crockett.

Mr. Cutler, who holds an associate in applied science degree in radiologic technology from Angelina College in Lufkin, earned a bachelor of arts degree in general business and radiologic technology from Sam Houston State University, Huntsville.

The new administrator's wife, Terri, is a recent graduate of Sam Houston State University, earning a bachelor of business administration degree in accounting.

The couple will be relocating to Clarksville/Red River County in the near future.

In addition to its flagship-ETMC System includes ETMC hospitals in the East Texas cities of Athens, Crockett, Mt. Vernon, Pittsburg and Rusk as well as an extensive area wide network of clinics home health programs, rehabilitation facilities and

other health services.

The affiliation agreement between the ETMC System and RRGH was announced in February. Under terms of that agreement, ETMC Clarksville will be guided by a board of directors consisting of representatives of the ETMC System and Clarksville/Red River County community leaders.

ETMC Clarksville employs 135 and has a medical staff of six, representing the specialties of family practice, internal medicine, general surgery and cardiology.

The Clarksville hospital also provides general acute care and diagnostic services, laboratory programs and an intensive/coronary care unit, physical therapy, emergency care and home health services in nursing and respiratory care. In addition, ETMC Clarksville operates rural health clinics in the nearby communities of Bogata and DeKalb.

National Commander Speaks to VFW

Paul A Spera, the 1995-96 National commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, spoke to a gathering of local veteran and dignitaries at VFW 8560 in Sulphur Springs on Tuesday, March 26th. National Commander Spera, traveling with Texas State Commander Paul Duff, State Sr. Vice Commander Alexander Vernon and N.F. Layne State Jr. Vice Commander visited Congressional Candidate Max Sandlin, an aide from Jim Chapman's office the Hopkins County Judge, and Sheriff and several Hopkins County Hospital Administrators. This was a two hour stop-over breakfast as they traveled across the state of Texas.

"The VFW works every way we can to make life better for our active duty veterans," local veterans were told by Commander Spera. He went on to tell of "Operation Call Home", a joint venture between AT&T and the VFW. Veterans stationed in Bosnia during the Christmas Holidays were each presented with a \$20 prepaid calling card, and with special lines open were able to call home on Christmas Day. Spera announced that it is in the planning stages for this to become a permanent program for overseas Military and VA Hospitalized patients.

The commander also discussed Veterans Health Care. "We have another job, serving those that have already served... There are those in Congress that want to do something to cut the budget... I am concerned about Veterans. They were promised lifetime health care but those in Congress are now nickle and diming away veteran's entitlements. The same entitlements that they were promised 20,30,40 years ago when they volunteered to stay in the service and serve their country. Yes, your Congressman votes to increase the VA budget, but they fail to tell you that it is far below the cost of living increase. Thus the VA cannot keep up with the needs of a growing segment of aging veterans." Spera went on to say, "I have been told by VA Hospital Directors across the Nation that any further VA Hospital cuts will come directly from patient care". According to national statistics, 9 out of every 10 veterans get turned away from VA Hospital care.

"We as voters, have not been noisy enough", according to Commander Spera. "We let them (Congress) tell us how wonderful they are, how grateful this nation is for its veterans, but then they go and make budget cuts affecting the health care of these same veterans." Recently an independent Veterans Group has been formed. It is comprised of veterans from other Veterans organizations. The purpose of this group is to ensure the protection of our aging veterans entitlements and health care. They have come up with a three point plan to meet this goal.

1. Change VA eligibility requirements, so that most veterans will be able to receive VA Hospital care.
2. Current regulations are tying the Va's hands, change these regulations. For example: A veteran can go to the VA Hospital/ Clinic for eye exams and outpatient surgery. The VA Hospital cannot provide him with glasses after that surgery unless he is admitted to the hospital.
3. Let Medicare/Medical pay for VA benefits. Don't penalize the Va Hospital system. Have the same guidelines apply for VA hospitals as public sector hospitals concerning medical reimbursements.

Congress Sonny Montgomery has recently introduced bills on these issues. They have bi-partisan support in both the House and Senate. The Senate version is S1563 and the House version is HR3119. Commander Spera asked that we contact our local congressman and senator and request that they sign as co-sponsors of these bills and give them their full support.

Commander Spera closed "We must answer the call to duty, it is time for us to get involved in politics. We need to get involved at the grass roots level. Let our Legislators know our concerns and needs, and then hold them accountable for their actions."

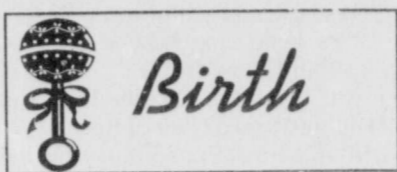

Remember that the offering received goes entirely to the church community fund to help our neighbors in emergency needs. Your generous gifts continue to make this effort meaningful.

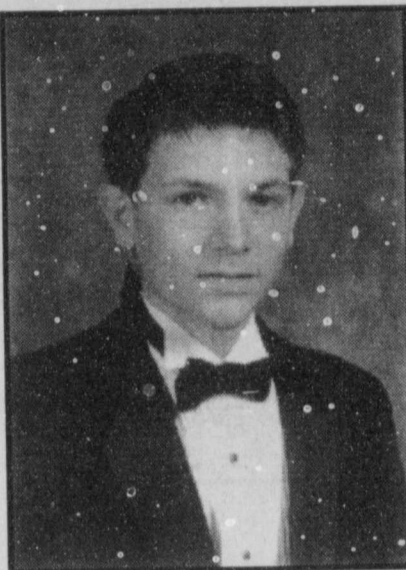

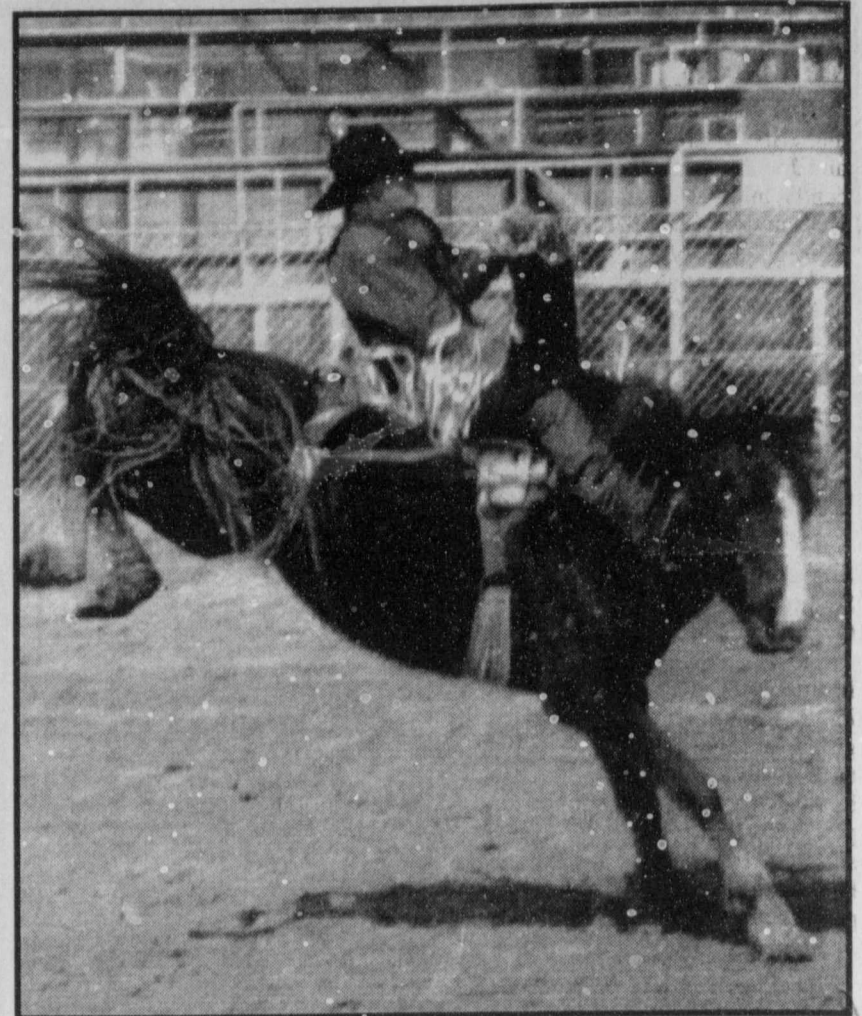

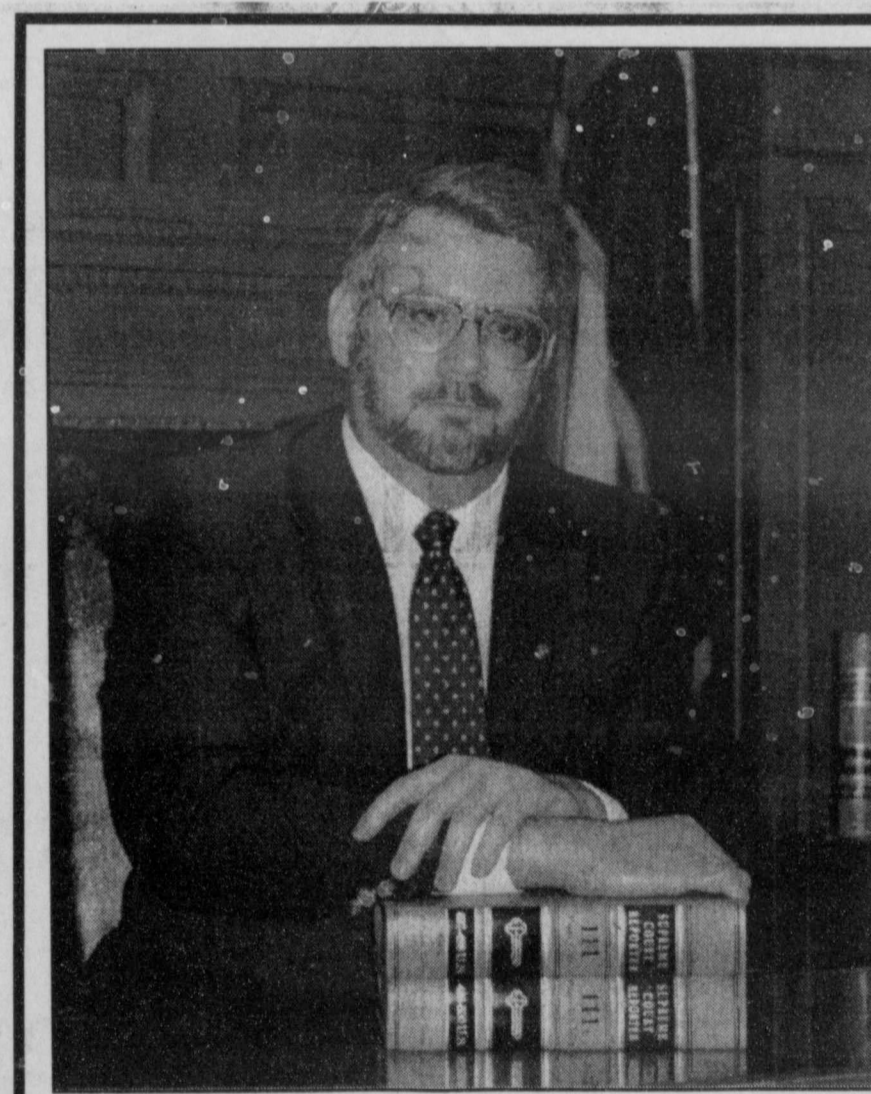

County Attorney Jack Herrington said the offenses arose out of a drive by shooting of a ten year old boy in February of 1995. After an altercation with the father, Porter drove by the house of the child, got out of his car and fired 2 shots toward the house. Thirty minutes later Porter came back and fired at least four more shots from a Chinese made SKS Rifle at the child and the father. The child was hit in the arm. He was airlifted to Wadley Hospital and doctors were

able to save his arm. He has undergone 2 surgeries and a fourth is scheduled this summer. After denying his part in the shooting for over a year, Porter took the stand at punishment and confessed to the shooting. He said he hid the gun in the attic of his apartment and later threw it in the Red River. Porter is married and has a six month old child. Herrington said Porter must serve one half of his sentence day for day with no good time credit before he will even be eligible for parole.

The jury trial system has worked to serve justice, Herrington said. The jury has sent a message that this type of conduct will not be tolerated in Red River County.

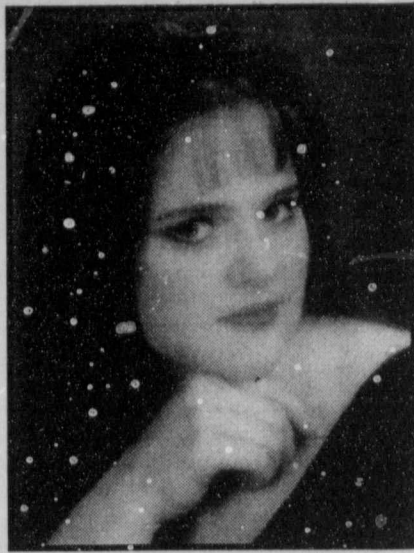
Tawala Padgett is Chi Omega initiate at SHSU

Don't look up even when lying down

The year was 1885, 5 years after H.C. F. Dodd (1856-1914) had married Belle Smiley (1858-1932). There were a total of 11 children born to this couple residing in Rosalie. H.C.F. had arrived in Texas from Spartansburg, N.C. when he was only one year old. H.C.F. married one Smiley girl and his brother Herschel (1856-1906) had married her sister, Mary. Herschel and Mary were married in 1875. H.C.F. and Belle were married on January 14, 1880. H.C.F. was nicknamed "Jack". If you had a name like Hiram Cornelius Franklin Dodd wouldn't you need a more simple name? That was Jack. I am also nicknamed "Jack". With a name like Henry Clay Dodd, Jr. I didn't need one more. I changed my name when I started the first grade in Rosalie. No problem, just started signing my name "Jack" on all the papers. Of course I was still Henry Jr. to all the family.

The first child born to H.C.F. and Belle was Martha (Dutch) who later married Dr. Jones in Rosalie. These were the parents of Lucy Bell Holder. Then came Cora. She moved to New

Mexico and reared her family. My father H.C. Senior was the lost child born on the old log cabin homestead about one and one half miles from Rosalie Store. Charles McDeamond lives there now in a new lovely home. These three had been born in a log cabin just west of Charles' present home. It was time to expand. So in 1885 Jack Dodd started a one story house down by the main road. Main road being Bogata to Clarksville. Jack's father had purchased 150 acres on the road years before for 75 cents per acre. A classic homesite as chosen, a well dug and foundation started. Planks were from 6 inches wide to 41 inches wide, at least those that were cut locally. However, many loads of lumber came out of Paris. Grandpapa would take 2 team wagons to Paris one day and return the next.

On one lumber trip a strange thing happened. Grandpapa told Jack to take that old stray dog with him to Paris and lose him. She didn't want him around. So on this trip Jack took the stray with him. Dogs were smarter than they could walk or trot under the wagon for miles in the shade and

never get run over. Dogs can't do that today. Sorta like the couple driving down the road and saw a 3 legged chicken running along side the car. He was going about 20 miles per hour. He pointed out to his wife that a 3 legged chicken was running beside the car. She looked, he goosed the car up to 50 miles per hour. Still the 3 legged chicken right there by the driver's door. About this time the chicken turned left up a dirt road. The driver slammed on his brakes and followed the 3 legged chicken. About one half mile down the dirt road was an old shotgun house with a whole yard of 3 legged chickens. An elderly man came off the porch and greeted the couple. The driver asked, "Where in the world did you get all those 3 legged chickens?" My son likes drumsticks and has a program going to grow chickens that each one has 3 drumsticks. The driver was amazed. "How do they taste," asked the driver of the car. The old man replied, "Don't rightly know, never been able to catch one".

Grandpapa Jack left out with 2 teams of mules and a big wagon for Paris and the Stray Dog. The trip to Paris went well, got loaded up about dark. No sign of the old stray dog so Jack took off out of town toward home with his load of lumber. He planned to go about 3 miles and spend the night.

This house that was about to be built was a one story. Only 4 years later a second floor was added. Big old house but cold in the winter. Can't seem to remember the hot nights, we slept on 2 beds out on the back porch. A lot of love was in that old house that burned in 1952. I thought the house had quite a bit of old furniture in it. I didn't realize until years later that house was full of antiques.

I got caught playing keeps with marbles in the seventh grade by Coach Garrett. There were about 8 of us. He gave us a choice, a whipping or 1 hour after school for 2 weeks. Wilford Lowry and I more chose a whipping. Coach used electrical cord and really did whip Wilford and the other boy. I had thought about a whipping, but changed my mind. I lied to my parents, something I very seldom did, but I did. I told them I had joined the school choir and had to practice. I had dumb parents. They should have known better than that. Well, each day I would run from Bogata to Rosalie to do my chores, singing one

song after the other when I got home. This one day I was running down the road and turned in at the house and saw Mother in the front swing talking to Noma Jean Bell and her mother. Now Noma Jean and I had never been mean to each other, but didn't play that much either. She was bossy. Noma Jean looks up and says, "There's Jack, still has one week left to stay after school." Mother says, "We are very proud of Jack for making the choir this year." Noma Jean smiled just as I walked up and yelled out, "He got caught playing keeps by Coach Garrett." My daddy set a pattern for all whippings. "This is for lying to me." If your don't think a belt on the butt will help you make the right decisions, you are wrong. When decision time came, I was always wondering what Daddy would think and if the Devil would get me. Between the two some pretty good decisions were made.

About dark thirty Grandpapa Jack pulled the wagon off the road. Tied the mules, spread his quilts under a big pecan tree and lay down. He looked up and saw 2 boot soles hanging above him. There had been a hanging. Got up, hitched up the team, drove about 2 miles and tried it again. Grandpapa was sound asleep when something woke him up. He was a tall man and as most were then, pretty scrappy. In the moonlight he saw two men over by the wagon. One pointed, he would go this way toward Grandpapa and the other man would circle around. Well Grandpapa kept a revolver under his pillow at all times. He let the men get closer and closer and about the time he was going to pull the pistol, shoot in the air and holler to scare and run off the would be robbers-out of nowhere came this old Stray Dog. That dog bit, chewed and chased those 2 men for 30 minutes. You could hear that old stray way in the woods still biting and barking for a long time.

Needless to say, the next day when Grandpapa Jack rode into the yard of their new homeplace the old Stray was in the seat with Grandpapa. My daddy told me that Grandpapa said to Belle, "Belle the dog stays." Nothing else was ever said about losing the stray dog. She stayed.

Lindeman was awarded a knife made of gold, turquoise and jade and a jacket with a wild turkey embroidery.

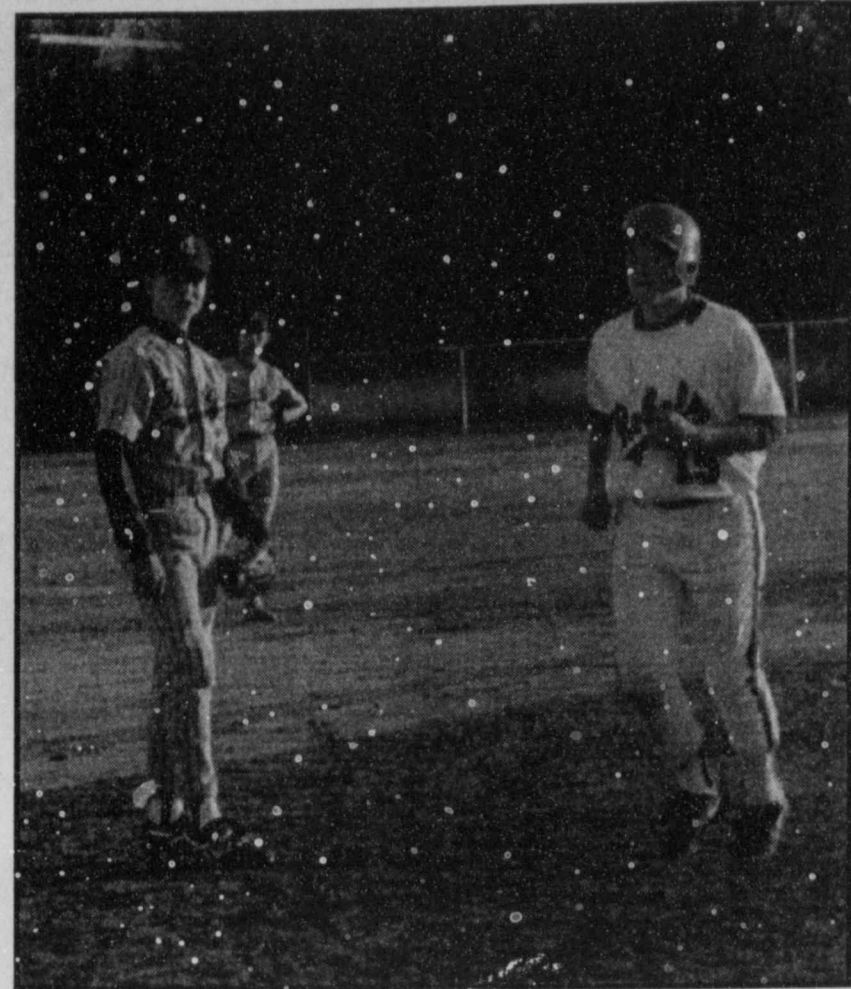

Do you know of a child that has been abused? Probably not, most children that are abused don't tell anyone. They don't tell because they are threatened by the person that is abusing them. Red River County is one of the 30 sites in Texas selected by the Children's Trust Fund of Texas Council to continue its funding initiative, Family PRIDE. A local Family PRIDE Council has been established and will work to inform the community of this initiative and gather information on the prevention needs of the community.

As a Family Pride Community, Red River County will be eligible for CTF funding for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1996. Any legal constituted entity (other than a state agency) may apply for a grant. To request a packet, call 512-370-9566. The local Family PRIDE Council of Red River County is holding a respondent's conference on April 23, 1996 at 6:30 p.m. in the Red River County Courthouse. This meeting will hopefully bring together agencies/organizations interested in submitting proposals together and to collaborate and coordinate programs. The Children's Trust Fund of Texas

was established in 1985 by the Texas Legislature to support community-based programs to prevent child abuse and neglect. Revenue comes from a portion of each marriage license fee, the federal prevention grants and donations. The goal of Children's Trust Fund, a state agency, is to promote and provide opportunities so that Texas children can grow to responsible and productive adulthood free of threats to their dignity, physical safety and emotional well-being.

For more information about Family Pride, contact one of our county members as soon as possible so that we will not miss out on the grant money for Red River County. If you read the police reports and the grand jury indictments you are well aware that child abuse is definitely on the rise in our county. Things aren't always what they appear

The year was 1939, which could have been a good year without the drought, mumps and depression. Rosalie was as good a place to be during all this dry weather and hard time. Everyone's life was sort of like the two men hiking in the woods. A big grizzly bear reared up in front of them. One of the hikers sat down, took off his shoulder bag, took out his tennis shoes and starting replacing his big heavy boots with the tennis shoes. His partner asked "You think you gonna out run that bear?" He answered, "Don't have to, just have to outrun you!"

Praying was very popular in 1939. There was a lot to pray for; rain, better times, new shoes, rain, better times, etc. It was during this time the sheriff got a call about a local farmer with 6 children living out toward Cuthand killing a new exotic bird. This was a beautiful bird but was protected from being killed. The sheriff went out for the farmer and asked him about the bird. The farmer said, "Sure did. My family was hungry and I had a shotgun shell left. I went into

the woods to kill the first thing I saw that we could eat. Yep! I killed the bird."

The sheriff took the bird killer to face the judge. "Yes, Judge, I killed the bird. My family was hungry and I did it for them." The judge turned the farmer loose, never to kill the exotic bird any more. The sheriff was taking the farmer back home and couldn't wait any longer. "Just what does one of those exotic birds taste like? I have always wanted to know." The farmer thought a minute and then said, "About half way between a whooping crane and a bald eagle."

I was plowing the other day and a big Lincoln stopped on the highway. A man got out and hollered, "How do you get to Clarksville?" I stopped the tractor, thought a minute and hollered back, "My son usually takes me." Started up and plowed on. After a long time the Lincoln drove off very slowly. Some days no answer seems to please a person.

This was one of those years that we had to haul water from the spring behind the Garren's house down on the creek. That sure was a good spring. Two years ago I tried to find it. The past has gone by us, no spring. I was hauling water with a team of

mules, Simon and Mandy. We had two 55 gallon drums on a sled. You lost a lot of water and it seemed our milk cows could drink 58 gallons of water each, and we were watering 16, or so. Well, one day we were going to the spring, and something scared the team of mules and they went. The sled was going from side to side, both barrels off and finally the sled hit a tree and flipped old Simon to the ground. A stick stuck in his right eye and put it out. We kept on hauling water while Simon was getting used to his loss of sight in one eye.

Late that fall Daddy and I were cooling off on the back porch and I had just turned the team loose in the lot. Ever see an old mule wallow in the sand? If humans could wallow in the sand like a mule after a hard day's work, half of our mental problems would be solved. Well, old Simon was wallowing, he was tired and wallowed a long time before he stopped and laid still to rest a bit. It just so happened his right eye socket was looking up, the one he punched out.

There were two big buzzards circling overhead and both spotted Simon with his eye socket up. They circled around and finally landed on the gate to the lot. Those were big buzzards. Daddy and I wondered what would happen next. Well, the biggest of the buzzards hopped down, walked around old Simon twice looking it all over. In case you don't know, a buzzard will start eating an animal at a natural body opening every time.

That old buzzard was determined to tackle this old mule. Simon's tail was up a bit and the old buzzard took a quick hard peck just under Simon's tail. I have never before or since seen any mule as startled and scared. Down came the tail, up off the ground came Simon and out the back gate he went with the buzzard flopping behind. About 50 yards up the hill behind the barn, the old buzzard was blown away. Now there were 2 startled scared animals in the same pasture. The old buzzard finally stumbled off under a fence line to figure it all out and Simon came back to the barn after a while.

We had a lot of dry, sultry work days on the farm after that, but I never saw Simon wallow any more. That was sad because Simon was a good wallower.

Estimated Tax

for 1996

People who expect to owe at least \$500 in tax for 1996 after subtracting withholding and credits may need to estimate taxes before their annual return is due.

Estimated tax is the way to pay tax on income that is not covered by withholding. This income includes self-employment, unemployment compensation, interest, dividends, alimony, rents and awards. If the amount of income tax withheld from salary, pension or other income is not enough to cover the taxes on this unwithheld income, estimated tax payments should be made.

To figure and pay estimated tax, use Form 1040-ES, "Estimated Tax for Individuals," which includes a worksheet to help calculate the payment. Each payment must be accompanied by the payment voucher from Form 1040-ES.

People who have income subject to estimated tax during the first payment period (January through March) must make the first payment by April 15, 1996. They can pay all their estimated tax at that time, or in four installments. Each period has a specific due date. The other installment due dates are June 17, September 16, and January 15 of the next year.

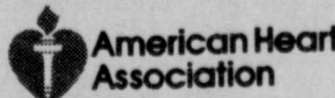

Storm cellars have multiple uses

The year was 1940. 1940 was a hot summer year. The Fosters lived just down the road a ways, sort of over yonder from our house. One of their sons, Paul, was born the same year and on the same day as I was. We sort of grew up as extra close friends, because any two people born on the same day must have been meant by the Almighty to be close.

It was during August of that year, 1940, that Paul and I were playing in the barn one Friday (why we were not plowing or working is beyond me) when Paul suggested we go down into the storm cellar and cool off. Now Mr. Foster had his own vineyard and made his own wine, some people say the very best. Now all of this wine was stored in the cool storm cellar. We were both hot and Paul said the wine was sure cool.

Now I was old enough to know not to drink any alcoholic beverage, but it was over 100 degrees outside, cool in the storm cellar and the wine, so says Paul, is nearly like ice water.

This was the same year that a local family that shall remain somewhat unknown to most had a dog and church problem. This country family that lived over yonder from us, had an old blue tick hound. The Mrs. always fed the old dog and the dog loved the Mrs. The problem was the old dog came in the church's open door and laid at the end of the pew where the family was sitting.

Now any of you familiar with hound dogs know that laying on cool planks with a breeze causes them to roll over on their backs, legs up and groan, growl and on occasions expel some gas. Now the Mrs. was a little embarrassed by all of this so she told the Mr. to do something with the old dog to keep him out of church. Their son and I went to the movies every Saturday afternoon so the Mr. gave

his son .25 cents, 15 cents for High Life and 10 cents for the show. We went by Devaney's Drug and got 15 cents worth of High Life for the Mr. with little knowledge about what was to happen later. We could have gotten two milk shakes and I hamburger at the café for 15 cents and would have been a lot better off than buying the High Life.

The Methodist Church in Rosalie had a group of big oak trees in the front yard. Many of them are still there. The following day the family from over yonder all went to church. It was hot and the church's front door was wide open, in fact both doors. About the singing of the first song, the old blue tick hound ambled in, circled 3 times to find the upwind direction and laid down at the end of the pew where the family sat. By the singing of the second song the old dog had started his grunting and groaning and the Mrs. started hissing to the Mr. to get the dog out of the church.

It was at this time that the Mr. and son should have shot the old dog or better still have us take the dog to the storm cellar. But the Mr., and the son, my age, exactly, got up, pulled the old hound out front of the church under the oak trees. The Mr. told his son to grab the dog's hind legs and hoist him up at which time 15 cents worth of High Life was poured on the old dog's rump. The Mr. then twisted the dog's tail round and round until the high life and rump got very warm at which time the old hound came to life. Clawing with his front feet, howling like the he was being killed and finally the Mr. said, "Son, turn him loose." He did as his father kicked at the old dog and hollered, "Now get to the house."

House, Hell, that old hound circled around the big oak trees in front of the

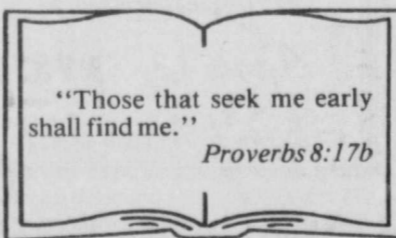
church a few times and then, Yep, started for the front door of the Methodist Church at Rosalie, Texas. The minute that hound hit the church floor he dropped his hind legs out from under him and clawed his way with his front feet plumb to the front of the church. The pastor hollered, "My God, he's mad," and left through the back door that very few ever knew was there. Needless to say the Mr. and the son cut across the fields to over yonder while the Mrs. drove the old Model-A home. I know first hand she whipped them both with a broom for weeks every time she thought about that old dog. The hound never came home, guess it got the idea it wasn't welcome anymore.

About this time Paul uncorked a tall, long neck bottle of red wine. Cool, real cool, as cool as the center seed of a cucumber. We passed the bottle back and forth for about 20 minutes. About now my stomach turned upside down. I told Paul I'd better get home. I made it to the back porch steps where I got sick and don't remember anything else. Mother called Mrs. Foster and told her about my sudden illness. Mrs. Foster told mother what had happened and told her as soon as I slept it off I would be okay somewhat.

Mr. friends, that was 56 years ago and you could put all the wine I have drunk in all those years in a small milk pan. Paul and I moved away in '42 and '43. Haven't seen him since, but I expect he would remember everything you have read here today. I still think of you, Paul. Saw your older brother, the retired preacher, last year. He said you got rich in the jewelry business in California. I'm glad some local boys made good. Some people say I got lucky. However, it always seemed to me that the harder I worked the luckier I got.

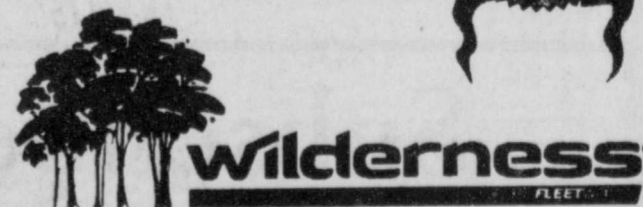

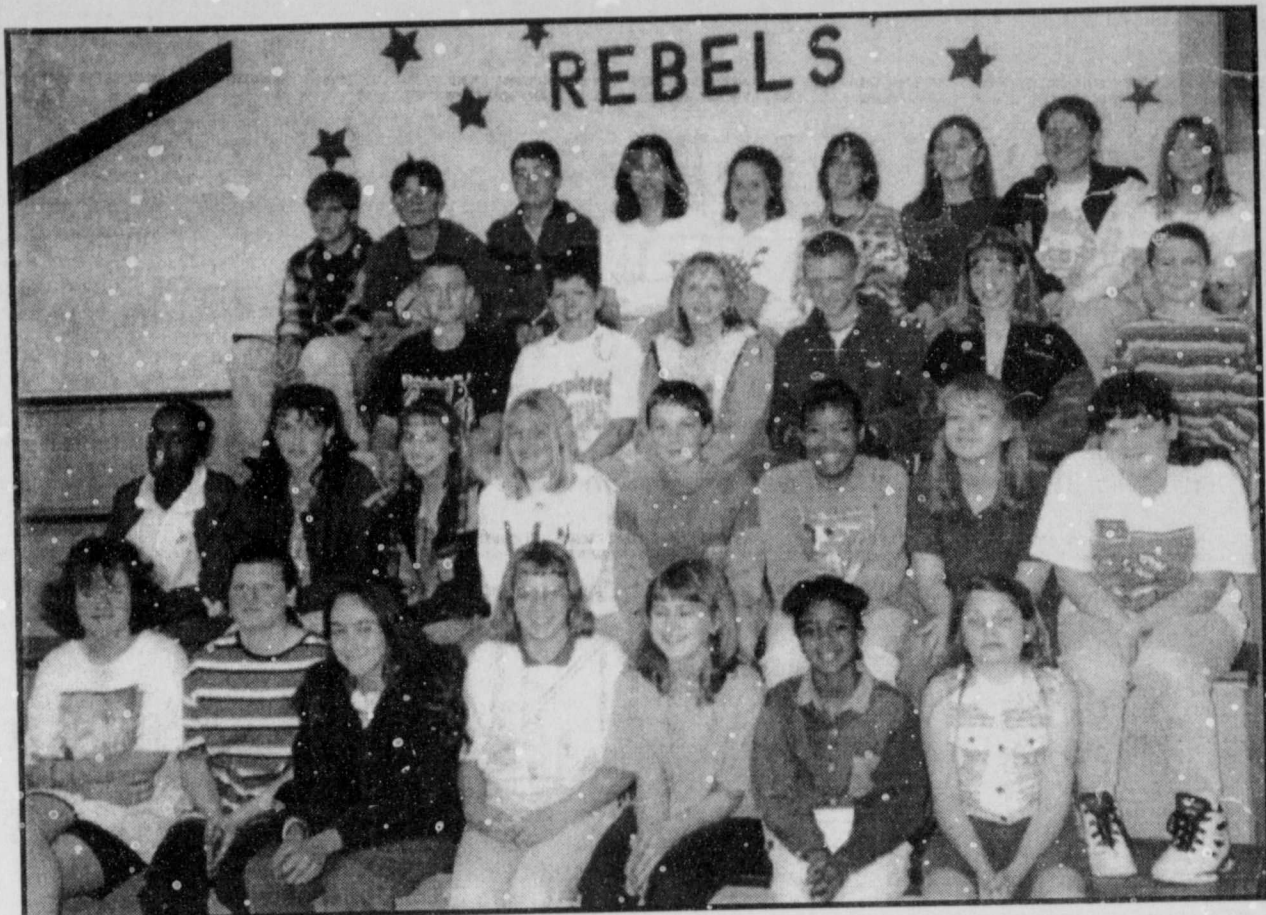
