Items at Bogata sewer plant will be disposed properly

city dump at Bogata, located at the sewer plant south of Bogata are "the result of a one time event and not the start of a city dump", according to Brian Ely with the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commissioner Office in Tyler.

There are several metal items, plus some wood, brush and other debris, Ely says.

"I have been in contact with the mayor and he said they'll have the items removed and placed in dumpsters" Ely said. He also stated told the Bogata News that "there really is no big story here, it's being taken care of

Ely reports that the TNRCC had

Anonymous reports of an illegal received anonymous calls from Bogata residents complaining about the site.

"I've been up there and seen the site" Ely stated, and reports of a dump site are exaggerated.

An unidentified resident of Bogata said that the federal Environmental Protection Agency had placed the city on a two-week deadline to clean up the site. The EPA's Dallas office said the TNRCC was handling the com-

He also said that other people have promised to let him know if the city does not get the site cleaned up imme-

Mayor Garretson said that it would be taken care of.

Council hears report on low income housing grant

called meeting Friday, November 20 with four council members and Mayor Garretson attending, along with two employees and eight visi-

Teresa Smith gave the invocation. One bid on the fire truck was received from Emergency Vehicles of Texas, and was in the amount of \$128,733.00. The council voted to accept the bid, and they also voted to purchase this fire truck. It is an American Eagle Series commercial pumper and should be delivered in January, 1999.

The council discussed possible solutions for funding of the fire truck, and voted to transfer \$15,000 from Waterworks Fund to the Fire Truck Savings Account to be used for the first year's payment, which is not due

until one year after delivery. Council agreed to write a letter of approval to Texas Department of Transportation to secure a permit to install a sewer line from Missionary Baptist Church to Texas-New

The Bogata City Council held a Mexico Power Company warehouse. All expenses are to be paid by the

Council voted to make Melba Knight's raise retroactive to October

Council approved sending Nelda Talley to Court Clerk school and Michael Garretson to Municipal Judge school in December. They also

approved a bond for Nelda Talley. Council approved the purchase of a printer and Professional Office Essentials software for the new computer with an approximate cost of

\$478.00. Council heard from Nelda Talley about a grant for Texas Home Investment Partnership Program, whereby the City could apply for a grant for \$350,000.00 and match this with \$27,875 from the City, to repair/rebuild several homes occupied by very low income elderly and/or disabled homeowners. This was tabled.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:55

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


The Rebels shot 16 of 24 from the free throw line for 67% and 19 of 43 in their first home game of the seafrom the field for 45% shooting per-

A sisterhood of seven

Seven sisters meet once a month to share stories

Many years ago, A.L. and Burnice Webster took a giant step and ran off to marry, it is doubtful that they envisioned what life would bring them. From their marriage came seven

A.L. Webster was twenty-two when he fell in love with fourteen year old Bernice, and she sneaked away from school to run away and marry. The nervous, frightened couple rode the train to Texarkana, Arkansas to marry, then returned home to "face the music"

With deep ties to the land they set about farming in McCrury Community. About every three years the couple had another baby, and without fail those babies were girls.

Today these seven sisters have a unique tradition that reflects the character and upbringing they were given by their beloved parents. Once a month, the "girls" meet for dinner. They have done so since the death of their mother in 1983. At these dinners, which take place either at one of their homes, or at a restaurant, they share again the joys of growing up in a large, all-female group of siblings, and catch up with the lives of their children, grandchildren and other relatives.

The seven Webster sisters are: Christine Nix of Hooks; Helen Stanley of Hagansport; Hattie Abernathy of McCrury; Bettie Pace of Clarksville; Juanita Sparks of Deport; Hiawatha King of Pattonville and Nelda Talley of McCrury.

Talking and chattering all a once, getting stories of their childhood isn't always easy, but some constant things emerge-these are women brought up in joy and laughter, Christian values, respect for farming and the land and honest character.

Life must sometimes have been a bit difficult for their father, after all, he was a lone male in a household of eight women.

They remember one time when they had several friends over, one staying for two weeks, two others for several days. That swelled the number of females to a point where

"Daddy couldn't find a place in the house to change clothes. Everywhere

he went there were girls". He finally retreated to the barn to change!

The house they grew up in wasn't large, it was a small, three bedroom home. Everyone, had their chores to do, and without that discipline the household couldn't have operated.

Two of the sisters (who must remain nameless or else this story can't be related) had the task of washing and drying the dishes every evening. The younger one got into the habit of retreating to the outhouse and staying until the older one finished her choirs

"She knew if I wanted to go out I had to get the job done, so she would wait until I did both jobs"

Finally, the older sister sneaked out and slipped the latch down on the outhouse. Locked in during the waning heat of a summer's day, the younger sister was trapped for a long,

"Well, it worked, she didn't shirk her chores anymore" laughs the older

Their mother dressed them in ruffles and frilly dresses, in spite of having to wash without benefit of electric washing machines or dryers. In addition, she made everything they wore. She had the amazing talent of looking at a picture in a catalog, then creating its replica. They would select their fabric from a peddler that came around, then show their mother what they wanted made. Of course, they had to wear one another's hand me downs, but didn't seem to mind.

Their grandmother lived next door to them, and she counted the number of girls "unmentionables" pegged to the line one week. There were 47

Next to the youngest, Hiawatha, was the family's tomboy. She used to love to follow her dad around in little boots and overalls.

Hiawatha's rather unusual name is the result of oldest sister Christine being told she could name the impending child. At that time she was studying the poem "Hiawatha" in school, and promptly sadly her newborn sister with the name. It seems to have been the last time the Websters let a daughter name a baby!

How do you discipline seven girls, with a three year age difference? Not by spanking. Instead, if they fought or fussed among themselves they had to stand in front of the mirror, then kiss one another. For real offenses they had to put out their tongue for a small dose of terrible tasting castor

Love was more a part of their lives than stern discipline, though. Christian values were instilled early, and they recall when the father, after working all day in the fields, would go from bed to bed at night, fanning his beloved daughters so that they could sleep.

Their mother would recall as she grew older that

'When I was raising my girls I had time to visit with my neghbors, wash, iron, cook and clean, now I'm older and have all-electric appliances and I can't get much of anything done".

As the young women of the Webster matured the subject of dating came up. They could date, but were not allowed to go by themselves, either other friends had to go, another sister, or it had to be a double

The youngest sister, Nelda, laughs that she is now only one half mile from where she was born and one half mile from where she will be buried.


"I guess I didn't get very far in life" she laughs.

All the sisters love to cook and are excellent cooks. Most sew beautifully. They have worked at a variety of jobs. Five of them began their work careers working at the Duke & Ayers "dime store" in Clarksville.

They have sixteen children between them, and thirty-six grandchildren. Christine is the only one with great-grandchildren so far.

As they gather together in Juanita Sparks' living room they flood the room with laughter and good nature. They tease and "pick" at one another. It's a view back in time, for a moment one is witness to what life must have been like for A.L. and Burniece Webster as they raised their seven daughters. It is a pleasant sight in-


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
