

Campaign signs not allowed on right-of-way

As the election season moves into high gear, candidates and campaign workers are reminded to be careful where / place campaign signs.


Such signs are not allowed on state highway right of way, which is reserved for official traffic control signs. Campaign signs erected on highway right of way will be removed by the Texas Department of Transportation and the owner can be charged for removal costs.

In addition, a person placing an unauthorized sign in highway right

of way can be fined up to \$500 per

Campaign signs may be placed on private property, with the landowner's permission if they meet certain restrictions. Signs must be made on lightweight material and be no larger than 50 square feet. They can be erected no sooner than 90 days before an election and must be removed 10 days after the election.

Signs within city limits may be subject to local ordinances.

FOOT NOTES



THE FOOT EXAM

To correctly diagnose and treat a foot problem, the podiatrist will ask if a patient is experiencing pain and swelling and if these symptoms limit normal activities. The feet will be examined for any skin changes or signs of injury. The podiatrist feels for displaced bones or swollen soft tissue, and tests for strength, reflexes and sensations. 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
