
can. Finally, everyone gave up on fishing for the can. It's hard to reach into an elephant's mouth because it's located high, high up!

ous illegal dumps, primarily along less than 200 pounds or has a volcounty roads. Illegal dumping is defined as disposal of waste in an unpermitted area. These wastes are often dumped illegally to avoid the cost of proper disposal or the time and effort required for proper disposal.

Citizens should be aware that as of September 1, 2001, violations are subject to the following penalties:

Class B Misdemeanor, more than five pounds but less than 500 pounds or a volume of more than 5 gallons but less than 100 cubic feet. Maximum penalty, six months in jail and /or \$2,00 fine.

Class A Misdemeanor, 500 000 pounds or has a volume of 100 cubic feet or more but less than 200 cubic feet or is disposed for a commercial purpose and model, color, tag number, etc.







#### **Explanatory Brief for HJR 2**

HJR 2 would amend the constitution to allow the commissioners court of a county to declare the office of constable dormant if that office has been vacant for at least seven consecutive years. The records of a constable office that is declared dormant will be transferred to the county clerk. If the office is declared dormant, the previous officeholder does not continue to hold the office. The office may not be filled by election or appointment unless the commissioners court votes to reinstate the office or a majority of votes cast in an election held on the issue favor reinstatement. The reinstatement election may be held if the commissioners court on its own motion orders such an election, or the reinstatement election must be held if the commissioners court receives a petition signed by 10% of the registered voters of the constable precinct. The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows:

It seems that the rest of the Commissioners cannot understand why this district has a hard time keeping it's roads in condition. District One has from about nine to twenty-eight percent more roads to take care of than the other Districts with the same amount of money (this was after there was redistricting because of inequities). I should point out that historically this District has had as much as thirty-eight percent or more roads than another District (I won't call names, but I have the County supplied figures). Without an equal distribution of funds for so many years it is no wonder that this District has less and much older equipment than any other District. I have been to the Commissioners Court several times (didn't see any of the other Candidates there) and have made these facts heard again and again. The other Commissioners don't want to hear it and they are not willing to give up any of their budget. Occasionally they will offer to get this District out of trouble by offering fifteen or twenty thousand dollars - this is less than one percent of the total budget and they are all sharing the "burden" equally. In short it is three to one, every time. When individually asked the other Commissioners are willing to give this District an increase, but out of someone else's budget - "NOT THEIRS!". There are answers out there and I intend to find them. There is a way to get more of the budget (a fairer amount anyway), but to this date we have not hit upon it - THERE IS A WAY THOUGH. I intend to dispel or discredit every argument they have given about why our roads bad and so little equipment which is all old and well use. I intend to make it so they cannot go to sleep at night without feeling guilt or have a nightmare (if

in fact they have a conscience). The citizens of the whole county must realize that we are a very poor county and if recent history is representative we will be-

There have been several larger sources of water offered to Dallas, but Dallas would not have control so they don't want them, besides they can seal it cheaper here, especially after our taxes help build it.




Enrollment at PJC has topped out at 3,653 students after the 12th class day Wednesday, an 11.44 percent increase over last year and nearly 25 percent up from the fall of 2000. PJC has 375 more students this fall that last, and the enrollment is 717 students more than were at the college in the fall of 2000.

"I suspected our enrollment would be up a little this fall, but

Junior College President Bobby Walters. "We were not expecting this, but it is gratifying that so many people are coming to college to continue their education."

Walters pointed out that contact hours, the measure of the number of courses students take, is up in both general academic and the applied science areas and totals 860,456 hours. That is an almost 100,000-hour increase over last year.

Enrollment at both of PJC's Technical Center campuses set new records this fall.
