They said that Commerce was only 10 miles from Deport, and that Mt. Pleasant was 15 miles away. I tried and tried to reason with them. I even mailed them a highlighted map. They wouldn't budge. The computer 'said" and that was that.

This week my husband's truck had a dead cell in the battery. It wouldn't even boost off from a charger. He did as the dealership instructed him, and called the roadside assistance service. I think the word 'assistance" has been misused.

The first thing they told him was that Greenville is closer than Paris or Mt. Pleasant. They said that Commerce was closer than Paris or Mt. Pleasant.

He told them that this absolutely wasn't true. They insisted that "their computer said" that Greenville was only 10.1 miles from Deport!

He tried to be patient. He tried to reason with them. In the end, however, he was as stymied as I was . The computer said that Deport and Greenville were only 10 miles apart and that was all there was to it.

Does this mean that Dallas is only 20 miles away? When did they move it? Or, even more frightening...did they move US and we didn't even know it? Hey, does this mean that we can now receive Dallas property values for our land and homes?

Seriously, I've spoken with person after person in the health care field who have run into exactly the same problem with insurance companies.

I know of one computer company that argued that it was closer to send a serviceman from El Paso to this area than it was to send one from Texarkana, Arkansas!

Unite...rebell, we need to start protesting this ridiculous mapping system someone has come up with. In their minds if Greenville is only 10 miles from Deport New York and Los Angeles are probably only a hundred miles away!

Seriously this is causing inconvenience and distress. Someone somewhere needs to wise up and have a reality check about these things.

I'd be interested to know if other people in other parts of this nation are having the same problems?

At any rate, I think I'll just run to Dallas for lunch. It can't be over a fifteen or twenty minute drive!

Did you know that the okra plant is a member of the Mallow family, related to cotton, hibiscus and hollyhocks. It is a annual tropical herb cultivated for its edible green seed pods. (There is also a red pod variety that turns green when cooked.) It has heart-shaped leaves and a large, yellow hibiscus-like flower.

Okra probably originated somewhere around Ethiopia and was cultivated by the ancient Egyptians by the 12th century B.C. Its cultivation spread throughout North Africa and the East. The seed pods were eaten cooked and the seeds were toasted and ground, used as a substitute.

Cut okra into 1/4" rounds. Put tomatoes in pan and cook slowly for half an hour. Drain any liqbutter and oil in skillet. Add okra and onions. Cook until onions are wilted and okra has begun to brown around edges, 10-15 minutes. Turn often and add tomatoes and salt and cook for 5 minutes. Add corn and cook 3-4 minutes. Season to taste.


