presented at the halftime of the game on Friday evening.

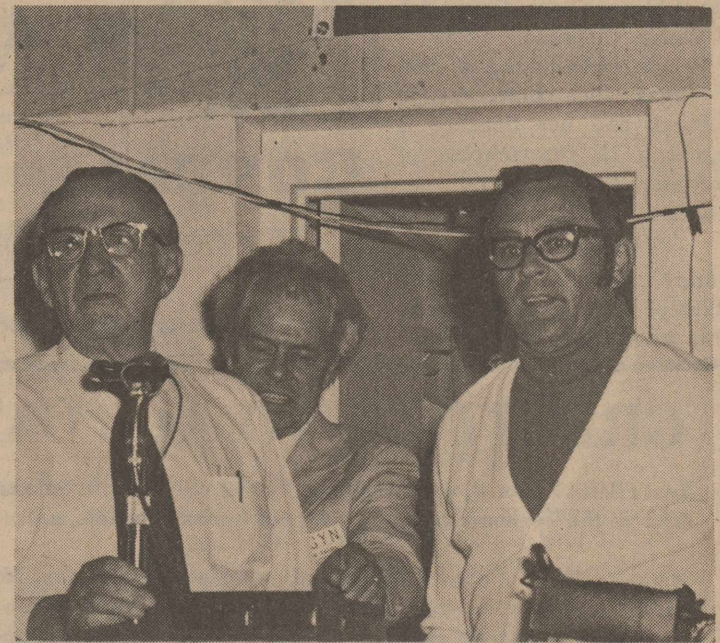

Over 3,500 Attend Annual Feeder Sale

Over 3,500 persons attended the 28th Annual Feeder Show and Sale held Friday at the Texhoma Livestock Auction Company in Texhoma with a total of 3,500 cattle selling through the auction.

Albert Hodges of Forgan, Okla., had the top pen of Steer Calves with Bob Free of Abilene offering the second place pen and B.G. Barby of Clear Creek, Okla., offering the third place pen. Forgan's pen averaged 521 pounds and sold for \$31.75 per cwt. Free's 57 head averaged 456 pounds and brought \$32 per pound while Barby's offering averaged 408 pounds and sold for \$34.40.

In the Heifer Calves class, Barby topped the class in first place with 20 head averaging 367 pounds which sold for \$28.60. Colorado Cattle Company won second and third in the class and these sold for \$29 per cwt for the second place cattle and \$28.10 for the third place cattle.

Moving down to Yearling and Feeder Steer class, Coldwater

Cattle Company's 20 head entry topped the class and averaged 730 pounds and sold for \$32 even. Second and third places in the class went to Louis Mayer of Hooker, Okla., His second place pen of 41 head averaged 685 pounds and sold for \$31.80 and third place of 47 head averaged 725 pounds and sold for \$31.70.

Yearling and Feeder Heifer class was won by Deen Cattle Company of Springfield, Colo., and their 29 head averaged 641 pounds and sold for \$26.40 per cwt. Second place went to Leonard Davis of Liberal, Kans., and his 44 head averaged 720 pounds and sold for \$26.40. Third place was won by Jim Taylor of Stratford and his 39 head averaged 734 pounds and sold for \$26.40.

The Grand Champion pen was offered by Albert Hodges of Forgan, Okla., and Reserve Champion pen was offered by Coldwater Cattle Company of Amarillo. The Grand Champion pen sold for \$31.75 per cwt and the reserve pen brought \$32 per cwt.

Farm Bureau Annual Event Slated Oct. 19

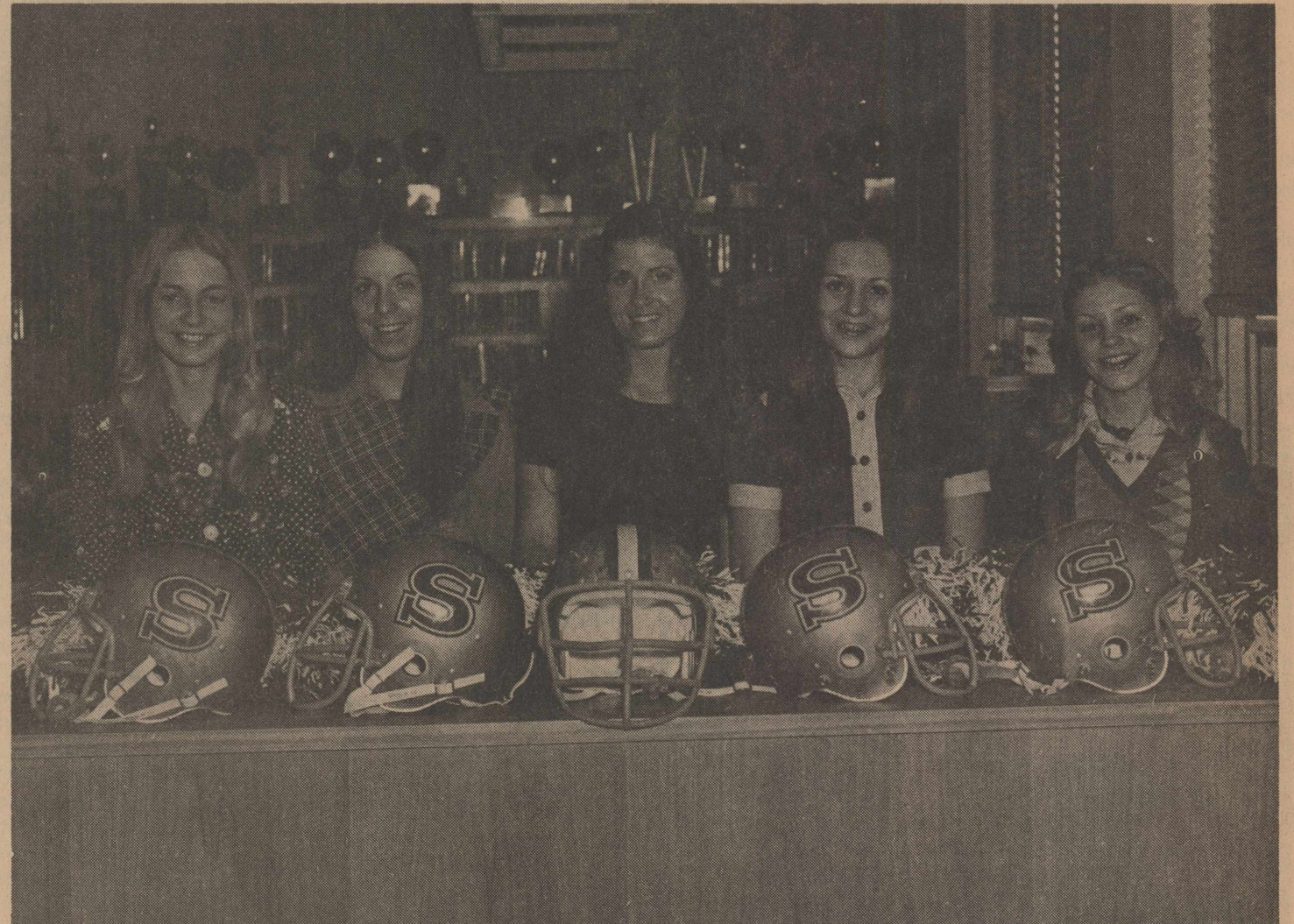

White Deer Bucks Upset Elks 14-7

Stratford's Elks were upset in their first District 1A outing Friday night 14-7 at the hands of the White Deer Bucks.

The Elks scored on their very first possession of the game with Halfback Rick Howard scooting 48 yards for an Elk td and Quarterback Mark Beatty booted the PAT to make it 7-0 with 9:54 left in the first stanza. Ironically, this 48-yard scamper was the only big offensive threat of the Elks the remainder of the night as the inspired Bucks played near flawless football to get out in front and eat up the clock and win the game.

The Elks threatened one more time in the first stanza after holding the Bucks on downs following the resulting kickoff. They drove 50 yards to the Buck 32 where Beatty attempted a field goal which went wide of its mark.

The Bucks used two big plays to put their points on the board then utilized ball control to eat up the clock and chaff up the upset victory.

White Deer's Denny Moss broke loose on a 73-yard touchdown run on the second play of the second quarter. Taking the handoff on a punch

into the middle of the line Moss squirmed loose from two would-be tacklers, got three steps open into the secondary and outran every Elk defender for the touchdown. Terry Sanlon booted the PAT and the score was knotted 7-7 with 11:17 left in the second.

The second and deciding Buck touchdown came in the third stanza. The Elks received the second half kickoff and with fourth down needing one yard at their own 29 Beatty stood back to punt. A poor pass from center forced Beatty to attempt to run with the ball but he was caught at the Elk 24.

The inspired Bucks took six plays to move in for the score with Billy Lynch going in from the one-yard line and Sandlin booted the PAT to make it 14-7 with 7:41 left in the third.

From this point on the Bucks kept the Elks deep in their own territory and managed to come up with key stops to thwart the Elk offensive machine from operating.

The Elks moved into the fourth quarter with the wind at their backs all to no avail.

The last Elk drive was ended with a pass interception at the Buck 36. With the final minutes ticking away the White Deer offense managed two vital first downs that finally turned the ball over to the Elks with only 1:15 left in the game.

Operating at their own 29 yard line the Elks went to the air in a desperate effort to get on the boards but three passes

went astray and on fourth down Quarterback Will Allen was trapped for a loss.

The Elks had used up all their time out and White Deer ran out the clock preserving their 14-7 lead for the big win.

The Elks had been three touchdown favorites in the contest.

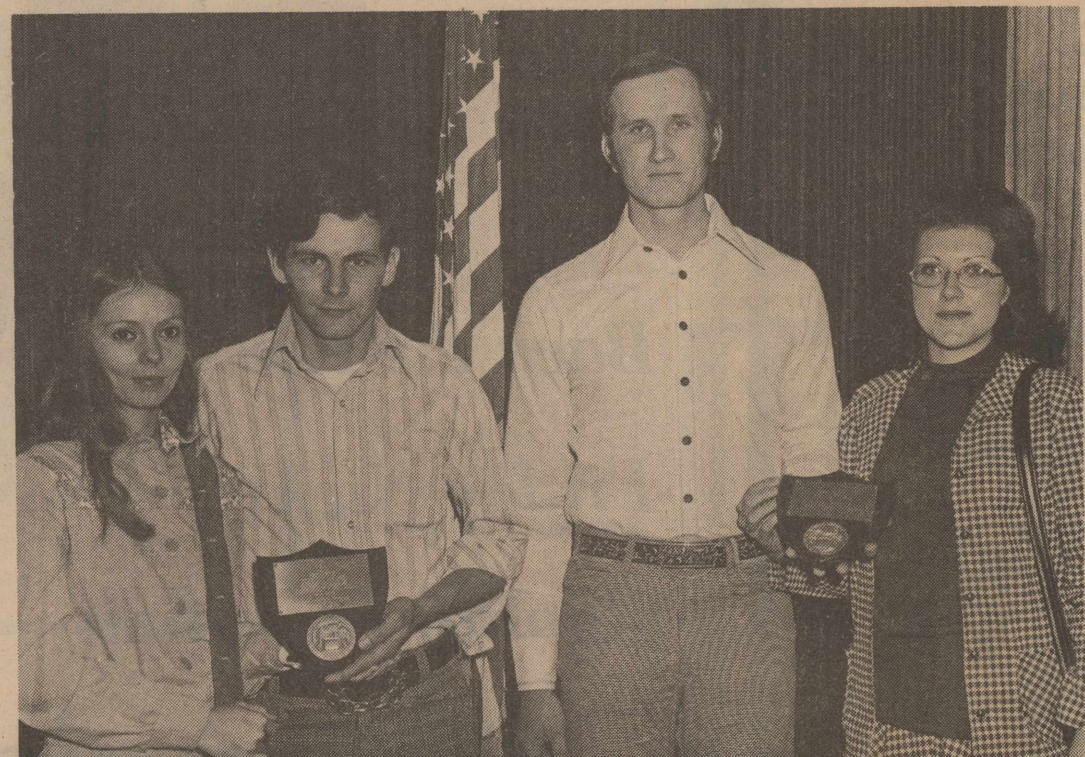
Handsome trophies were presented to the top three winners in each of the six age divisions.

The Wildcats have won over Wheeler 16-6 and over Panhandle 22-17 while losing to

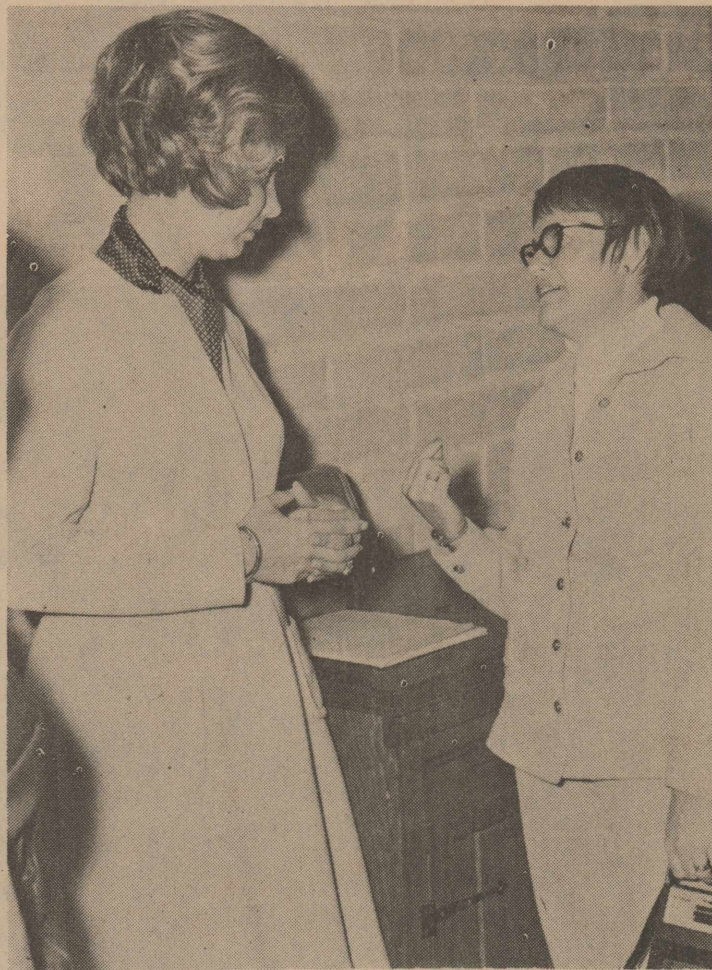
Phillips 12-8, Spearman 43-12 and Sunray, 29-0.

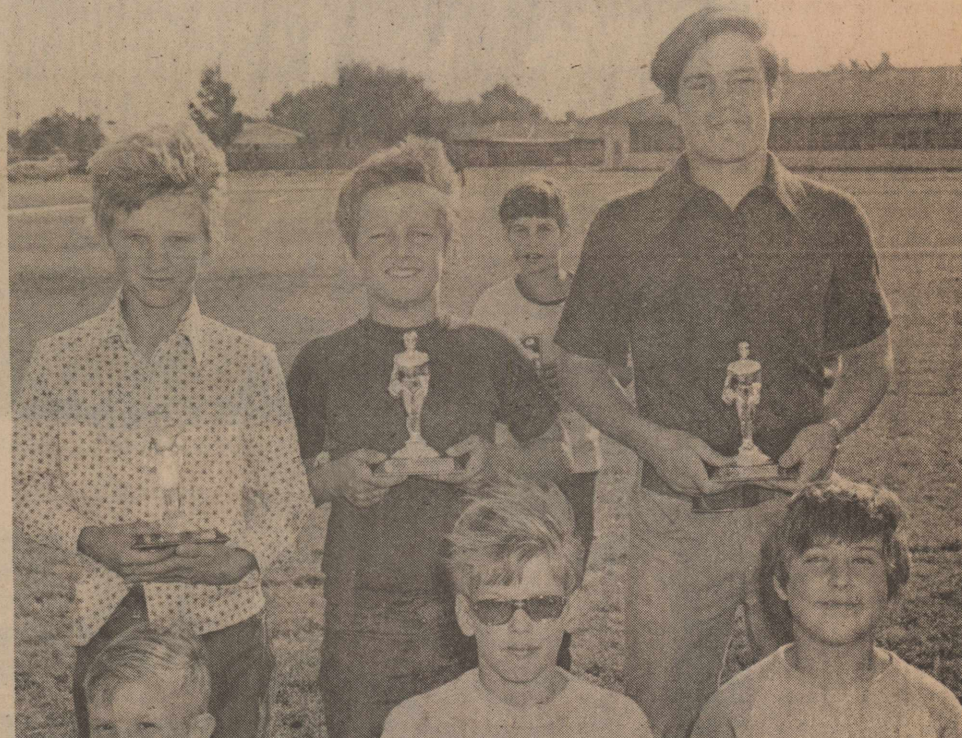

The Bucks opened with one touchdown in the first stanza and capitalized in the second to put up three more with the last ones coming in the final quarter.

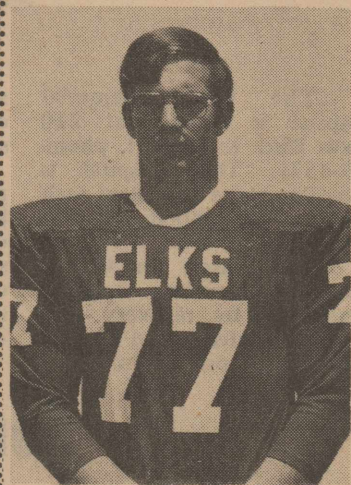

The second "Golden Age" of television is close to reality. The recent bid by Phillips for all of the stock of Magnavox will give Phillips a powerful edge in competing with U.S. television manufacturers.

The two leading developers of home video players are N.V. Philips, the huge Dutch electronics manufacturer, and MCA, Inc., Los Angeles based entertainment conglomerate. Now these two companies have agreed to combine their video disk efforts. Phillips will manufacture and market the video player while MCA will make and sell the disk programs.

Many companies have been spending huge amounts developing video disk recorders, but the big problem has been incompatibility. The disks of one manufacturer would not play on another's player. With Phillips and MCA joining forces, their video player could follow the rest of the industry to follow it as the standard. Phillips and MCA say they will be "Generous" in licensing patents and the player to other manufacturers, but things look grim for companies such as RCA and Zenith who have been working feverishly to develop their own video players.

Commercial production is scheduled to begin on the MCA Phillips player by 1976 with 1 million units projected for 1978. The recent bid by Phillips for all of the stock of Magnavox will give Phillips a powerful edge in competing with U.S. television manufacturers.

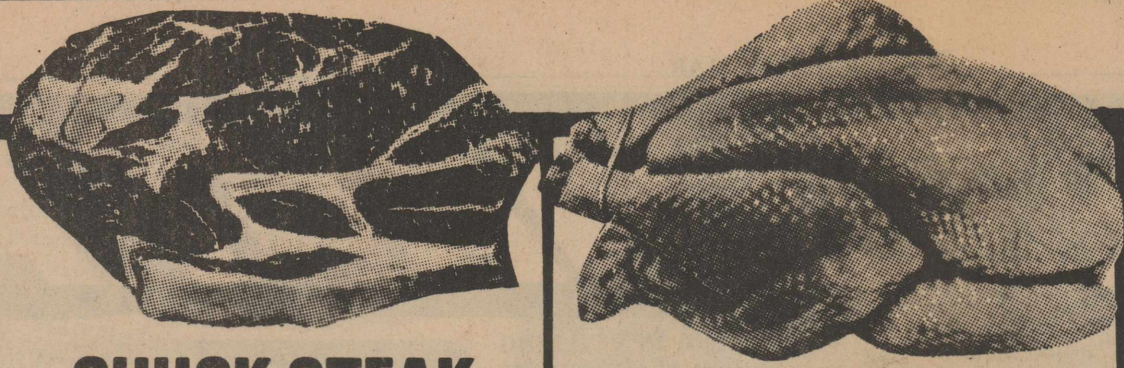

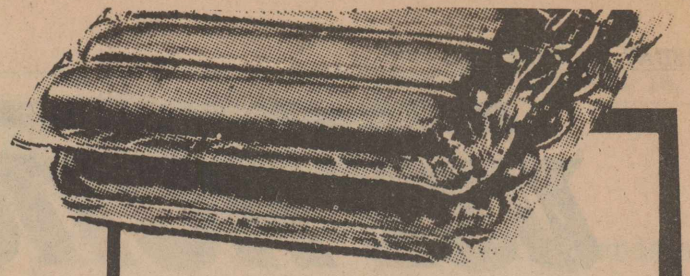
