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Aurora Borealis Is Visible In Night Sky "Northern Lights" Highly Unusual For This Area

For those who happened to look at the night sky Monday night, a rare, and rather disquieting, event was visible.

The Aurora Borealis, or "Northern Lights" were visible on Monday and Tuesday nights of this week.

Reflecting off of atmospheric conditions, the weird red lights, shot with pale green and white streaks, were visible all across the sky, not just on the northern horizon.

The best way to view the natural phenomenon was away from light sources such as street lights.

Pinkish red to almost a red glow was the primary display, showing up as long areas. Slowly changing streaks or rays were visible through the red

cloud-like formation. Also, bursts of white light almost like spotlights, but located high in the sky, were in evidence.

The areas dimmed and strengthened, as well as forming in various areas, and were visible erratically from full dark until the early morning hours.

The Aurora Borealis was beautiful, and also a little "spooky", looking as if some strange holocausts were lighting the night sky.

Experts report that they are due to the northern lights being extremely intense right now.

Northern states can see them frequently and with much more intensity.

James Allcorn Addresses Kiwanis Club

Lamar County Executive Director of Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation (ASCS) James Allcorn was guest speaker at the Deport Kiwanis Club meeting Saturday morning.

Allcorn explained to the Kiwanis Club that his office's duties are to administer government programs and work with Lamar County Farmers.

According to him, his office and the Soil and Water Conservation Office work together to help farmers and ranchers offset their land from erosion. Spending for such programs now in Lamar County ranges from \$750,000 to \$900,000. When asked if the program would be eliminated through cutbacks, Allcorn said he believed that there would be a program in the future, and that since Lyndon Johnson's administration there had been talk of cutback in the program in each administration. In the future,

he stated, the programs could be geared more for water quality.

For the 1989 program, Allcorn said that it was designed to eliminate foreign landowners from receiving government payments. Only bonafide, active farmers will receive payments.

When questioned how many foreign landowners are in Lamar County, Allcorn estimated from 14 to 15, representing approximately 20,000 acres.

He continued that even though the number of farmers is decreasing each year, there is an increase in the number of "entities" (corporations) owning land.

Details and information about the requirements of receiving payments through the 1989 farm program, he said, should be directed to the ASCS office in Paris, as the guidelines are extremely complex.

Deport VFD Receives Gifts

The Deport Fire Department has received three substantial donations recently in memory of John H. Moore II and Martin Jeffus.

In both cases, the fire department members had assisted when illness struck. John H. Moore III sent one dona-

tion, and the other two, in memory of Martin Jeffus, were from J.T. Barber and family of Phoenix, AZ and Richard and Virginia Hartwick, also of Phoenix.

The department expresses their gratitude for this timely and appropriate memorial.

Prairiland Board Discusses Repairs, Building

The Prairiland School Board met Monday night, March 13 at the school.

The board discussed the repairing and building of parking lots on the Deport and Blossom campuses.

The School Board called for a school trustee election for May 6, 1989 for two places, Place 1 and

Place 4.

The Board rehired all teachers from the Prairiland, Deport and Blossom campuses.

They approved the minutes of the previous meeting and were given a financial report and tax report.

Drug Arrest Made In Blossom

Constable Billy Foreman and Constable Randy Boren, along with Lamar County Sheriff's Department officers, reported the arrest and arraignment of Vicky Lou Bell for possession of a controlled substance.

Ms. Bell was arrested while a search warrant was being executed in Blossom at approximately 10:20 p.m. on Monday, March 13.

Constable Foreman, along with Sheriff Gene Burns, Chief Deputy George Dollins, Investigator B.J. McCoy, Deputy Steve Owens and Constable Randy Boren, jailer

Tammy Castenada and narcotics dog handler, Bob Wixom, made the arrest.

Constable Foreman stated that inside the residence, law enforcement officials found what is believed to be several kinds of drugs. According to Foreman, in the preliminary search, they found about five ounces of mixed drugs, mostly a white powder believed to be cocaine, and what appeared to be a "designer" drug (synthetic drug) called Ecstasy. The narcotics value of this was valued at about \$10,000 by Foreman.

A subsequent search using a narcotics detection dog uncovered an additional amount of what is believed to be narcotics, described as an "eightball" and having a worth of about \$200.00.

Also confiscated in the search was a large collection of weapons said to include rifles, shotguns, pistols and a scope crossbow.

Bond was set at \$50,000 against Ms. Bell and other arrests may be forthcoming in the ongoing investigation.

Deport Council To Notify Owners To Clean Up Derelict Houses

The Deport City Council decided to notify several people about the health hazards created by their property after receiving several complaints by neighbors that dogs, cats, skunks and vermin live in the abandoned houses.

Preston Crump and Larry Freeman are to be notified that their derelict houses need to be burned or turned completely down.

The fourth estimate on the Grant Street Project was approved.

The council made the decision to

keep Morris Weddle's insurance in effect until his disability is in effective. Weddle has been extremely ill.

A discussion was held concerning the street project on North Jeffus Street.

A sixty-day change order on Grant Project #707261 due to rainy weather in February was approved, and discussion on radio work was approved.

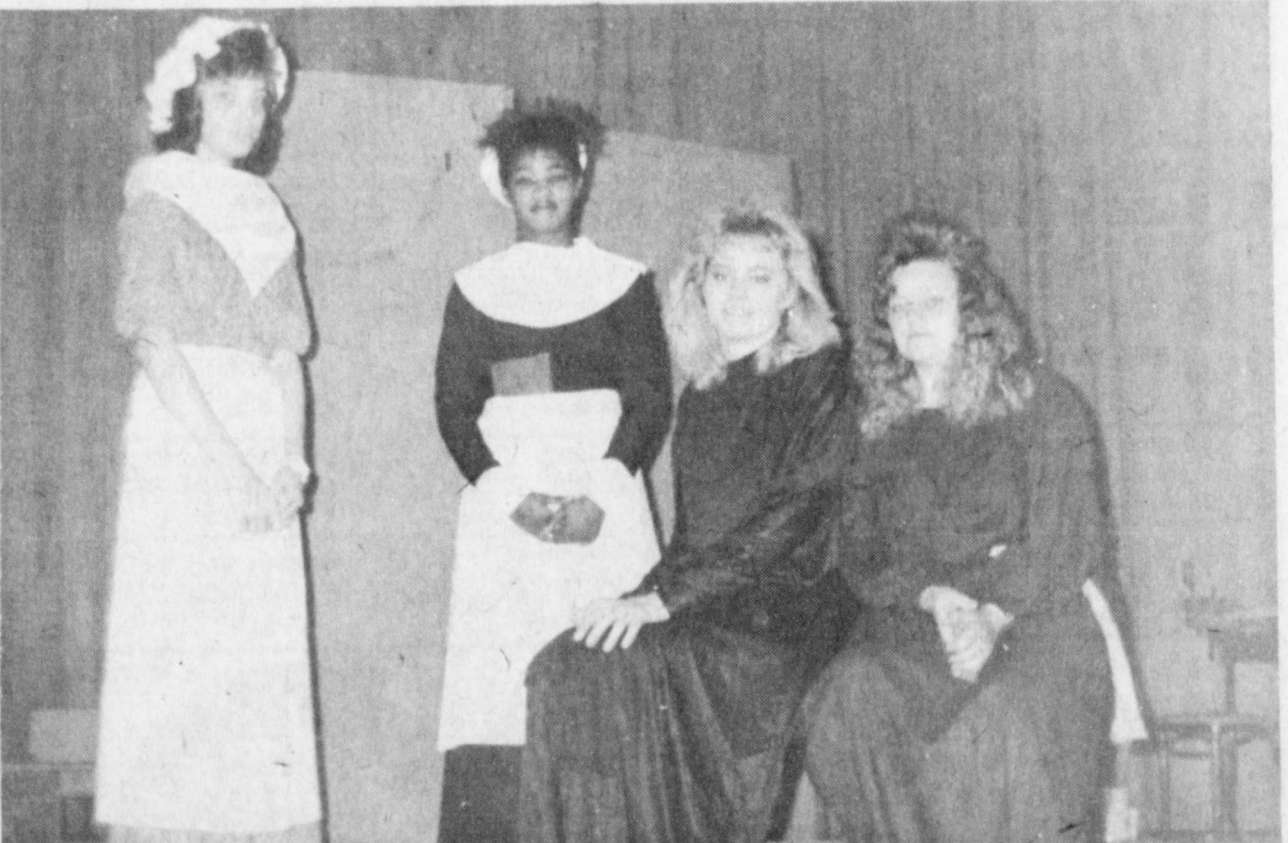
The financial report was approved as presented, as was the audit report, and motion was made and carried to approve payment of bills.

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Friendly Folks, Scenery, Good Highways Top Tourist Draws

Two or three people zipping down a smooth highway, enjoying the scenery, and recalling the friendly people and good food at their lunch stop, that's the typical party of visitors to Texas, according to a year-long survey of more than 13,000 tourists.

Respondents to the highway department's Auto Visitor Survey during 1988 rated Texas friendliness first, followed by scenery, good roads and

food as what they enjoyed most during their visit.

Oklahoma, California, and Louisiana sent the most visitors, while Minnesota, Michigan and Illinois residents topped the list of people staying 30 days or more.

San Antonio was the most popular destination, and a remarkable one-third of respondents visited the Alamo. "San Antonio, with big draws

like the Alamo, the River Walk, and Sea World, is a real asset to the state because auto visitors have to travel a long distance across Texas to get there," said Don Clark, director of the department's Travel and Information Division.

Dallas and Houston were also popular tourist destinations. Other highly rated attractions included the Lyndon B. Johnson Ranch, the Confederate Air Force Flying Museum and South Padre Island.

What did tourists do during their stay? What they did most was shop. Other popular activities were touring historic places and museums, camping, bird-watching and taking photographs to record their visit.

Most U.S. visitors stayed an average of a week in the state and spent more than \$560 per party on food, lodging, vehicle expenses, shopping and entertainment. Foreign visitors spent a similar amount per day but stayed a few days longer.

The tourist report was prepared from a 17-question survey completed by out of state travelers who stopped at Texas tourist bureaus for routing information and travel literature. The bureaus serve as Texas' front door, and travel counselors extend hospitality to visitors arriving from all directions. Many travelers surveyed said information they received from the bureaus prompted them to visit more places, enjoy more recreation and stay longer in Texas.

Yields Affected By Ice

Wheat has received another winter setback with the last round of sleet and freezing rain. It is a safe assumption that wheat yields have been affected downward by the severe cold weather three weeks ago and perhaps by the more recent spell. The extent of the damage will not be fully known until harvest time in many instances. It has been noticed that the cold weather killed some of the young tillers in some fields. This, of course, means that there are fewer stalks to produce grain heads. Also, it is quite possible that some heads were damaged in the more advanced wheat.

Freeze damage in wheat is directly dependent on the planting date, fertilization and amount of lush growth at the time of the freeze. Fields that have shown the most freeze damage are those fields that were planted early, fertilized heavy and had lots of top growth.

Dr. Travis Miller, Agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, reports that half of the yield comes from the main tiller. Another "thumb rule" is that one needs from 40 to 45 heads per square foot to produce acceptable yields.

There is a good chance that disease problems will surface when weather conditions become favorable for diseases to develop. In order for a disease to develop there are three things that must occur. If any one of the three are not present, then a disease will not occur. These three are host, pathogen and environment. We have the host in wheat plant. We have had leaf rust scattered in wheat throughout the fall and winter, so we won't have to depend upon the wind currents to bring the fungi into our area from wheat producing areas to the south.

What are the environmental conditions favorable for leaf rust development? The critical minimum temperature for development of the leaf

rust fungi is 50 degrees Fahrenheit. Infection will occur in six hours if there is free moisture present and the temperature is 50 degrees or higher. Free moisture could be dew, shower or rain.

The conditions necessary for stripe rust are quite similar to that of leaf rust except that stripe rust prefers cooler weather than does leaf rust. The spring of 1988 was a much cooler spring than normal and the stripe rust epidemic lasted much longer than expected because of that situation.

Septoria leaf blotch is another serious leaf disease problem in our area of the state that other areas does not have to deal with. Seldom do we just have a septoria problem without either leaf or stripe rust. It does reduce yields and in 1988 demonstration work conducted in Lamar County we obtained a five bushel increase where fungicides were applied to control septoria.

The decision to use or not to use a fungicide is one that each producer must make. Producers should take into account the yield potential of their wheat, the wheat price situation and the disease pressure. We have generally thought that one should have a yield potential of 40 bushels per acre before the application of a fungicide would pay. However, that scenario may not necessarily be accurate with the market price prospects higher than in previous years.

A breakfast meeting for wheat producers will be held on Thursday, March 23 at 7 a.m. at the Paris Holiday Inn. The program will be a discussion of the disease situation at that time and a further explanation of disease control measures. Sponsors of the meeting include Estes Chemicals, CIBA Geigy, and the County Crops Committee in cooperation with our office.

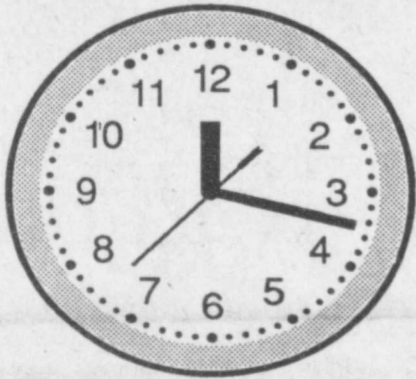

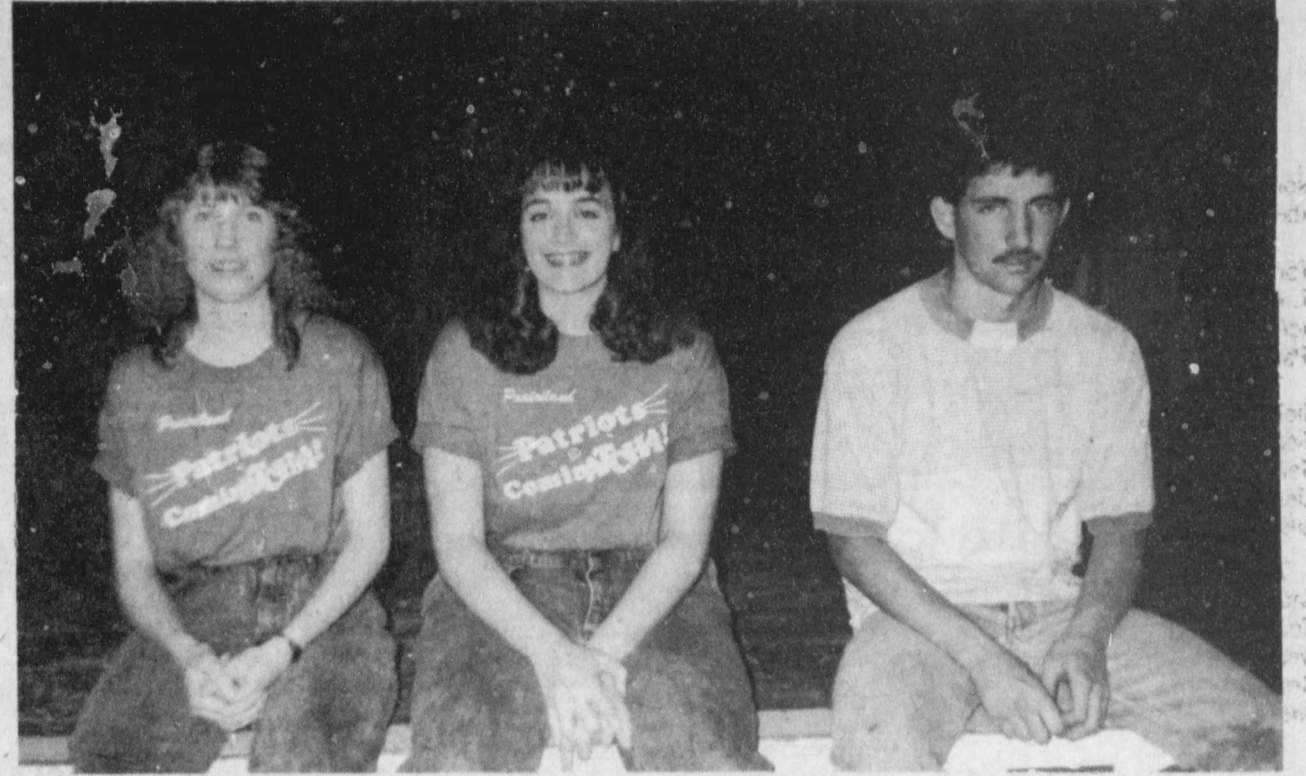

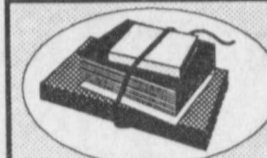

The lecture and tou will be on Tuesday, April 11 but reservations must be made by March 10. Only 24 positions are available and will be filled on a first come, first served basis.

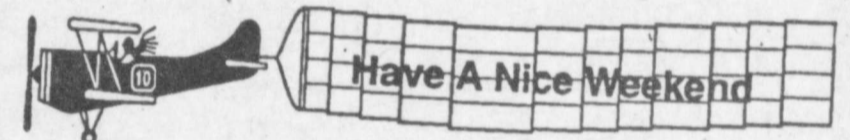
The lecture will be given by Jo Carlson, a doctoral student in Art Education at the University of North

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

Quarterly Tax Payments May Be Required

Estimated tax payments may be required by anyone who receives income that is not subject to withholding of income tax, or income from which not enough tax is withheld, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Such income includes but is not limited to self-employment earnings, alimony, interest, dividends, rent and capital gains.

Estimated tax is the total of expected income tax and self-employment tax (as well as certain other taxes) less any tax withheld and tax credits. These other taxes include the alternate minimum tax.

Generally, individuals required to make estimated tax payments may make quarterly installments or may pay all their estimated tax at one time. In order to avoid a late payment penalty, the one-time payment must be made by the due date of the first quarterly payment for which the taxpayer is liable.

Payments are due on April 17, June 15, September 15, 1989 and January 17, 1990. A payment-voucher from the Form 1040-ES package should accompany each payment and should be mailed to the Internal Revenue Service Center for your state as shown in your 1040-ES package.

Form 1040A or 1040EZ cannot be used at tax time if estimated tax payments were made because there are no lines on these forms to show estimated tax payments.
