On Chili, Stew & Hot Tamales

My dad, Roger Bell, and my uncle, Stanley Bell, were both pretty well known for their good chili and stew, both being cafe opprators, they certianly were experienced!

While visiting uncle Stanley rewas brought into our conversation and he began telling me the difference in his and daddy's concoctions and how some of the local ladies came to talk to hom about the way to make a good stew. Corn and carrots are definitely a "no-no". In his "flowery" description of what they do to stew, simply meant if you want syrup, get a bottle of Karo and take a swig! Being 96 years old, his mind is sharp and his memory unbelievably good. He rembered the price of chili powder and camino during the depression and how he relied on the same brand of chili powder and said he would still use it today if he was still able to

I like to think that my chili is as near to daddy's as any I have eaten. I use uncle Stanley's brand of seasonings, and a lot of it. He told me the chili powder makes the difference, lots of garlic, too he said. You can't hurry it, cook fast and then very slowly.

I can still remember the yellowishbrown sack the dried chili's came in and from being packed and handled they would be slightly crushed. A

slight handful would be dropped into the pot. Hot? You bet!

James Grant never ordered one bowl at a time, but two, ate one while the other cooled, sweat rolling down his face. Now, that's chili!!

I don't recall very much about the cently, the Deport Chili Cook Off stew making, but I do know everyone wanted a "red top", that was stew with a little chili on top.

Uncle Stanley said he used elbow macaroni for a filler and he guessed they liked it, because they ate it.

There were hot tamales, too. I can remember having to go to the barn with brother Bud to get the shucks. They were washed, trimmed and scalded before rolling the mush filled with what ever kind of meat available. Daddy and Mama would cook and grind the meat, it might have been an old tough rooster, hen or a cheap cut of pork or beef, season it just so. The tamales were then tied in bundles and boiled until daddy said they were ready.

He would take them to town, keeping them hot in a lard stand over a cool oil burner. I believe it was the Veteto building which had a recessed front, that served a a good wind break... He sold them for 35¢ a dozen. Then, that was about as much money as the three dollars and fifty cents we pay

Times have changed and so have our lifestyles, but good stew, chili and hot tamales have stayed the same.

Haymaking Season Has Arrived

Hay producers should be completing their first cutting of hay and fertilizing the meadows, says Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., extension agronomist for the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Overton.

The older the grass gets, the lower the quality of hay.


"Meadows which have been cut should be fertilized immediately after bailing," Reeves said. "Have the fertilizer before it rains so the fertilizer can be carried into the soil to produce the next hay crop. Try to fertilize when the grass is the shortest so it will reach the soil and not stay on the plants."

If the stand is thin from winter damage, use a fertilizer that has as much potassium as it has nitrogen. Potassium causes the grass plant to spread faster, have more drought tolerance and produce a higher qual-



Nearby Farm Has Unusual Livestock

By Wanda Fincher Ostriches grazing, strolling, feed-

ng. A sight to be seen on the African plains? A sight to be seen in a zoo? Yes, but also a sight to be seen pretty

Bonnie and Frank Thrasher have an ostrich farm in close-at-hand Franklin County, just north of Mt. Ver-

There have been murmurs that ostrich farming was an up-and-coming industry in this country for some

The Thrashers began their ostrich farming when they purchased an adult pair about a year ago. Now they have nine yearlings, and two babies, plus eggs in the incubator.

Frank came home one day and simply said, "I have something for you to do....raise ostriches.

Bonnie enjoys her work, unusual as it is. Each ostrich egg weighs about four pounds, and takes 42 to 45 days to ;hatch in the incubator.

Bonnie candles the eggs to see if they are fertile. Unfertile eggs are

used for a variety of crafts. Bonnie with the consistency or appearance removes the insides of the eggs and paints them intricately. She says that a plain, undecorated egg sells for \$25 each while the decorated eggs sell for \$45 to \$50 each. The big eggs are certainly curiousities with great ap-

Even more valuable, of course, are baby ostriches. They can sell for about \$2,000 each, while an adult pair goes

The high strung, aggressive birds are capable of taking care of themselves, but are kept in a fenced pen close to the Thrasher's home so that they can keep an eye on them. "They must be protected from people, dogs and injury, especially when young" Bonnie reported.

The huge, stately birds can stand over 8' tall and weigh about 300 pounds. They have never been important on the livestock or poultry industry in the United States, but the Thrashers feel this may change soon.

They say the meat is excellent,

of beef, but is lean and low in cholesterol.

Of course, the feathers have long been a favorite in fashion and feather dusters, even used for cleaning computer systems and turbo chargers.

Their popularity is growing, and there is even an American Ostrich Association. The demand of the big birds has increased since an embargo went into effect during Ronald Reagan's presidence.

That has made the price go way up, and the Thrasher's anticipate an escalation in the market for several years.

The couple, in addition to the giant birds, also have ducks, pheasant and geese. Bonnie says she prefers the work involved with the ostriches to cattleranching, and it should be interesting to see if, in the future, it's ostriches that are "home on the range" instead of cattle. For now, that's a reality in nearby Franklin County!!

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


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

It's Time To Identify "Ants"

By Paul D. Payne

A determination that is made time and time again this time of the year is the identification of the flying looking "ants" in the home. It is important that one correctly identify these flying insects as it is very easy to call a termite an ant, and that could be dis-

Termites do resemble ants but are noticeably different. Termites are basically the same width the full length of their body while ants are narrow at the midway point in their

Termites are often seen swarmg in the bathroom or perhaps the kitchen in concrete slab homes. Of course they can be seen in any area of the house, but these are the most prevalent places. So, the next time you have swarming "ants" check them carefully or you may be operating on borrowed time.

Our phone began to ring this week from concerned gardeners with puckered peach leaves on their trees. This occurs each year about this time and seems to be worse in rainy weather. It is a fungus, and infection can take place when air temperature is between 40 and 86 degrees. The idea temperature is 68 degrees. It must have surface moisture on the leaves to develop, so all of the conditions are ideal for it to occur.

After the disease is visible, control is possible. Copper fungicide sprays aplied at the time the leaves begin to fall in the fall have proven very satis-

Infected leaves are characterized by puckering, thickening and curling leaves. They will also be various

Gardeners with tomato plants are encouraged to keep a film of fungicide on their plants in order to prevent Early Blight. This fungus starts out at the bottom of the plant as black to brown spots on the leaves. These spots get larger and a large part of the affected leaves turn yellow and even-

The fungus thrives in warm, moist conditions and rapidly infects leaves up the plant. If left untreated, the majority of the leaves may be destroyed by the disease. Fruit of naked plants are subject to sunburn.

Gardeners are encouraged to apply a fungicide to the leaves of plants. This disease must be prevented, so it is important to keep a film of fungicide on the leaves. One should pay close attention to the lower leaves and those near the center of the plant where the leaves stay wet for a longer period of time.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm ers, the interest rate is 4.5%. loans for losses caused by severe storms, flooding and tornadoes occurring April 15 and continuing are bein accepted at the Farmers Home Administration office in Clarksville, FmHA County Supervisor, Frank B. Stroud, said recently.

Red River County is one of eight in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the

storms, flooding and tomadoes. Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lendAs a general rule, a farmer must

have suffered at least a 30% loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Stroud said. Farmers pariticipating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations and cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

DPS Colonel Joe Milner reminded motorists that the traffic volume increases during holidays, raising the chances for fatal collisions.


