Kent, who presides over a 47-county area of Central and Northeast Texas, has been active for the past two years at the local, regional,

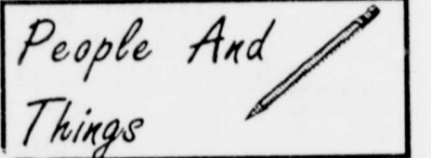
state and national levels. She will be a participant in the state program in San Antonio in April.

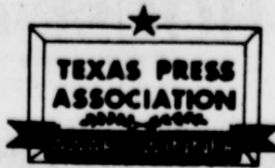

Country Cooking

This new article will be dedicated to everyone who likes to eat. Hopefully, no one will be left out. I am very excited about writing this article and I hope everyone enjoys reading it. First of all, I will give you a little background about myself. I live in Cunningham with my husband, Clyde, and our three children, Jerrod,

Kristi and Chance. We are members of the Life Tabernacle Church. I teach business Education at Paris High School.

This week, I decided to share with you two dessert recipes which are very easy, quick and delicious. The first one is "Fried Apple Roll-ups". I usually use apple as my fruit, but you may use whatever you like best.

Recipes For The Week

Fried Apple Roll-Ups

Ingredients:
*One 20 oz. can of apple pie filling. Put in sauce pan with 1/2 cup sugar and heat.
*Approximately 12 flour tortilla shells. Put a small amount of heated apples in shell and roll up. Deep fry, turning once, until golden brown. Sometimes I stick a toothpick in to keep them from unrolling. When brown, sprinkle with powdered sugar. Yield: Approximately 12 roll-ups. Preparation time: About 15 minutes.

The next recipe is Cherry Cobbler. This is also a simplified version of a cobbler, but very delicious.

Cherry Cobbler

Ingredients:
*One can of Cherry Pie filling. Place in saucepan adding one can of water and sugar to taste. I like mine sweet.
*Add two tablespoons margarine. Heat and boil for a few minutes.
*A box of Pillsbury All-Ready Pie Crusts contains two flat sheets of pie crust. Unfold and cut into strips. In long casserole dish, place three or four strips on bottom, pour half of the fruit and juice, another layer of crust, then remaining fruit and juice, top with remaining crust. Sprinkle sugar and some butter on top.

Bake approximately 45 minutes at 250 degrees or until top crust is lightly brown. Eat plain or top with ice cream or cool whip. You may substitute any kind of fruit.

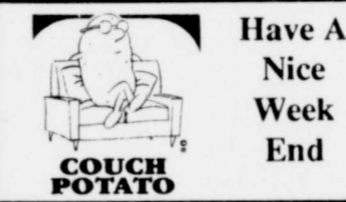

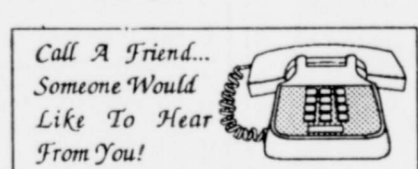

A T-shirt or windbreaker may be purchased from the Patriot Booster Club.

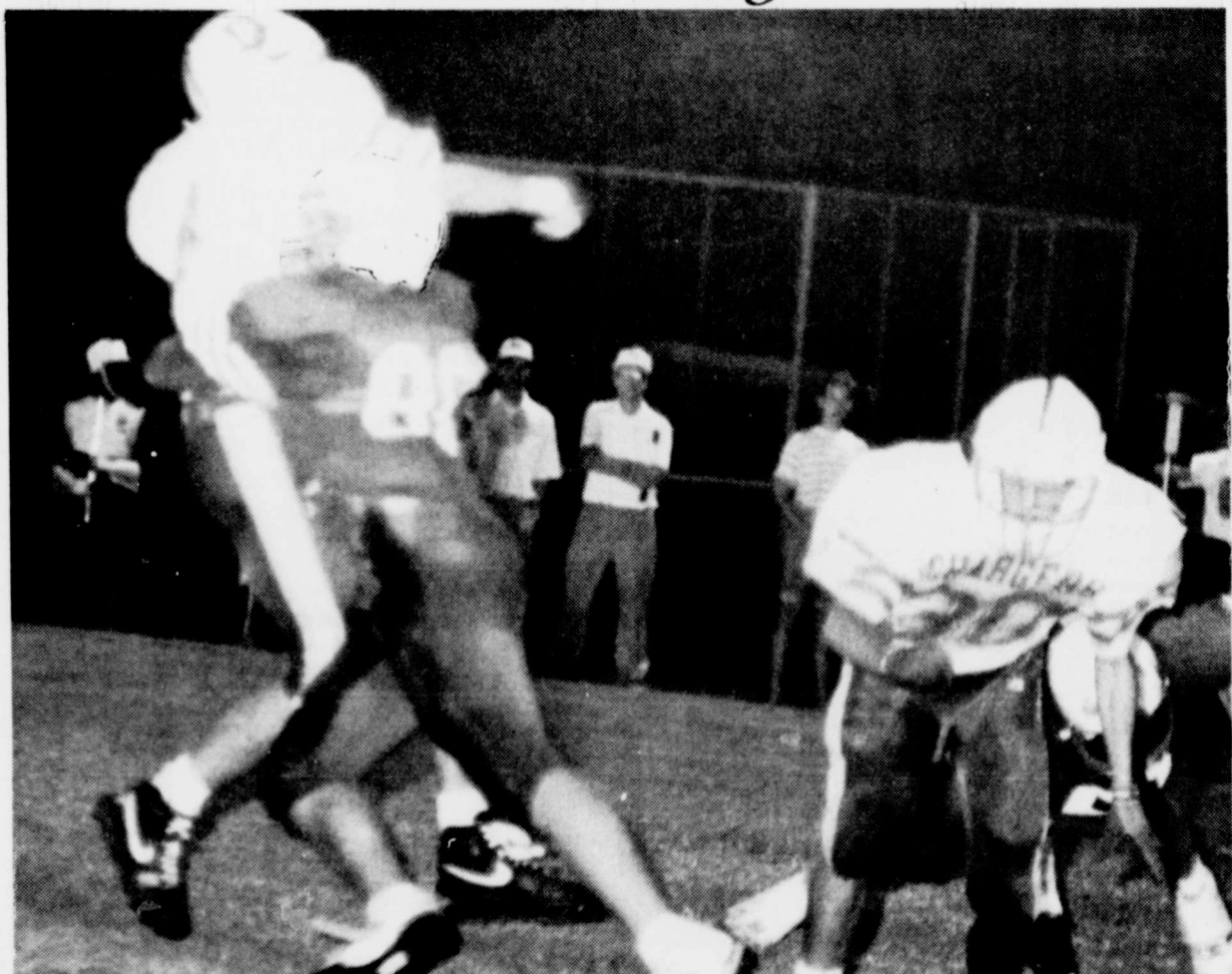

Ingredients:
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups flour
1/4 cup cocoa
1/8 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup chopped natural California pistachios

Directions:
Cream sugar and butter. Add egg and vanilla; beat until light. Blend in flour, cocoa and salt. Stir in pistachios; mix well. Shape dough into 10-inch long roll, 2-inches in diameter. Wrap and chill overnight. Cut into 1/4-inch slices; place on ungreased cookie sheets. Bake at 400 degrees F., 8 to 10 minutes until edges are firm. Makes approximately 4 dozen.
TIP: Dough can be refrigerated up to one week.

PISTACHIO MICROWAVE FUDGE*

Ingredients:
1 box (1 pound) powdered sugar
2/3 cup cocoa
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup milk
2 teaspoons vanilla
1/2 cup butter or margarine, sliced
1/2 cup chopped natural California pistachios

Directions:
In large microwave-safe bowl, combine powdered sugar, cocoa and salt. Stir in milk and vanilla; mix well. Place butter patties on top of mixture. Microwave at HIGH (100%) 3 minutes. Beat with mixer or wire whisk until smooth; stir in pistachios. Spread in foil-lined or buttered square baking pan. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons finely chopped pistachios. Refrigerate at least 1 hour or until firm. Cut into squares and serve at room temperature.

Deer Hunters Seminar Set In Mt. Pleasant

The annual Deer Hunter's Seminar sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Titus County Extension Service Natural Resources Committee is scheduled for October 23 at the Titus County Civic Center in Mt. Pleasant.

"The committee has put together an outstanding program for area hunters and landowners", said Dick McCarver, Titus County extension agent.

Numerous education exhibits and displays, as well as booths with sporting goods and related items will be open for viewing at 5:30 p.m. The formal program begins at 6:30 p.m.

"Clothes for the Hunter" is sure to be a popular topic. Ted Rye, Walls Industries, and Bob Stover, Spartan Realtree, will discuss camouflage patterns, new miracle fabrics and

insulation qualities of various products available in today's outdoor wear for hunters. Information presented should give hunters a better understanding of how to be invisible to wild game and how to stay warm and dry in the process.

"The Art of Growing and Taking Big Bucks" is the topic of Larry Varner, Ralston Purina Co. and former extension wildlife specialist. This presentation focuses on locating, keeping and harvesting big deer. If you enjoy seeing lots of big bucks, Varner's slide presentation should have you on the edge of your seat.

Hunting laws and regulations will

be discussed by Skip McBride district supervisor, L Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Law Enforcement Division. The TP&W will have a booth where hunters can get an-

swers to specific questions.

Dr. James Dixon, director of the National Wild Turkey Federation, will give an update on the restocking program of Eastern wild turkeys. His presentation includes turkey calling tips which McCarver says will have hunters strutting in the aisles.

Herb Chambers, Texas fieldman for the National Rifle Association, will discuss "Gun Owners Rights--a Legislative Report", and "The Pro-Hunting Movement". His presentation will detail what hunters can do to counter legislative threats to gun ownership as well as attacks on hunting by animal welfare groups.

"The whole family can attend this program," McCarver said.

"Special door prize drawings will be held for younger hunters and ladies. L Area merchants have donated many door prizes including gift certificates, rifles, knives and many other sporting goods items."

An admission charge of one dollar for adults will be charged. Youth under 12 will be admitted free.

Information on booth space or other aspects of the seminar can be obtained from McCarver at the Titus County Extension office located three miles north of Mt. Pleasant on Hwy. 271 or calling 214-572-5201. Everyone is welcome.
