Norwood Resigns, Patterson Appointed To Prairiland Board

James Norwood, long time member of the Prairiland School Board, resigned Monday night, stating that he had served for "a long time".

In his place Johnny Patterson was appointed.

Superintendent Max Ballard stated that "We really hate to lose James Norwood, but feel that Johnny will be a very knowledgeable addition to the board".

In board tabled any action on custodial salaries until a salary schedule

study can be made.

A discussion was held on the health insurance program and bids will be received on the July 29th meeting.

The board approved a contract with region 8 educational service center for the 1991-92 school year.

The First National Bank of Deport was awarded the depository contract for the 1991-93 bi-ennium.

Carl Bush was hired as a teacher subject to assignment.

The financial report was heard, the minutes read and approved and payment of the bills approved.

Deport To Try Recycling Experiment Soon

Deport will become an experiment in recycling, according to Ann Wilson, who presented some information to the Deport City Council.

Ms. Wilson says that it will about three months to implement the program.

When it goes into effect recyclable items will be picked up at curbside on the same day as trash (Tuesdays). The recyclable materials, however, will be separated according to what they are in blue colored bags. These bags will be purchased by people willing to recycle, and will cost only 10cents per bag. There will be no expense to the city of Deport for this service.

While it might possible cost a citizen a dollar or two a month, the knowledge that the environment is benefiting, and that waste is being eliminated, should be well worth it!

Judy Whittle is the chairman of this effort, and further information concerning it will be released in the next few weeks.

In addition to hearing from Ms. Wilson the council discussed an application for a block grant after a Public Hearing, but took no action.

Appointed to the Deport Housing Authority Board of Commissioners were: Nina Sparks, Chairman; Ruth Cheatham, Vice Chairman; Hugh Jeffus, Sr.; R.E. Burden and Mike Francies.

It was decided to investigate the possibility of a street light on Dewey Street.

A meeting will be held with the Lamar County Commissioner's Court to discuss repairs on Jeffus Street from John Good's to the bridge by Gerald Glasgow's.

It was decided to send letters to those who need to clean up their property because of a health hazard.

The city will purchase new Christmas Decorations. These decorations will feature elves, a sleigh and Santa, and will be in the downtown park. Public support for this project is asked for, as the city is trying to help make the town more attractive during the holiday season.

It was decided that the new city truck will be locked up in the city barn after work hours and the keys kept in the office. It will be used only for city business.

Deport Releases Regulations For Lake Usage

The City of Deport released the rules and regulations on the Tom Jeffus Reservoir, located just north of Deport.

Fees for a one year permit will be \$5 for a family of four, and a family of more than four will pay \$10.

Rules are:

- 1. No nets. 2. Small boats-paddles or trolling motors only 3. no firearms 4. no swimming 5. 18 and over must have permits 6. trot lines must be marked and not left over 5 days at a time in the lake 7. 25 hooks per trot line and not over 1 line per person 8. catfish and bass no less than 14 inches in length 9. bag limit of 10 catfish and 5 bass per day 10. valid fishing license according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department 11. must enter lake on west side of lake on city property or could be prosecuted for trespassing violation 12. no littering 13. no drinking alcoholic beverages or have narcotics.

Fines of \$10 to \$200 enforced by the City of Deport and State laws by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

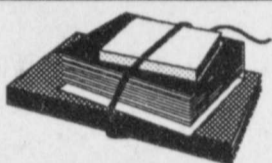

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Mexican Salad

1 large head lettuce, chopped
1 large bell pepper, chopped
2 large tomatoes, chopped
1 large can Ranch Style beans
1 lb. cheese, grated
Cook 1 lb. hamburger meat and drain. Just before serving, add 1-8 oz. pkg. Fritos and toss, then add one bottle Catalina dressing and fold in.

Tasty Cole Slaw Dressing

3 tablespoons honey
3 tablespoons vinegar
1 1/2 cups miracle whip
dash salt
Mix the honey and vinegar thoroughly, add the salad dressing and beat well. Salt to taste. At this point you may want to add more honey or vinegar, according to taste. This is enough dressing for 4-5 cups of shredded cabbage.

Frozen Dessert Or Salad

1 can whole cranberry sauce
1-15 1/2 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup chopped nuts
small box Cool Whip
1 or 2 bananas, sliced
Mix together and freeze.
Quick & Easy Apple Dumplings
1-5 oz. can refrigerated buttermilk biscuits

2 1/2 medium sized cooking apples, peeled, cored & quartered
3/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup water
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
Roll each biscuit into circles on a lightly floured surface. Place apples in the biscuit, moisten edge of dough with water, bring ends to center, pinching to seal. Place in an 8" baking dish. Combine sugar and remaining ingredients in sauce pan, cook over medium heat until mix comes to a boil, pour syrup over dumplings. Bake at 350 for 30 minutes or until dumplings are golden brown.

3 eggs
2 1/2 cups sugar
1 cup Crisco
2 cups zucchini, grated
3 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. cinnamon
1 tsp. nutmeg
1/4 tsp. baking powder
1 cup chopped nuts
1 small can pineapple, drained
3 cups flour

Zucchini Bread

Beat eggs, add oil and sugar, beat well. Add zucchini and vanilla, mix well. Add remaining ingredients and thoroughly mix. Bake in 2 prepared loaf pans for 1 hour at 325.

Blueberry Yum Yum
2 cups blueberries
2 cups sugar, divided
1/4 cup water
1/4 cup cornstarch
3 tablespoons water
1 cup all purpose flour
1/2 cup margarine, softened
1 cup finely chopped pecans
1-8 oz. package cream cheese, softened
1-9 oz. container frozen whipped topping, thawed.

Combine blueberries, 1 cup sugar and 1/4 cup water in medium saucepan, cook over low heat until berries are soft (about 15 min.). Combine cornstarch and 3 tablespoons water in small bowl, stir well. Add cornstarch to blueberry mixture, cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Set aside and cool. Combine flour, margarine and pecans in small mixing bowl, mix well. Press dough evenly into 13x9x2 baking dish and bake at 350 for 20 minutes, cool. Combine cream cheese and one cup sugar, beat until smooth. Fold in whipped topping, spread over cooled crust. Pour blueberry mixture evenly over top. Refrigerate, cut into squares to serve. Yield: 15 servings.

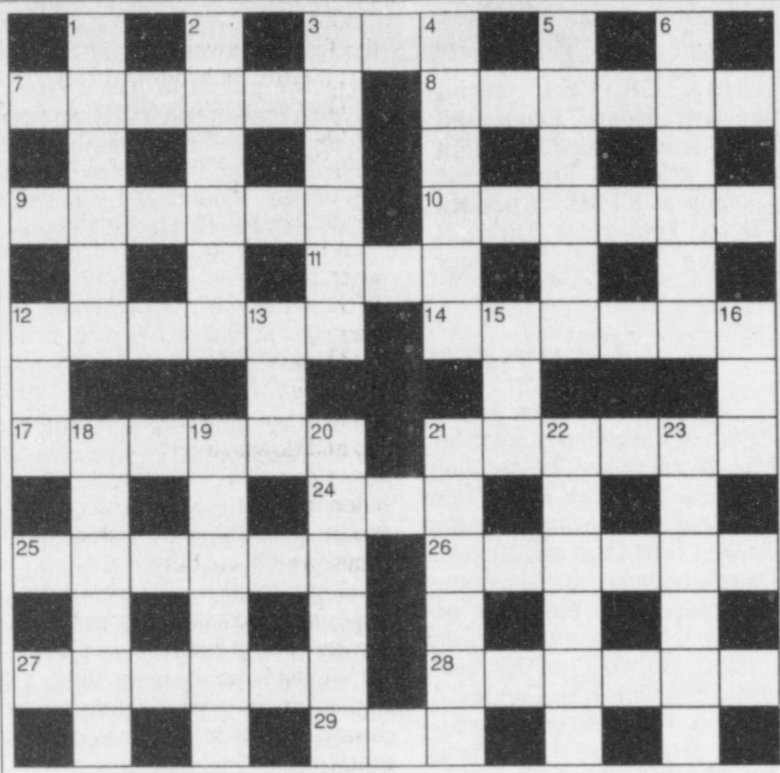

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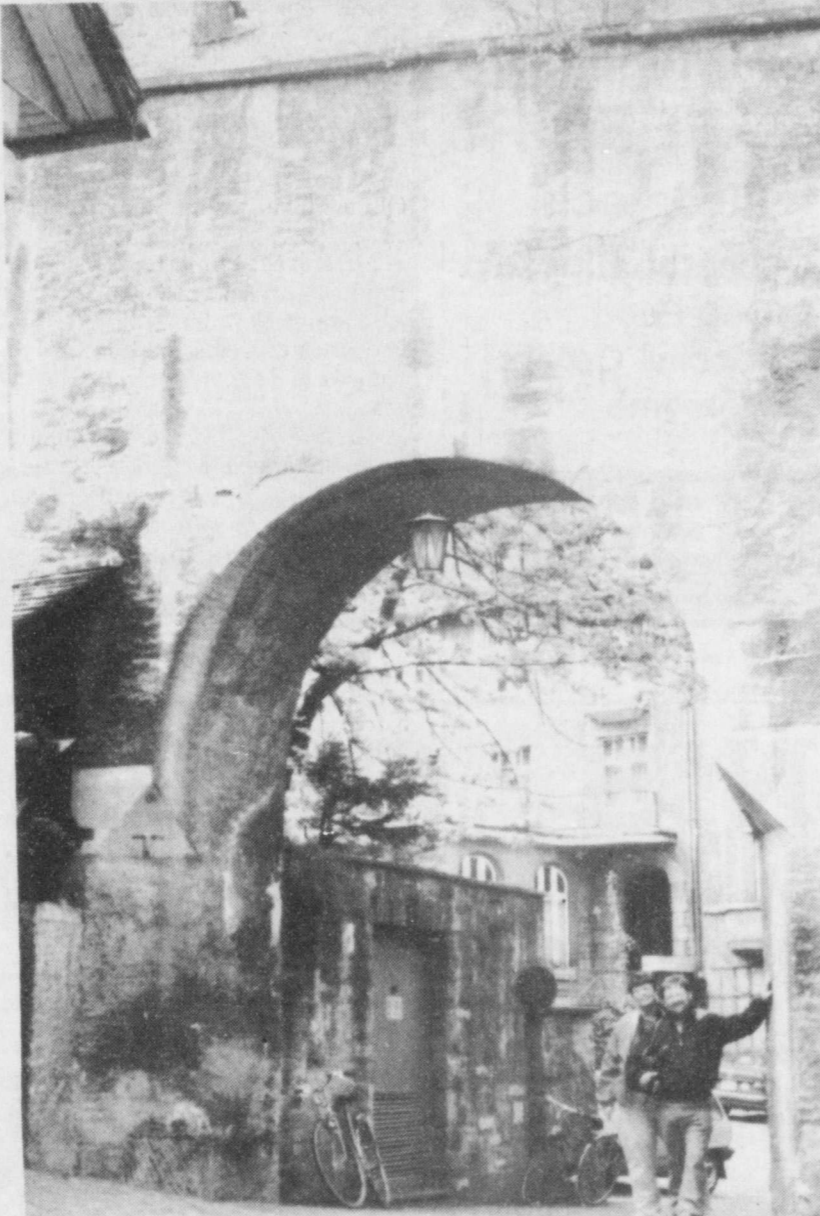

Lucerne, A Truly Noble City

Editor's Note: This is the conclusion of our travel series. We appreciate all the compliments on the series.

Lucerne must truly be one of the most beautiful cities in the world. Like so many Swiss cities, it is located on the banks of a lake, and is surrounded by mountain peaks. We first saw the Lion Monument, carved into the stone of a mountain side. It depicts a slain lion, head resting on a shield, heart run through by a spear. This commemorates the Swiss guards who lost their lives in a vain attempt to guard Marie Antoinette during the French Revolution.

Our hotel was only a block from the famous covered bridge, and we lost no time in heading down to it. The pedestrian bridge is the oldest in the world. Roofed with wooden shingles, a watch tower sits alongside of it, adding the perfect touch to a beautifully composed picture.

A Jesuit church stands nearby, and after the walk across the bridge one is in the pedestrian part of the city. Restaurants painted with blazes of color, odd hidden faces and bizarre figures, buildings that bear paintings of giants or medieval figures grace the narrow up and down streets.

A brightly painted fountain draws attention, and a department store boasted chocolates, tee shirts, coats, housewares and curtains.

Swans honked and swam on the lake, and leashed dogs trotted after owners doing evening shopping.

At last we went into the Jesuit church with it's modified onion domes.

Inside the color scheme was salmon pink and off white, trimmed with gold accents. It was truly a highlight of the day, light and airy, a lovely place of worship.

Strolling along beside the river we admired fountains weathered with age, buildings with paintings so old as to be almost invisible. We sat, swinging our feet, on a wall and listened to a choir singing "Yesterday" it took a moment to realize that it sounded strange to us because it was in English...we were becoming accustomed to hearing songs in German, Italian or French!

The old town hall was a delight, and we climbed narrow stairways up past little aptment doors graced with tulips, bleeding heart and gypsophilia.

Ivy covered walks led us back to the hotel, where we took a quick shower and prepared for our "folklore evening".

In a huge hall with beams and flowers our group, along with other people, sat down to a meal of traditional Swiss Fondue, veal, potatoes and other hearty Swiss fare.

Fondue is cheese with a little wine, heated until melted. Chunks of good brown bread are speared, then dipped into the mixture.

A small band played, and then the entertainment began.

The master of ceremonies was a

wizened elderly man who soon had us all laughing.

Yodelling made some smile, others cringe...it began, we heard, centuries ago when mountain dwellers chanted their prayers from mountain peak to mountain peak.

Alp horns, huge horns fifteen feet long, were blown by the experts...but then the audience was called upon to try. That was definitely something that experience was needed for, as the audience didn't doo too well.

There were more songs, more yodelling, flag throwing, and skits.

A quick instruction in the polka still proved hilarious, especially from our own tour member, Lew, who gave it his best shot, much to the mausement of his friends.

At nearly midnight the evening concluded, and we all returned to our hotel.

It was with sadness that Thomas and I realized that tomorrow would be the end of another wonderful trip.

The next morning we were up and at Zurich Airport bright and early, which was fortunate, since the computers were down and check in had to be done manually.

It took a long, long time, and we were already tired by the time we boarded the plane. Still, it was a long, uneventful flight.

All stiffness disappeared, even though we had been sitting down for nine hours. O'Hare airport in Chicago offered us some mighty long lines to enter back into the United States through, then we "followed the green lines" in accordance with instructions, and after what seemed a three mile walk, managed to get on our plane to Dallas/Ft. Worth.

Rural Fire Protection Grants Approved

U.S. Rep. Jim Chapman (D-Sulphur Springs) announced that funding for the Rural Community Fire Protection Grants, which assist communities to address the rural fire problems, was recently approved by the U.S. House of Representatives in the FY92 Rural Development, Agriculture and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill.

"This is good news for rural East Texas. These grants are made to public entities to organize, train and equip local firefighting forces to prevent, control and suppress fires threatening human lives, crops, livestock and other resources in rural areas," said Chapman, who, as a member of the House Appropriations Committee, was able to secure \$3.5 million to fund approximately 3,800 grants.

Throughout the years, in the past, Texas has received a number of these grants. "In the upcoming weeks, the Senate will consider the bill. You can be assured that I will continue to offer my full assistance to the firefighting community and will continue my efforts to see that East Texas rural fire programs are adequately funded," concluded Chapman.
