Deport City Council Hears From Lone Star Gas

The Deport City Council heard from Roy Sparks Manager and Zenett Fulbright Office Supervisor of Lone Star Gas Company as they presented a rate increase to the city during the council's regular meeting Monday, Nov. 9, 1992.

When I got out of the car at the Wright home this week, I was greeted by a big, red, flop-eared pup named Rusty and a feisty little white dog whose name I didn't catch. Laying to the side of the path was old Bullet, a German Shepherd. He didn't react to noise, and I was afraid there was something wrong with him. I watched a while to make sure he was breathing before going toward the house. Laura came out on the porch and I commented that he didn't seem very interested in his surroundings. I thought she said he was dead. I told her that he couldn't be dead because he was breathing. She then explained that Bullet lives in a world of silence. He isn't dead. He is deaf.

Laura and Donnie Mack Wright with their daughter and son, Lindsay and Matthew, live northwest of Deport. Laura is employed by Guaranty Bank-Deport and Donnie works for TU Electric. Lindsay is a freshman at Prairiland. She enjoys playing on the volleyball team and Matthew is in the seventh grade at Deport. His interests include basketball, baseball, swimming and golf. The Wright's older daughter, Stacy Huddlestone, is a third grade teacher at Deport. Stacy and her husband, Allen Dale, operate A&R Grocery.

Laura says that the cooking she does usually consists of repeats of the family's favorite dishes because they don't enjoy trying too many new things. She says that during cool weather they eat a lot of soups and Donnie Mack's 2-Alarm Chili. They also enjoy goulash type casseroles, using the small sized elbow macaroni. She tries to keep either beans or peas cooked at all times. She uses her great Aunt Hester's preserve pot for this. By doing this, they can accommodate their busy schedule by just running in and fixing a salad and a pan

of Mexican cornbread and they are ready to eat. She did mention the speed at which the entire family goes through sweets.

Laura Enloe Wright grew up in Paris. She attended J.G. Wooten, Paris High and PJC. Her father Stanley Enloe, traced their lineage back far enough for Laura to become a member of the DAR. Her great-grandfather donated the land for the railroad to come through the community of Enloe. The Enloe home in Paris was one of the first to burn in the 1916 fire. When the home was rebuilt, the furniture had to be replaced. Laura is preparing to bring the dining room table and chairs to put in the room with the rest of her antique collection and her collection of old Japanese wear. When she picks up a delicate pitcher or a brightly painted plate, her eyes show the pleasure she gets from this hobby. One week of her vacation each summer, she takes off with her mother, Vivian Enloe, and her sister in search of antique stores and flea markets to add to her collection.

The Wrights attend the Presbyterian Church in Deport. At one time Laura taught a Sunday School class but she prefers to just go and listen now.

Donnie had some funny anecdotes to relate about Laura's learning to cook some of the things he enjoys. They sounded vaguely familiar to me. I'm sure they would be easy for most wives to relate to if they'll remember back when they tried to fix the things their husbands were accustomed to eating. Especially if their mother-in-law was a good cook, as Mildred Wright is.

Carrot Cake

By Vivian Enloe
Mix together: 3 cups flour, 2 cups sugar, 2 tsp. soda, 2 tsp. cinnamon and 1/2 tsp. salt. Mix together 3 eggs beaten, 2 full cups grated carrots, 1 small can crushed pineapple, 1 1/2 cups Wesson oil, and then gradually add above. Add last 1 cup nuts and 2 tsp. vanilla.
Grease and flour tube pan. Pour mixture in and bake at 350 for 1 hour or until done. Cool about 5-10 minutes before turning out cake plate.

Wesson Oil Cake

Mix in order:
1 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. soda
3 tablespoons cocoa
5 tablespoons Wesson oil
1 cup cold water
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. vinegar
Icing:
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup milk
1 stick oleo
1 tsp. vanilla
a little Karo
4 tablespoons cocoa
Grease and flour 2 cake pans. Cook at 325 for about 25-30 minutes. Don't

overcook. Make chocolate fudge icing and ice while just barely warm or just cooled.

Buttermilk Cornbread

By Mildred Wright
3/4 cup meal
1/4 cup all purpose flour
1 tsp. sugar
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder
1 egg
1/2 tsp. baking soda
Combine dry ingredients and sift into large mixing bowl. Then add egg and enough buttermilk to make a good runny mixture. Pour into cast iron skillet with oil very hot. This begins cooking process right away. Bake 20 minutes in bottom rack of oven then as top looks dry, move to top rack to complete cooking of the top of cornbread. Remove and cut. Makes wonderful cornbread dressing.

Buttermilk Biscuits

1 cup buttermilk
1 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. soda
Combine all in a large mixing bowl and stir well. Sift self-rising flour into wet mixture and mix until you have a good elastic mixture. Then place onto floured dough board and knead with flour already on board. Pat out dough into large circle then use a cutter and cut biscuits. Put oil in pan and dampen each side of biscuits. Cook about 20-25 minutes.

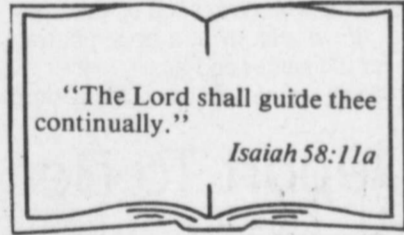

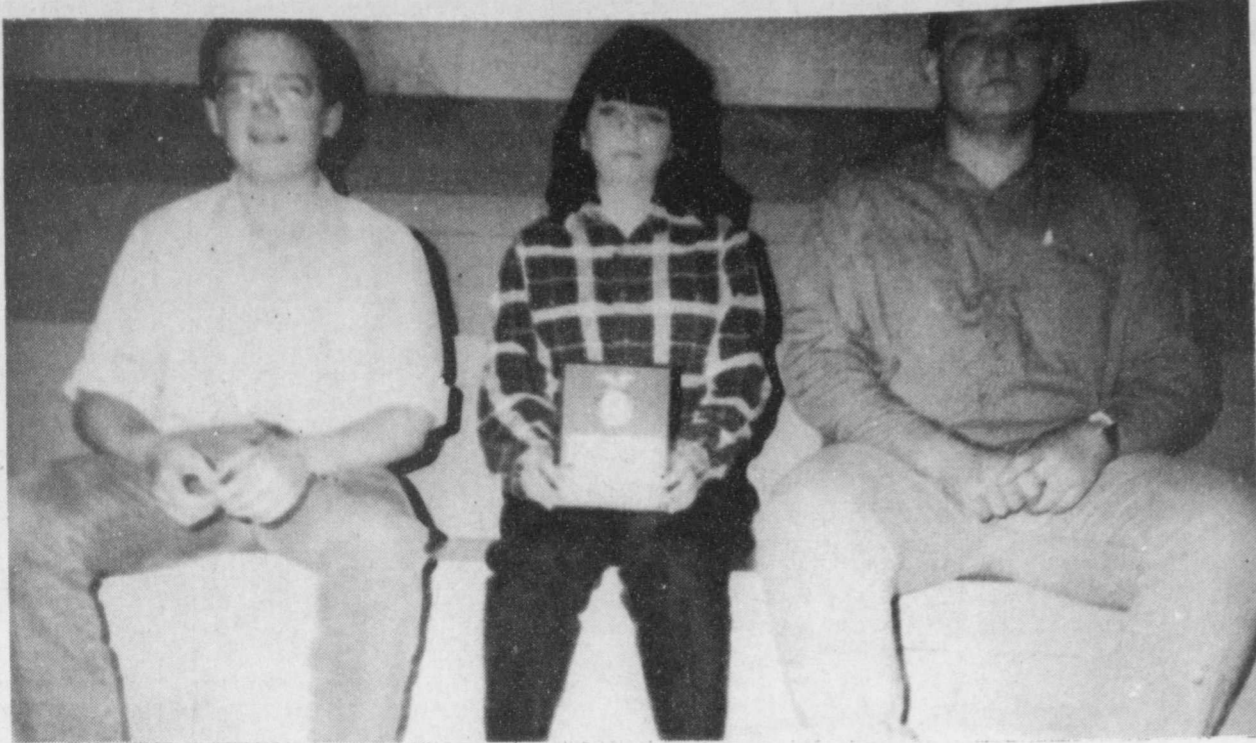

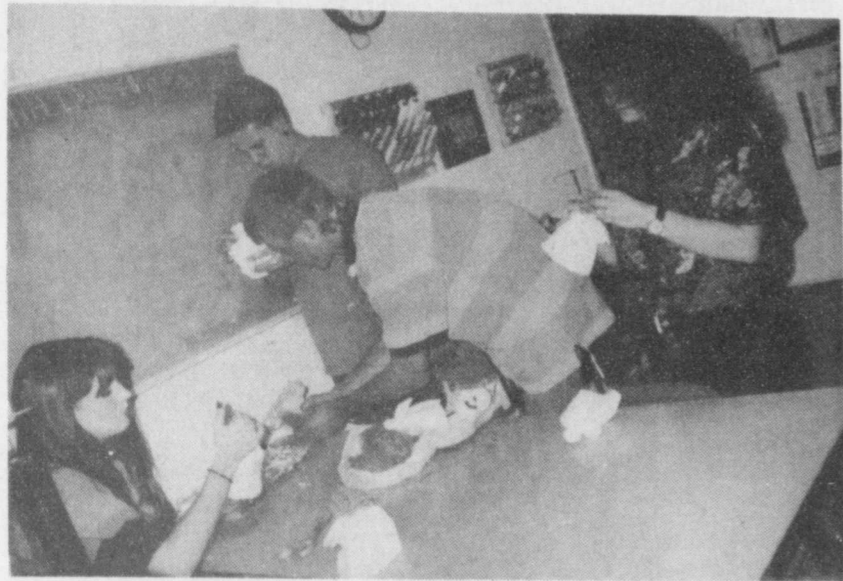

Article Tells About World's Largest Gin!

Mr. & Mrs. Vernon Lollar, of Fairfield Bay, Arkansas, formerly of Deport, sent a copy of an article run in the Arkansas Democrat-Gazette down to us here at the paper thinking we might be interested in it, which we were.

The article tells about Leacville Mississippi which is now the home of what is reputed to be the world's largest cotton gin.

Charles Dean "Boe" Adams says that the gin will have the capacity of about 2,000 bales per day.

Adams has a net investment of \$7.5 million in the building and equipment, and more than two acres are under one roof.

Under ideal conditions it could put out about 120 bales an hour. There are ten gin stands in the huge plant.

Most of the cotton ginned will be in modules, and Adams has ten module trucks that will cotton from about a sixty mile radius. Trailer cotton will be ginned only at designated times.

It is estimated that the gin will handle the cotton from about 62,000 acres. About 100,000 bales this year and about 120,000 in the future is predicted.

The entire operation is state-of-the-art. He says that they try to make \$40 to \$45 per bale through marketing and ginning, anything above that they return to the farmer.

the gin will operate two twelve hour shifts daily with 17 people per shift.

Adams was once a basketball coach, and owns about 30,000 acres of land. He also has pursued insurance in the past.

He and his family have recently moved into a 17,000 square foot home, complete with a 4,500 square foot guest house and a dindoor tennis court!

He also operates a farm supply store as well as a fertilizer and chemical business.
