disease). At stores they are at terrible risk from vehicles. In the country they are eaten by coyotes, run over, or worst of all, may die a

lingering death from starvation. And it is so completely unnec-

Most of us can manage to run to "town" for just about anything...so why can't we take unwanted animals to the Humane Association vor Pound? Yes, they may have to be eliminated. But it is done quickly, and isn't painful. Or take them to a vet...even shot them yourself! As harsh as it seems, it beats being injured or killed on the road, or starving.

Ican't abide cruelty...and dumping is cruel, cruel, cruel. Please folks, don't do it!

There is a verse which reads "A good man looks to the welfare of his animals" it's from Proverbs in the Bible. Think about it.







Enchiladas By Becky Wiliams

1 lb. ground hamburger 1 medium onion (yellow, white or red)
1 lb. Longhorn cheese

can chili (any brand you prefer) 12-24 tortillas Dice onion into small pieces. Fry

hamburger meat over low heat adding a few onions for flavor. When meat is done, drain of as much of the grease as possible. Cover skillet with a lid and set to one side Take a 1/2 cup of oil and put into a

small saucepan on medium heat. Let the oil get warm, drop tortilla in one at a time for just a few seconds to get soft and take out. Repeat this as many times as you need to.

mAfter you have prepared the meat andtortillas, get a large pan (depending on how many tortillas you are making). Grate cheese in a bowl. Warm chili. Take one tortilla, put approximately 1 tablespoon meat, sprinkle with onions and cheese, roll over and put into the pan. Keep filling up tortillas until you have filled the pan. Pour chili over the top and sprinkle the rest of the onions and cheese over the top. Bake at 300 until cheese melts and chili is bubbling.

Several items can be substituted to make a low calorie meal. Substitute hamburger for lean, ground turkey, use low fat cheese and bake the tortillas in the oven on low until they are soft. Everyone can enjoy enchiladas even if they're on a diet. Note: There is no saltin

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When people see ads in the paper they should know firewood is sold in standard units called "cords," which equal 128 cubic feet. Dense hardwoods, like hickory, oak, maple and ash are the best buys. Softwoods, such as pine, burn rapidly and contain resin or pitch. Use firewood which has been cut, split and dried out for at least one year for more heat and less creosote build up.

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Postal Employees Making A Difference In Silver Star Cemetery

When some rural carriers and some management employees of the Lamar County Post Offices joined together as a work team for the "Auality Work Life/Employee Involvment" program, few realized some of the projects that would stem from the organization. The latest, a very humane and caring project is taking on the task of cleaning up the Silver Star Cemetery. The graveyard, purchased in 1895 from P.M. Chism by the Lamar County Commissioners Court, has many grave sites there but has fallen into hard times and disrepair in the past few years.

Most people who pased the cemetery, located north east of Paris on FM 195, didn't realize a burial ground was located there. The chain link fence was completely covered with vines and brush. The cemetery, itself was a jungle of trees, brush and

In searching for a community project, the QWL/EI Paris Area Work Team, made up of rural carriers and mangement from the Paris, Pattonville, Powderly, Blossom, Detroit Sumner and Arthur City Post Of-

fices, took the suggestion to check into cleaning up the Silver Cross Cemetery.

Inchecking with the Lamar County Commissioner's Court, who didn't realize that the court owned the cemetery, the team was told that the court was more than glad for the group to take on the project and also offered to help with some of the work.

The work team has spent several work days on the project and have the southeast corner, about one acre of the six acres cleaned out. The county moved the gate and installed a culvert tomake the site accessable to FM 195. The highway department also installed a road sign on 195.

Many others have volunteered their work and services to the team project. One man sprayed for insects and sprayed to kill the weeds and underbrush. Another volunteered his tractor and shredder. The team members

Shortly after the second clean up day, the county used the cemetery to

bury a person. The group was very pleased that they had cleaned it up some before the burial. When the grave had settled, the work team filled it in with more dirt and removed the dried wreaths from the grave.

The site has graves all over the six acres. Some are marked with tombstones, some with just a piece of granite, and some are marked only with bois 'd arc stobs. However, many are unmarked and will have to be located and marked.

The people involved in this project are very enthusiastic that they can work at something that can be such a benefit for so many people who are affected by the final resting places of their loved ones. Contel's intraexchange DS1/DDS Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through Contel's current private line tariff rates Existing customers with DS1/DDS Services will not be affected by these rate changes. DS1 1.544 Megabits per second (Mbps) Service and Digital Data Service (DDS) will normally be used for the transmission of data communications or large volumes of voice communications between two locations. These services are optional and will not affect the existing rates of customers who do not order these services. The estimated annual effect on GTE-SW's revenues in the first year is \$1, 080, 567. The estimated annual effect on Contel's revenues in the first year are \$42, 383.

DS1 Service

DS1 Service is an intraLATA Private Line Service which provides a dedicated, high capacity channel which may be used for simultaneous two-way transmission of voice data or other digitally encoded customer information signals. DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts. If the customer selects an OPP, additional DS1 Local Loops may be ordered and installed at the Additional DS1 Local Loop rate between any SWC and CDL covered by the OPP, at any time during the term of that OPP.

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DS1 signal between Serving Wire Centers. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

DS1 Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DS1 Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DS1 Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the DS1 Transport.

Digital Data Service (DDS) is an intraLATA Private Line service which supports synchronous, full-duplex transmission between the CDL and the SWC or the point of connection with another telephone company at transmission speeds of 2.4, 4.8, 9.6, 19.2 and 56 kilobits per second (Kbps). DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.

DDS Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DDS Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two CDLs or between a CDL and a point of connection

IntraLATA DDS Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DDS Local Loop, DDS Transport and DDS Transport Termination. Each element is

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer may establish and disconnect DDS Local Loops without penalty other than the minimum service interval of one month's service, as his/her needs demand.

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DDS signal between SWCs. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

DDS Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DDS Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DDS Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each


