## Area Drought Worsening With Heat, No Rain

Crops are rapidly deteriorating as the moisture situation worsens throughout the entire Red River Valley area. It has been about a month since any appreciable amount of rainfall has been received, and that coupled with high winds equates to a disaster.

Nevertheless, we have much for which to give thanks, and perhaps we should be thankful that we have made some production and our cattle have not been swept down the river and our homes and farmsteads are not inundated with water and several

feet of mud.

Soybeans are one of the hardest hit crops at this time. The early maturing varieties (Group III & IV) are in the bloom and pod filling period in their development at the present time. The Group III and early Group IV varieties have set pods while the later maturing Group IV varieties are blooming presently. If moisture doesn't come soon, the beans in the set pods will not fill and the beans blooming will not set pods. A good rain this week would be very beneficial.

The area hay crop is running upwards of 50% of normal based on reports from custom hay operators and farmers. The first cutting was extremely short, as bermuda grass did not grow until the weather warmed up in late May. Consequently, the first grass cutting contained very little bermuda. This shortage has caused prices of most commodities to go up, and we should expect feed cost to escalate when the full impact of the midwest flood is realized.

## McCuiston Hospital Affiliates With Presbyterian

McCuiston Regional Medical Center has announced that, based on the recommendation of the hospital's administration, the Board of Directors has chosen to affiliate with the Dallas-based Presbyterian Healthcare System.

According to hospital administrator, Anthony A. Daigle, "Since early 1992, McCuiston's Board of Directors and Administration have been exploring options related to providing high quality healthcare for Paris, Lamar County, northeast Texas and southeast Oklahoma in the face of challenging financial restrictions. "McCuiston and Presbyterian," Daigle said, "share a common philosophy of providing the best possible care to patients and their families in the most appropriate and convenient setting."

Doug Hawthorne, President and CEO of Presbyterian Healthcare System, added, "Both of our institutions enter this agreement from positions of strength. In creating this affiliation agreement, we are teaming for the future. Presbyterian represents a major health care network composed of 1300 physicians, 5000 employees in hospitals and urgent care centers throughout north and east Texas."

The selection of PHS, Daigle stressed, provides added assistance in the efforts McCuiston is making to establish new and needed programs for its service area as well as expanding existing programs. "Working with Presbyterian will strengthen our ability to provide solutions to some of the problems related to access of adequate healthcare by our aged and indigent population; control and hopefully reduce healthcare cost to our patients; increase the access to all levels of service by our patients and their physicians, and enhance the quality of healthcare in our service

area."

The hospital leaders also announced that cooperative actions are being reviewed with St. Joseph's Hospital and Health Center, Paris. Several meetings have been held with leadership from both facilities. The ongoing effort is to produce effective solutions to the needs and concerns of the community. "Because it is our desire to help support the needs of the Paris community, Presbyterian Healthcare System will pursue grants which will aid in meeting the identified community needs and will benefit all of those who seek and provide healthcare in this community," Hawthorne emphasized. Many needs were identified through a community needs assessment which St. Joseph's conducted in 1992.

The Presbyterian Healthcare System affiliation promotes care at the local level and creates an ease of access to desired levels of service by patients and their physicians while strengthening the physician-to-physician relationship with staff members at Presbyterian Hospital-Dallas. Additionally, the strengths of both organizations complement the existing strategic plans for McCuiston and reinforces the joint strategic planning of both local hospitals in meeting community needs. By sharing current resources, McCuiston would not have to develop programs that exist in the Presbyterian Hospital System freeing up local capital for other endeavors.

"By selecting Presbyterian, we have created a relationship without legal hassles or entanglements," Daigle noted, "and have not given up local decision-making power or operational management. I believe this affiliation means the broadening of our horizons to ensure the best possible care for the citizens of our community for today and tomorrow."

Friday: Fill a pew. (By family). The youth will have pews to fill also. The family with the most pews filled will win a prize.

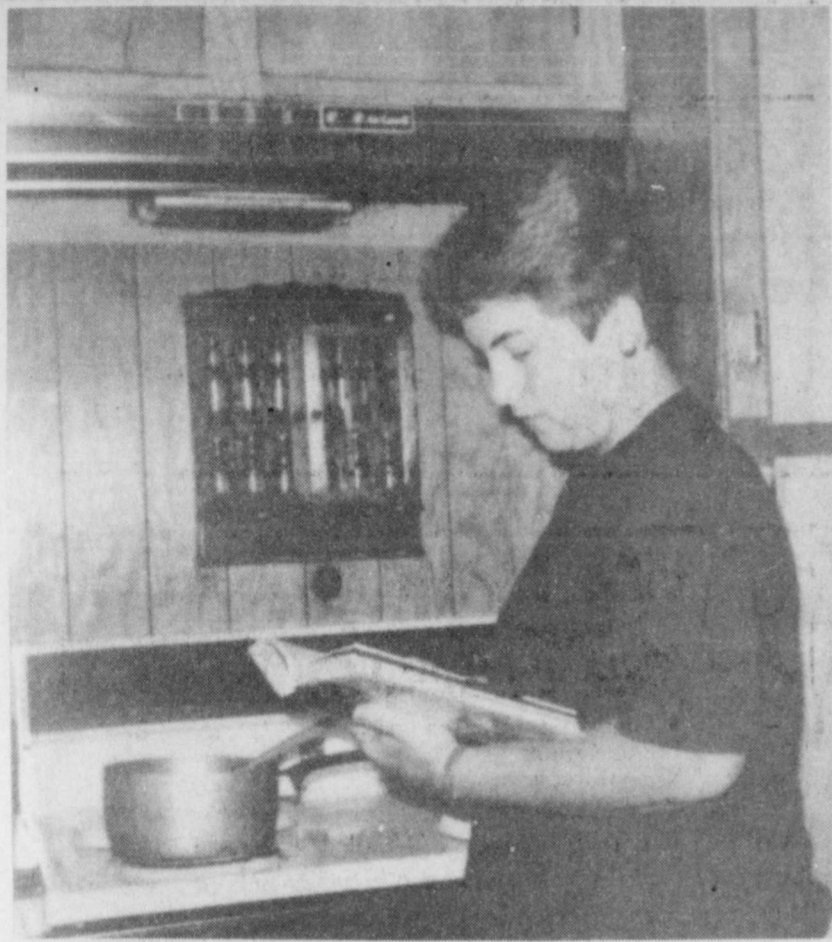
Saturday: Young adults eat with the ministers after the services.

**MEXICAN PIZZA**  
By Tana Screws  
1/2 cup plus 1 Tbs. corn meal  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1 Tbs baking powder  
1/2 tsp salt  
3/4 cup skim milk  
1/4 cup liquid Butter Buds  
1 (12 oz.) jar mild picante sauce  
1 (15 1/2 oz.) can Mexican Style chili beans undrained  
1/2 lb. ground white meat skinless turkey  
1-4 oz. can chopped green chiles, drained  
2 cups grated Kraft Free cheese Slices  
1 small jar jalapeno peppers, sliced. (Only use peppers if you want it real hot. I don't)  
Heat oven to 450 degrees. Spray a 14 inch pizza pan, with a cooking spray. Sprinkle 1 Tbs. Corn Meal into prepared pan. Combine remaining 1/2 cup corn meal, flour, baking powder, and salt. Add milk and liquid Butter Buds; stir with fork until mixture forms a ball. Press dough into prepared pan; shape edge to form rim. Bake 15 minutes.  
Cook ground turkey meat in microwave in a bowl, covered with wax paper 5 minutes on high. Remove and stir. Cover again and cook 1-3 more minutes. Drain. In a medium size bowl combine turkey, meat, undrained beans, green chiles, and picante sauce. Spread mixture over cooked crust. Sprinkle grated cheese on top. Arrange sliced jalapenos on top of cheese if you use them. Bake 10 minutes or until cheese is melted. Serves 8. Fat grams Per serving: 0.69 - calories- 262. Taco sauce may be used instead of picante sauce.

**SPANISH RICE SKILLET**  
1 recipe of 1 cup dry rice and 2 cups water, cooked as directed on package. Use liquid Butter Buds instead of oil or margarine.  
In a skillet, brown, drain, and rinse with hot water 1 pound of ground turkey. Return turkey to skillet. Stir in 1 medium sized can stewed tomatoes and juice. Add 1 tsp salt and 1 tsp garlic powder, and 1 tsp chili powder. Mix cooked rice into tomato and meat mixture. Take 6 slices Kraft Free Cheese and break up in tomato rice meat mixture. Heat in a skillet on top of the stove until the cheese is melted and juice is hot.

**QUICK SNACK CAKE**  
1 1/4 flour  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup cocoa  
1/4 cup corn starch  
1/2 tsp. baking soda  
1/2 tsp salt  
2 Egg Beaters or 4 egg whites  
1 cup water  
1/2 cup light corn syrup  
Spray a 9 inch square baking pan with a cooking spray. In a large bowl combine flour, sugar, cocoa, corn starch, baking soda, and salt. In a medium bowl, using a fork or wire whisk, mix Egg Beaters, water, and corn syrup. Add to flour mixture; stir until smooth. Pour into prepared pan. Bake in a 350 degree oven 35 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center, comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack. 16 servings. Less than 1 gram of fat per serving and less than 83 calories.



# Monthly Sales Tax Rebates Received by Local Cities and Counties

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered a total of \$111.4 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 977 Texas cities and 108 counties, a 6.9% increase over the payments of one year ago.

Texas cities received \$100.3 million, up 7.7% over the \$93.1 million they received last July. Counties received a total of \$11 million, virtually unchanged from their July 1992 payment.

This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected on May sales and reported to the Comptroller in June by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

"Employment across the state has continued to expand since May 1992. The service sector led all other industries, adding 63,000 jobs over last year. The government, wholesale and retail industries also increased by 43,000 and 31,900 jobs respectively," Sharp said.

The city of Houston received a sales tax payment of \$14.6 million, the largest rebate for July, and a 2.8% increase from its \$14.2 million in July 1992.

"Proposed plans to relocate some manufacturing facilities to Houston, as well as the addition of new retail stores, could bolster employment and break the city's stagnation," Sharp said.

Blossom received \$1,675.92 this year as compared to \$1,303.80 last year, an increase of 7.22%.

Deport received \$684.88 this year as compared to \$565.68 last year, an increase of 8.38%.

Paris received \$163,863.77 this year as compared to \$169,019.35, a decrease of 5.98%.

Bogata received \$1,929.39 this year as compared to \$1,951.57, a decrease of 5.23%.

Clarksville received \$14,873.80 this year as compared to \$15,882.98, a decrease of 1.85%.

Detroit received \$853.30 as compared to \$678.85, an increase of 21.88%.

Mount Pleasant received \$125,848.46 as compared to \$105,076.22, an increase of 15.63%.

Talco received \$933.41 as compared to \$942.38, a decrease of 6.04%.

Check the battery for frayed cables, loose clamps and corrosion. Check the fluid level in the battery if it isn't factory sealed.

Check all the fluids and filters. Check the headlights, brake lights, turn signals, hazard lights, windshield washers and horn.

And before you leave on your trip, don't forget your basic tools, as well as a jack, jumper cables, road flares, a lug wrench, flashlight, pocketknife, and first-aid kit.

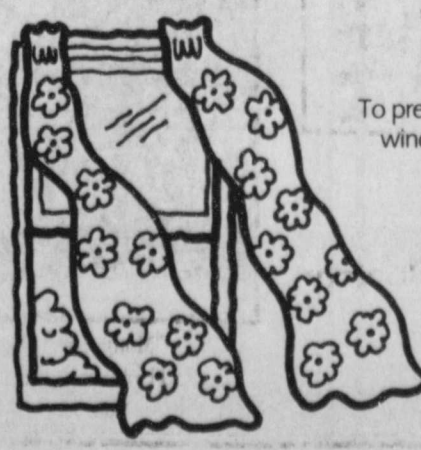

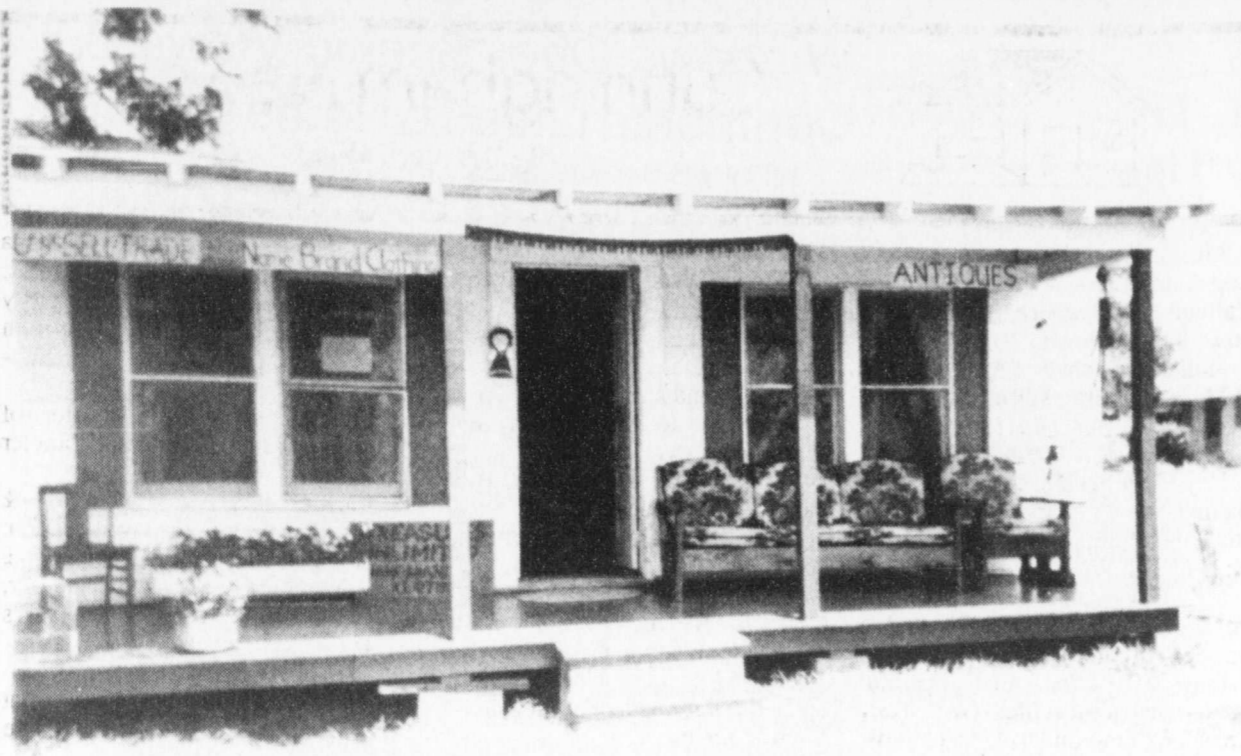

## Low Birthweight Babies May Be Eligible For SSI

According to Ray Hudson, District Manager of Paris Social Security Office, low birthweight babies may be eligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits, and being eligible for SSI usually means you are eligible for Medicaid.

SSI is a federal program that provides monthly benefits to individuals who are 65 or older, or blind, or have a disability and who don't own much or have a lot of income; and the program isn't just for adults. Infants who weigh less than 1200 grams (approximately 2 pounds 10 ounces) at birth are considered disabled and may qualify. Even an infant who weighs more than 1200 grams at birth,

and has serious medical problems, may also meet the SSI disability requirement.

Generally, while the infant is in the hospital the parents' income is not counted and will not affect the baby's eligibility. However, if the baby is receiving SSI and is discharged to go home with his or her parents, the parents' income will be reviewed and may affect the baby's continuing eligibility for benefits.



**To Beat Heat, Try These Garden Tips**

The dog days of summer can daunt even the most spirited of gardeners. But abandoning the garden because of drought or heat can greatly reduce yields.

Here's some help to beat the heat and drought:

- Avoid the scorching mid-day heat by working in the garden late in the afternoon or early in the morning. But don't start too early; waiting until the morning dew is dry will help prevent the spread of diseases.

- Harvest vegetables in the morning before they wilt or get too large.

- Spread an organic mulch such as straw or pine bark over the garden. The mulch will hold moisture in the soil and reduce the amount of time

you need to spend weeding.

- Be sure to cultivate weeds when they are small. If you wait until they become well established, you'll have a harder time removing them. Also, the weeds will consume moisture and nutrients that your vegetable plants need.

- Instead of watering every day, try watering only once a week. But be sure to give the garden a thorough soaking, wetting the soil to a depth of 6 inches. Gardens need an inch of water a week.

- Remove plants from the garden when they have finished producing. By doing so, you'll reduce the chance of having serious disease and insect problems to handle.

**Windows Offer Scenic Views But Contribute Little To Home Comfort**

A wall of windows may offer a scenic view, but it offers little to a home's comfort level or energy efficiency, according to Texas-New Mexico Power Company.

The R-value of a window shows why windows may contribute up to 20% of a home's summer heat gain or winter heat loss through heat transfer. R-value is a relative measure of a material's resistance to heat transfer. The higher the value, the higher the resistance to heat transfer. A double-paned window generally has an R-value of R-1.5, compared to a standard wall, which has an R-value of R-11.

Although windows can never achieve the efficiency of a wall, homeowners can take steps to reduce energy waste through windows, said Gary Petty, Bogata district manager with TNP.

Most of these steps involve either some type of insulation for the windows or shading for the outside of the window. Insulation can involve something as simple as heavy drapes that fit tight to the wall and have a cornice to control air flow at the top. Mini-blinds, on their own, offer very little insulating ability, Petty said, but they can be helpful in trapping layers of air when used in conjunction with drapes.

The most effective interior treatments, he said, are the use of movable insulation such as thermal curtains and shades and thermal shutters.

In the summer, a solar screen installed on the outside of the window can help block from 50% to 70% of the direct radiant heat of the sun. Solar screens look similar to tightly meshed insect screens and are available with reflective and non-reflective finishes. The reflective screens

reflect solar heat away from the house, while the non-reflective mesh blocks sunlight and absorbs some of the sun's energy.

The screens can be purchased or assembled the same way insect screens are assembled. They have the added advantage of being effective with the window opened, and they can be removed during the winter so that the sun can be used to warm the house.

Shading windows on the outside is another way to reduce energy waste during summer months. Shading options include awnings, landscaping, shutters, exterior roll shades and roof overhangs. Shading should be planned so that it not only reduces heat in the summer but allows the heat to come in during the winter, Petty said.

For customers building new homes, TNP recommends taking care to place windows where they minimize energy loss. A southern exposure is best, Petty said, especially if there is a deep overhang with the window. Northern and western exposures are the worst, depending on the time of year.

TNP also reminds customers that windows can be a source of air leakage. Caulking and weatherstripping are easy and inexpensive ways to prevent this leakage.

"Obviously, windows can make a big difference in the visual appeal of a home--from the inside and outside," Petty said. "That's why we're not recommending that customers consider living in a windowless environment. We just want them to be aware that there are energy use trade-offs for the aesthetic appeal, but that there are ways to reduce that trade-off."

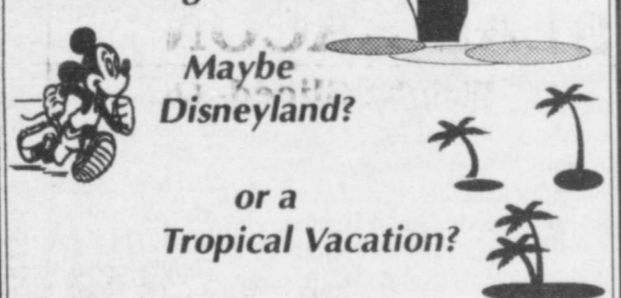

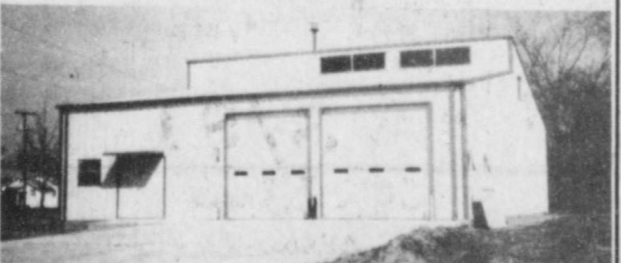
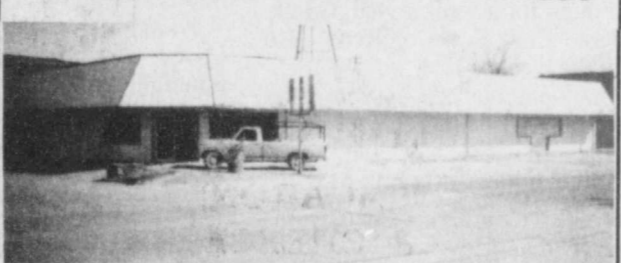
