Soybeans are one of the hardest hit crops at this time. The early maturing varieties (Group III & IV) are in the bloom and pod filling period in their development at the present time. The Group III and early Group IV varieties have set pods while the later maturing Group IV varieties are blooming presently. If moisture doesn't come soon, the beans in the set pods will not fill and the beans blooming will not set pods. A good rain this week would be very beneficial

The area hay crop is running upwards of 50% of normal based on reports from custom hay ooperators and farmers. The first cutting was extremely short, as bermuda grass did not grow until the weather warmed up in late May. Consequently, the first grass cutting contained very little bermuda. This shortage has caused prices of most commodities to go up, and we should expect feed cost to escalate when the full impact of the midwest flood is realized.

Veterans Of The Battle Of The Bulge To Hold 12th Annual Reunion

The Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge, Inc. (VBOB), will hold its 12th Annual Reunion in Bismarck, North Dakota, September 15-18, 1993. Reunions are held annually to honor the Americans who served in the Battle of the Bulge and remember those who sacrificed their lives in this great battle.

VBOB is an international nonprofit organization which is composed of members who served in the World War II battle which rebuffed Hitler's strongest offensive and turned the tide of the war, their friends and family members, and history buffs. In its 11-year existence VBOB has enrolled over 11,000 members. It affords members the opportunity to renew and develop friendships, exchange information, and assist in initiating efforts to see that this battle is never forgotten.

The Battle of the Bulge has been called by many "America's greatest battle." It was fought during the

bitter cold and snow of the heavilyforested Ardennes area of eastern Belgium and northern Luxembourg from December 16, 1944, through January 25, 1945. Six hundred thousand American soldiers fought in this great battle with 81,000 resulting casualties, including 19,000 killed. General Patton, while speaking to his generals on the strategy for the battle, said, "If we live through this one, be forever grateful that you have brought with you one of life's greatest moments!

December 16, 1944, will mark the 50th Anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge. Many plans have been made for this observance. St. Louis, Missouri, has been chosen for these special commemorative ceremonies.



Low Birthweight Babies May Be Eligible For SSI

According to Ray Hudson, District Manager of Paris Social Security Office, low birthweight babies may be eligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits, and being eligible for SSI usually means you are eligible for Medicaid.

SSI is a federal program that provides monthly benefits to individuals who are 65 or older, or blind, or have a disability and who don't own much or have a lot of income; and the program isn't just for adults. Infants who weigh less than 1200 grams (approximately 2 pounds 10 ounces) at birth are considered disabled and may qualify. Even an infant who weighs more than 1200 grams at birth,

and has serious medical problems, may also meet the SSI disability requirement.

To Beat Heat, Try **These Garden Tips**

The dog days of summer can daunt even the most spirited of gardeners. But abandoning the garden because of drought or heat can greatly reduce yields.

Here's some help to beat the heat and drought:

· Avoid the scorching mid-day heat by working in the garden late in the afternoon or early in the morning. But don't start too early; waiting until the morning dew is dry will help prevent the spread of diseases.

In the summer, a solar screen installed on the outside of the window can help block from 50% to 70% of the direct radiant heat of the sun. Solar screens look similar to tightly meshed insect screens and are available with reflective and non-reflective finishes. The reflective screens off.

A wall of windows may offer a reflect solar heat away from the house, while the non-reflective mesh blocks sunlight and absorbs some of the sun's energy.

Windows Offer Scenic Views But

Contribute Little To Home Comfort

The screens can be purchased or assembled the same way insect screens are assembled. They have the added advantage of being effective with the window opened, and they can be removed during the winter so that the sun can be used to warm the house.


Shading windows on the outside is another way to reduce energy waste during summer months. Shading options include awnings, landscaping, shutters, exterior roll shades and roof overhangs. Shading should be planned so that it not only reduces heat in the summer but allows the heat to come in during the winter, Petty said.

For customers building new homes, TNP recommends taking care to place windows where they minimize energy loss. A southern exposure is best. Petty said, especially if there is a deep overhang with the window. Northern and western exposures are the worst, depending on the time of year.

TNP also reminds customers that windows can be a source of air leakage. Caulking and weatherstripping are easy and inexpensive ways to prevent this leakage.

"Obviously, windows can make a big difference in the visual appeal of a home--from the inside and outside!" Petty said. "That's why we're not recommending that customers consider living in a windowless environment. We just want them to be aware that there are energy use tradeoffs for the aesthetic appeal, but that there are ways to reduce that trade-




