






Catfish Losses To Nitrites

According to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service there were many reports of large catfish dying from nitrite poisioning in early fall. Nitrite-Nitrogen accumulates when ammonia is oxidized faster than nitrites can be converted to nitrates. Nitrite in the blood of fish interferes with the blood's ability to transport oxygen. The problem is alleviated if

sufficient chlorides are present. Enough chloride to supply a 5:1 chloride: nitrite ratio will prevent nitrite poisoning. Large catfish are more susceptible than small catfish, and centrarchids (bass-blue gill-crappie) are resistant. Adding 50 pounds of salt/ acre foot twice per year to catfish ponds usually prevents the prob-





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



Plan Ahead For Mailings To Faraway Places

states of Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Texas have a quick quiz for postal customers.

What's the connection between October 1 and Christmas? No, October I wasn't the date to start thinking about doing your holiday shopping.

If you're sending a gift by surface delivery, the least expensive way to someone in Australia, Africa or Southeast Asia, that's the date the parcel needed to be in the mail to assure delivery before the holiday.

The October 1 mail by date was the first of a number of deadlines or suggested mailing dates for packages and cards being sent to civilians and U.S. military personnel in foreign

The earliest mail by date for military parcels is October 12 for those going by surface delivery to servicemen and women stationed in Europe, the Far East or Australia.

Other suggested surface mailing dates for military parcels range from mid-October through late November, depending upon the destination. For surface delivery of civilian parcels, the latest date is November 1, to Europe, the Caribbean and Central and South America.

The fastest choice is two-day express mail military service to most

Local postmasters serving the four APO and FPO addresses in Alaska, Hawaii, Iceland and the Caribbean. The same rates apply as for domestic express mail service. They start at \$9.95 for up to eight ounces; \$13.95 for up to two pounds and \$15.95 for three pounds, with a 70-pound weight

In addition, regular express mail international service provides expedited delivery in 96 countries.

Postal customers have a choice of several other services that are between express mail and surface mail speed and cost. These include Parcel Airlift Mail-PAL parcels go by air to a gateway airport in the United States, then overseas by air on a space available basis Regular Parcel Post rates are charged, plus an air service fee ranging from 35 cents to \$1.40, based on weight.

SAM packages should be mailed by dates in early and mid-November Regular Parcel Post rates apply.

With Priority Mail, packages weighing from 12 ounces up to 70 pounds receive the same handling as first class mail to any APO or FPO address, suggested mail by dates for both priority mail and civilian International Air Parcel Post range from November 21 to December 9, depending upon the destination.





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

October Is National Fire Prevention Month

The winds of winter carry one of the deadliest seasons for home fires. Woodstoves, fireplaces and alternative heaters are often necessary to fight the cold, but if not used properly ey can become fire hazards. The ncrease of fires during the winter months is particularly ominous for the state of Texas, which ranks among the nation's top states in fire deaths.

The need for fire safety information is critical. Fire kills close to 5,500 people in the United States every year -- more than all other natural disasters combined. October has been deemed National Fire Prevention Month.

The United States Fire Administration (USFA) has issued the following recommendations to reduce the number of fire-related deaths this

Alternative Heaters Use space heaters in well-venti-

lated rooms.

Place heaters where they will not be knocked over easily and away from curtains, furniture and other items that burn.

Plug heaters directly into wall sockets, not into extension cords.

Unplug heaters when they are not being used.

Woodstoves and Fireplaces Use seasoned wood and protective screens at all times. Clean interiors, hearths and chim-

neys yearly

Sleep Safety Practices Never smoke in bed.

Use only electric blankets approved by testing labs.

Don't run cords under beds or trap against walls.

Safe Cooking Practices Don't leave the stove unattended

while cooking. Keep clothing, curtains and other

fabrics away from the stove. Make sure the stove is off and all small appliances are unplugged be-

fore going to bed. USFA also aims to reverse a trend toward a complacent attitude about smoke detectors. "Nearly 86% of homes in the United States have smoke detectors -- the problem is with people maintaining them," said USFA Assistant Administrator James Coyle. "It's tragic to see so many deaths occur in homes where firefighters are able to look right at the wall or ceiling and see the detec-

tor in plain view, only to open it and

find the batteries missing or wires

disconnected."

The best way to ensure the effectiveness of the detectors is to test the batteries monthly and change them at least twice a year. A working smoke detector doubles a person's chance of surviving a fire.

Stickers To Reduce Theft

The Texas Department of Transportation is issuing a new vehicle registration sticker, for placement inside windshields instead of outside on license plates. The program begins with registrations expiring January 1994.

The sticker is larger and of a different design. Its main purpose is to deter thet, bringing up another important feature.

If the sticker is peeled off the windshield, the word "VOID" apears on it, making it a useless scrap of paper.

In 1992, 568,885 replacement li-cense plates and stickers were issued. TxDOT estimates that 60% of replacement stickers issued were due to theft. At \$5.30 per replacement, replacing the stickers cost the public \$1.8 million and a lot of time and

The 72nd Texas Legislature passed a law in 1991 mandating the sticker change to lower vehicle registration theft. Drivers whose vehicles have no windshield will continue using the license plate stickers.
