

## Don Curry Home Burglarized Tuesday

The Don Curry home was burglarized Tuesday night while the family was away from home.

Mrs. Curry called the Briscoe County News Tuesday morning to report what happened and to warn other residents what was going on in the area.

The Curry home was locked and the burglars tried to break the back door down. Failing at this, they broke a glass and gained entry.

"They took a long list of things," Mrs. Curry said. "They took radios, television sets, and a lot of our kids' school clothes. A lot of the kids had left to wear were the things that were in the dirty clothes hamper. I had folded some pants and put them away in drawers, and they didn't take these, but the kids don't have any shirts to wear with them.

"Apparently something scared them away before they were finished. They had the bedspread off our bed ready to load when apparently they left in a hurry," she continued. "We don't know if someone was heard on our two-way radio or whether they saw someone coming, but it seemed as if they left before they were finished.

"We were all gone and there weren't any vehicles here. I was helping my mother-in-law who recently had back surgery and she persuaded me to stay a few minutes longer than I had planned, or I might have surprised them myself."

The car in which the burglars were travelling was seen by a neighbor and this has been reported to the Briscoe County Sheriff.

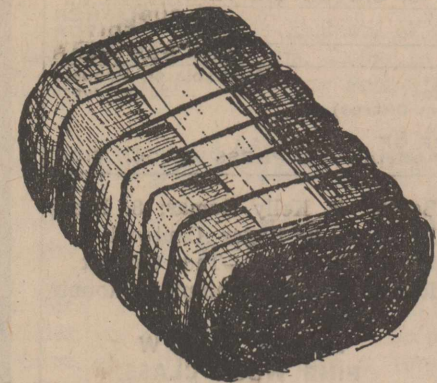
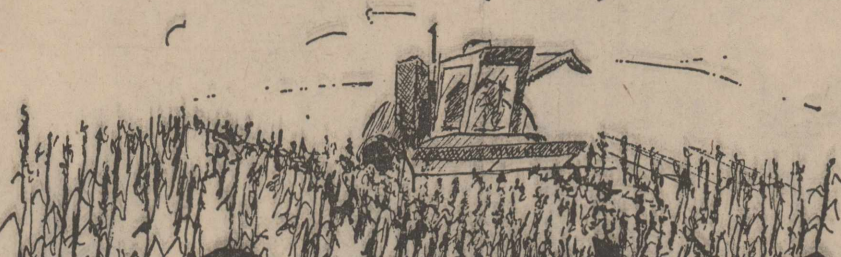

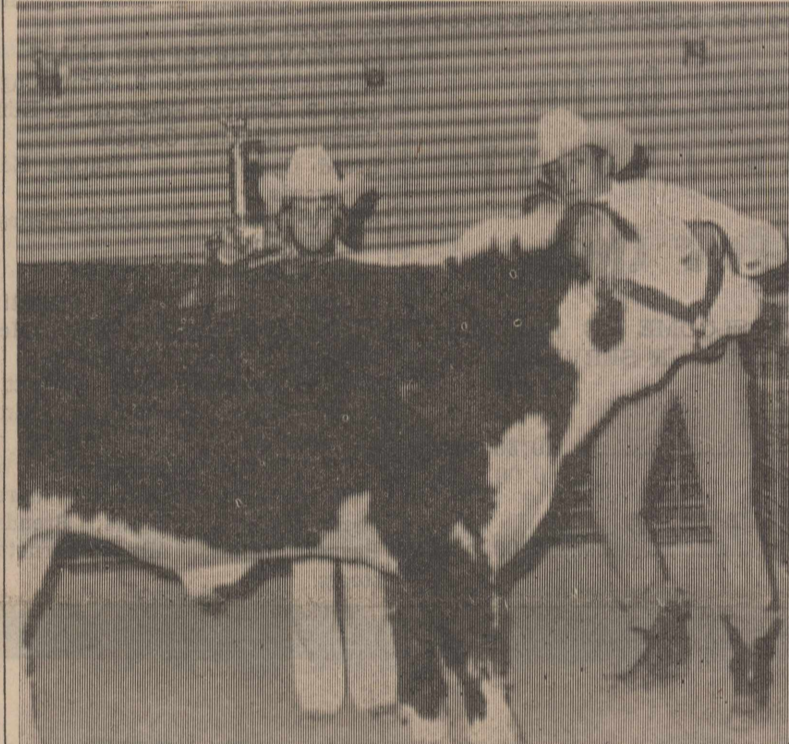

## First Traffic Fatality In County Occurs Early In New Year

### Services Held Friday For Tony Thomas

Briscoe County's first traffic fatality of 1975 occurred when the New Year was less than two hours old in a one-car accident just west of the Silvertown city limits on Texas Highway 86. Three passengers in the car also were injured in the mishap.

Tony Thomas, 19, was dead on arrival at Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulia less than an hour after the accident.

Barry Bullock, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gail Bullock of Silvertown who was home on leave from the United States Navy, remained until last Saturday in Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulia for treatment of a broken wrist, back injury and concussion. Bullock left by plane Tuesday for the Great Lakes Naval Center in Illinois.

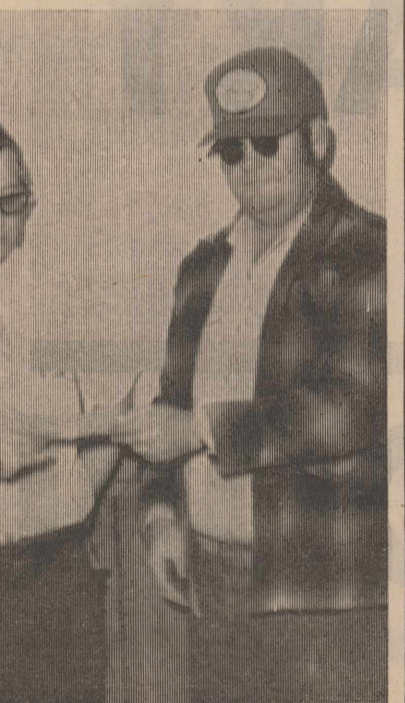
Two cousins, Van Martin, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Martin of Silvertown, and Douglas Ellis, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Ellis of Dumas, immediately were transferred by the Silvertown Volunteer Ambulance Service to the Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo after receiving first-aid treatment at Swisher Memorial Hospital. A nurse from the Tulia hospital, Mrs. Leala Vaughn, accompanied the ambulance to Amarillo to supervise the IV's which were begun on Martin and Ellis in Tulia. Ambulance attendants on the call were Bill Ford, Flute Hutsell, W. D. Rowell and Charles Sarchet.

Ellis was taken into surgery after examination at the Amarillo hospital and was in intensive care with a spine injury until Sunday when he was moved into Room 252. He was treated for a collapsed lung, but is resting well now. It is expected that Ellis will be moved to High Plains Baptist Hospital for therapy on Wednesday or Thursday. Ellis was salutatorian of his graduating class at Dumas High School and was studying banking and accounting at Texas Tech.

Martin was treated for internal injuries and Monday underwent surgery for the placement of a pin in a broken shoulder. Martin also received a hairline fracture of a vertebrae in his back, but is resting well in Room 256 and is expected to be able to return home later this week.

Interviews with the survivors of the accident reveal that Thomas was having some mechanical trouble with the automobile at the time of the accident. The accelerator hung, and following the accident the transmission was locked in second gear. Both Martin and Bullock recall that Thomas was thrown out of the car the first time it rolled and apparently he was struck by at least a portion of the car; they both recall that Martin and Ellis were thrown out on the second roll of the car. It is thought that Bullock remained inside the car, but he said he lost consciousness on the third roll.

Martin started to town for help and was picked up near the Y by the Jimmy Stones and David Tiptons.

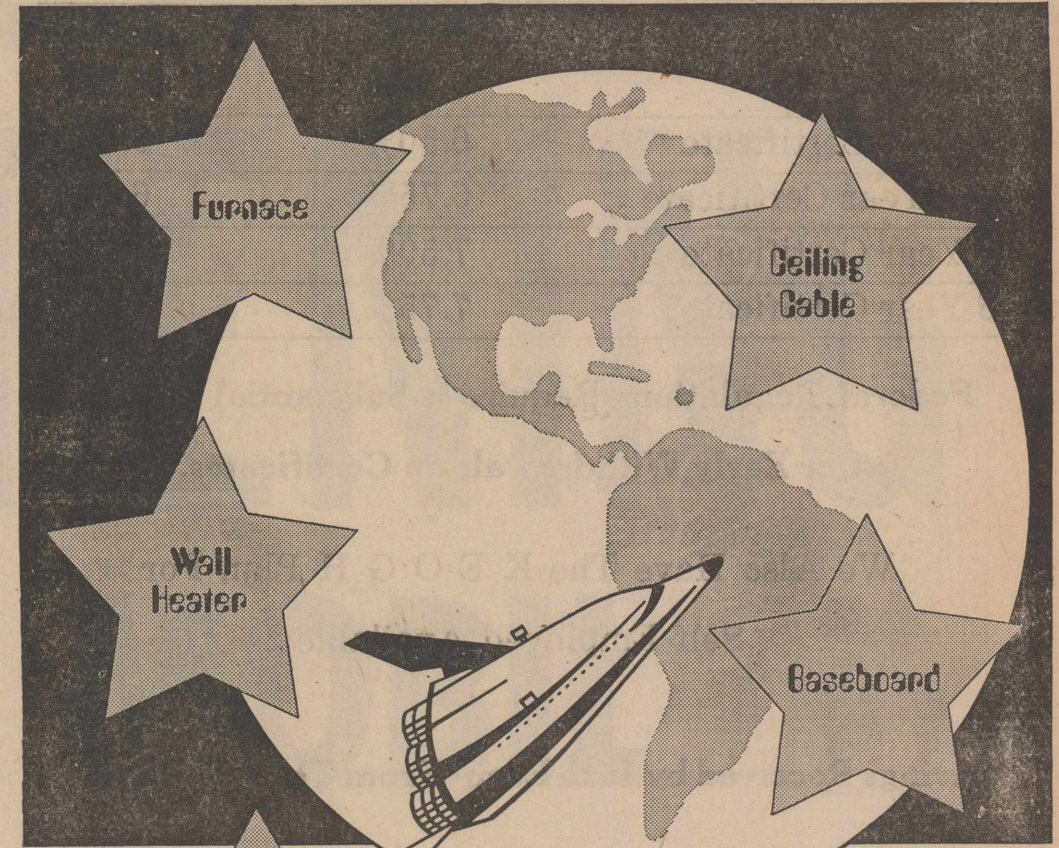
