Mr. Green, another account is given that we might be interested in studying together. This one is found in (Acts 8:26-40). When Philip baptized the eunuch the record says (here will you read it) "and they both went down into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him. And when they came up out of the water—" That is pretty plain is it not? You can see that if they were sprinkling for baptism during that time there would have been no need whatsoever of them going down into the water. They could not have come out of the water because they had not been in it.

Let us new look to (Acts 22:16). Ananias told Paul to arise and be baptized and wash away his sins. Now you know that one could not be washed with a little water being sprinkled upon him. When my wife washes my shirts she really washes them. They are plunged under the water, immersed. For a person to have his sins washed away he must be immersed as Paul was, I am sure. That's what the Book says, is it not Mr. Green? Of course now, I know that baptism does not wash away the filth of the flesh. (1 Pet 3:21). Paul uses the washing in Acts 22:16 to illustrate that one must be washed even as a garment would be. To be washed one would have to have more than enough water to sprinkle on.

Rom. 6:34 says that we are buried with him in baptism and that we arise to walk in newness of life. Notice these two points very carefully. First, we are buried with him through baptism into death. For one to be buried through baptism there needs to be more than enough water to sprinkle. Second, we arise. We arise from what? We arise from baptism which in a likeness plants us in Christ's death. Now one cannot be planted in sprinkling can he? Col. 2:12 gives us the same teaching. I believe with these scriptures in mind you can see that one must be immersed in order to be saved. Think on these things Mr. Green and study on them and I believe that you will come to a knowledge of the truth, because I believe that you are honest and are looking for the truth. Because you believe the Bible with all your heart you should let it speak and you, then obey. That is the only way to have salvation in the Lord Jesus Christ.

My friends, I have heard of many people becoming dissatisfied with sprinkling and being immersed, but never have I heard of any one becoming dissatisfied with immersion and being sprinkled. There must be a reason for this. The reason, as you can plainly see from the above scriptures is that immersion is taught in the Bible. There are many who will be immersed and know that their condition is safe, while there are others who have been sprinkled worry all their life about their condition and do nothing about it. Which condition are you in? Why not be immersed and let the Lord add you to his Church and then you can know that you are right. What a blessing it will be to you to be able to lie down at night, at the close of day, and know without doubt that you have obeyed your Lord. If you have been buried with him you have the assurance that you will rise with Him, but if you were sprinkled there will always be a doubt in your mind. Why not take the way that is right and can not be wrong. All will agree that immersion is safe, for that is the Bible way.
