AMARILLO — The winning pitcher turned acrobat and the head coach sounded like a breakfast short-order cook after Perryton beat Muleshoe, 6-3, in the Class 3A bi-district playoffs Thursday at Tascosa High School.

Feli Landeros, who struck out 16 in a five-hitter, somersaulted off the mound after quelching Muleshoe's threerun rally in the seventh inning by striking out Edward Olivas.

Good thing Landeros is judged by the pop of his fastball and the bite of his curve.

"That was the ugliest somersault I've ever seen," a chuckling Ranger coach Bill Merrell said. "I told him to stick to pitching. I'll do the somersaults."

Unsolved mystery in Muleshoe

Angie Jordan had never met her step sister and figured it was better left that way until she learned of an ad placed in the Lubbock Avalanche Journal - apparently intended to find her and her two brothers.

Jordan, a 33-year-old photographer from Oklahoma City, is trying to find a stepsister she believes was born in the Muleshoe area in 1963 or 1964. They share the same father, James McNutt. McNutt was a farmer, cotton ginner, and according to Jordan, a womanizer.

It is not known how long McNutt lived the Muleshoe area, or if he is still alive.

"Since the ad came out we decided to try and find our sister," Jordan said. "Before that, I didn't want to find her because I didn't know if she knew who her real parents were, and I didn't want to cause trouble."

Jordan and her natural brother, Rickey McNutt, 31, of Ladonia, Texas, did find a step-brother, Tony Chancellor, 34, of Commerce. They met Tony while they were all in high school, but lost touch.

They were reunited last Thanksgiving. Now they talk on the phone once a week and get together regularly.

"We made a pact we would never get separated again," Jordan said. "Everybody can't believe the family resemblance. The pictures of Tony's two girls look just like the ones of me when I was little."

Third-graders at DeShazo Elementary School learned an important math lesson Thursday learning multiplication tables pays dividends.

More than 140 students, and about as many relatives gobbled up 12 gallons of ice cream, 150 pounds of bananas, 700 cherries, 144 ounces of whipped cream, plus plenty of chocolate and strawberry syrup during a banana split party in the school cafeteria.


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School Board outlines curriculum, schedule changes

Student codes of conduct, class scheduling, and test exemption policies were among items the Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees discussed Tuesday night.

Four items on the agenda will directly affect the 1996-97 school year.

Beginning with the 1996-97 school year, trustees approved a plan to return the high school to A-B block scheduling. The A-B system is similar

to that used by universities. Four of students' eight classes are scheduled every other day, with each class lasting 90 minutes.

The board also approved a plan to add choir to the current curriculum. The Peer Assistance and Leadership (PAL) program, which will no longer be offered as a state-approved elective, will be replaced by a Teen Leadership class. The Teen Leadership class will count as a state-mandated elective, but will also serve more students than the PAL

program, according to Bill Moore, Superintendent of Schools. The PAL program could only involve 15-20 students, where as the Teen Leadership class will provide unlimited involvement in learning decision-making and life-management skills, he

Plans to add a Multiple Occupations and Career Training (MOCT) class, as well as a Spanish III class were discussed as well. MOCT will consolidate individual workstudy classes in agriculture,

home economics, and dis- a plan that would allow for will provide a broader selection for employment for students.

Plans for summer school were finalized; classes will be puses and will run from May 28 to June 24. Three of the campuses will offer reading, writing, and math courses. The high school will hold only algebra and geometry classes, Moore said.


