Baptist Training Conference Is Scheduled at Clyde Church

First Baptist Church of Clyde will host a four-day training conference Oct. 5-8, the first of its kind in the state. It is designed to help Baptist training union workers in Callahan County improve their Sunday night programs.

Baptist training union workers with nursery, beginner and primary departments will meet at the church Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 5-6, from 7 to 9 p. m. for an elementary workshop.

Workers with junior, intermediate, young people and adult departments in Baptist training unions will meet Wednesday and Thursday nights, Oct. 7-8, at the same time.

Both meetings will teach training union principles and methods in an effort to improve the churches' Sunday night training union programs.

First Baptist Church of Cross Plains will hold similar meetings using the same conference leaders, but the Cross Plains church will hold the leadership emphasis meeting on Monday and Tuesday, and the elementary workshop on Wednesday and Thursday.

The Rev. Edward E. Laux of Dallas, secretary of the training union department of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, said it was the first time to his knowledge that this approach has been used to teach and train training union workers in the state.

Meetings will be sponsored jointly by the Callahan Baptist Assn. and the training union department of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Conference leaders for the elementary workshop include

Mrs. W. R. Bumpas of Dallas, nursery; Mrs. B. B. Longacre of Abilene, beginner; and Mrs. Edward E. Laux of Dallas, primary.

Conference leaders for the leadership emphasis meeting will be Mrs. Lowell Queen of Abilene, junior; Marshall Walker of Abilene, intermediate and young people; and Kenneth Trinkle of Corsicana, adults, pastors, educational directors and training union general officers.

Taylor to Stay Neutral for Now

Taylor County Commissioners have agreed to take no sides in the boundary question between Callahan and Coleman counties. They took the action Tuesday following a request from Callahan County Judge Byron Richardson that Taylor county back Callahan in the event of a suit filed by Coleman.

The boundary "dispute" covers some 400 to 850 feet along the entire 25-mile boundary shared by Callahan and Coleman counties.

The matter is expected to go to court before being settled. Coleman County Commissioners Court has approved \$3,000 to finance a suit, and has authorized hiring of Hal Woodward of Coleman to represent that county.

A strip of about 400 feet for the 4 1/4-mile boundary of Coleman and Taylor counties is also jointly claimed by the two involved.

If the Coleman-Callahan dispute is settled at the line recognized by Coleman County, Callahan would lose 1,456 acres; if by the line recognized by Callahan County, Coleman would lose 726 acres.

FFA Band Will Play Saturday

A varied musical program will be presented this Saturday in the high school auditorium by the Baird High School FFA chapter talent team, recent state competition winners.

Proceeds from the program will finance the team's trip to Kansas City to perform at the national Future Farmers of America convention later this month.

Tickets, at \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students, may be obtained from team members, and will be available at the door. The program will begin at 7:30 p. m.

Members of the FFA band are Billy Seelig, Hal Miller, Lloyd Ray Hughes, B. P. Stephenson, Bill Moore and Bill Bollinger.

Other highlights of the program will include presentation of Barbara Bruce as 1964-65 Baird FFA chapter sweetheart, and introduction of chapter officers for this school year.

Each Employee Is Due UF Card

Each wage-earner in Baird is to be contacted in this year's Baird United Fund campaign. A donor card is being prepared for each person.

In past years, only one card was prepared for families in which both the husband and wife work. This year, however, both will be contacted for United Fund contributions.

The change is designed to give every wage-earner an opportunity to contribute his or her share to the United Fund. The theme for this year's drive is "a day's pay for a year's work," with donors asked to contribute the equivalent of a day's pay to the campaign.

Final details of this year's drive are being mapped. The drive will be conducted during final weeks of October.

A total of 6,015 statements have been mailed to Callahan County property owners by the county tax assessor-collector's office.

The annual tax levy is for a total of \$108,662.42. The amount is based on the county rate of 80 cents per \$100 valuation. Total tax valuation in the county is \$13,582,815.

Bears Joust Ranger In Key Loop Tussle

A perfect 4-0 non-conference record won't mean a thing Friday night when the Baird Bears visit Ranger for the first District 10-A match of the season for both teams.

Kick-off time is 7:30 p. m. While the Bears challenge Ranger, Albany will be at Eastland and DeLeon at Cross Plains in other first round league games. Clyde hosts Class 2-A Cisco to round out the schedule.

Ranger was the pre-season choice to give Albany the biggest tussle for the district championship.

Baird, which cut down four straight non-district foes, had its closest call last Friday when

the Bears had to score in the final minutes to topple Rotan, 7-0.

Ranger, which carries a 1-2 season record, was idle last week. The Bulldogs beat Gorman, but have fallen to two Class 2-A opponents, Dublin and Cisco.

Despite their 1-2 season record, Ranger is almost a sure bet to be among the leaders when district play ends in mid-November. The Bulldogs are blessed with a big experienced team which will average near 185 pounds up front and almost as much in the backfield.

Ranger, helped by Baird fumbles, slashed the Bears by 36-8 last season. A double handful of Friday night's starters filled similar roles last season.

Coach Vernon Townsend is expected to go with the same starting 11 that took the field last week at Rotan. That would find Stanley McGowen, Jimmy Collins, Bruce Bell, Bobby Black, Pat McKennon, Kelton Jones and Thomas Robbins in the line and Tommy Barton, Eddie Childers, Wally Harris and Richard Windham in the backfield.

Windham, off to a slow start this season because of a foot injury, shouldered most of the offensive load last Friday night against the fired-up Yellowhammers.

He lugged the leather 28 times for 98 yards and scored the lone Bear touchdown. Despite generating about half of the Baird offensive plays, his average for the night for a highly respectable 3.5 yards per carry.

Childers carried nine times for 57 yards and a 6.3 average, while Harris gained 36 yards in 10 plays, including a vital 16-yard dash on fourth down to set up the Baird score.

Harris carried from the 17 to the one in that key burst to set the stage for Windham's smash into the end zone for the winning touchdown.

Richie Crow converted after the tally to make it 7-0 with little more than 60 seconds to play.

Baird mounted other promising drives during the evening, but fumbles and the aroused Rotan defense combined to keep the Bears away from paydirt.

Rotan never seriously threatened to score, and managed only four first downs and 76 yards rushing for the game. The 'Hammers also picked up 26 yards on three completed passes.

The Bears were able to get short yardage throughout the game, but were never able to get together for the long gain which marked their first three games this year.

In all, the Bears had 192 yards rushing for 13 first downs.

It was the lowest offensive output of the year for Baird, which has now scored 130 points to 31 for four opponents.

Callahan County Oil Industry Worth \$7.2 Million Per Year

A \$7.2 million a year ingredient in the prosperity of Callahan County is the production of oil and gas, the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assn. says in its current survey of economic factors stemming from petroleum operations here.

Using just-published U. S. Bureau of Mines figures as a base, the association has projected what oil and gas activities mean in this county. In 1962 Callahan County was producing more than 2.3 million barrels of crude oil and 3 billion cubic feet of natural gas. The oil was valued

at \$6.8 million; the natural gas at \$357,000.

Ranks 10th
Callahan County ranks 105th in the state as total value of oil and gas production.

"Demand for Texas crude picked up enough last year to give us an increase of about 3 per cent over 1962 on a statewide basis. This slightly improving trend seems to be holding this year as more autos are put on the road and nationwide business conditions accelerate," said James L. Sewell, president of the association. "It will be several months, however, before

we know to what extent individual counties are participating in the current market."

The dispersion of oil dollars through Callahan County business channels and the healthy effect given property values by petroleum industry activity are indicated by several figures published by the association.

Royalty Payments
It is estimated that royalty payments to Callahan County landowners who are fortunate enough to have producing wells on their property create a 'crop' worth about \$894,000 annually. These and other farmers and

ranchers who have leased acreage for exploration receive additional rental and bonus payments, but sufficient current data is not available for measuring the amount.

Oil and gas operators invested an estimated \$2.7 million in Callahan County last year in the search for new fields and in the development of zones where production has been found. The Oil and Gas Journal reports that 216 wells were drilled in the county in 1963, resulting in 94 oil wells, 1 gas well, and 121 dry holes.

Drilling operations included

57 wildcat wells in which operators hunted oil in new territory or at new depths. About \$1.3 million of the drilling expenditures was lost to dry holes, the association estimated.

Petroleum Payrolls
Petroleum industry payrolls contribute about \$312,000 a year to the county, according to Texas Employment Commission records. They show about 84 persons directly employed in oil and gas operations.

The state government's financial interest in Callahan County operations is measured by the \$337,000 a year which the opera-

tors and royalty owners provide the state government in production taxes.

These payments are in addition to those paid to local units of government and schools as property taxes. Oil and gas property taxes are reflected in local support of many Texas school districts.

For example, 47 per cent of the local taxes for the Baird School District comes from oil and gas operations; 25 per cent at Clyde; 36.8 per cent at Cross Plains; and 64.3 per cent at Eula.

Top Animal Husbandman to Speak At Throck's Experimental Ranch

"Dr. Jan Caonells (cq) Bonsma of South America, possibly the foremost animal husbandman in the world, is expected to astound Callahan County ranchers when they hear him next month at Throckmorton," says County Agent Pat C. Garner.

Since 1955, Dr. Bonsma, a reproductive physiologist, has headed the Department of Animal Science at the University of

Pretoria, Republic of South Africa. He currently is at Texas A&M University, where he is teaching for a year in the animal husbandry department.

Occasion at Throckmorton will be the 1964 field day of the Texas Experimental Ranch, just off U. S. Hwy. 183, 10 miles north of Throckmorton, 20 miles south of Seymour.

"Merely by looking at a cow," explained Garner, Dr. Bonsma can tell ranchers whether the animal will be highly non-breeder throughout her lifetime. He will peg several cows in such a manner for the hundreds of guests at the ranch."

The October 1 program begins at 9 a. m. and ends at 3 p. m. and will be hosted by the ranch manager Dr. Wm. J. (Dub) Waldrip of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

During the morning session, guests will board buses for tours of the ranch and to inspect at first hand, grade Herefords and pastures under various experimental treatments, "suspension" fencing, and the control of mesquite by chemical and mechanical methods.

In addition to Dr. Bonsma, others scheduled to speak during the afternoon session are Dr. O. D. Butler, longtime head of the A&M Animal Husbandry Department; Dr. Waldrip, and E. D. Robinson (cq) range specialist at the Rolling Plains Livestock Research Station near Spur.

Robinson will discuss the results of several years devoted to research in the chemical and mechanical control of mesquite.

and Dr. Waldrip will present results of research in grazing management and nutrition for cow-calf operations on native rangeland. Master of ceremonies will be Dr. Butler.

Grazing of Diverted Acreage Is Approved

Producers who have diverted acreage under the feed grain or wheat programs for 1964 are authorized to begin grazing this acreage on October 1, according to the Callahan County ASC office.

However, producers are reminded that they must pay for haying diverted acres under these programs as they have in the past.

Producers with Conservation Reserve (Soll Bank) contracts are not included in the authorization and are still required to file a request to permit grazing or haying of this diverted acreage and secure the county committee's approval.
