**Neutral for Now** Taylor County Commissioners have agreed to take no sides in the boundary question between final weeks of October. Callahan and Coleman counties. They took the action Tuesday following a request from Callahan County Judge Byron Richardson that Taylor county back Callahan in the event of a suit filed by Coleman.

The boundary "dispute" covers some 400 to 850 feet along the entire 25-mile boundary shared by Callahan and Cole-

The matter is expected to go to court before being settled. Coleman County Commissioners Court has approved \$3,000 to finance a suit, and has authorized hiring of Hal Woodward of Coleman to represent that county.
