Assault victims now have instant access to help


Parmer Medical Center, through a partnership with the Texas Teleforensic Remote Assistance Center (Tex-TRAC), will be able to assist sexual assault victims ages 13 and older in conducting sexual assault forensic exams with guidance from a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) through the Telehealth cart starting April 3rd, 2023.

Tex-TRAC TeleSANEs are available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, and provide a seamless interaction between hospital nurses and victims during sexual assault forensic examinations by using these telehealth carts with specially designed software. The TeleSANEs, via a secure internet connection, can advise and assist hospital nurses as they conduct the lengthy sexual assault exams, which are known to take three to six hours on average to complete.

Currently, sexual assault victims in Parmer County and surrounding counties must be transported to local hospitals in those counties by either EMS, law enforcement, or private vehicle, which compounds the traumatic stress on the victim as well as preventing first responders from returning to their duties sooner.

Tex-TRAC, part of the Texas A&M Health Center of Excellence in Forensic Nursing, was established with federal grant funding from the Office for Victims of Crime and state funding from the Office of the Attorney General to provide a SANE telehealth program to serve rural and underserved communities in Texas.

State Capital Highlights

Senate passes tax cut package

The Texas Senate last week unanimously approved a \$16.5 billion package to lower property taxes and inject billions of dollars into public schools.

As reported by the Texas Tribune, the three separate bills require the state to send at least \$5.38 billion to public schools while at the same time raising the state's homestead exemption from \$40,000 to \$70,000, with an additional \$20,000 exemption for homeowners 65 and older. According to the Tribune, the proposal would save an average homeowner \$341 on their annual tax bill. Seniors would save an additional \$227 annually.

In exchange for the increased state funding, local school property tax rates would be cut by 7 cents for every \$100 in appraised value. An owner of a \$300,000 home paying the state's average school tax rate would save \$210 annually in property taxes.

"This is off-the-charts, incredible property tax relief for millions of Texas homeowners," said state Sen. Paul Bettencourt, R-Houston.

Deadline to register for May 6 election nears

The deadline for eligible Texas voters to register in order to vote in the May 6 local elections is just around the corner, Secretary of State Jane Nelson announced.

"If you are not already registered to vote in the upcoming local elections - there is still time! Make sure to submit your voter registration application to your county voter registrar by Thursday, April 6 so that you can have an opportunity to make your voice heard in your local community," Nelson said.

The Austin American-Statesman reported that Senate Bill 222, besides allowing the 30 days of paid leave, would apply to anyone paying into the Employee Retirement System of Texas; to employees working within the executive branch of state government; and give 10 days of paid leave to employees whose spouse gave birth.

"Paid parental leave will help the state attract and retain talent while combating the workforce shortage," the bill's main sponsor, state Sen. Robert Nichols, R-Jacksonville, said. A similar bill in the House would grant 60 days of paid leave under the same circumstances detailed in the Senate bill.

Agency warns of dangerous drug combination

An animal tranquilizer called xylazine has been found mixed with illegal drugs distributed in the state, resulting in at least four deaths, the Texas Department of State Health Services reported.

The tranquilizer has been combined with fentanyl and other opioids, as well as Xanax and other drugs. It produces a strong sedative effect and can cause unconsciousness, low blood pressure, a slowed heart rate and breathing. It can also cause organ damage due to loss of blood flow.

Since it is not an opioid, the effects of xylazine cannot be reversed by using Narcan, officials said.

New foster care model launched

Community groups representing nearly 50 counties in North and East Texas are assuming oversight of foster care from the state of Texas in a groundbreaking attempt to boost capacity and By Gary Borders

"This largest expansion to date for Community-Based Care is a real turning point in our state's intensive effort to move to local control, and a better system overall for the children and youth in our care," Stephanie Muth, DFPS commissioner, said. "Those kids belong to their communities, and those communities want the opportunity to make every day better for a child in foster care."

The expansion means that community-based care is now in place in half of the state geographically, representing a third of the population.

School choice hearing draws hundreds

A Senate Education Committee meeting on proposals that would give parents public money for private schools drew about 200 people and stretched past midnight last Thursday, the Statesman reported.

Supporters spoke about allowing school choice and financial relief for parents of private school students, while opponents warned against siphoning money from public districts, lack of oversight and using taxpayer money for religious schools.

State Sen. Brandon Creighton, R-Conroe, is sponsoring Senate Bill 8, which would provide \$8,000 per child for private school, homeschooling, tutoring or other educational costs. He told the Statesman that education savings accounts would not hurt public schools.

"We can lift up public schools and teachers like never before," Creighton said. "We can reconcile both very easily."

Opponents say the proposal would harm public schools.

"For the state to statutorily tarnish the reputation of our public schools by directly putting dollars

Paid parental leave for state workers?

For the first time, state employees could get 30 days of paid leave for childbirth or adoption. A bipartisan bill passed the Texas essential services for children under the state's conservatorship.

Three contracts were signed by the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services and private groups. One serves Dallas County along with eight surrounding counties. 





Hot Chicken

This recipe is probably not for everyone, but if you are a fan of spicy food, then you will love it. Hot Chicken or Nashville Hot Chicken is fried chicken with a spicy kick. It is traditionally served with white bread and pickles. It is believed to have originated at Prince's Hot Chicken Shack in Nashville but has become popular across the country. If you haven't ever tried hot chicken, then March 30th, National Hot Chicken Day, is great time to start.

Directions

Arrange chicken pieces in a large bowl. Whisk buttermilk, pickle brine, hot sauce, and egg together in a mixing bowl. Pour marinade over chicken and stir to ensure each piece is thoroughly coated. Cover and let chicken marinate in refrigerator 2 to 4 hours. Mix flour and salt together in a shallow flat dish. Remove chicken from marinade and blot with paper towels. Reserve marinade. Toss chicken in flour until thoroughly coated. Return chicken to marinade, coating all sides; remove chicken from marinade allowing excess to drip back into the bowl. Coat the chicken once again in flour mixture. Place on a rack. Repeat with all chicken pieces. Allow to sit out about 15 minutes to allow coating to dry out a bit. Place butter and lard in a large pot. Add cayenne pepper, brown sugar, paprika, garlic powder, kosher salt, and black pepper. Place over mediumhigh heat. Cook and stir until fats melt. Remove from heat; keep sauce warm. Fill cast iron skillet about 1/3of the way with vegetable oil. Heat oil to 350 degrees F over medium-high heat. Carefully place chicken into hot oil, skin side down. Maintain an oil temperature of 325oF, adjusting heat as need. Fry until instant read thermometer reads 160 degrees F, 8 to 10 minutes per side. Transfer chicken to a rack to drain. Brush with the sauce on both sides.

Cook's Note: For best results, Chef John recommends tossing the chicken pieces with 1 tablespoon kosher salt in a bowl; cover and refrigerate overnight.



Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 17th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this year.

Who must file a rendition?

A person shall render all tangible personal property used for the production of income that the person owns or that the person manages and controls on January 1st. Examples of personal property that shall be rendered are inventory, machinery and equipment, and furniture and fixtures. If you do not render, render late, or file a false rendition, a 10% penalty may be imposed.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are: · You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of current appraised value.

• You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments. · You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2022. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2023.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2023 renditions is April 17. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 17 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after May 15 for an owner who shows good cause in writing.

Have you ever been so bold and so carnal that you ask God for exactly what you want without giving consideration if it even remotely lines up with what God wants? In Mark 10:35-40, just after Jesus prophecies to his disciples about the most significant events in human history, Jesus' death and resurrection, two of his disciples decide to make their move and come to Jesus with a really big request. The big ask from James and John, was "Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory." These two places of prominence and prestige in Christ's kingdom were theirs for the asking, so that's what they did. Jesus didn't rake them over the coals, but he did direct them away from seeking their own will, to see that following Jesus requires full commitment.

Jesus called them to deeper commitment by talking to them about sharing Jesus' cup and baptism. The cup in scripture often points to suffering, baptism points to identification, and the reality is that those who will become great in God's kingdom, find their identity in Christ alone. Jesus invitation to James and John was to suffer with Him, because they were identified with Jesus as they followed him. They sought their own will in asking for the prominent places in kingdom, but Jesus called them to a place of suffering and identifying with Him, to the point that they sacrifice their will and surrender fully to God's.

Greatness in God's kingdom is not driven by demanding my will be done, but by surrendering to the Lord's will, whatever that may be, wherever he may lead. When one seeks exaltation and attention, Christ points one to humble service that places God's will above your own as His love compels you to care for others.

Jesus gives us a calming answer. A promise. In Matthew 5 He says, the transitions seem hard remember the promise. They shall be filled.

Which Is Easier?

In the story of Jesus healing the paralyzed man, Matthew 9:1-7, Mark 2:1-12, and Luke 5:17-26, Jesus asks the question, "Is it easier to say, 'Your sins are forgiven' or 'Get up and walk'?" I have often wondered the answer to this question. I know that since Jesus is God, both questions are easy for Him. But, I decided to do a little research and see what commentators have to say.

YMLP.com says,"It is easier to say 'Your sins are forgiven.' Why? Well, because what human being can dispute it? Anyone can say your sins are forgiven, yet what evidence is there to prove or disprove the forgiveness of sins?

"On the other hand, if someone says to a paralyzed man, 'Arise and walk,' something has to happen. If the man doesn't arise and walk, then that word is shown to be inept, without authority or power."

Matthew Payne points out, "Forgiveness is an invisible action. Jesus healed the man visibly to prove that His invisible act of forgiving sins was also effective."

But, here is where Payne disagrees with YMLP.com: "Christians know that full forgiveness of sins before a just and holy God was a far more significant undertaking than any miracle ever was. God effortlessly parted the Red Sea for Israel to escape Egypt, but it took nothing less than the death of God's Son to achieve the forgiveness of sins (Hebrews 10:10-14). The fact is that it was far easier for Jesus to heal the man than it was to forgive Him."

Payne seems to contradict himself by saying that if Jesus had ordered the paralyzed man to get up and walk, and he didn't, then Jesus would have been ridiculed and scorned as a fool. "Few of us would dare invite that kind of reaction by promising a healing. So, if forced to choose, we would have to say it is easier to say: 'your sins are forgiven'.

Payne doesn't end there; he says this is the logic of an atheist! He

says that it is "far better to look a fool in the eyes of the world than it is to offend God." "It is clear that the criteria against which Jesus considered what was 'easier to say' was what God thought of His actions, not what people thought. Risking upsetting people is a small matter compared to disobeying God. Jesus only ever acted with His Father's authorization (cf. John 5:19)."

I came to the conclusion that there is no definite answer as to which is easier, forgiving or healing; but whatever we do, we must do what God wants us to do; we must please Him. In studying Revelation, I have come to realize life isn't all that tough if we love Jesus and His Word, and we obey Him. He will bless us and take care of us for our living in and through Him, and He will help us get through those unexpected tough times of life that are handed to us, oftentimes by others! It doesn't matter which is easier; it matters what God thinks!

Gas prices rise slightly

Average gasoline prices in Texas rose 6.7 cents last week, to an average of \$3.06 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 20.8 cents higher than a month ago and stand 77.3 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.59 while the most expensive was \$4.17 per gallon.


The national average price of gasoline fell 0.3 cents last week, averaging \$3.40 per gallon. The national average is up 7.8 cents from a month ago and stands 83.0 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has fallen 5.9 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.19 per gallon. "The national average price of gasoline has seen little overall change over the last week, with big decreases in states like Colorado and Ohio offset by large increases in Arizona and North Carolina. While more states saw declines than increases, any downward trends are still likely to be temporary and not necessarily long lasting," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy. De Haan explained, "While Colorado's refinery issues are largely moving into the rearview mirror, challenges making the transition to summer gasoline in Arizona are leading to tight supply and accelerating prices. Motorists in some areas may be on the receiving end of good news, while others may not as we hit the second half of refinery maintenance season. You never know what the closing moments will look like, and motorists could be in for a dramatic ride if issues develop."






Project History
