Voting made easier

Farwell, Texas - Voters in Parmer County may soon be able to vote at any county polling location on Election Day. Parmer County Commissioners, along with the County Clerk and Voter Registrar, have requested the implementation of Countywide Vote Centers which will allow registered voters to vote at any Voting Location. The court voted on Monday, May 8, 2023, to approve a resolution petitioning the Texas Secretary of State to allow Parmer County to participate in the program in the November 7, 2023, 7th Constitutional Amendment Election.

All registered voters will have the opportunity to vote at a polling location that is the most convenient to the voter. There are people closer to Bovina whose assigned polling place is Farwell. This program will allow them to vote in Bovina, if your parents live in another precinct of the county then you do, this will allow all of you to vote at one place. In Friona, there are three precinct polling places. This program would allow the county to have one place in Friona that everyone can vote, no matter what precinct you live in.

There will be 4 Vote Centers strategically located across the county. There will be one in each town at previously used locations. On election day a registered voter can vote at any location from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. A list of the locations will be formally approved by the Commissioners after the State has approved participation in the program. The County Clerk has discussed this program for almost two years. Commissioners approved the purchase of necessary equipment and technology to provide a smooth Countywide Voting process. County officials will now wait on a response from the Secretary of State. Everyone feels confident that the county will be allowed to participate in the program. According to the Texas Secretary of State's Office, more than 90 counties utilize countywide voting in the state. There is a mix of large, medium, and small counties in the program.

The Council approved a proposal from Richard Bermea, owner of Bermea Construction, to pave the street east of Lowe's Market with a new "slurry seal" process. A nearby street will have the standard "chip seal" applied to it this summer. Council members, as well as the general public, will have the opportunity to compare the two processes in order to make decisions concerning future street repairs.

After hearing recommendations from Fire Marshall & Code Compliance Officer Danny Campbell, the Council approved the adoption of the 2018 International Building Code, the 2018 International Residential Code, and the 2020 National Electrical Code. These are the codes that most cities and towns in our area are using. In other business, the accounts payable for April 2023 were approved as well as the financial statement for April 2023. Consideration on the demolition of the 4-Way Pump building was tabled until the next meeting. All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary.

Transatlantic Cattle Drive

I was recently involved with a live cattle export project sending Holstein and Jersey dairy heifers to the Country of Turkey (Turkive). These cattle were sourced from California, Utah, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Illinois, and Idaho. All of these cattle arrived at Hereford Feed Yard where they were processed, fed, checked for health concerns, isolated, and eventually shipped to the Port of Galveston to be sent overseas to Turkey. The Country of Turkey currently imports about 30% of their domestic milk consumption. Their goal is to increase the size of their domestic dairy herd while also introducing better genetics into their herd. The United States is their first choice when it comes to importing live cattle.

This project required massive amounts of data and a very close attention to detail. All of the cattle were given a USDA 15 digit radio frequency identification tag (RFID) that is about the size of a quarter and is attached to the ear. These tags are read using a handheld wand and each number is unique, therefore each individual animal can be identified. They also received standard visual cattle tags that contained a 2 to 3 digit number large enough to be read by the human eye, and each tag had colors that further identified the breed of the heifer (Holstein or Jersey), identified if the heifer was bred or open, and identified the Turkish buyer.

This export shipment had eight different Turkish buyers for the cattle. The cattle were tested for Tuberculois (TB), Brucellosis (Bangs), Luekosis, and Blue Tongue, while also receiving standard cattle protocol vaccines. All the cattle were given an ultrasound to determine if the heifers were bred, and if so, at what stage they were in the pregnancy.

The cattle were DNA sampled and each sample was submitted to a national DNA database that identified prior generations on each family tree and quantified their expected milk production. The cattle are in isolation for a minimum of 30 days before shipping to prevent any cross contamination from other cattle. The export criteria is tailored to a certain type of diary heifer that the Turkish buyer wants. Out of 5,096 head that arrived at the feed yard, only 2,889 were qualified for export.

Loading and shipping the cattle

from Hereford Feed Yard required 59 cattle trucks and took almost 24 hours to complete. The USDA scans each animal's unique RFID tag number prior to loading, and then seals the cattle trailer with a metal seal imprinted with a USDA number. This prevents any cattle from being off-loaded or substituted prior to arrival at the Port. When the cattle trucks arrive at the Port the USDA then removes the metal seal and confirms the cattle head count. The cattle are unloaded through a 'wishbone' type system that allows one truck to be unloading while a second truck is backing up to the dock.

I was stationed at the Port of Galveston to oversee the truck unloading and ship loading operations. Despite having an efficient unloading system, the process of unloading the trucks and loading the ship took another 24 hours to complete. The livestock transport ship "Queensland" has 8 decks for cattle with pen sizes ranging from 10 head to 33 head. Each pen has bedding, its own water tank and a gravity flow feed system. The ship will arrive at its destination in 20 days. From start to finish, the whole project is a massive undertaking.

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
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

Commissioners seek county-wide voting

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, May 8th, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

Commissioners approved a motion 5-0 to petition the state to implement county-wide voting. If approved, county residents from all four (4) precincts will be able to vote at any of the polling locations in the county. A motion was also approved for the use of \$72,500 of ARPA funds to purchase voting machines and printers. County Clerk Susie Spring said the goal was to have county-wide voting available for the next election. Approval was given for the advertising of a Notice to Bid for Bank Depository for Parmer County accounts for a term of four (4) years. Parmer County Sheriff Eric Geske reported to the Court that the Parmer **County Law Enforcement** Center is currently housing 17 inmates of which 1 is a paying customer from Dawson County.

The Interlocal Cooperation Agreement between Parmer and Lubbock County was renewed for the housing & care of inmates. The fee was set at \$75 per day.

In other business, cybersecurity training through the Texas Association of Counties was approved as well as continuing education hours for JP Precinct 1 Rhonda Wilkins and Veterans Service Officer Richard Villarreal. A water line under a county road in Precinct 1 was also approved. The new water bottle filling station that was approved at the last meeting is scheduled to be installed within the next two weeks. There were no comments from the public during the open forum. Minutes from the April 24th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved. The next regular meeting is Monday, May 22nd. All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary.

National Egg Month

Here is another egg recipe to celebrate National Egg Month in May. This is a little twist on the common scrambled egg.

Indian Scrambled Eggs (Egg Bhurji) myheartbeets.com

Ingredients

4 eggs

¹⁄₂ teaspoon salt ¹⁄₄ teaspoon black pepper ¹⁄₄ teaspoon paprika

- Handful cilantro leaves chopped 3 tablespoons oil 1 onion diced ½ serrano pepper diced 1- inch fresh ginger minced
- ¹/₂ red bell pepper diced

Instructions

Add the eggs, salt, pepper, paprika and cilantro together in a bowl and mix well. Set aside for now. Heat a sauté pan over medium heat and once it's hot, add the oil, onion, and serrano pepper. Stirfry for 5-6 minutes, or until the onions start to brown and caramelize. Add the ginger and sauté for 1 minute, then add the bell pepper and stir-fry for 2 minutes. Add the egg mixture and cook for 1-2 minutes, scrambling the eggs until cooked.

Notes:

I like using red bell pepper because it's sweeter than green and goes well with the bhurji, but any color of bell pepper works.

I also highly suggest using fresh ginger (rather than ginger powder or ginger paste) as the flavor of fresh ginger really adds a lot to this dish.

Looking over my shoulder

I can pinpoint the year when English became the subject I wanted to teach. 1970 found me in a classroom where poetry made sense, Charles Dickens's *A Tale of Two Cities* captivated me, and Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet* was ridiculously non-relatable. (Teenage love should never end with poison and a dagger in a burial vault).

History was added to the undergrad degree plan as a result of some excellent secondary teachers. This subject made the perfect blend. Years later, I combined my two passions of studying the past and seeing it portrayed in poems, short stories, and novels. In previous columns, I have referred to my classroom return after a three-year retirement. Meeting with students two or three days a week who are on the UIL speech and debate teams is a focal point of my job. Another group, UIL Social Studies team members, join me as well. To do justice to the objectives, students must research current issues and write and present speeches from more than one point of view. The students in Social Studies read a novel--this year about the United States during the 1920s. This history book's contents include innovation through technological progress, economic growth, educational opportunities, women's right to vote, unbridled capitalism, and literary and musical explosions.

To cover the book effectively, my high school students and I have also had discussions about Prohibition, political grift, racial injustices, the peril of propaganda, and crime.

Teaching is meant to be enlight-

faith and facts have colored my objectives as a speech/English/ history teacher now for almost 45 years. To question that is humiliating. It is insulting, as if I or most every other teacher sets out to harm a child.

Looking over my shoulder, I see a wave coming. It is white-capped, foaming at the mouth, and shouting "Protect the children!"

This politically-driven, media induced storm has engulfed us and is only growing stronger, fueled by the heat of a propaganda machine interested in harnessing power.

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 11.9 cents last week, averaging \$3.02 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 20.7 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 95.4 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. According to GasBuddv price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.63

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"not in your midst"

Deuteronomy 1:41-46 retells of when the Israelites defy God and decide to enter the promised land on their strength and not the Lord's. This happens shortly after the twelve spies returned from the land, and ten of the spies brought back a bad report that discouraged the people from entering the land God promised to give them. Sometime after the people freaked out, then threatened to stone Moses, God slew the spies who brought the bad report. This caused the people to show regret over the consequence of their sin, and then they decided they were ready to go in and take the promised land. They put on their gear and declared they were headed to victory to go in and take the land God had promised.

According to their pundits, experts and strategists, their mission was a slam dunk because they were using God's name to endorse their endeavors. In reality, though, they had missed their God given opportunity and were now seeking to manufacture a similar chance with an awesome result. The big problem was that by this point, God had said they would have to wander in the wilderness for forty years, because of their rebellion. After hearing the consequences of their

sin, they were now ready to obey the Lord, but things don't work that way in God's kingdom.

In God's world, our sin has consequences, and you cannot leisurely erase the consequences of your sin. In sin, you get to choose when and how you sin, but the consequences are out of your control. Instead of submitting to God and going back into the wilderness, the Israelites went up to invade the land, and in Deuteronomy 1:42 God says "Do not go up or fight, for I am not in your midst, lest you be defeated before your enemies." After hearing God's clear Word to quit, guess what they did? They did exactly what God told them not to do, and suffered even more humiliating consequences.

In a similar way, when you do your will and try to slap God's name on it, things will end in disaster because God is "not in your midst." God will not be mocked, he will not endorse your sin, nor will He go along with it. When you plow ahead in sin, it will not go any better than it did for those Israelites who were defeated. So, when you do fail, be quick to repent and move forward trusting God even when the consequences of your sin seem unbearable.

first runner-up and a 2021 WILLA Literary Award finalist in contemporary fiction from Women Writing the West.





Texas corn acres decline as national crop grows

Corn acres are expected to increase nationally this season, while planted acres in Texas are expected to decline, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert.

Much of Texas continues to experience significant drought conditions, which may be impacting planting decisions. Texas corn acres are expected to be 100,000 acres below last year's total of 2.15 million acres, said Mark Welch, Ph.D., AgriLife Extension grain economist, Bryan-College Station.

Welch said the U.S. Department of Agriculture prospective plantings survey estimated growers nationwide would plant 92 million acres of corn. That number is 3.4 million above last year's planted corn acres.

The additional prospective corn acres are spread across the country with an increase of 865,000 across the South, 950,000 acres in the Dakotas, 650,000 acres in Iowa, Illinois and Indiana, and another 550,000 acres in other Corn Belt states.

In some areas, there are questions surrounding final planting decisions due to weather, Welch said. Corn plantings in some parts of the Corn Belt states are still in doubt due to drought, and the near 1 million acres in North Dakota and South Dakota may be delayed due to a cold, wet spring.

Corn Belt states like Nebraska and Kansas that have been locked in exceptional and extreme drought received rainfall recently, and planting conditions were expected to improve if El Niño weather patterns deliver more rain. Growers in the Dakotas can typically plant corn into June, but a late spring snow melt and subsequent soggy conditions could push farmers to other crops like soybeans. "As we get into May, the grain markets will be paying attention to the areas where there are questions about whether they actually get significant corn acreage planted," Welch said.

Good prices push U.S. corn acres upward

The drought may keep Texas acres down, but the price incentive to plant corn is driving the increase in acres nationally, Welch said. However, there is a concern that good yields across the nation could drive prices down.

All grain prices have fallen in recent weeks, Welch said. But the fall is not confined to the grain markets. Other commodities like crude oil and copper are down as well, reflecting weakness in the overall outlook for the economy.

Corn futures prices remain relatively strong at \$5.25 per bushel, but that is down from \$5.75 a bushel a month ago and \$7.45 a bushel at this time last year, he said. El Niño weather patterns are generally associated with good growing conditions in the Corn Belt, and Welch expects growers to realize 179 bushels per acre or better, which would mean record vields.

"Grain prices have really been under pressure the last 10 days or so," Welch said. "Overall, yield outlooks are very positive, but the impact of a slowing economy and higher interest rates are playing into commodity markets. The use side is where the challenge will be if yields create a glut of corn."

Welch said there is still good demand for grains now, and stored corn supplies are tightening. That could mean good cash prices for Texas producers who get their crop to harvest in July and August because they are typically among the first to enter the grain market each season.

However, Brazil has a big corn crop that will be harvested around the same time and could counter-balance that advantage on a global scale, especially with exports to China, he said. "It seems like there is a lot of last-second decision-making around the state and in some areas of the country with significant acres that could go to one crop or the other," he said. "It will be interesting to see which way everything goes and how the season plays out from now to harvest."



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
