

Services held for former mayor

Funeral services were held last Saturday for former Friona mayor Clarence Monroe, who passed away on Monday, August 21, 2023. Brett Hoyle, pastor of Friona First Baptist Church, officiated the service. Interment at the Friona Cemetery was conducted by Hansard Family Funeral Home.

Friona Mayor Clarence Monroe served from 1983 until 2002. His 19 years of service is the longest tenure of any mayor in Friona history. Before becoming mayor, he served on the city council for six years. He was also a member of the regional review committee for the Texas community development program, president of the Region 2 Texas Municipal League, chairman of the Panhandle Conference of Mayors, and member the board of directors of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for six years.

Monroe was a farmer most of his life and raised cotton, wheat, and corn. He served on



the board of directors of the Parmer County Farm Bureau for 28 years, the Friona Farmers Co-Op Gin board of directors for 7 years, the Friona Wheat Growers board of directors, and the Friona Iunior Livestock Show board of directors. In 2019, he received the "Pioneer Award" from the Texas Farm Bureau.

Monroe was also a past president of the Friona Baseball board of directors, an officer in the Booster Club, and was active in his local church. In recognition of devotion to his community, he was honored as the 2002 "Man of the Year" by the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

Farmers Co-Op conducts annual meeting

Friona Farmers Co-Op Gin held its 60th Annual Stockholders Meeting on Tuesday, August 29, 2023 at 6:00 p.m. in the Friona Jr. High Cafeteria. Danny's Fins & Hens catered the meal which was followed by the audit report, manager's report, and door prizes.

Only 10,274 cotton bales were ginned last year and poor weather conditions this year present a very unfavorable outlook for the current season. However, the auditor, from D. Williams & Co, Inc. CPA's of Lubbock, told the attendees that many of the other gins in the area were in a lot worse shape financially. In his report, gin manager Jeff Watkins pointed out that the gin still has a large seed inventory on hand which could prove to be very useful in a "down" year.

Board members Ricky Barnett and Cris Ingram were reelected by acclamation. The Board of Directors for 2023-24 includes: Mitchell Wiseman, President; Cris Ingram, VP; John Jarecki, Secretary-Treasurer; Ricky Barnett, Director; Davy Carthel, Director; Garret Clark, Director; Russell Harkins, and Jeff Watkins, Gin Manager.

Commissioners discuss jury duty compensation

Parmer County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, August 21, 2023 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas

A resolution calling for the closing of the railroad crossings at CR 15 and near CR 14 was approved. The CR 15 railroad crossing will be closed at the start of construction on the new overpass west of the Cargill plant. It will be closed permanently. The current railroad crossing west of CR 14 will also be closed sometime during the overpass construction. Eventually it will be moved east to align with CR 14.

Commissioners discussed the pay increase for jurors and jury service mandated by House Bill 3474. Compensation for Day 1 of Jury Duty was increased from \$10 to \$20 and the pay for each subsequent day thereafter was increased from \$40 per day to \$60 per day.

A motion to approve continuing education hours for Justice of the Peace Pct. 1 Rhonda Wilkins was passed. Sheriff Geske reported to the Court that the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center is currently housing 39 inmates of which 24 are paying customers from Lubbock County. Since January 1st, Parmer County has received \$168,610 in compensation for housing Lubbock County inmates.

There were no comments from the public during the open forum. Minutes from the August 21st meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved. The next regular meeting is Monday, September 11th.

All meetings are open to the public. Information in this article is only a summary.

Top Wheat Picks announced

As producers try to put weather-plagued 2022-2023 wheat crop behind them and prepare for the next season, Texas A&M AgriLife agronomists from the High Plains and Rolling Plains are releasing their annual list of top-performing wheat varieties.

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and Texas A&M AgriLife Research annual "Top Wheat Picks" list for topperforming varieties is based on a three-year running average and not a single year, taking into account the harsh drought conditions of the past two years.

2022-2023 was tough weather-wise

The 2022-2023 wheat season was hampered by extreme weather events, said AgriLife Extension agronomists Jourdan Bell, Ph.D., Amarillo; Calvin Trostle, Ph.D., Lubbock; and Emi Kimura, Ph.D., Vernon.

Continued drought conditions in fall 2022 resulted in poor planting conditions. While some timely planted fields benefited from late September and early October rainfall, fields quickly dried out. Fields dusted-in, or dry planted, in late October and November, had poor to no stands, and that was followed by another dry winter.

Adding to the injury were sub-zero peratures in December, resulting in winterkill in most dryland wheat areas. High winds throughout the spring of 2023 resulted in the loss of other wheat fields.

drought The and above-average spring temperatures resulted in a regional forage deficit and strong forage prices. As a result, much of the wheat not lost to drought and wind injury was either grazed or harvested

for hay or silage.

Adding to the barrage of weather damage were heavy wheat streak mosaic and barley yellow dwarf virus. Russian wheat aphid pressure also prevailed across much of the Texas High Plains, with reports from north of Lubbock to the Oklahoma line.

Testing for top varieties under stressful situations

Texas A&M AgriLife experts annually evaluate how wheat varieties grow under adversity and select top performers. Trostle said they examine data from the past years' wheat variety trials coordinated by the Texas A&M AgriLife Wheat Improvement programs in Amarillo and Bryan-College Station. Variety trial entry fees and the Texas Wheat Producers Board fund these studies.

The agronomists said all "Wheat Picks List" varieties must show stability within their target regions over three years.

This allows for variable growing conditions such as lack of soil moisture at planting, freezing temperatures during early growth and near the onset of the reproductive

excessive moisture during the grain-fill stage, and disease and insect pressure, which can affect performance in any growing season. The three-year average provides a more accurate picture of performance, they said.

Also, picks are not necessarily the numerical top yielders. The team considers end-use quality, important disease resistance traits, insect tolerance and standability. This important varietal trait information enables a producer to better manage potential risk.

High Plains, South Plains wheat 'Picks List'

Wheat grain variety picks are based on the performance of varieties in 18 different trials conducted in 2020-2023 under irrigated and dryland conditions.

— Full Irrigation Picks - TAM 114, TAM 116, TAM 205, WB 4792, CP 7017AX and SY Wolverine.

 Limited Irrigation Picks - TAM 114, TAM 115, TAM 116, TAM 205, WB4792 and **CP7017AX.**

Dryland Picks -TAM 113, TAM 116, TAM 205, Canvas and WB4792.

TAM 116 was added to each list this year, but seed availability is extremely limited for the 2023-2024 season, Bell said.

TAM 112 was removed from the 2021-2022 wheat crop list, but it remains a good option for tough dryland conditions. TAM 115 is similar in pedigree and traits to TAM 112, but it does not fare well on tough dryland acres. TAM 115 was removed from the fully irrigated list, but it remains a good option for limited irrigation because it is less susceptible to injury from late spring freezes.

Croplan CP7869 was removed from the current picks list because it was not evaluated in the 2022-2023 trials. Croplan CP7017AX is a new addition to the 2023-2024 irrigated list. It has a strong four-year production history in the High Plains Uniform Variety Trials.

The agronomists also add varieties starting to show promise to a "watch list." This year, the watch list includes Monarch on the full irrigation and limited irrigation lists and Kivari AX on the limited irrigation and dryland lists.



Vehicle Inspection System Now Fully Operational


The Texas Department of Public Safety's (DPS) Vehicle Inspection System is now fully operational after an outage due to a hardware failure late last week. DPS personnel was able to replace the damaged hardware over the weekend and finalize testing overnight on Sunday in order to allow inspections to resume on Monday morning.

The outage began on Aug. 23 and would not allow stations in safety-only counties to conduct proper vehicle inspections. Station license renewal applications were also unavailable. The issue did not impact emission inspections. Again, the system has been restored and there is no longer an interruption to service at this time.



Wildfire danger remains high in **Texas**

The Texas A&M Forest Service continues to respond to requests for assistance on wildfires across the state as dry weather continues. Currently there are four active fires, the largest being the Shearwood Creek Fire in Jasper County. As of Sunday it had burned 3,000 acres and was 70% contained.

As of Sunday 208 counties had burn bans in place. Meanwhile, a helicopter delivering water to the 150-acre Barth Fire in Caldwell County almost collided with a drone being flown by someone not with the agency. It came within feet of the helicopter.

"Pilots have no way to detect a drone or know there is one present in the airspace until they see it," said Jared Karns with the forest service. "Suppression aircraft can respond to wildfires quickly, increasing the likelihood that a new ignition remains a small, manageable wildfire. Utilizing aircraft greatly enhances the state's firefighting efforts, but they have to be able to fly in a safe environ-

Under Federal Aviation Administration rules, all aircraft, including drones, are prohibited from flying over wildfire areas. More than 1,350 wildfires have occurred in the state in July and August to date.

TPWD trying to buy property containing state park

The commissioners overseeing Texas Parks and Wildlife Department voted unanimously last week to negotiate acquiring the roughly 500 acres that contains Lake Colorado City State Park in Mitchell County. The state has been leasing it from Vistra Corp. for more than 50 years.

Earlier this year, the energy company sold a piece of property that contained Fairfield State Park to a developer, forcing the park's closure.

"This makes all the sense in the outgoing commission chairman Arch "Beaver" Alpin III said about the purchase, according to The Dallas Morning News. "I believe we've had a meeting of the minds on being able to do it. This will allow us to secure one of our parks for the long term and be able to own it."

The park is located off Interstate 20 about halfway between Sweetwater and Big Spring and offers opportunities for water recreation and outdoor activities for nearly 30,000 visitors annually.

Judge rejects 'invasion' defense in buoy suit

A federal judge in Austin rejected the state's assertion that it has the right to install buoys in the Rio Grande because of a "migrant invasion," The News reported.

"We are here for purposes of determining whether this is a barrier to navigation, whether this is a navigable waterway," U.S. District Judge Ezra said.

The U.S. Justice Department has sued the state over the buoys, saying their placement ignored the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899, which established that the federal government controls navigable waterways. The state's defense claims the Rio Grande is not navigable in the section where the buoys were installed, near Eagle Pass.

Counties can't ban solar farms, AG rules

An attempt by Franklin County officials to ban solar farms has failed after provisional Attorney General Angela Colmenero ruled that counties don't have specific authority to do so, the Texas Standard reported.

Commissioners in that county voted last year to impose a 180day moratorium on commercial solar development. They later rescinded it, but the Franklin County attorney asked for an attorney general's ruling.

As elsewhere, some Franklin County residents opposed the solar farms on grounds that trees would be cut down, grasslands destroyed, and wildlife blocked by fences.

WWI naval shipwreck found in **Neches River**

The Texas Historical Commission has confirmed a shipwreck found in the Neches River dates to World War I. The wooden-hulled vessel was one of nearly 40 built in Beaumont by the U.S. Shipping **Board Emergency Fleet Corpora**tion and abandoned when the war ended.

Many of the 40 vessels were unfinished and often converted to barges or sold for scrap. Designed as steamships, they were nearly 282 feet long.

Many were eventually abandoned in the Neches and Sabine rivers near Orange in the 1920s.

THC said the shipwreck sites are protected under state and federal laws. The latest one became visible as a result of low water levels in the Neches due to drought and the summer heat.

Gas prices lower

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 9.0 cents last week, averaging \$3.36 per gallon, according to Gas-Buddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 5.0 cents lower than a month ago and stand 2.4 cents higher than a year ago. According to Gas-Buddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.99 while the most expensive was \$4.29 per gallon.


The national average price of gasoline fell 4.0 cents last week, averaging \$3.78 per gallon. The national average is up 5.8 cents from a month ago and stands 3.5 cents lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel rose 3.3 cents last week and stands at \$4.333 per gallon.

"For the first time in weeks, the national average price of gasoline has fallen over the last week as the wholesale price of gasoline had been under seasonal pressure as we near the end of the summer driving season. However, the drop may be short-lived, as one of the nation's largest refineries partially shut last week after a fire at a storage tank, and as we see more tropical activity that could lead to further disruption," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

De Haan added, "While GasBuddy is closely monitoring Florida for challenges related to Idalia and is prepared to activate the fuel availability tracker, the rest of the nation could see gas price declines reversing, pending the outcome of refinery issues that continue to put upward pressure on wholesale gasoline prices."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas *stations across the country.*

A Justice for Justice

As a lawyer for the "little man," as History. com puts it, Thurgood Marshall, was an extraordinary attorney. He attended Howard University Law School and graduated magna cum laude in 1933. A year later he was working for the Baltimore NAACP, and by the time he was 32, in 1940, Marshall was the organization's chief counsel.

"Over the next two decades, Marshall distinguished himself as one of the country's leading advocates for individual rights, winning 29 of the 32 cases he argued in front of the Supreme Court." In 1954, he protested the landmark case of Brown v. Board of Education of Topeka be-



fore the Supreme Court upending the so-called "separate but equal" principal of "laws designed to achieve racial segregation by means of separate and equal public facilities and services for African Americans and whites."

On August 30, 1967, Thurgood Marshall became the first African American confirmed as a Supreme Court justice.



dents. Examples of items not allowed in dumpsters includes: steel and metal, mattresses and furniture,



Official weather watcher John Gurley took this photo early Monday morning just west of Friona at the intersection of Country Road 10 and FM 2013. Approximately 1.5 inches of rain fell in that immediate area. Official rainfall for Friona was .33 inches Sunday morning and .40 inches Monday morning.



El Niño conditions, which typically bring a cooler and wetter fall and winter to Texas, are expected to persist into Spring 2024. Similar conditions in 2018-2019 brought relief to our surface water reservoirs by October. In 2014-2015, supplies did not begin to increase significantly until February.
