Linzey Receives Telephone Association Award

Amy Linzey, Chief Executive Officer for West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative and WT Services, was the recipient of the prestigious Neville Haynes Award at the Texas Telephone Association's annual meeting on August 8th in Austin, Texas.

The Neville Haynes Award is the Association's highest honor and recognizes truly exceptional service by an active member to the TTA and the industry as a whole. This award was established by the Texas Telephone Association General Membership in 1984 in honor of the late Neville Haynes of Alpine.

In reaction to receiving the award, Linzey stated, "It was a total surprise. I truly expected the award to be given to Mark Seale, Executive Director of TTA, and our Lobby Team for all their work with this year's Legislature. One bill extends the Texas Universal Service Fund for 10 years - that is quite an accomplishment."

A native Austinite, Linzey graduated from Crockett High School, attended the University of Texas and gradu-


ated from St. Edward's University Magna Cum Laude with a B.S. in Business and Management. She attained the current position as CEO for WTRT Cooperative and WT Services in 2012. She has also served as a board member of TTA, and has been actively involved in the association, in Texas, and nationally.

In 2018, Linzey received the Outstand-Achievement ing Award and in 2001 she garnered the Associate of the Year Award. She became only the third woman to receive the Neville Haynes Award and joins Gracie Fuhrman of North Texas Telephone and Joan Johnson of Big Bend Telephone with that honor.

Unable to attend the TTA annual meeting the past few years because of the pandemic and other health challenges, Linzey opined about her return to the event, "I received warm greetings from so many of my industry colleagues and have certainly missed seeing everyone. Some said it was wonderful to have the "family" back together again. It truly was memorable for me."

Hundreds of new laws go into effect

A total of 774 new laws went into effect on Sept. 1, affecting Texans in many areas of their lives, the Austin American-Statesman reported. The new laws concern property taxes, registration fees and voting access, among other issues. Several have drawn court challenges from opponents.

A few examples of the new law include:

· Book vendors must create a rating system for books deemed "sexually relevant" or "sexually explicit." House Bill 900 is currently being challenged in an Austin federal courtroom by several Texas book sellers. Other major legislation concerning schools provides nearly \$330 million over the next biennium to increase school safety infrastructure and resources.

· The cost of a new electric car goes up \$400 after Senate Bill 505 passed both chambers unanimously, adding a new registration fee. In addition, owners of existing electric cars now must pay a new \$200 annual registration fee, with the money from both fees going to the state highway fund, which is primarily financed by gasoline taxes.

· Governmental entities in Texas are now banned from implementing CO-VID-19 restrictions, such as vaccine mandates or requiring the wearing of masks under Senate Bill

Law eroding local power ruled unconstitutional

A Travis County judge last week declared unconstitutional a new state law stopping cities and counties from passing ordinances that go beyond what is allowed under state law. The ruling came just before the so-called "Death Star" bill went into effect, the Texas Tribune reported.

The state has appealed the ruling by State District Judge Maya Guerra Gamble. Local officials across the state's urban areas blasted the law as an overreach that prevents them from meeting local needs, such as providing water breaks to construction workers. That municipal requirement is now banned under state law.

Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner hailed the ruling.

"The Governor's and Legislature's ongoing war on such home-rule cities hurts the state and its economy, discourages new transplants from other states, and thwarts the will of Texas voters who endowed these cities in the Texas Constitution with full rights to self-government and local innovation," Turner said in a statement. "This self-defeating war on cities needs to end."

Gov. Gregg Abbott defended the bill, saying,

"Texas small businesses are the backbone of our economy. Burdensome regulations are an obstacle to their success."

Dove season sparks wildfire concerns

With dove season now open in much of Texas, officials with the Texas A&M Forest Service are urging hunters to take special care during activities that could spark a wildfire. Vehicles, trailers, all-terrain vehicles, and other equipment used for hunting and camping often cause wildfires, and bone dry conditions are especially dangerous this hunting season.

ince mid-June, wildfires have burned more than 75,000 acres in Texas, according to the forest service. As of Friday, there were six active fires, most of which have been largely contained. The largest to date was the Shearwood Creek Fire in Jasper County, which consumed 3,562 acres.

There are currently 211 counties across the state with burn bans.

Drought unveils new (old) dinosaur tracks

Severe drought conditions have at least one upside, as 70 new dinosaur tracks were discovered in the Dinosaur Valley State Park in Glen Rose, according to the Houston Chronicle. The tracks are believed to belong to an Acrocanthosaurus and a Sauropodseiden.

The former was a 15-foot-tall dinosaur that weighed close to seven tons, while the latter stood 60 feet tall and weighed 44 tons.

The tracks are normally hidden under the water and mud of the Paluxy River and date back around 100 million years. Two consecutive years of drought and high temperatures uncovered the new tracks, which likely will be covered again once the area receives a decent rain.







Gas prices trending lower

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 1.5 cents last week, averaging \$3.35 per gallon, according to Gas-Buddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 11.5 cents lower than a month ago and stand 13.1 cents higher than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.89 while the most expensive was \$4.39 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline fell 1.2 cents last week, averaging \$3.77 per gallon. The national average is down 4.4 cents from a month ago and stands 2.1 cents higher than a year ago. The national average price of diesel rose 9.6 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.435 per gallon.

"The national average fell to its lowest level since July ahead of Labor Day, even as oil prices rose last week to the highest level since last November," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at Gas-Buddy.

De Haan noted, "In addition, Hurricane Idalia steered well clear of significant energy infrastructure, leading to zero impact to gas prices. With the switch back to winter gasoline less than two weeks away, we could eventually see more downward pressure on gas prices. However, any disturbances that threaten the Gulf could delay any decline between now and then, creating a bit of a bumpy ride for the next week or two before more relief arrives toward late Septem-



The Bible records the Ten Commandments in Exodus 20 and Deuteronomy 5. The first four commandments with one's relationship toward God and the last six focus on relating to others.

Commandment #4 is "Observe the Sabbath day, to keep it holy..." (Deut 5:12). The last day of the week was to be a day of rest for the Israelites, their servants, and even their livestock, but this was also to be a day of worship for them as well. Rest and worship are essential rhythms you need to have in your life. When you don't rest, you set yourself up for burnout, stress out, health problems, and more, but when you have a pattern of healthy rest and Christ-centered worship in your life the benefits are many. Beware, though, lest one idolize rest, sleeping through the worship service and making Sunday a lazy day, because the Sabbath commandment is rest AND worship.

God's design and de-

sire for you is to have a blessed balance of weekly rest and worship, so much so that He gave the example of this in the creation week. In a world that applauds relentless busyness, with phones that send endless notifications, and surrounded by technology that conspires to hijack every minute of your schedule, the need for weekly, habitual rest and worship is crucial. All people need weekly rest and worship, but it is Christ's followers, who can also observe the sabbath in a way that rests physically, but also worships our Lord and Savior, who is our ultimate sabbath rest (Heb 4:8-16).

The 2024 proposed budget and proposed tax rate are available for inspection in the County Clerk's office, Room 102, at the Parmer County Courthouse, 401 3rd St. Farwell, TX. The County Clerk's Office is open Monday through Thursday from 8:30 am to 5:00 pm, and Friday from 8:30am to 3:00pm.

The Parmer County Commissioners Court will hold a public hearing on the 2024 proposed budget, proposed tax rate and salary increase at 9:30am on September 11th 2024. The hearing will take place in the Parmer County Courtroom, at the Parmer County Courthouse, 401 3rd St,

Farwell, TX.

There being no objections, the Parmer County Commissioners Court will then plan to adopt the 2024 proposed budget and proposed 2023 tax rate in its regularly scheduled meeting on that same date.

Countywide Voting Approved

Secretary of State, Jane Nelson has approved countywide voting in Parmer County for the November 7, 2023 Constitutional Amendment Election. All Parmer County voters will be able to vote in any one of the four polling locations.

Parmer County will have four vote centers on Election Day. One in each of the following areas: Friona, Bovina, Lazbuddie, and Farwell.

Countywide voting makes voting more convenient, more secure, potentially increases voter turnout, and prevents voters from being turned away because they are in the wrong



precinct on Election Day.

In the future, all County, State, and Federal elections will be using countywide voting centers

The Parmer County Clerk's Office is looking for volunteers to serve as poll workers this November and in next year's Primary and Presidential elections. We especially need Spanish speaking individuals to help at each Vote Center. Please contact the Clerk's office if you are interested or want more information.

Each year, to vote by mail in the election, you must request an Application to Vote by Mail from the Clerk's office or find the online application on the Secretary of State's website. To date, no one has requested to vote by mail in this year's election. Call 806-481-3691 to request an *application to vote by mail*.

State Sales Tax Revenue Just Under \$4 Billion for August

On Friday, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.98 billion in August, 5.7 percent more than in August 2022. The majority of August sales tax revenue is based on sales made in July and remitted to the agency in August.

"Restaurant receipts were slightly above the inflation rate for food away from home in July." Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in August 2023 was up 5 percent compared with the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes in August: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$659 million, up 1 percent from Au-

gust 2022; (2) motor fuel taxes - \$329 million, up 3 percent from August 2022; (3) oil production tax — \$501 million, down 18 percent from August 2022; (4) natural gas production tax — \$137 million, down 74 percent from August 2022; (5) hotel occupancy tax - \$70 million, up 1 percent from August 2022; and (6) alcoholic beverage taxes — \$148 million, up 2 percent from August 2022.















Roads Get Makeover
