Sales tax totals \$3.8B

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced last week that state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.79 billion in September. The amount was 2.8 percent more than the revenue received in September 2022. The majority of September sales tax revenue is based on sales made in August and remitted to the agency in September.

"Modest growth in sales tax revenue compared with last year may reflect a slowing pace of economic growth, as well as cooling inflation," Hegar said. "Remittances from the oil and gas mining sector led all major sectors in growth, as has been the case nearly every month since the economy began to emerge from the pandemic. Other sectors driven by business spending were mixed, with receipts from the construction sector up moderately while remittances from manufacturing and wholesale trade fell slightly.

"Remittances from the retail trade sector overall were slightly up from a year ago. Among retail subsectors, receipts from grocery stores saw the largest increase compared with a year ago, followed by those from convenience stores and gasoline stations. Receipts from the electronic shopping subsector grew moderately, while receipts from general merchandise stores were essentially flat compared with a year ago. Receipts from home improvement centers were down for the third consecutive month, and from furniture and home goods stores down for the eighth month in a row.

"Restaurant receipts increased, but at less than the inflation rate for food away from home in August."

Ahead of the third called special session set to begin on October 9, Comptroller Hegar also announced that his office will release his Certification Revenue Estimate, which provides detailed tables for the revenue estimate used to certify the General Appropriations Act for the 2024-25 biennium and other appropriations bills approved by the 88th Legislature.

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in September 2023 was up 3.7 percent compared with the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$631 million, up 2 percent from September 2022; (2) motor fuel taxes — \$329 million, up less than 1 percent from September 2022; (3) oil production tax — \$544 million, down 2 percent from September 2022; (4) natural gas production tax — \$208 million, down 57 percent from September 2022; (5) hotel occupancy tax — \$59 million, up 3 percent from September 2022; and, (6) alcoholic beverage taxes — \$144 million, up 4 percent from September 2022







Texas Senate News

Legislators return to Austin

The 88th Legislature began its third special session Monday, with Governor Greg Abbott calling lawmakers back into Austin to consider the issue of legislation that will permit the diversion of some public funds to private schools.

Also on the agenda is legislation relating to border security, bills that would ban private businesses from mandating COVID vaccinations, and legislation that would extend state services and oversight to the rapidly growing south Texas community of Colony Ridge in Liberty County.

Border Security

The special session agenda is on well-trodden ground for the Senate. In his proclamation, Governor Abbott directed the Legislature to consider "creating a criminal offense for illegal entry into this state" as well as "increasing the penalties for criminal conduct involving the smuggling of persons or the operation of a stash house."

The Senate has passed multiple bills, in both regular and special sessions, that do just that, but they never received enough support in the House. The governor also called for bills increasing funds for maintenance and operation of physical barriers along the state border with Mexico.

School Choice

The Senate also passed legislation that would answer the governor's call for school choice during the regular session, but those efforts face a steep climb in the House,

where majorities have consistently rejected diversion of public money to private schools.

The plan passed in April by the Senate would permit up to \$8,000 per student to be given back to families to help pay for private school tuition, tutoring services, and other education related expenses. "We will chart a brighter future for all Texas children by empowering parents to choose the best education option for their child," Abbott said in his special session proclamation calling for the creation of education savings accounts for all Texas pupils.

The Senate Education Committee is slated to take up their school choice plan at a Tuesday hearing.

School Funding

Teacher pay raises didn't pass during the regular session and they don't yet appear on the governor's session call, but on Monday the Senate Finance Committee moved forward with a plan to increase teacher salaries across the board. SB 2, by Conroe Senator Brandon Creighton, would increase annual teacher pay by \$3,000 per year in large districts, and \$10,000 for teachers who work in districts with fewer than 5,000 students.

Creighton says that pay for teachers in smaller rural districts lags that of their urban colleagues by tens of thousands of dollars in some cases. "It's not designed to create a windfall where small districts pay better than the larger districts," he said. "It's designed to take a teacher that's

making in the \$30,000 [range] and give him or her a fighting chance to stay in the profession in that small school district."

There's also more money in the bill for the basic allotment, that variable that determines the base level of funding each district receives. The bill would also double the school safety allotment per student and per campus, and includes more money for local enrichment tiers.

The bill contains more money, about \$1.2 billion, than was finally appropriated at the end of the regular session as Comptroller Glenn Hegar has revised the biennial revenue estimate upwards, giving lawmakers more room to increase education funding.

Spending Limits

They can't spend everything they have in the state treasury, however, Houston Senator and Finance Committee chair, Huffman, told members, as total appropriations are already approaching constitutional spending limits for the upcoming biennium. There's about \$6 billion headroom left, she said, and they have to leave enough margin to cover the supplemental budget that will be passed next session to true up projected revenues and expenditures with actual costs and income. "We must remain fiscally responsible and not commit to ongoing expenses that the state cannot sustain in future biennia," said Huffman.

Caramel Apple Muffins

Here is another recipe to curb your apple and caramel cravings. These can be enjoyed for breakfast, a light snack, or dessert.

Caramel Apple Muffins

Ingredients

2 cups all-purpose flour

3/4 cup sugar

2 teaspoons baking powder

2-1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon salt

1 large egg, room temperature

1 cup 2% milk

1/4 cup butter, melted

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1/2 cup chopped peeled tart apple 12 caramels, chopped

topping:

1/2 cup packed brown sugar 1/4 cup quick-cooking oats

3 tablespoons butter, melted 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon



Directions

In a large bowl, combine the flour, sugar, baking powder, cinnamon, and salt. In another bowl, whisk the egg, milk, butter, and vanilla. Stir into dry ingredients just until moistened. Fold in apple and caramels. Fill 12 paper-lined muffin cups three-fourths full. Combine topping ingredients, sprinkle over batter. Bake at 350°F until a toothpick inserted in the cake portion comes out clean, 20-25 minutes. Cool for 5 minutes before removing from pan to a wire rack. Serve warm.



Can you think of any professions that have a reputation for not always telling the truth? Politicians, used car salesmen, and lawyers come to mind, but they are not the only ones prone to twist the truth, withhold truthful information or even speak deceitfully about someone or something. Each and every person is prone to bend the truth for their own benefit, especially when uncomfortable confrontations arise, or when they may be tempted to lie for the sake of someone or something else. Going this path is the path of the father of lies, Satan himself, who deceived Eve in the Garden, twisted God's Word when tempting Jesus, and will do the same thing to lead you astray as well.

The problem with lying is not simply that it twists the truth, but it also falls short of God's standard for how we are to communicate and live. Every lie is like a web that entraps its teller, growing into a massive matrix with layers of half-truths, twisted truths and distortions that engulf those tied to it. Lying is not simply a sin that God says not to commit in the Ten

Commandments (Exodus 20, Deuteronomy 5), but God has a much clearer path to communication that leads to freedom and righteousness. God's design for your vocal cord usage is that you 'speak the truth in love' (Eph 4), discerning when and how to speak, unlike a blabbering fool who only wants to spew opinions (Prov 12:15, 18:2). When you speak the truth in love, you first must be grounded on the truth of God, redeemed by the one who is the Truth, Jesus (John 14:6), and bold in sharing the greatest truth, which is the gospel.

Panhandle Parables

Layout Ground

When I was about twelve I learned to drive a tractor helping my granddad plow layout ground. Every now and then he would pull some of his land out of production so there was no crop planted that particular growing season. Even land needs a break every now and then. This was a good place to practice learning to handle large equipment and there was plenty to learn. Here is just a couple of things:

- Layout ground may not be producing a crop but can grow lots of weeds quickly.
 There are lots of moving parts when it
- comes to a tractor and a plow.
 3. Pay attention, not just when turning
- around.

 4. Never use a grazing cow as a guide,
- you will have to make a cleanup round to straighten up that mess.
- 5. Sometimes preparing the land is as important as reaping the harvest.
- 6. Slow down before you do anything else when you get to the end of the row.

There are several spiritual lessons I learned, not necessarily when I was twelve, but for sure in the reflection of those memories of sitting in my Pop's lap trying to plow and keep it straight.

1. When you are idle spiritually, be aware weeds (distractions) can pop up

fast and left unattended will cause you a lot of wasted energy.

- 2. Life has a lot of moving parts, decisions you make can impact others in good ways or bad based on the choices you make.
- 3. Be aware, Satan is always looking for an opportunity to cause you trouble. Remember there are lots of moving parts. You can make a mess in a hurry if you don't stay focused.
- 4. Don't make decisions based merely on feelings or what others are doing. Make decisions that are right because God says they are right, making poor decisions will require more work to fix.
- 5. To receive blessings from God, it often requires a preparing of the heart to receive what God wants to plant there. It won't grow just anywhere, but a heart open to the Lord.
- 6. Slow down, too many big decisions are made in haste leaving regret as the reward.
