**Callahan County Wildcat Project Near Baird Waiting on Potential**

A Callahan County wildcat 3½ miles southwest of Baird is waiting on potential. The strike is John B. Hawley Jr., Trust No. 1, of Corpus Christi No. 1 Eula Davis, Lot 18, Victoria CSL Survey 336. Completion is being made from four perforations per foot at 4,566-70 feet opposite the Mississippian. The pay was treated with 250 gallons of mud acid.

No. 1 Davis flowed 158 barrels of oil daily on various size chokes.

The well later flowed at the daily rate of 39 barrels through a 7-64-inch choke. The 4½-inch casing is set at 4,634 feet, two feet off bottom.

Edwards & Reynolds of Abilene will drill No. 8 W. L. Cutbirth in the Callahan County regular field eight miles south of Clyde.

It is a planned 1,500-foot rotary Moutray Sand test.

It spots 670 feet from the north line and 1,970 feet from the west line of Section 6, BBB&C Survey. Site is 670 feet from the north line and 650 feet from the west line of the 240-acre lease.

Laco Oil Co. of Abilene will re-drill No. 24 Harris-Barton in the regular field eight miles south of Baird.

Proposed depth is 1,300 feet

with rotary. It will test Moutray Sand. Location is 1,320 feet from the north line and 1,750 feet from the west line of Section 8, BBB&C Survey. It is on a 480-acre lease.

It originally was drilled as C. U. Bay No. 1 Harris.

Prior to entering the USAF recruiting service, he served as an air policeman and has eight years experience as an air force investigator.

**Rural Postal Patrons Requested To Keep Approach to Box Clear**

Postmaster Roy Gilbreath has appealed to postal customers on Baird rural routes to help rural carrier make mail deliveries during bad winter weather.

The Baird Post Office has one rural route that covers the area around Baird; Star route 1 to Cottonwood, and Star route 2 covering the area of Rowden and south to the Coleman county line.

Gilbreath said that at the time he hopes all authorities concerned with rural routes where snow and other bad weather hampers the carriers will

continue to cooperate to help the mailmen get through.

The Postmaster listed these points of particular concern:

1. Approaches to rural mail boxes must be kept open by customers.
  2. Obstructions to delivery of mail on rural routes should be removed or minimized to the fullest extent possible.
- Where rural boxes post a problem, the carrier may leave form 4056, "Your Mailbox Needs Attention," a notice to keep box approaches clear by promptly removing all obstructions, including snow, which may make mail delivery difficult or impossible.
- Unless approaches are cleared it may be necessary to temporarily withhold delivery of mail, the Postmaster pointed out.

Rural carrier are not required to perform service on foot when roads cannot be traveled with the vehicles normally used, but they are expected to make every reasonable effort to serve as many of their patrons as possible without physical exertion or added financial cost, he explained.

If excessive detours are necessary to effect delivery of mail, customers should temporarily relocate their boxes on the new line of travel, arrange to receive their mail through other patron's boxes, or make other arrangements for their mail until travel on the roads affected can be resumed.

**AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE**

WASHINGTON — A chief characteristic of the "reformer" in America is his belief in the corrective power of law. Every time he sees social and maladjustment or personal tragedy, he wants to pass a law to correct it. Gradually, and with the best intention, he weaves a net of regimentation around the individual.

Sometimes this individual calls himself a "liberal," although the term applied may not always be accurate.

General these individuals are really nice people, and nicer to be around than the sourpuss reactionary.

It would be better to be cast away on a desert island with an outgoing and an outgoing person of this kind than a guy who is against everything, including his willingness to build a raft.

Mostly these people honestly believe themselves to be champions of liberty, while they favor creeping coercion, as long as they are the authors of coercion. They are so sure their theories are good for you that they think they are only doing you a favor when they tie you to a post, pry open your jaws and pour their ideas down your throat.

A television comedian not long ago had a skit in which he impersonated a Communist holding forth in New York's Union Square.

"Come the revolution," he shouted, "you will eat strawberries and cream."

"But," protested a listener, "I don't like strawberries and cream."

"Come the revolution, and you will eat strawberries and cream," exhorted the speaker.

Really, this is not a bad description of the reformer's idea for human happiness.

He seemingly believes that if we keep on passing laws to obviate every possible injustice, eventually we will reach Utopia. The contrary philosophy is that if we continue to pass laws in an effort to relieve every need, eventually we arrive at the ultimate injustice -- the police state.

Many of these reformers, or whatever description might be applied, often profess a contempt for money, yet they have almost a childlike faith in its power. What he can not cure with law, he seems to think he can cure with an appropriation.

With some logic he views the failure of local government to meet all human needs and demands that the Federal Government take over, on the logical theory that the farther the taxing agency is removed from the individual, the more chance there is that the individual will be complacent about paying taxes. "If Texas does not get it, California will," is a potent argument.

He is delighted because he questions whether local government will ever have adequate "social vision." He will see to it that the super-government has.

The holder of this philosophy thus deludes himself with the comfortable assurance that he is

far-seeing -- a progressive -- a man of the future. In his effort to cure injustice by piling on more government, he forgets that all the great fundamentals for freedom have been directed against the overblown force of government. He has concocted his medicine and if our colic increases, he merely calls for bigger doses.

This individual is a nice guy. He is loving us to death.

**New Machines To Speed ZIP Mail**

Acting Postmaster Roy Gilbreath said he has received word this week he has received word from Postmaster General John A. Gronouski in Washington, D. C. that a big "break-through" has now been made on electronic machines to "read" ZIP-coded addresses on mail.

"The Postmaster General said he expects to begin installing these sophisticated new machines in major post offices starting in about a year," the postmaster said.

The postmaster emphasized, however, introduction of the "seeing eye" device next year does not mean ZIP Code isn't useful already.

"ZIP code," he explained, "is important in mail handling under the system of mail processing already in use which will continue to be in use as the basic system at most points. These machines will be just another step -- in conjunction with the mechanical sorting machines we have developed -- to help keep pace with the growing volumes of mail. Neither will the machines endanger jobs -- they will only help us meet mail expansion with minimum manpower expansion."

## AF Lowers Ban On Non-Grads

Technical Sergeant Hollis Yates, Air Force Recruiter for this area, has announced that effective immediately the Air Force will once again accept applications for enlistment into the regular Air Force Non-Prior Service Program, young men who have not graduated from high school.

This is a reversal to the requirement made effective July 1, 1964, which made it mandatory that all applicants be high school graduates.

This new ruling does not mean that the Air Force is advocating young men quit school in order to join the Air Force -- but after much consulting with many school officials, the Air Force concluded that there is and will continue to be a percentage of young men who simply cannot continue in school because of various reasons, he said.

Air Force recruiters have and will continue to encourage all young men to "stay in school and graduate" -- offering their assistance to high school principals and counselors in counseling and encouraging potential drop-outs to continue with their high school education, the Sergeant said.

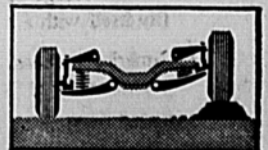

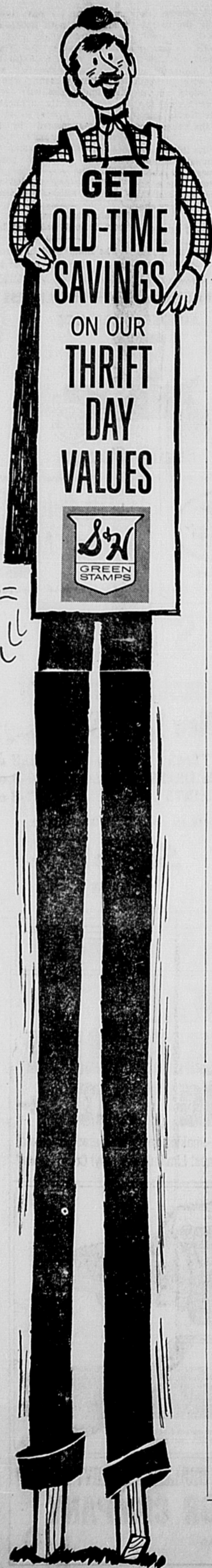
