



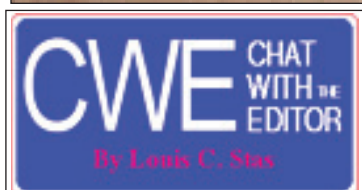

WINNERS: Naomi Diaz and Tyler Clayton were the winners at the "Bike Rodeo" Friday, June 8, on the Courthouse Square. The event was sponsored by Texas Dept. of Transportation, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension, Parkview Hospital, Texas Dept. State Health Services and Panhandle Regional Advisory Council.

Sweetwater Creek Dairy, an organic dairy is under construction west of Mobeetie, TX. The goal will be 2,500 cows in two years. Plans for the project began three years ago. I understand construction is 40% complete. Ten employees are presently being trained at the

company's Red River Dairy near Pampa. There will be 20-30 employees when the dairy is in full operation. The Pampa operation has 65 employees. Being "organic" means the feed cannot be exposed to herbicides or

pesticides; no medicines can be used on the herd. Maintaining "organic" has rules and regulations. Cows and heifers must be on pasture 120 days a year. Two large ponds are under construction; they are completely lined with

heavy plastic. The ponds will help maintain runoff, which will be minor if any. The owners, Richard and Linda DeVuyst moved to Pampa from Southern California fifteen years ago and developed the Red River Dairy near Pampa. The cou-

ple had operated a dairy in California for several years. The construction is visible on the south side of Highway 152. They have been married 40 years, have five children and six grandchildren. Three of their children are working on the dairies and farm.

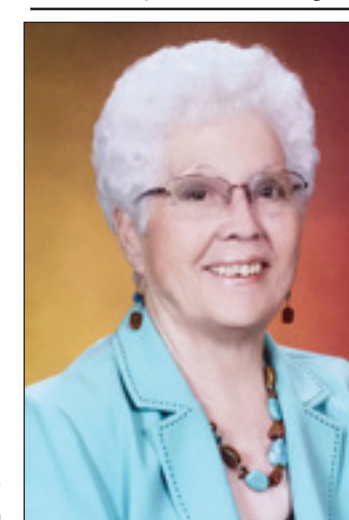

older boys took turns driving from one harvest to the other. Some were better at night, some were better during the day. If you were too young to drive, but too old to be in the front seat with mom, you sat in the back. Not the backseat, but the back of the truck - the bed of the truck as we call it today. They worked for weeks at a time, living in less than adequate accommodations that the 'jefe' provided. They slept in cots if they were lucky, but often on the floor. They ate beans and tortillas for breakfast, lunch and dinner. And, they worked.

Fast forward to today. He is an American success story. I won't bore you with the details, but I want to get back to the lesson - the gift he gave me yesterday. You see, all this time growing up with him and having the privilege to work beside him for the last 25 years, I have never one time heard him complain. Never a complaint about hard financial times, struggling business, mistakes his kids might make, or a bad economy. Never a complaint about a deal gone wrong, a friend's betrayal, or simply a bad day.

I used to chalk this up to him being the consummate optimist, a glass half full kind of guy. Then I finally realized that was not it at all. It was perspective. Perspective is what my dad has and has had that makes him see adversity differently than the rest of us. When he is telling stories about the old days, he doesn't dwell on the hard work, instead he laughs about Armando drinking so many Big Reds that he vomited or Jimmy eating so many Easter eggs he was sick for days. He reminisces about Willie sounding like Hank Williams and how scared he was when Philip went to Vietnam. He doesn't talk about the long, long drives, but the great stops along the way. He doesn't focus on the many hours in the fields, but paints a perfect picture of the music made after a long day. He remembers his sister Alice helping his mom cook for the men. He remembers how proud he was that his brother Albert suddenly became a better drummer than himself. And he talks about his youngest brother Fred with "father to son" admiration.

Perspective: THAT IS THE GIFT. He has seen so much adversity that there is no longer adversity in his eyes. "Everything will be okay. It will work out," he always says. You know what, Dad? I believe you! Thank you for the perfect birthday gift!
