# \$64,312.92 For Pct. 4 & Extension Vehicles

The Commissioners' Court of Wheeler County, Texas met in regular session on Monday, September 14, 2020 at 9:00 a.m., in the Commissioners' Courtroom of the Wheeler County Courthouse at 401 Main Street, Wheeler, Texas to consider prior bills and discuss matters of mutual concern.

Court reconvened at 10:00 a.m. to discuss the seventeen items on the agenda.

The minutes of prior meetings were approved as presented.

The county office reports were approved as presented.

There were three Budget Amendments approved by the court.

Numerous Budget Transfers were approved by the court.

The Line Item Transfers presented were approved.

No action was taken on the Wheeler County Policy Manual.

No action was taken on the Burn Ban.

Minor Fund Budgets were approved.

The contract with Tascosa Office Machines for the District Clerk's Office copier renewal was approved.

The purchase of 28 Electronic Poll Pads for Election System for the County Clerk's Office was approved. The Electronic Voter Check-in will eliminate signing the voter book.

The Sheriff and Constable Fees for 2021 will remain as they were in 2020.

The court approved the contract with LGS for the switching of software in Rick Walden's office to LGS. LGS bought out the company previously used by the county office.

Cindy Brown, Tax Assessor, will remove the Child Safety Fee from Texas Department of Motor Vehicle

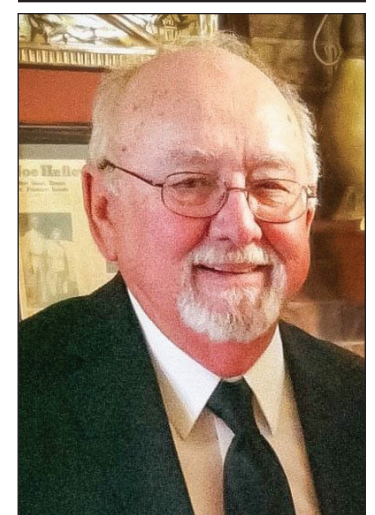
fees as approved by the court.

The purchase of a 2020 Chevrolet Traverse for Wheeler County Agri/Life Extension Agent was approved at the previous meeting. The cost is \$23,463.64 w/\$10,000 trade-in. The vehicle was purchased from Ware Chevrolet.

The purchase of a 2020 Chevrolet Silverado Pickup for John Walker, Pct. 4 in the amount of \$40,849.28 was approved. The purchase was made through Ware Chevrolet.

The court voted to approve the purchase of 5 acres of property on Hwy 83 in Shamrock, Texas from Clifford Oldham. No amount was stated.

The payment of bills in the amount of \$200,291.52 was approved.

## USDA Reminds Farmers

### Update Safety-Net Program Crop Yields

USDA Reminds Farmers of September 30 Deadline to Update Safety-Net Program Crop Yields

Don't Miss This One-Time Opportunity - First Since 2014 WASHINGTON, Sept. 10, 2020 - USDA's Farm Service

Agency (FSA) reminds farm owners that they have a one-time opportunity to update Price Loss Coverage (PLC) program yields for covered commodities on the farm. The deadline is September 30, 2020, to update yields, which are used to calculate the PLC payments for 2020 through 2023. Additionally, producers who elected Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) should also consider updating their yields.

"The last time farmers could update yields for these important safety-net programs was in 2014," said FSA Administrator Richard Fordyce. "It is the farm owner's choice whether to update or keep existing yields. So, if you rent, you'll need to communicate with your landlord who will be the one to sign off on the yield updates."

Updating yields requires the signature of one owner on a farm and not all owners. If a yield update is not made, no action is required to maintain the existing base crop yield on file with FSA.

For program payments, update yields by September 30, 2020. (Continued Page 2)

# Merely Mustard

Last week I had a refresher course on a lesson I've learned a number of times before. And it wasn't as though I had forgotten, or that the original lesson had lost its meaning, but still it was good to have a reminder, to keep fresh with the information. That is one of the reasons many professions (or professional boards with the power to certify and decertify licenses empowering the license holders to practice their profession) require their practitioners to undergo continuing education courses on a periodic basis. Mine was not mandated by any such board - it was simply administered by the experience of

living life. I found myself in a minor jam, or amidst a minor problem. The solution was simple and was not evasive; that is, I knew what to do to remedy the situation, but I found myself absolutely powerless to solve the problem with the equipment I had on hand. Here an argument could be made that I was ill-equipped to begin with, and had I been properly outfitted I could have resolved the problem myself. That could very well be true, and a boy scout might admonish me that I had failed to "be prepared". (The directive to be prepared is a noble one and is a good general principle to abide by,

but in my opinion it is also an impossible state to achieve. Since it is non-specific as to what we are to prepare for, it suggests to me that one is to be prepared for anything, or everything. It doesn't take much thought, or much life experience, to conclude this is an impossible standard. Nonetheless, I acknowledge the immense value of the directive to be prepared, and I believe it is something to strive for. And I admit I was insufficiently prepared when I got in my jam.) As I stated, I knew the solution to my problem, but I lacked the means to implement it. But I was able to call on someone to come render

assistance, which was delivered, and the problem was resolved with a little teamwork. It reminded me of other times I have experienced similar circumstances. No matter how well-equipped or well-intentioned one might be, there invariably will be times when each of us encounters trouble, and are powerless to get ourselves out of it. We have a tendency to value the concept of self-reliance and self-sufficiency, and I think those are ideals worth valuing and striving for. However, in the absolute, they are proven to be illusory. It turns out, so it seems to me, that we can't make our ways through life

This is clear in unconventional circumstances, such as the jam I was in, but it is also easy to see that our day-to-day life is full of reliance on others. After all, someone is delivering the electricity that powers our homes and businesses, or pumps water out of the well that someone else drilled and outfitted. Another group of people is responsible for the multitude of tasks involved with our sustenance – from those who grow the food (who are in turn reliant on fuel producers, delivery infrastructure, water, electricity, markets for their product, etc., etc.), to those who buy it, process it, package it, deliver it, stock it, and every other step that is necessary in getting the food product in edible form. Then, if it is cooked, there is the fuel required for cooking, the skillets, utensils, or other tools – all of these require a host of people in order for them to be available. I do not mean that the individual who is doing the action of cooking is simply the recipient of others' generosity; the individual must take initiative for himself or herself if anything is to happen. I simply mean to say that the effectiveness of the individual's initiative is reliant on others, to an unknown degree.

It simply is unknowable how many people are involved in all these aspects of our lives, but I think it would be both incredibly fascinating and humbling if we were able

to see with a God's-eye view the webs that are our lives, and how many strands connect us all together, friend and foe, and people we never will meet or know. I once heard an interview with a person who was interested in exploring this very concept. He was reflecting on how much he enjoyed his cup of coffee in the morning, and decided he desired to thank each person who played a role in that simple pleasure. I was stunned to learn it was something like 1,000 individuals who were required for that one action to be possible. And I would posit this was a rather small facet of this man's day. If you think about it, it is staggering the number of people we rely on, and, in turn, who rely on us, each day.

Therefore, I suggest we endeavor to go about our days with a sense of gratitude for the small miracles of human cooperation we experience countless times each day. It is so easy to lose sight of this, but I believe it is worth considering from time to time. Think about it – the guy stopped next to you at the intersection, with the loud music (I am loath to use such a dignified word to describe the noise typically heard in the situations I am describing) which he is obnoxiously sharing with (and lowering the IQ scores of) everyone within a 100 yard radius ...that person may have played some unnoticed role in making sure your toilet flushed this morning. It almost makes his music worth enduring.

**Deadline** (from Page 1) dated yields will apply beginning with the 2020 crop year which, should payments trigger, will be paid out in October of 2021.

Determining Yield Updates  
The updated yield will be equal to 90% of the average yield per planted acre in crop years 2013-2017. That excludes any year where the applicable covered commodity was not planted and is subject to the ratio obtained by dividing the 2008-2012 average national yield by the 2013-2017 average national yield for the covered commodity.

The chart below provides the ratio obtained by this calculation.

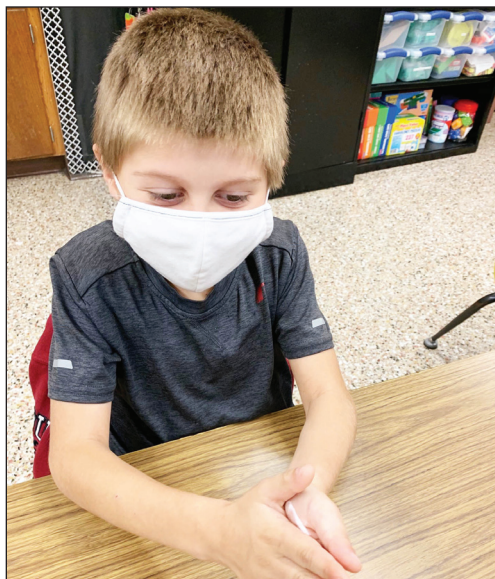
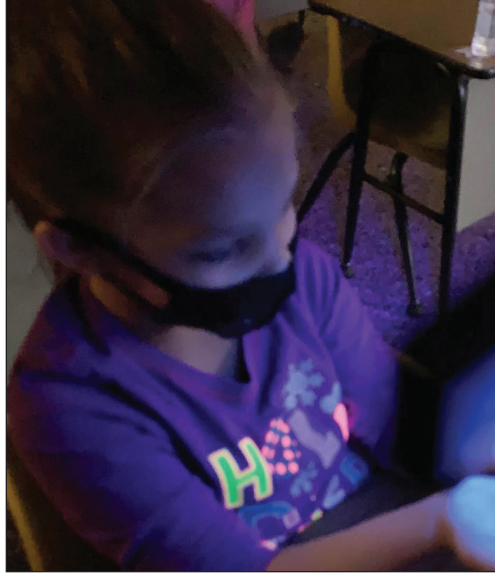

The voter-approval rate is the highest tax rate that City of Wheeler may adopt without holding an election to seek voter approval of the rate.

The proposed tax rate is greater than the no-new-revenue tax rate. This means that City of Wheeler is proposing to increase property taxes for the 2020 tax year.

A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE PROPOSED TAX RATE WILL BE HELD ON Monday, Sept. 21st @ 5:30 p.m. at City Hall located at 505 Alan L. Bean Blvd.

The proposed tax rate is not greater than the voter-approval tax rate. As a result, City of Wheeler is not required to hold an election at which voters may accept or reject the proposed tax rate. However, you may express your support for or opposition to the proposed tax rate by contacting the members of the City Council of City of Wheeler at their offices or by attending the public hearing mentioned above.
