Minds are working and gears are turning here at Kelton ISD. Students at Kelton are provided an opportunity to construct a robot that has to accomplish a specific task and compete with other teams from all around the world. Every year, a new challenge is released in the form of a game and it is the students' job to brainstorm and construct a robot that can perform the task. The constraints are that the robot has to be under 42 pounds and measure less than 18 inches in width, length, and height. Kelton has been very successful in their robotics program and have qualified for the world competition three times and will be home to four teams this year. All the teams are enthusiastic as can be and are preparing for the release of the new challenge. This preparation can range from building basic drivetrains to renovating their workspace. Come join us at the Kelton School this Saturday at 11:00 AM where this year's challenge will be revealed.

The most experienced team here at Kelton is the 9778 Robotic Chinchillas. It is the team's fifth year participating in the First Tech Challenge and they have advanced to the world competition three times, won UIL Robotics State Champions in 2018, and acquired second place at the Panhandle Plains competition last year. Merely Mustard

Last week I wrote about how interconnected our lives are, with people who we don't even know, and how we rely on them, and they on us, in the unfolding of our day-to-day lives. I ran out of room before I was able to write about a particular angle of this phenomenon — that sometimes those we rely on, or those who deliver aid in a time when we can't help ourselves, are those very people we may tend to dislike or toward whom we harbor some kind of animosity.

I have experienced this a few times in my own life. Once, during winter many years ago, I had a flat tire on

a dirt road. Being that it was winter and after 6:00 p.m., It was dark outside. Fortunately I had a spare tire (not a guarantee with today's vehicles), and fortunately the spare was full of air (not necessarily a guarantee ever). And fortunately I was riding with a friend, or, rather, a friend was riding with me, since I was the one who had been driving. Not that a friend is necessary for the task of changing a tire, but if you are going to change a tire in the dark on a dirt road, you may as well have a friend to help, or if nothing else, to hold the light, and if not even that, to share your misfortune. Anyway there was a

particular individual who I had been feuding with (although that may be a bit dramatic of a word choice, and might diminish the meaning of the word "feud"), and at some point during the process of removing the flat tire and installing the spare, headlights appeared on the road. And, lo and behold, who should it be coming down the road, but my nemesis? This person was way down the list of people I would have chosen to see at that time. But what did the "nemesis" do upon driving up to us? The nemesis offered to help. I was taken aback. The reality was we really didn't need any help, but still I felt (and

as I recall it was a perceptible physical sensation, similar to when anxiety comes on, or some confrontation, or if you are in the early stages of going along with something you don't agree with, or something against your "gut") a change of heart toward this individual, and as best as I can recall I never thought of this person as a nemesis again. American actor and musician, Red Steagull, filmed an episode for his television series, Somewhere West of Wall Street, at the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum in Old Mobeetie, Texas on Monday.

Steagull, whose program focuses on the American West invites viewers to ride along with him as he discovers the most interesting and historical landmarks and trailblazers of the West. His focus for this episode was on Mobeetie, Texas, the first town in the Texas Panhandle.

His story began with the establishment of a trading post to serve the buffalo hunters in the area, the formation by the army of Fort Elliott, and (Continued Page 5)

Pavan Patel is a 15-year-old sophomore and is the programmer, builder, and driver of the robot and this will be his third year participating in the program. Raj Bhakta is a 14-year freshman and is also the builder, programmer, and driver of the robot and this will be his second year participating in the First Tech Challenge. Finally,

Alexis Lopez is a 16-year-old junior and assists in computer-aided design and logs the team's doings in the engineering notebook. At the moment, Pavan and Raj have successfully built and programmed a mecanum drivetrain. They have also implemented color, range, and touch sensors on their robot. Alexis has created the first renderings of the drivetrain and has started work on the engineering notebook. During their spare time,

Raj and Pavan have been helping the younger kids build and program their robot and have created guides for future reference.

The second team that Kelton is home to is 14806 Gemini which is an all-girls team. This will be the team's first year participating in robotics and is filled with potential. At the moment, they have built a basic drivetrain and are now constructing an arm. Caylon Schaefer, Capryce Chappell, Zen Lister, Macy Lamar, and Shaylee Dougherty are all member of the team. At the moment, Shaylee and Caylon have constructed a rigid push-bot drivetrain and have implemented the new REV Control Hub onto their robot. Capris and Jordan have also been working with Pavan Patel to create a basic code to make their robot functional. Lastly, Zen and Macy have been logging the team's happenings in the engineering notebook.

Kelton's third team is the 16799 Robotic Wookies. They are now putting the final touches on their omni directional drivetrain and are in the process of implementing sensors on their robot. The Robotic Wookies consists of two builders named Jet Erikson and Vincent Sherwood both who have also been working with Raj Bhakta to implement sensors on their robot. Recently, they held a deconstruction of the new challenge with the Robotic Chinchillas and developed a variety of prototypes and designs. Tess Braddock is also a member of the team logs the team's happenings in the engineering notebook.

Last but not least, the Robotic Roosters are the fourth team to come out of Kelton. Right now, they have completed their drivetrain and are wiring the new REV Control hub onto their robot. Seth Bryant and Alex Chandler have completed their mecanum drivetrain and Dalton Brown has been researching designs and coding the basic OpModes.

Kelton ISD is hoping to have a better and more successful robotics program than ever before. The children have learned valuable life skills like troubleshooting, critical thinking, and cooperation. To receive a facility visitation designation, a facility must demonstrate that it has separate areas, units, wings, halls, or buildings designated for COVID-19 positive, COVID-19 negative, and unknown COVID-19 status resident cohorts; separate dedicated staff are working exclusively in the separate areas, units, wings, halls, or buildings; and there have been no confirmed COVID-19 cases for at least 14 consecutive days in staff working in the area, unit, wing, hall, or building that accommodates residents who are COVID-19 negative.

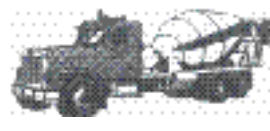

(from Page 1) Agriculture (USDA) will use funds being made available from the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) Charter Act and CARES Act to support row crops, livestock, specialty crops, dairy, aquaculture and many additional commodities. USDA has incorporated improvements in CFAP 2 based from stakeholder engagement and public feedback to better meet the needs of impacted farmers and ranchers.

Producers can apply for CFAP 2 at USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) county offices. This program provides financial assistance that gives producers the ability to absorb increased marketing costs associated with the COVID-19 pandemic. Producers will be compensated for ongoing market disruptions and assisted with the associated marketing costs.

CFAP 2 payments will be made for three categories of commodities – Price Trigger Commodities, Flat-rate Crops and Sales Commodities. Price Trigger Commodities are major commodities that meet a minimum 5-percent price decline over a specified period of time. Eligible price trigger crops include barley, corn, sorghum, soybeans, sunflowers, upland cotton, and all classes of wheat. Payments will be based on 2020 planted acres of the crop, excluding prevented planting and experimental acres. Payments for price trigger crops will be the greater of: 1) the

eligible acres multiplied by a payment rate of \$15 per acre; or 2) the eligible acres multiplied by a nationwide crop marketing percentage, multiplied by a crop-specific payment rate, and then by the producer's weighted 2020 Actual Production History (APH) approved yield. If the APH is not available, 85 percent of the 2019 Agriculture Risk Coverage-County Option (ARC-CO) benchmark yield for that crop will be used.

For broilers and eggs, payments will be based on 75 percent of the producers' 2019 production. Dairy (cow's milk) payments will be based on actual milk production from April 1 to Aug. 31, 2020. The milk production for Sept. 1, 2020, to Dec. 31, 2020, will be estimated by FSA.

Eligible beef cattle, hogs and pigs, and lambs and sheep payments will be based on the maximum owned inventory of eligible livestock, excluding breeding stock, on a date selected by the producer, between Apr. 16, 2020, and Aug. 31, 2020.

Flat-rate Crops Crops that either do not meet the 5-percent price decline trigger or do not have data available to calculate a price change will have payments calculated based on eligible 2020 acres multiplied by \$15 per acre. These crops include alfalfa, extra long staple (ELS) cotton, oats, peanuts, rice, hemp, millet, mustard, safflower, sesame, triticale, rapeseed, and several others.

Sales Commodities

Sales commodities include specialty crops; aquaculture; nursery crops and floriculture; other commodities not included in the price trigger and flat-rate categories, including tobacco; goat milk; mink (including pelts); mohair; wool; and other livestock (excluding breeding stock) not included under the price trigger category that were grown for food, fiber, fur, or feathers. Payment calculations will use a sales-based approach, where producers are paid based on five payment gradations associated with their 2019 sales.

Additional commodities are eligible in CFAP 2 that weren't eligible in the first iteration of the program. If your agricultural operation has been impacted by the pandemic since April 2020, we encourage you to apply for CFAP 2. A complete list of eligible commodities, payment rates and calculations can be found on farmers.gov/cfap.

Eligibility There is a payment limitation of \$250,000 per person or entity for all commodities combined. Applicants who are corporations, limited liability companies, limited partnerships may qualify for additional payment limits when members actively provide personal labor or personal management for the farming operation. In addition, this special payment limitation provision has been expanded to include trusts and estates for both CFAP 1 and 2.

Producers will also have to certify they meet the Adjusted Gross Income limitation of \$900,000 unless at least 75 percent or more of their income is derived from farming, ranching or forestry-related activities. Producers must also be in compliance with Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Conservation provisions.

Applying for Assistance Producers can apply for assistance beginning Sept. 21, 2020. Applications will be accepted through Dec. 11, 2020.

Additional information and application forms can be found at farmers.gov/cfap. Documentation to support the producer's application and certification may be requested. All other eligibility forms, such as those related to adjusted gross income and payment information, can be downloaded from farmers.gov/cfap/apply. For exist-

ing FSA customers, including those who participated in CFAP 1, many documents are likely already on file. Producers should check with FSA county office to see if any of the forms need to be updated.

Customers seeking one-on-one support with the CFAP 2 application process can call 877-508-8364 to speak directly with a USDA employee ready to offer assistance. This is a recommended first step before a producer engages with the team at the FSA county office.

All USDA Service Centers are open for business, including some that are open to visi-

tors to conduct business in person by appointment only. All Service Center visitors wishing to conduct business with FSA, Natural Resources Conservation Service or any other Service Center agency should call ahead and schedule an appointment. Service Centers that are open for appointments will pre-screen visitors based on health concerns or recent travel, and visitors must adhere to social distancing guidelines. Visi-

tors are also required to wear a face covering during their appointment. Our program delivery staff will be in the office, and they will be working with our producers in the office, by phone and using online tools. More information can be found at farmers.gov/coronavirus.

pleasurable. I suspect it was pride that had deceived me, and that holding my grudge was only attractive because it would have meant my original assessment of the individual was correct, whereas laying down the grudge was tantamount to saying "I was wrong."

That is not the only incident of this nature that I have experienced, but detailing additional ones here does nothing to help convey the point. Suffice to say that I have had other experiences where I was in need of assistance, and the very people who rendered assistance were the ones that I was uncomfortable with, or had some "problem" with previously. It is a humbling thing to ask for, or simply to receive, help, and how much more humbling it is to ask for or receive help from someone with whom you are at odds, but I have found those occasions to be impactful when I have been in that position. The grudge tends to go away, and, in a bizarre way, I wind up feeling more gratitude toward those individuals for the aid they rendered, than I would for one with whom I was not at odds. I suppose it is because those with whom we are on good terms have no reason to withhold their assistance and so in a certain (inaccurate) way it seems as though we are entitled to it; whereas for our nemeses to assist us is an act of humility on their part as well - after all, they could have kicked us when we were down, or at least withheld their help and concern; yet they humble themselves from their position of relative superiority

and therefore their intervention means more than that of those to whom we are on good terms with, or at least neutral toward. It is almost as though we perceive each other as holding daggers of animosity, and when our foes take the initiative of laying down theirs (or perhaps they never held such dagger of animosity to begin with, and we only imagined they did) to offer a hand of assistance and peace in our time of need it disarms us, and we never take up those daggers against each other again.

Life shakes out this way sometimes, and it can be greatly for our benefit, and for others involved. It almost gives the appearance that these encounters have been arranged. I have a bit more to say on this matter, but have run out of space. Perhaps I shall explore further the aspects of this topic next week.

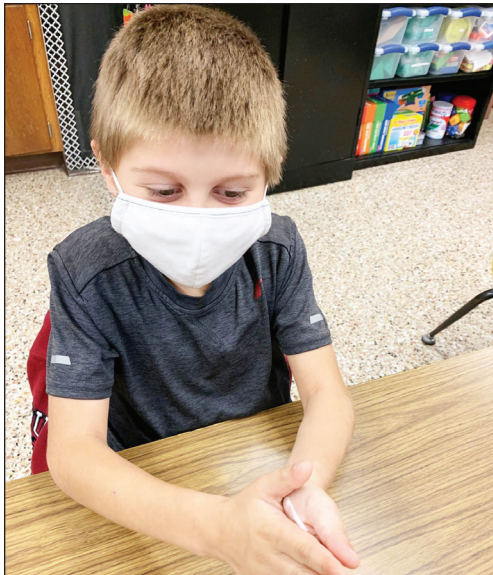
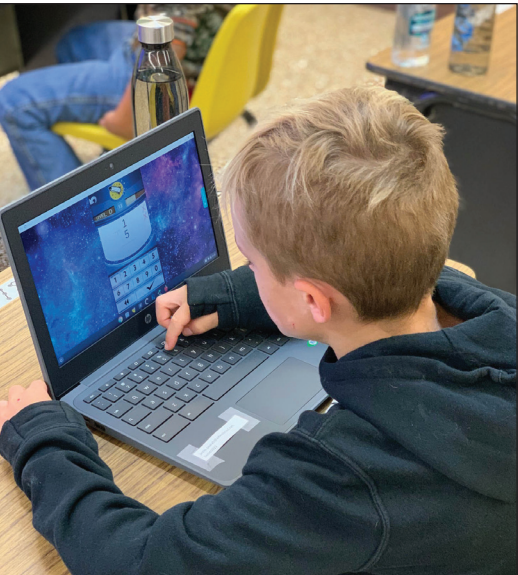

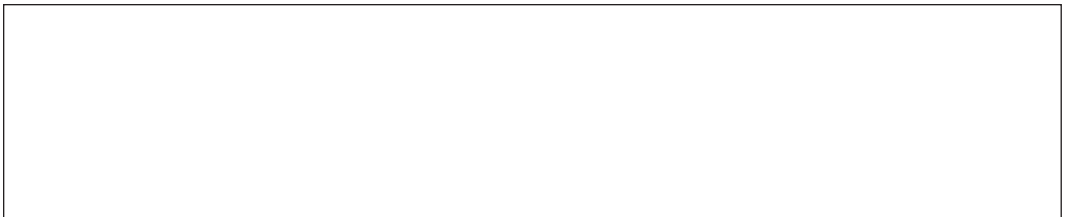
