County Committee Elections County Farmers Urged To Vote

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has started mailing ballots for the Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committee elections to eligible farmers and ranchers across the country. To be counted, ballots must be returned to the Wheeler County FSA office or postmarked by Dec. 6.

“FSA county committee members provide valuable knowledge and judgment as decisions are made about the services we provide, including disaster and safety-net programs,” said Janee Cross, program technician in charge for Wheeler County. “Please take a few minutes to review your ballot and make your selection prior to the Dec. 6 deadline.”

Each committee has from three to 11 elected members who serve three-year terms of office, and at least one seat is up for election each year for a certain Local Administrative Area (LAA). Newly elected committee members will take

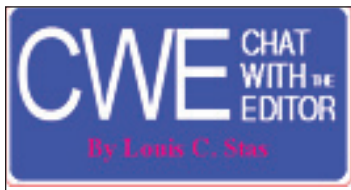

The nominee up for election in LAA #1, which includes areas that are north of Highway 152 in Wheeler County, is Steve Zybach.

Steve Zybach is nominated to serve as a committee member for a 3-year term. Zybach resides in the Briscoe area and has been a livestock producer in that area for many years.

Steve is a member of American Angus Association and recently served as a delegate to the American Angus Association's annual national convention in Fort Worth. He is also active with the Amarillo Senior Softball League.

Producers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program to be eligible to vote in the county committee election. A cooperating producer is someone who has provided information about their farming or ranching operation but may not have applied or received FSA program benefits. Also, for County Committee elections, producers who are not of legal voting age, but supervise and conduct the farming operations of an entire farm, are eligible to vote.

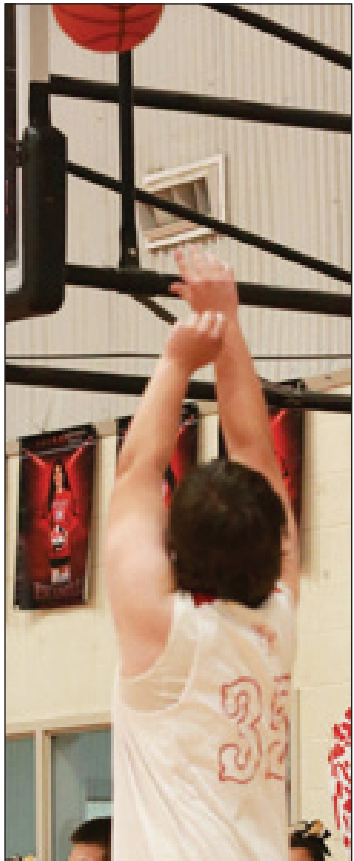

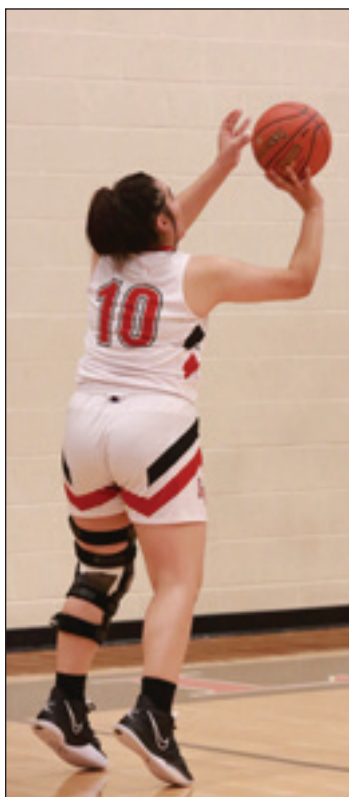

with some measure of gratitude. This often takes the form of reflecting on the previous day. And what has surprised me is that in so doing I remember things I otherwise would have missed – true blessings, that otherwise would have washed over me, while I failed to savor them, and failed to gain the joy and perspective that follow acknowledging one's blessings. Allowing blessings to touch us without our acknowledgment is like eating a piece of pie, or a hearty meal, and receiving the nutrients, but failing to savor the tastes and smells, and take pleasure in it all.

A sage told me, "Things are never so bad that they couldn't be worse." This simple statement is always true. In essence, it is an expression of gratitude. It could be rephrased to say, "I am at least glad to be living, breathing, able to think..." The acknowledgment of one's blessings in this manner could be nearly endless. And this simple acknowledgment is the antidote that prevents one from looking with tunnel vision down the spiral of despair. Such antidote was Jonah lacking, who received refreshment from a shade tree, but never exhibited gratitude for it, and was therefore left with only bitterness when it was gone.

And so it is with us. For each individual there are multitudes to be thankful for. There are struggles, but the struggles are not as bad as they could be. And there are surely a number of blessings along the way. Living in gratitude is a means to stop at these way stations and receive respite from weariness; it is a means of seeing the oases in the desert, and leaving them refreshed. "Gratitude – good for the soul." That could have been the byline which would have preempted my writing this piece. Regardless, it is enough: I shall preach no more. And for that you may be grateful.
