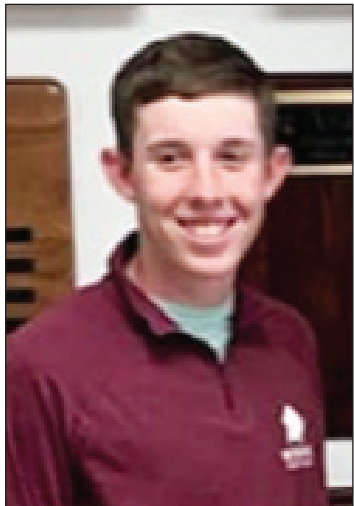

Funds To Help Landowners, Managers With Wildfire Recovery And Restoration

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Texas is offering financial assistance to farmers and ranchers that have been

impacted by recent wildfires, including animal mortality assistance, deferred grazing, and more.

Payments To Livestock Producers Impacted By Drought Or Wildfire

The U.S Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced that ranchers who have approved applications through the 2021 Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP) for forage losses due to severe drought or wildfire in 2021 will soon begin receiving emergency relief payments for increases in supplemental feed costs in 2021 through the Farm Service Agency's (FSA) new Emergency Livestock Relief Program (ELRP).

“Producers of grazing livestock experienced catastrophic losses of available forage as well as higher costs for supplemental feed in 2021. Unfortunately,

I was recently visiting with a friend of mine who is also a sort of counselor – not in the professional sense, but in a more subtle kind of way. This dignified title is one I extend to all of my friends, and many others who I encounter in my everyday life, though perhaps they know it not. I tend to hold the attitude that anyone can be an advisor, because anyone has the capacity to teach me something I did not know, or to show me something I could not see for myself. Similarly, anyone can speak a prophetic word at any given time, though the benefit of the prophecy to its recipient might be affected by degree that he or she is open to acknowledging the possibility that prophecy has been spoken.

This friend and I were exchanging anecdotes on times recently where things worked out favorably for each of us in various personal endeavors, in a way that made the circumstances appear as though they were arranged for us. I generally believe things are often (perhaps always) arranged for our benefit, and the main task for us is to recognize it, both so that we can walk through those doorways to blessing, and, more importantly, that we can acknowledge with gratitude those blessings, those encounters, those situations where we were clearly guided to take the right steps.

This stance of being open to guidance, open to blessing, open to grace, is one which inevitably yields a rich life, primarily because generally, whatever we seek, we shall find. It is one of the most radical concepts in day-to-day life because on one

hand it flies in the face of logic and reason; at the same time, it is the most logical and reasonable thing to believe. Do you expect a particular person to be a grouch with you? Congratulations – you have created that scenario, without yet even having encountered that person. You have planted the seed which will yield a dead tree. This is accomplished perhaps by sub-conscious signals where the brain creates the situation it envisioned, so as to control its environment. The problem is that a counterproductive situation was envisioned and thus created. And this can be done without the creator of unfavorable outcomes even being aware that they are the one creating those outcomes. But, if a person lives open to the concept of

to assist landowners with their efforts to address wind and water erosion, livestock production limitation, degraded plant condition, and other resource concerns caused by the recent wildfires," Kristy Oates, NRCS state conservationist in Texas said. "Loss of vegetation not only affects forages for livestock and wildlife habitat, but it can lead to increased soil loss due to erosion by wind and water."

Currently, eligible counties in Texas include Blanco, Brooks, Brown, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Grayson, Hood, Mason, Potter, Randall, Runnels, Starr, and Williamson. As more wildlife disaster proclamations occur, those counties will also be eligible. Funding is available through the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP), which provides financial and technical assistance to agricultural producers to address natural resource concerns and deliver environmental benefits. Professional resource conservationists with the NRCS can visit with landowners about practices such as grazing deferral, cross fencing, reseeding and water development that are effective post-fire strategies to help reduce erosion.

NRCS accepts applications for conservation programs year-round, however, producers and landowners should apply by July 5, 2022 to be considered for this year's funding. Applications for this

the conditions driving these losses have not improved for many and have even worsened for some, as drought spreads across the U.S.," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "In order to deliver much-needed assistance as efficiently as possible, phase one of the ELRP will use certain data from the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), allowing USDA to distribute payments within days to livestock producers."

Background
On September 30, 2021, President Biden signed into law the Extending Government Funding and Delivering Emergency Assistance Act (P.L. 117-43). This Act includes \$10 billion in assistance to agricultural producers impacted by wildfires, droughts, hurricanes, winter storms and other eligible disasters experienced during calendar years 2020 and 2021. Additionally, the Act specifically targets \$750 million to provide assistance to livestock producers for losses incurred due to drought or wildfires in calendar year 2021. ELRP is part of FSA's implementation of the Act.

For impacted ranchers, USDA will leverage LFP data to deliver immediate relief for increases in supplemental feed costs in 2021. LFP is an important tool that provides up to 60% of the estimated replacement feed cost when an eligible drought adversely impacts grazing lands or 50% of the monthly feed cost for the

number of days the producer is prohibited from grazing the managed rangeland because of a qualifying wildfire. FSA received more than 100,000 applications totaling nearly \$670 million in payments to livestock producers under LFP for the 2021 program year. Congress recognized requests for assistance beyond this existing program and provided specific funding for disaster-impacted livestock producers in 2021. ELRP Eligibility – Phase One

To be eligible for an ELRP payment under phase one of program delivery, livestock producers must have suffered grazing losses in a county rated by the U.S. Drought Monitor as having a D2 (severe drought) for eight consecutive weeks or a D3 (extreme drought) or higher level of drought intensity during the 2021 calendar year, and have applied and been approved for 2021 LFP. Additionally, producers whose permitted grazing on federally managed lands was disallowed due to wildfire are also eligible for ELRP payments, if they applied and were approved for 2021 LFP.

As part of FSA's efforts to streamline and simplify the delivery of ELRP phase one benefits, producers are not required to submit an application for payment; however, they must have the following forms on file with FSA within a subsequently announced deadline as determined by the Deputy Administrator for Farm Programs

enrollment opportunity will be selected for funding by August 5, 2022. NRCS is allowing early start waivers and a shorter enrollment period. Eligible producers can use the funds to implement eligible practices including fencing, watering facility, range plant-

Mobeetie History

The weekends for All Things Texas is very much used for research of many small Texas towns and other history our members will enjoy!

And we are always going over old files of previous history we have given. Especially when a member asks for a town we have already covered. We try to go back and see if there was anything left out of the town we gave history.

There are certain quotes that can't be left out on the history of a town called Mobeetie, Texas. So we hope Tim Long enjoys our look at it's history?

Mobeetie was as rank a place as any fancier of rankness could ever want. Gamblers, prostitutes and gunfighters turned Mobeetie from Hidetown into a frontier Sodom and Gomorrah. Pioneer Panhandle cattleman Charles Goodnight described the town as "patronized by outlaws, thieves, cut-throats and buffalo hunters, with a large percentage of prostitutes." Temple Lea Houston, Sam Houston's youngest son, wrote his wife that Mobeetie was "a baldheaded whiskey town with few virtuous women."

Long before Mobeetie, Texas ever became an "almost ghost town", the vast plains were home to the Apache Indians. In the 1700s the Kiowa and Comanche took over the area, running the Apache out. However, the Kiowa and Comanche were defeated in the Red River War of 1874 and the white settlers quickly began to settle the area.

Buffalo hunters from Kansas would come to the area in the spring of 1874. They would form a camp close to Sweetwater Creek named Hidetown. This was about two miles southeast of present day Mobeetie.

The U. S. Government in 1875 established Fort Cantonment about 2 miles northeast of Hidetown to keep the Indians on reservations in Indian Territory and establish law and order in the region.

Several companies of infantry arrived in 1875 under the command of

Major H.C. Bankhead of the 4th Cavalry to help with it's establishment. The first buildings at the fort were made of sharpened cottonwood posts placed into the ground at close intervals, joined by poles fastened across the top. Larger logs were used as ceiling beams which were stacked with layers of brush and weeds above the beams. The structure was then covered with adobe, packed into the spaces between the posts. Board buildings would quickly replace most of the picket buildings, but some were still in use until as late as 1890.

Hidetown began to rapidly grow, with the settlement of the Fort and gained the name Sweetwater City. Dominated by three Dodge City, Kansas men by the names of Charles Rath, Bob Wright, and Lee Reynolds, the settlers supplied buffalo

hides to the three men, who in turn, made provisions available to the settlement. With the fort established, the Dodge City men built a trading post and Sweetwater quickly grew to a population of about 150 people. The three Dodge City men claimed to have bought over 150,000 buffalo hides while they were in Sweetwater.

Another man steep in Texas history would also arrive there, William "Billy" Dixon. Dixon would be the hero of the Second Battle of Adobe Walls in 1874, was wagon master of a bull train in Sweetwater for a time. Running the train for Lee Reynolds of Dodge City, Kansas, Dixon mastered ten 7-oxen teams of three wagons to a team bringing provisions into Sweetwater and taking loads of buffalo hides back to Dodge City.

Like many Old West settlements, the town was primarily called home to bull-whackers, outlaws, buffalo hunters, and gamblers. Catering primarily to the soldiers at the fort, Sweetwater had a Chinese laundry, a restaurant, a dance hall and several saloons by the summer of 1875.

One of the restaurants there was run by Tom O'Loughlin, and his wife, Ellen, who was said to have been the only virtuous woman in the settlement. The only other women in the small town were the dance hall and saloon girls. Numbering about 15, the girls worked the many Sweetwater Saloons, which held such names as the Pink Pussy Cat Paradise, the Buffalo Chip Mint, and the White Elephant. One saloon called the Ring Town Saloon, located about 2 1/2 miles northwest of Sweetwater was designated for black men only - primarily those Buffalo Soldiers employed at the fort.

The owner of the main dance hall was Bill Thompson, brother of the noted Ben Thompson, gunman of Austin, Texas who was killed in San Antonio.

In the fall of 1875 a new player would arrive, Bat Masterson. Masterson had scouted for Colonel Nelson A. Miles during the Red River War, landed in Sweetwater. Working as a faro dealer in Henry Fleming's Saloon, Masterson became embroiled in an argument with Sergeant Melvin A. King over a card game and a dance hall beauty named Mollie Brennan. The argument quickly led to gunplay and King was left dead.

But during all of this, King's shot passed through Mollie Brennan's body, killing her, and then hit Masterson in the pelvis. The injury caused Bat to walk with a limp for the rest of his life. In 1876, Masterson returned to Dodge City, Kansas where he became a lawman there for many years. Other visitors to Sweetwater during this lawless time included Patrick F. Garrett and Poker Alice.

In February of 1876 the fort there would be renamed Fort Elliott by General Order No. 3 of the Division of the Missouri. By the time of it's renaming, Fort Elliott had officer's quarters, sufficient barracks for six companies of enlisted men, a headquarters building, hospital, laundresses' quarters, storehouses and cavalry stables all built of lumber.

Most of the supplies that were needed for the Fort were brought in from Dodge City, Kansas. For those living around the Fort they would produce their food and sell at a market at the Fort.

On April 12, 1876, Wheeler County was one of twenty-six counties created out of Clay County Territory and was named for Supreme Court Justice Royal T. Wheeler. In 1878 it was learned that Sweetwater was located on the Military Reserve and the town had to relocate. Moving two miles northwest to section 45, this proved to be a boost for the settlement, with its location nearer to the fort.

Wheeler County was officially organized in 1879 by a petition signed by 150 qualified voters and Sweetwater was elected as the county seat. The settlement then applied for its own post office with the town name of Sweetwater. However, the name was rejected because Texas already had a town by that name. It occurred to some to ask the local Indians the name of Sweetwater as spoken in their language.

The word was Mobeetie and it became the name of the town. It wasn't until many years later that a Comanche related that Mobeetie didn't actually mean "sweet water," but instead, meant "buffalo dung."

By 1880, Fort Elliott was able to procure from the locals, hay, some lumber, shoes, saddles, wagon wheels, clothing and many staple foods. These early entrepreneurs constituted the first manufacturing in the Texas Panhandle.

Throughout the 1880s Mobeetie was the commercial center of much of the Panhandle, connected by a mail route with Tascosa, to the west. Rath's mercantile store catered to area ranches and Fort Elliott dominated the economy. Mobeetie's main street expanded to include livery stables, wagon yards, a barbershop, drugstore, blacksmith shop, two hotels, numerous boarding houses, and an increased number of the ever-present saloons.

In 1880 the first courthouse would be built in Mobeetie, it was the first courthouse built in the Panhandle of Texas. Irish stone masons would build this. They quarried the stone from the Emanuel Dubbs homestead nine miles east of Mobeetie. Just one year later Mobeetie became the judicial center of the Thirty-fifth District, which comprised fifteen counties. Several lawyers set up shop, including Temple Houston, son of Sam Houston, who served a term in Mobeetie as district attorney before his election to the state Senate.

Mobeetie continued to have its share of gamblers, rustlers, and prostitutes. However, Captain George W. Arrington and his Texas Ranger Company proved an effective deterrent to the lawless element. Arrington was elected county sheriff in 1882 and throughout his term made his home in the two-story stone jail, which still stands today. In the same year the Texas Panhandle, the region's first newspaper, began operation. By 1886 Mobeetie had a population of about 300.

The old county jail in "Old Mobeetie" has since become a museum, after having served as a private residence for several years and the local VFW Hall. The museum features artifacts from both Mobeetie and Fort Elliott. On the site is also a crude flagpole, and an outdoor jail cell, which is all that remains from Fort Elliott. The museum and several outbuildings are open year-around from 1:00-5:00 p.m. daily except Wednesdays. Manned by volunteers, donations are graciously accepted.
