Election Filing Slow Across County

With mayor, city council and school board trustee seats open across the county and a March 10th filing deadline looming ahead, filing for a place on local ballots has been fairly slow.

Cody Manning has filed an application for a place on the Knox City - O'Brien CISD school board. The school board election has three full term, three-year seats open.

The City of Knox City has three full term, two-year council seats open for the upcoming election. No one has filed for a place on the ballot as of press

Benjamin ISD has three full term three-year seats and three unexpired two-year terms open.

Those having filed as of February 25th are Glenn Heard, Linda Griffith, Kim Moore and Jimmy Barrientez, all who currently serve on the board.

The City of Benjamin has opened the mayor's seat in addition to two full term, two-year council seats and one unexpired one-year seat. Sylinda Meinzer has filed for the mayor's seat and Lorene Powers has filed for a full term council seat.

Meinzer currently serves as mayor and Powers is also an incumbent.

According to mayor Charlene Brothers, the City of O'Brien has opened the mayor's seat in addition to three full term, twoyear council seats.

Wildfire Threat Still A Major Issue

Grasses dry and brittle across much of West Texas, some of the lowest relative humidity seen this year and Santa Annalike winds howling across the plains led the National Weather Service's Storm Prediction Center to issue a rare "extremely critical" fire weather warning for parts of the state on Monday, and had fire fighters and much of the state on high alert through

mid-week. With gusts up to 50 mph on Monday, the stage was set for disastrous circumstances in the event of wildfire. The Texas Forest Service alerted media that any fire that started could travel up to 1,000 acres in 30 minutes, equal to one football field per minute. With forward rates of spread possibly up to 5

mph, one source reported that fires could be so dangerous that they would outrun firefighters and fire vehicles, and with the wind gusting as they were, even helicopters that were on standby to help put out fires could not take off until winds were below 35mph.

It was reported on Monday that the current weather circumstances replicated the worst days in 2006, when there were homes and lives lost.

An update on Tuesday from the State Operations Center stated that some fires cannot be contained, and that high winds did prevent containment. Evacuation has been a key player in order to save lives in conditions such as these. The state responded to 20 critical fires that occurred over 165,000 square miles. The Texas Forest Service in Grandbury processed 24 requests for state assistance with 13 coming in during a one hour period.

The Texas Department of Transportation closed seven roads on Monday due to smoke and fire threat, the major road closing IH 20 in Clyde.

"Citizens must be aware that they may have to self-evacuate to a safe area if a wildfire threatens. This is a dangerous situation and fires burning in these conditions will progress faster than a human can possibly run," said Mark Stanford, chief of fire operations for Texas Forest Service.

Knox County is still under a burn ban.

AUSTIN - Barack Obama of Illinois and Hillary Clinton of New York met at the University of Texas to debate in a nationally televised forum on Feb. 21.

The two United States senators, vying to be the Democratic Party's presidential nominee, answered questions posed by Jorge Ramos, a reporter for Univision, the Spanish-language television network, and CNN reporter John King.

Among many topics were:

Democratic Frontrunners Set Up Camp In Capital City

- universal health care
- economy/trade/jobs
- immigration policy
- federal taxation
- Iraq strategy
- care for wounded veter-

- care for military families

Clinton suggested her experience should make her the clear choice for Democratic voters. Obama asked for voters' help in his effort to change the nation's capital from a place "where good ideas go to die" and work with him to help America "live up to its promise" of liberty and justice for all.

Forty-thousand people applied to attend the debate in the UT recreation center, but admittance was limited to 1,000. Pro-Hillary and Pro-Barack crowds gathered outside the building and engaged in loud but peaceful volleys of chants.

Thousands more attended political rallies and debate watches were held at Sholz Garten, the Austin Music Hall and the Hyatt Regency Hotel.

To cap the debate, an Obama rally the following evening in downtown Austin drew a crowd estimated at 30,000. The city of Austin closed off streets near the rally to vehicular traffic.

Meanwhile, Republican candidates U.S. Sen. John McCain of Arizona, former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee, and U.S. Rep. Ron Paul of Clute scheduled appearances in various cities in advance of the Texas GOP pri-

Party primaries are set for March 4, and early voting ends Feb. 29.

SMU chosen as Bush library site

The future site of the

George W. Bush Presidential Library will be Southern Methodist University in Dal-

The SMU board of trustees announced Feb. 22 it had reached an agreement with the George W. Bush Presidential Library Foundation.

SMU is first lady Laura Bush's alma mater. Yale University, President Bush's alma mater, was in the running among eight potential sites.

A "Presidential Center," to be built on SMU's main campus, will consist of the presidential library containing Bush administration documents and artifacts, a museum with permanent and traveling exhibits and an independent public policy institute.

The library and museum will be operated by the National Archives and Records Administration.

Bush was elected to two

consecutive terms as governor of Texas and served from 1995 until 2000, when he resigned to run for president.

City considers owning wind farm

The City of Austin's utility company, Austin Energy, is looking into renewable or "greener" energy solutions for the future.

Michael McCluskey, deputy general manager of Austin Energy, said the utility company might consider buying West Texas land on which to build its own wind farm.

Owning wind turbines instead of contracting for power would guarantee a supply of wind power into the future and give the utility more cost control, McCluskey said.

Currently, much of Austin's energy supply comes from coal-burning power plants.

'Own Your Own Future' launched

The Texas Education Agency on Feb. 22 launched a program to encourage youth to stay in school, graduate and pursue a career.

The program, "Own Your Own Future," comes through a grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Education Commissioner Robert Scott said the program "provides at-risk youth with career options tied to their passions and desires, all while reiterating the need to finish high school to make these achievements a reality."

The program is accessed via www.ownyourownfuture. com, a Web site that moves the user through a series of question-and- answer sections that help the student chart a clear path to goals and objectives and participate in the decisionmaking process.

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

21st Century Cattle Business Predictions Update

In 1988, prezactly 20 years ago, I wrote a column predicting what the livestock industry will be like 50 years later; 2038.

Some of my predictions were:

- 90 % of meals will be eaten out. Home cookin' will not exist.

- Fertile agricultural land will be scarce.

The cessation of grain feeding to livestock.Cattle will be slaughtered at

12 months of age.
- Feedlot cattle will eat gar-

bage, recycled manure and ethanol pulp.Calf birth weights will be 30

- Feedlots will be demanding that cattle have bones like a

chicken, loins like a dachshund and the digestive system of a goat!

- And packers will be financing research to develop cattle without hair, ears, tails, spleens, lungs, kidneys and feet.

Much of my prediction depends on genetic manipulation and digestive chemical technology. It also relies on the presumption that the population and urbanization of the best farm ground will increase exponentially. Now, 2008, 20 years down the road, we are steadily making progress to prove many of my postulations true.

Summer Rains Have Improved Aquifer Levels

Many questions are being asked about this summer's rainfall and its effect on the water table levels. Rolling Plains Groundwater Conservation District measures water levels in February to determine the effects from the previous years pumping and the recharge from the season's precipitation.

Due to the summer rains and the imminent starting of wheat irrigation, the District gauged its list of monitor wells during the first week in February to determine the status of the Seymour Aquifer in Baylor, Haskell and Knox Counties.

Well levels in Baylor County had risen 1 foot or 12 inches.

Well levels in some areas of Haskell County had risen from 12 inches to 2.75 feet, with an average of 22.08 inches.

Wells levels in some areas of Knox County had risen 2.83 feet or 33.96 inches.

Due to the extreme variability of the Seymour Aquifer, varying rainfall, variations in recharge areas and pumping rates, water levels may vary in the three counties.

One word of caution, the District encountered bees in wells in all three counties. If you are going to be working around a well that hasn't been disturbed in a while, please exercise caution. There is a good probability that bees could be in the well.





Extended Order Prohibiting Outdoor Burning

WHEREAS, the Texas Forest Service has determined that Drought conditions exist within the county;

OR

Whereas, the Commissioners' Court finds that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of King County that all outdoor burning is prohibited in the unincorporated area for 90 days from the date of the adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 352.081, and other applicable statutes. This Order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for: (1) firefighting training: (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or, (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

In accordance with Local Government Code 352.081 (h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00.




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

He will be playing in the All Star Game at the Six Man Coaching Clinic in Lubbock this summer. Congratulations Orrin!

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

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
