Sales tax figures up slightly in Knox County

The sales tax figures released by Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs may not be Earth-shattering but, as the old adage goes, a gain is a positive thing no matter how small.

Knox County communities were on the positive side of the ledger as far as sales tax revenue growth, according to Combs. Knox City, Munday, Benjamin and Goree all showed increases in sales

tax totals during the latest reporting pe-

The City of Knox City posted a small gain. According to state records, Knox City generated \$24,309.60 in sales tax revenue from sales reported in December. The city's total represented an increase of just over half a percentage

A year, Knox City generates \$24,180.82 as part of the February 2011

The City of Munday, like Knox City,

totals climbed by 0,05 percent as its businesses generated \$17,557.32 this period.

Goree and Benjamin posted the biggest gains in the county in the latest findings. Goree's sales tax totals soared by 44 percent over a year ago. The town brought in \$2,967.27 in sales tax revenue this period - more than \$900 over last year's numbers.

Benjamin's sales tax mark climbed by 11 percent. The community brought in \$2,173.95 in sales tax funds. A year

posted a slight gain. Munday's sales tax ago, the northern Knox County town generates \$1,865.24.

> While the numbers were positive in Knox County, the figures weren't as god in neighboring Throckmorton County. The City of Throckmorton and Woodson saw their numbers decrease slightly.

> Throckmorton's total fell by 1.5 percent to \$11,924.50. A year ago, the community generated \$12,116.19.

Woodson's sales tax figures declined by 0.55 percent, dropping from \$480.88 a year ago to \$478.22.


Wilde designated the Munday Volunteer Fire Department to receive the award in Knox County.

Brand registration period ends on Feb. 29

The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) reminds ranchers that the next brand re-registration period ends Feb. 29. The state requires that brands be reregistered in the county or counties where the owner operates every 10 years.

Larry Gray, executive director of law enforcement at TSCRA, says that branding is the number one way to prevent livestock theft. Livestock theft continues to be a common problem throughout the United States, especially with recent record high cattle prices. TSCRA was established in 1877 to help prevent and solve agricultural crimes. Since then, the association's law enforcement division has expanded to include 30 special rangers stationed throughout Texas and Oklahoma who work alongside local law enforcement agencies to protect citizens against agricultural crimes, including livestock theft.

Although Texas does not have a statewide brand registry database, TSCRA has market inspectors stationed at 105 Texas livestock auctions that collect brands and other identifying marks on 4 million cattle sold annually. They report this information to TSCRA headquarters in Fort Worth, where it is entered into the nation's largest brand recording and retrieval system. This system currently houses more than 102,000 brands, the largest brand registry in the U.S. This database is the first source checked when livestock is reported stolen, and has aided in the arrests of livestock thieves and the recovery of hundreds of thousands of stolen livestock.

Gray says that while Texas law does not require you to brand your cattle, he highly encourages it as a way to protect your busi-

To help guide ranchers through the brand re-registration process, TSCRA has launched www.tscrabrands.com. Working in conjunction with the 254 county clerk offices, this site provides all the necessary paperwork and information to register brands, as well as information on current brands, designing and reading brands

Water levels down by more than 3 feet

Many questions are being asked about this past summer's lack rainfall and the fall and winter precipitation and their effects on the water table levels.

The simple answer is ... a lot. The Rolling Plains Groundwater Conservation District measured water levels in late January to determine the effects from the previous years pumping and the lack of recharge. The results they recorded in the area show just how hard the recent drought has impacted the region.

Wells levels in Knox County had dropped 3.29 feet - or 39.48 inches, since December 2010.

Redistricting talks move toward a big compromise

AUSTIN - Indications that compromise might not be so far away arose last week in the redrawing of the House, Senate and U.S congressional districts of Texas.

Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott, acting on behalf of the state, and the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) and MALDEF (Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund) released statements of commitment to the negotiation process.

The statements were made following orders by Judge Orlando Garcia, U.S. District Court, Western District of Texas, in San Antonio, for plaintiffs and defendants in the redistricting lawsuits to work together to resolve matters and to appear at a Feb. 15 court hearing.

LULAC and MALDEF have petitioned for the maps to be drawn to include more minority opportunity districts allowing citizens more power in choosing who they want to represent them. The state's position has been that redistricting maps drawn by the Texas Legislature are legal and enforceable in accordance with the U.S. Voting Rights Act of 1965.

But Section 5 of the Act requires that in redrawing district boundaries, maps must be submitted to the federal government for preclearance in order to pre-

Sales tax revenue climbs

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced last week that state sales tax revenue in January was \$2 billion, up 9.5 percent compared to January 2011.

Combs, who said collections have increased for 22 consecutive months, pointed out that the recent monthly increase was led by the oil and natural gas-related sectors, and restaurants and services sectors also showed significant gains.

Combs warns of cost of drought

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs on Feb. 8 released a 16page document describing the effects of the 2011 drought, current and future water resources in the state and solutions to help solve the water crisis.

According to the document titled "The Impact of the 2011 Drought and Beyond" the state's current water plan predicts demand will increase by 22 percent by 2060 and should Texas experience another "mega-drought" as severe as the 1950s drought, "it could cost Texas businesses and workers nearly \$116 billion in income by 2060."

Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 15.

A "rendition" is a report to your county appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on Jan. 1 of this year.

Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income—such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10 percent to 50 percent penalty may be imposed.

Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value change and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.
- You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2010. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2011.

What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2011 renditions is April 15. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 (or the next business day if a weekend) if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 15 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after the deadline for an owner who shows good cause in writing.





On January 31, 2012, Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division ("Atmos" or "the Company"), filed a Statement of Intent with each City served by the Mid-Tex Division (hereafter "Affected Cities") with the exception of the City of Dallas. The Company's Statement of Intent proposes to increase its gas rates and implement a new schedule of rates and riders applicable to all customers within the Affected Cities. The proposed effective date of the requested rate changes is March 6, 2012. If approved, the proposed changes will affect approximately 1,194,420 residential, 100,461 commercial, and 705 industrial & transportation customers.

If approved, the proposed rates will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$49,080,069 or 4.36%, including gas costs, or 11.94% excluding gas cost. The proposed change in rates constitutes a "major change" as that term is defined by Section 104.101 of the Texas Utilities Code. In addition to the rate changes, other proposed tariff changes include revision of the Company's residential and commercial rate schedules (Rates R and C), as well as its Rider WNA and Rider GCR to change the current billing rate basis from Mcf to Ccf. The Company further proposes to revise the Rider GCR to: (1) remove the 2009 interest rate reference, (2) clarify that the calculation of (b) Pipeline Cost is inclusive of interest, and (3) update the Upstream Pipeline Charge Allocation (Factor D). Atmos also proposes to modify its Rider WNA to update the heat load and base load factors. The Company further seeks to implement a new Rate Review Mechanism ("RRM") tariff, as well as a new conservation and energy efficiency tariff ("Rider CEE"). In addition, the Company seeks to recover all of its rate case expenses and all city rate case expenses as allowed by law. The exact amount will not be known until the case is completed.

Based on the proposed rate design, the average monthly bill for each customer class within the Affected Cities will change by the amount and percent shown in the table below:


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

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

in Seymour. The time for the matchup had not been determined as of press time.


Knox City enters the postseason as the district runner-up. Woodson was the third-place team in their district standings, finishing behind Throckmorton and Aspermont.




