The Burrito Shop gets new sign, renewed business

MUNDAY — A new burrito restaurant in Munday has popped up and the word is officially out. The Burrito Shop, as it is appropriately titled, has been operating in Munday for a few months now, but is just getting established in the community with the addition of a crisp new business sign in front off Main St.

Opened at the end of last fall, The Burrito Shop has only been noticeable so far because of their unique circus tent colored drive up window, and the long line of cars that is usually trailing off right in front of

The shop was opened by Maria Silva with the help of her daughter Anita Silva, both working mothers. Although the Silva's are Knox City residents, they chose to open their shop here in Munday for the warm business climate and the lack of competi-

"Knox City has enough burrito shops, we didn't want to add to that and try and compete in that market. Why not just come to Munday where there was no burrito shop? People have been great to us so we think

Munday was the right choice," said Anita Silva.

And business has been great since they opened and even better with the addition of a colorful new business sign. The Silva's could not feel more welcomed in the Munday business community.

"We put the sign up about a month ago, and business has been booming since then. It was good before, but now we are really busy from start to finish," said Maria Silva.

Even though they originated from Mexico, the Silva's have called Knox County home for over 25 years now and thought of no other place when deciding to start their business. And even though Anita does not have much experience in the food business, her mother has been at it for years. Apparently, Maria Silva has been cooking for farmers and harvesters for almost a quarter century, so this is very natural to her.

"She has been making food for ranchers for the last 20 years, so this is second nature to my mother, and she truly enjoys doing it," Anita Silva said.

For any county resident that is yet to try them out, The Burrito Shop will be open every Monday-Saturday from 6 a.m.-2 p.m. and serves both breakfast and lunch.

BCAP employs three types of biomass assistance. For growing new biomass, BCAP provides financial assistance with 50 percent of the cost of establishing a perennial crop. To maintain the crop as it matures until harvest, BCAP provides an annual payment for up to five years for herbaceous crops, or up to 15 years for woody crops. To collect existing agriculture or forest residues that are not economically retrievable, BCAP provides matching payments for mitigating the cost of harvesting and transport-

"For forest residues, this year's matching payments are

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

USDA Announces Changes to Fruit, Vegetable and Wild Rice Planting Rules

(COLLEGE STATION, TX) - May 20, 2014 – USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) has announced fruit, vegetable and wild rice provisions that affect producers who intend to participate in certain programs authorized by the Agricultural Act of 2014.

"Similar to previous programs that we've administered, planting fruits, vegetables or wild rice on base acres on a farm can result in a payment reduction for program participants," said Judith A. Canales, State Executive Director for the Texas FSA.

Producers who intend to participate in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs are subject to an acre-for-acre payment reduction when fruits and nuts, vegetables or wild rice are planted on the payment acres of a farm. Payment reductions do not apply to mung beans, dry peas, lentils or chickpeas. Planting fruits, vegetables or wild rice on acres that are not considered payment acres will not result in a payment reduction. Farms that are eligible to participate in ARC/PLC

but are not enrolled for a particular year may plant unlimited fruits, vegetables and wild rice for that year but will not receive ARC/ PLC payments for that year. Eligibility for succeeding years is not affected.

Planting and harvesting fruits, vegetables and wild rice on ARC/PLC acreage is subject to the acre-for-acre payment reduction when those crops are planted on either more than 15 percent of the base acres of a farm enrolled in ARC using the county coverage or PLC, or more than 35 percent of the base acres of a farm enrolled in ARC using the individual coverage.

Fruits, vegetables and wild rice that are planted in a double-cropping practice will not cause a payment reduction if the farm is in a double-cropping region as designated by the USDA's Commodity Credit Corpo-

"Identifying, recovering and rescuing endangered children is a chief priority for DPS, and we recommend Texans 'Take 25' minutes to teach children about possible dangers and ways to stay safe."

On average, more than 45,000 children up to age 17 are reported missing in Texas each year, and at any given time, there are more than 4,000 active cases, according to records from the DPS Missing Persons Clearinghouse. Many missing children are recovered safely.

As a result of IPC training, DPS can account for the recovery of 117 children and has initiated more than 30 criminal investigations since 2010. Since the program's inception, DPS has provided the IPC training to approximately 7,600 officers in Texas, nationally and internationally.

First recognized in 1983, Na-

tional Missing Children's Day is an annual reminder that there are thousands of children who are still missing. May 25 is the anniversary of the day in 1979 when 6-yearold Etan Patz disappeared on his way to school in New York.

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

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



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El Niño said to be coming back with a vengeance

Circling far above the earth, NASA's Jason-2 satellite has been watching something brewing in the Pacific.


And if climatologists are right, what the Jason-2 has been observing could be the beginning of the one of the most potent El Niño events in recent years . . . as big, if not bigger, than the El Niño of 1997.

The chance of an El Niño happening this summer has increased to 65%, up from 50% last month. Forecasters are now favoring an El Niño onset during the May-June-July time period, vs. the June-July-August favored in April's outlook. "The forecasters are much more

optimistic that this is going to develop," says NOAA's Climate Prediction Center meteorologist Michelle L'Heureux.

The years 1997-98 made El Niño a household word. That was one of the strongest El Niño events ever seen, with extreme weather occurring on several continents. For example, North America experienced one of its warmest and wettest winters on record during

Scientists at the Climate Prediction Center of the National Weather Service foresee a 65% chance of a transition to El Niño in the summer of 2014. The good news behind this development is that if El Niño returns, the American West and Southwest could "see



major relief next winter from the long-lasting drought," climatologist Bill Patzert, of NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory. "Further, the very frigid winter in the upper tier of the U.S this past winter could do a flip to mild next winter."

This new El Niño does

have a dark side for North America, however. It could establish 2014 or 2014 ars the warmest years on record as it is coupled to higher average global temperatures. The 1997-1998 El Niño caused 1998 to be one of the four warmest years on record, according to NOAA.

Game Warden Field Notes

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement reports.

• Tattletale A Smith County game warden was contacted by a local landowner on the Neches River about a driver in a truck with noisy pipes shooting a rifle and shining a light across his pasture. Shortly after the warden began to observe the area, the truck returned and after a brief chase, the subjects were stopped. After the warden questioned the passenger, the driver admitted to shooting at some wild hogs. The warden called the landowner and asked him to check his property for freshly killed wildlife. While the warden drove back to where the hogs were shot, the passenger confessed to all of the events that night including a buck he shot. When they arrived, the driver, who held the brand new spotlight, said they "may have shot a hog." Then, after seeing the buck next to the landowner's vehicle, the driver hung his head and said "Sir, can I tell you something...We

shot that deer." The subjects were arrested on eight charges ranging from littering to hunting without the consent of a landowner.

• Gus's Nose Knows A Brazos County game warden received a call from Bryan Police Department requesting that Gus the patrol service dog sniff a vehicle. When the game warden and Gus arrived at the location, they went straight to work searching the outside of the vehicle. Gus indicated two separate times on the driver's side rear door handle. A police officer searched the vehicle and found a bag of marijuana in the rear door pocket. Charges pending for possession of marijuana.

· Fish are Friends, not Bait Two game wardens were patrolling the Navidad River checking for recreational fishing and water safety violations during a local catfish tournament undersized crappie. They when they found a trotline holding several blue catfish. They watched the trotline from a distance and later that afternoon, three fishermen returned to check their line and were greeted by the wardens. The fishermen were questioned and asked if they were using the

catfish as bait, but the men denied baiting their line with the game fish. The wardens explained that they had taken pictures of the catfish and the fishermen then admitted to baiting the trotline. The three men were issued citations for using game fish as bait.

· Bragging Brings Trouble A Zapata County game warden received information from a partner, who was fishing on his day off, about some bow fishermen who said they had shot an alligator gar and one black bass. The warden located the boat that was described and after a brief water safety check, he found multiple water safety violations along with one illegally taken black bass. Cases and restitution pending.

• It Wasn't Me Two Taylor County game wardens received a call about a man at Lake Fort Phantom with began to patrol the lake and made contact with the man, who said he had caught a few fish but not many. A fish basket was located nearby that contained seven crappie- four of which were undersized. The man claimed he leaves his fish basket at that location and

sometimes people generously leave fish in it for him. Citations were issued for undersized crappie.

• Filet O'Charges A Williamson County game warden received an Operation Game Thief call about a group of people cast-netting largemouth bass in the San Gabriel River. The warden found a woman filleting a largemouth bass and three men using casting nets. Charges and civil restitution are pending.

Sometimes Shouldn't Let the Good Times Roll A Montgomery County game warden responded to a call from the county sheriff's office about a vehicle seen swerving into oncoming traffic and off the edge of the road. The warden found the vehicle at a red light before it entered the highway staying on the shoulder of the road. When the car began to swerve, the warden stopped the vehicle and found it occupied by a man, his wife and three children. The driver staggered when he walked, used the car to maintain his balance and smelled strongly of alcohol. While speaking to the warden, the driver leaned heavily on the car and made it roll forward a

small distance. The warden checked inside and saw that while the driver had turned the vehicle off, never placed it in park. The man was arrested for driving while intoxicated with child pas-



Multiple cases for no fishing licenses, minor in possession/consumption of alcohol, and contributing/ purchasing alcohol to minors are pending.

· Flying Fish A Williamson County game warden patrolling Lake Georgetown saw six fishermen side-by-side at the Overlook Park. Once one of the men saw the warden, he threw his rod on the ground and a plastic bag onto some rocks. The warden spoke to the man and asked to see his fishing license, which he was unable to produce. Six feet away, a white bass caught the warden's eye and another white bass began to wiggle out of the plastic bag. A total of 11 white bass were confiscated. Citations and civil restitution are pending.
