## Land Bank Loans Show Increase

A greater volume of Land Bank loans was closed in Texas during 1946 than in any year since 1935, according to H. C. Cotton of Clyde, president of the Citizens National Farm Loan Association, and Secretary-Treasurer Leslie Bryant, who attended a conference of NFLA leaders held in San Angelo this week.

"This increase in loans indicates a desire of landowners to put their financing on a long-term basis and tie down today's low interest rates," Mr. Bryant said.

At a meeting in San Angelo, reports showed that the Land Bank has practically completed its program of decentralizing loan servicing functions begun 5 years ago. The result is that today most of the business farmers and ranchers have with the Land Bank can be transacted with their own home association. Operations of the local associations and plans for the annual stockholders' meeting of the Federal Land Bank of Houston in February were discussed.

The Federal Land Bank of Houston is completely owned by Texas farmers and ranchers through the 143 local national farm loan associations, Mr. Bryant said. The Land Bank, with no government funds of any kind in it, now has combined capital surplus, and reserves amounting to more than \$43,000,000. This is in addition to approximately \$6,000,000 in reserves and surplus of the associations in their own local accounts.

## Legion Hut Is Dedicated November 11th



Speakers referred to the formal opening of the new Legion Hut in Baird last Tuesday, Nov. 11th, as the "realization of a dream of many years." Legionnaires began their efforts to have a "home of their own" immediately after World War I, but it took the combined efforts of the veterans of both wars to make the building a reality. The Legion hut is located in southeast Baird on a large plot of land. The structure of concrete tile was built at a cost of \$12,000 of which more than \$8,000 has already been paid.

The Armistice Day program to dedicate the new building opened at 10:30 a. m. with Billy Mac Jobe giving the invocation. Judge B. H. Freeland, master of ceremonies, asked the audience of some four hundred people who had gathered there from all sections of the county, to rise and face to the west to pay a silent tribute to their buddies who gave their life for their country. Judge Freeland expressed the thanks of the American Legion to all who had helped to finance the new hut.

Judge B. L. Russell made a brief talk in which he stated that the "Legion is a symbol of patriotism. Patriotism is loyalty to God, loyalty to government, loyalty to each other."

District Commander of the 5th District of Texas, J. R. Gleaton, of Stamford, made a touching address. He stated that "This Armistice Day is a day in which we should remember our less fortunate buddies who gave their lives for their country, and those on hospital beds. The American Legion is the key service club of every community." He urged every ex-service man and woman in this section to join the Legion post.

Mr. Freeland called Fred Heyser to the speaker's stand and introduced him as Callahan county's No. 1 service officer, paying a tribute of praise for the unselfish work he has done for the service men of this county. Mr. Heyser said, "the completion of this hut is our dream come true. We have worked toward this end since 1919, but it took the young men to get the job done. We old men of the first war just kinda' helped the young ones to keep on the trail."

Judge Milburn S. Long of the Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland paid a beautiful tribute to the mothers and fathers who gave their sons and daughters in both wars. He said, "If it had not been for the isolationists and the people who did not want to spend a little money we would have gone into the recent war prepared. Many of our boys are resting today on foreign fields who might have come back one more to embrace their dear old mothers and dads had they been properly trained before going into battle. It is our duty to see to it that America remains free. There are enemies within who believe in a different kind of government than ours, and who are working to destroy the American way of life. We should uphold the American way. . . I will say that I believe our school teachers should believe in the Christian way of life and accept the Bible just as it is written, before they are permitted to teach our children. Every citizen should arm himself with a poll tax and shoulder the responsibility of our government." He called the American Legion a glorious organization and said "you can't buy the right to wear that emblem."

At this point in the program the master of ceremonies recognized a number of people present and invited anyone who wished to speak. He introduced Jimmie Settle and the Baird school band that furnished music for the occasion.

Clyde White, a Legionnaire since World War I, told a bit of history of the Legion hut, stating that the veterans of the recent war had put the cap-stone on the work that had been started thirty years ago. He praised the work of the Legion Auxiliary and introduced the president, Mrs. O. C. Yarbrough.

District Judge J. R. Black was introduced as the speaker of the day. Mr. Freeland stated in his introduction that he did not know anyone who did more for the war effort than did Judge Black.

Judge Black began his splendid address by stating that "I do not know what would be more appropriate on a beautiful day like this than to meet here in this beautiful building and dedicate it to our sons and daughters who served in the war, and to observe this Armistice Day in memory of those who gave their life for this country." Judge Black stated that the "sorriest life in the world to solve differences is with wars." His solution is to "work toward peace, be prepared. . . weakness invites war." He pointed an accusing finger at high rents, unreasonable profits by big business, as being un-American. He upheld the Marshall plan to feed Europe, and appealed to true American people to keep this country like the boys wanted it to be when they returned from the war. His splendid address ended his expressed wish, "May our motto forever be In God We Trust."

The Gold Star mothers and fathers were recognized by the master of ceremonies and Post Commander Randall Jackson spoke briefly to state that the work to erect the Legion was done not by the young men nor by the older members, but by all of Eugene Bell Post No. 82. Rev. W. B. Swim pronounced the benediction before the call was made for everyone to gather at the barbecue pits for a big dinner served by the Legionnaires. In the afternoon the crowd attended a football game and a grand ball was held in the Legion hut that night as part of the opening program.

### PRINCELY HOST

The Star editor and wife reached Bangs early Friday Oct. 31 when we drove there to attend the football game between our Bears and the Bangs Dragons. Of course, the first spot we would land was at the Brown County Gazette office. Editor Forrest Kyle received us in royal fashion and carried out the role of the ideal host throughout our stay in Bangs. After visiting his neat and smooth operating print shop for an hour, Mr. Kyle took us to supper at the town's leading cafe. That was about the cleanest cafe we have even been in, and the cleanliness was carried out in the food that was served. The cooks were clean and the waitresses were polite and courteous — real American people. I wish I had seen the name of the cafe, but didn't. I have looked through several issues of the Bangs paper, but their name is not listed among the ads, so when you go to Bangs you might ask the editor.

The Brown County Gazette has been published at Bangs for nearly twenty-five years. Editor Kyle has had the paper for the past seven years. It is a good-looking paper, six pages, seven columns to the page, and it is filled with live local advertisements proving the loyalty of the home town merchants. Besides publishing the home town newspaper, the shop also prints the school papers for Howard-Payne and Daniel Baker colleges at Brownwood. The job department also runs full time to turn out printed forms for the town's business houses. There seems to be a great degree of home town loyalty at Bangs in this respect. As a result, Bangs is a growing town in spite of the fact that it is

only eight miles from Brownwood.

The population of Bangs has increased from about seven hundred to thirteen hundred in the past five years. We drove over the city to see fine new additions opening up all around. New homes outnumber old ones. Mr. Kyle gives credit to the town's development to the pipeline that was built from Lake Brownwood at a cost of \$60,000 five or six years ago. The next step now is to install a city sewer system which will require many miles of sewer pipe to serve the residents in all precincts of the town.

Bangs' slogan is "The Biggest Little Town in Texas," and when you drive through the business district and then look over the residential district you readily agree with that slogan as being most appropriate. A bank was opened in Bangs by a few public spirited citizens June 26, 1947, this year. It is a First State Bank and its assets amount to \$803,959.23. The bank has loans out to the amount of \$216,708.72. On inquiry we learned that almost all of this money was loaned to local citizens on projects that tend to develop business generally in Bangs.

Editor Kyle went with us to the game. As we approached the rock portals that form the Memorial Stadium's entrance, press courtesies were graciously extended and we passed through the gate as guests of Superintendent Newton. We spent the first half of the game on the Bangs side of the field, and to return the favor, Mr. Kyle watched his team get beat from our side of the field. Good sportsmanship was the key-note throughout the game between the teams and among the fans. We were impressed with the dedication ceremonies at the half and the fine work done by Bangs citizens to erect the Memorial stadium in a year's time. We came home with a 40 to 7 victory and memories of a delightful evening spent with the Bangs people.

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
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
