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

Knox County to partner with the Texas Plains Trails Region

BENJAMIN — Knox County officials have agreed to become partners with the Texas Plains Trail Region. The County voted to join the region during the last regular session of Commissioners Court. The motion passed 5-0.

The partnership will come at an annual cost of \$500 to Knox County, but the tourism benefits of being included in the region will far out-weigh the initial costs. The annual tourism benefits awarded to partnering counties through all of the TPTR's sites and programs is worth roughly \$50,000 according to the Texas Historical Commission's website.

Judge Travis Floyd also agreed with the partnership and urged the court to participate.

"The Texas Plains Trail Region asks us to partner

Texas sales tax holiday is Aug. 8-10

AUSTIN — Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reminds shoppers they can save money on certain items priced under \$100 during the state's annual sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, August 8-10.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales tax, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"Families gearing up for the new school year will not pay any sales tax for many back-to-school items ranging from pens to blue jeans," Combs said. "When the backto-school list is long and the money is short, it can be difficult for Texas families. We hope this tax break will help ease that burden."

Lists of apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax free can be found on the Comptroller's website at TexasTaxHoliday.org.

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$82.7 million in state and local sales taxes during the Sales Tax Holiday.The tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.



KC 911 Office to receive upgrade

KNOX CITY — The Knox County 911 Office will be undergoing a remodel over the next couple of months. This will be done in an effort to give the workers more space to move and operate more effectively.

The remodel will include several enhancements. Foam insulation for comfort will be added, along with the dispatch being moved to the north wall for efficiency. Extra storage and filing cabinets will also be added, along with book shelves and employee lockers for extra security.

A concrete reinforced dividing wall will be knocked down so new vinyl flooring and lay-in lights may be installed. Oak trim will also be applied on all doors and windows as well with new wiring for a new breaker box. The bathroom will also be relocated.

Nicki Ledesma, the Knox County 911 Office Director, was excited about the proposal and even drew up a diagram of how the finished remodeling would look and what the costs would be. Apparently, the county will pay for initial construction, only to be latter reimbursed by the state.

"This is just a rough draft on how we want things to look after all the construction is completed and the only cost to the county will be moving the radio equip-


Hall. Mrs. Williams is sur-

KNOX CITY — It's that time of the year, the sun is shining, the weather is getting warmer, and the weeds are growing.

The City of Knox City is starting the summer mowing and cleaning routine.

The City of Knox City Code (Section 217.002 of the Texas Local Government Code) states "No person, owning, claiming, leasing, occupying, or having supervision or control of any real property, occupied or unoccupied, within the city limits of the City of Knox City, Texas, shall permit or allow any stagnant or unwholesome water, filth, carrion, weeds, rubbish, rubble, brushy, lumber building materials, refuse, junk, machinery or garbage, or impure or unwholesome matter of any kind, or objectionable, unsightly matter of whatever nature to accumulate or remain on such real property, or Premises, or within any easement area on such real property of Premises or upon any adjacent right-of-way for streets of alleys between the property line of such real property or Premises and where the paved surface of the street or alleys begins.

The City of Knox City can help you with your yard and property. If you have had your yard mowed by the city in the past or would like to have the city mow your yard for a fee of \$100 per lot each month, please call City Hall at (940) 658-3313.

This also includes "Junk Vehicles." "If you have an old car in your yard that doesn't run or is just sitting there please try to get that taken care of as soon as possible," a city spokesperson said. "If you need assistance in finding the vehicle a new home contact Knox City Police Department as we can assist you with this problem.

"In addition we would also like to remind everyone to make sure that your house number is clearly visible from the road. This is also a city ordinance and it helps to make sure that in times of emergency we can find your home quickly and without delay."

The Knox City Police Department reminds residents that the citizens of Knox City are the first line of defense against crime. If you see anything suspicious, out of place, or illegal activity going on, please do not hesitate to call 911, the Knox County Sherriff's Office Dispatch at (940) 459-2211, or the Knox City Police Department at (940) 658-3414. New law requires farmers and ranchers to show proof of eligibility for plates, excess weight permits

A new state law requires farmers and ranchers to show their state comptroller-issued Texas Agricultural or Timber Exemption Registration number before obtaining farm license plates and/or temporary excess weight permits at the Knox County tax office. "The law will help ensure no one can infringe on the privileges extended to our qualified farmers and ranchers who deserve them," said Mitzi Welch, the Knox County tax assessor-collector.

"Unfortunately, as the state has grown so have the number of reports of people abusing the farm plate and permit privileges."

The new law will weed out those taking advantage of the system that offers farmers and ranchers reduced vehicle registration and some sale tax fee exemptions.

"But to do that we will now have to ask farmers and ranchers to show us their Texas Agricultural or Timber Exemption Registration number, which we can verify on the state comptroller's website." "So please be sure to bring your Texas Agriculture or Timber Registration card number to the county tax office when you are applying or renewing your farm plates or applying for a temporary excess weight permit for farm motor vehicles, trailers and semitrailers."

Vehicles that do not quality for farm plates include regular passenger vehicles; those used for gainful employment (driving to and from work) or for hire; vehicles owned by farmer cooperatives; and ones used to transport livestock for non-retail purposes.

Types of farm plates include truck, truck tractor, and trailer/ semitrailer.



The geniuses at NASA have made a bold prediction, one that would change the world: Humans will find life on other planets in the Milky Way within 20 years. NASA outlined a plan Monday to search for

life using a variety of telescopes including the Transiting Exoplanet Sur-

veying Satellite, launching in 2017. NASA says 100 million

worlds in our own Milky Way galaxy may host alien life.

"Just imagine the moment, when we find potential signatures of life. Imagine the moment when the world wakes up and the human race realizes that its long loneliness in time and space may be over — the

possibility we're no longer alone in the universe," said Matt Mountain, director and Webb telescope scientist at the Space Telescope Science Institute in Baltimore, which plans to launch the James Webb Space Telescope in 2018.

"What we didn't know five years ago is that perhaps 10 to 20 percent of stars around us have Earth-size planets in the habitable zone," added Mountain. "It's within our grasp to pull off a discovery that will change the world forever."

So, NASA says there are 100 million worlds within the Milky Way galaxy which can sustain complex alien life forms. If they're right, you bet it will change the world. The question is, will it change Mother Earth for the better?

What if one of these world's needs water? What if they need cheap labor? What if they have the ability to not only get here, but take and do what they want?

Let's say NASA is correct in their assessment that it's only a matter of time before we phone E.T.

We already know through our own dealings that not everyone is nice. To think for one second that out of 100 million worlds that all of the intelligent life we discover is going to be nice is absurd.

"I think in the next 20 years we will find out we are not alone in the universe," said NASA astronomer Kevin Hand.

"Do we believe there is life beyond Earth?" asked former astronaut and NASA Administrator Charles Bolden. "I would venture to say that most of my colleagues here today say it is improbable that in the limitless vastness of the universe we humans stand alone."

And we thought the big topic were the thousands of illegal aliens flooding across the border. Now we find out that we have have all of these new aliens we're going to have to worry about. Wow.

There you have it – a reflection of roles we play in crises. I think I'm a fiddle.


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Stewart, Clayton to wed

Texas sets dove, teal seasons

Dove hunters will have more opportunity later in the season with dates and bag limits recently finalized by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD).

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has approved the 2014-2015 Texas dove season, including a 70-day season and 15-bird daily bag statewide, and a 16day early teal and Canada goose season.

The traditional Sept. 1 dove season opening day in the North and Central Zones remains; this year falling on Labor Day Monday. However, the first segment in those zones will be shorter than last season, closing on Monday, Oct. 20. The season will reopen Friday, Dec. 19 and run through Wednesday, Jan. 7, 2015, in the North and Central Zones.

In the South Zone and Special Whitewinged Dove Area, the first segment will be shortened by five days compared to last year, and those days would be added to the end of the second segment. The South Zone opens Friday, Sept. 19 and runs through Monday, Oct. 20. The

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second segment will run Friday, Dec. 19 through Sunday, Jan. 25, 2015.

The daily bag limit for doves statewide is 15 and the possession limit is 45.

The Special White-winged Dove Area will be restricted to afternoon only (noon to sunset) hunting the first two full September weekends on Sept. 6-7 and 13-14. Hunting in this area will reopen Friday, Sept. 19 and continue through Monday, Oct. 20, and then reopen Friday, Dec. 19 through Wednesday, Jan. 21, 2015. During the early two weekends, the daily bag limit is 15 birds, to include not more than two mourning doves and two white-tipped doves. Once the general season opens, the aggregate bag limit will be 15 with no more than two white-tipped doves.

A 16-day statewide early teal and Eastern Zone Canada goose season will run Saturday, Sept. 13 through Sunday, Sept. 28. The daily bag on teal remains six, with a possession limit of 18. Bag limit for Canada geese will be three and a possession limit of 6 in the Eastern Zone only.

El Niño - A Pause for Refreshment

Editor's Note: This week Evelyn Browning-Garriss, author of The Browning Newsletter, shares with us an update on El Niño: what it is, where it is and what its development would mean for rain in Texas and Oklahoma.

The developing El Niño is taking a pause.

Basically, an El Niño is when the Central and Eastern portions of the tropical Pacific are almost one degree Fahrenheit (technically 0.5°C) warmer than average. This changes weather around the world. During April and May, these areas in the Pacific warmed very rapidly. Some experts even predicted that the event would be as huge as the 1997/1998 El Niño and that was the largest one in 400 years! Now, however, the western portions of the El Niño zone have cooled slightly.

What does this mean?

The Pacific is big, complex and filled with a lot of different currents. Around the equator, there are a number of small patterns, called MJOs (Madden Julien Oscillations) that drift from west to east. Some are hot and others are cool. One of the cool ones has

entered the Central Pacific. It is cooling the western part of the El Niño zone. Next, it will drift east and cool the eastern portion of the El Niño. Then it will go away. It never stays in one place very long.

Right behind it is a warm MJO that will reheat the El Niño. El Niños always fluctuate when these MJOs ripple through them.

El Niños produce strong winds that suppress Atlantic hurricanes. The weakening of the conditions allowed Hurricane Arthur to develop and dash up the East Coast. The event should grow strong again in August and September, providing some protection during the peak of the Atlantic hurricane season.

At the same time, El Niños typically produce dry conditions in the Southern Plains during summer. Having the event delayed is good news for Texas and parts of Oklahoma.

Scientists around the world still agree the El Niño is on schedule to arrive and peak in winter, when it usually delivers strong rain to California, the Southwest and the Central and Southern Great Plains.

It may be weakening now, but it is hard to keep a good El Niño down.



DPS Inspects 8,700 Commercial Vehicles During Roadcheck

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) inspected 8,714 commercial motor vehicles during a three-day inspection effort last month as part of Roadcheck 2014. DPS Commercial Vehicle Enforcement troopers, specially trained Highway Patrol troopers and civilian inspectors joined forces in June during the annual inspection initiative aimed at enhancing commercial motor vehicle safety.

Approximately 21 percent (1,858) of the 18wheelers, buses and other commercial vehicles

inspected were placed out of service for a variety of safety violations until appropriate repairs can be made. Issues with brakes and defective vehicle lighting were among the most common infractions that led to out-of-service violations.

Additionally, drivers were checked for compliance with state and federal laws, and 263 drivers were placed out of service. Among the violations were improper logging of duty time, driving over the maximum number of hours, and failing to have the proper type of driver license for the vehicle being driven. In all, DPS issued 2,715 citations and more than 24,943 warnings.
