Texas' voter ID law declared unconstitional

quiring voters to present additional photo identification was declared unconstitutional by U.S. District Judge Nelva Gonzales Ramos last week. She ruled the law was intended to be racially discriminatory, like a poll tax meant to deliberately suppress voter turnout by minorities.

What has caused confusion has been the Supreme Court's recent rulings that allowed similar ID restrictions to remain in force in North Carolina and Ohio, but blocked one in Wisconsin. None

of the constitutionality of such laws, but instead are about the timing of if they can be used in this year's election.

Earlier, the high court struck down the part of the law that required nine mostly Southern states with a history of discrimination to seek approval before changing election laws.

Along with the state races, Knox County votes will be voting for two contested positions with democrat Charles Griffin of Benjamin going up against republican incumbent Travis Floyd of Munday for county judge and longtime county and district court clerk Annette Offutt, democrat from Munday, running against deputy clerk Lisa Cypert, republican from Munday.

Floyd regained a chance to keep his judge's position in a runoff election back in May. He had finished second to Jim Dillon by a 44-36 percent margin in the primary, but Dillon then decided to discontinue his effort prior to the second vote.

In Precincts 201 and 202, republican Daniel Godsey of Knox City, a former commissioner, is running against democrat Kim Sealey of Benjamin. Godsey got the nod over challenger Craig Wilde while Sealey was picked over Fred Cash in the primaries earlier.

In Precinct 401, voters will choose between republican Nathan Urbanczyk of Goree and democrat Robert Bowen of Munday, who were unopposed in the primaries.

Rosie Ake of Munday and Augustin (Augie) Rodriquez of Knox City are running unopposed as county treasurer and justice of the peace, respectively.

In Precincts 201 and 302, there will be a separate ballot for voters in Truscott and Vera to cast ballots to ratify the Crowell ISD's adopted tax rate of 1.17.

Knox gets much needed rain, but also hail damage

A pair of cold fronts brought cooler weather and much-needed rain to Knox County last Friday and Sunday nights, but the latter storms also brought some hail that did cause some damage.

It may take a few days for the runoff from the weekend rains to reach the lake, but there was plenty of standing water in the fields here in Knox County.

Measurements of over one-inch were reported by many in Knox County.

Friday's thunderstorms and lightning forced more than 90-minute delays for both the Paducah-Knox City and the Hamlin-Munday football games Friday, creating havoc all over North Texas gridirons.

Sunday's thunderstorms didn't produce as much rain, but hail, ranging from marble to golf ball size, was reported in Munday, Knox City didn't seem to be as hard hit by hail.

Higher temperatures were expected to return late in the week with no additional rain in the forecast.

Forecasters still expect an increase for moisture in November, December and January.

Commissioners OK

jail contracts

BENJAMIN-The Knox County Commissioners approved jail contracts with Baylor and King Counties to accept their offenders for \$35 a day and with Foard County for \$30 a day, adding a reimbursement of 55 cents a mile for transportation, during their regular monthly meeting here Monday afternoon in the County Assembly Room.

The commissioners also approved a motion to offer the position of road hand to Pete Roca, accepted the resignation of Heath Turner as constable and approved Rhonda Cooke to serve on the Knox County Child Welfare Board, replacing Gayle Morgan.

In addition, they approved the Texas County and District Retirement System for 2015 at the rate of 7%, but turned down a \$50,000 grant for a vehicle to be used to transport veterans to hospitals, citing additional costs related to hiring a driver and maintaining the

vehicle.

After hearing a report from Mitzi Welch, the tax assessor collector, the commissioners went along with her recommendation to nominate Patsy Gonzales of Knox City and Larry Thompson of Munday for one-year terms on the Knox County Tax Appraisal District board of directors.

Looking at the final report on the 2013-2014 budget, Judge Travis Foyd reported everything looked good as departments stayed within their budgets on expenses, except for inmates' medical expenses, adding that it's hard to predict how many will get sick and it was more than made up with \$40,000 exra on the revenue side.

The commissioners discussed the Knox County Rural Water Supply Corporation's intent to provide water utility service in Haskell, King, Knox and Stonewall and the possibility of purchasing a vehicle for use at the Aging Center, but took no action.





The 501 To toss or not to toss?

f I was something in another life, I wasn't a produce manager, not L that I believe in other lives. But if I did, that's what I wasn't.

I do believe in produce managers. Somebody has to do it. Better them than me.

Sure, it'd be fun to line up squashes in perfect order and face all apples the same direction, but it's the other side of the job I wouldn't relish. To toss or

not to toss? That's always the question. Those decisive produce guys don't hesitate. I've seen them in action. I couldn't do it. Too many decisions.

I'm not good at picking cantaloupes either, starting with my first real job cantaloupe picking. All of us kids signed on to pick for the late Eula Stowe,

a no-nonsense truck farmer who dressed her scarecrow in her husband's khakis, making for a very realistic scarecrow. Surprisingly enough, she required Social Security numbers, so I got one. It's my forever souvenir of a job I didn't much like.

Every morning bright and early (no 14-year-old likes early) we hopped on a trailer towed by Mrs. Stowe and headed to the cantaloupe field to start picking. Her young granddaughter rode on the tractor and, from her superior position next to one fender, she pointed out cantaloupes we were missing. Good for her.

Knowing which ones to pick was enough of a challenge without the unsolicited advice. Then when we ended up at the cantaloupe-sorting carport, there were more decisions. That's how I remember it. Decisions, decisions, decisions.

Now, when I gaze at a pile of grocery store cantaloupes, I'm no better at picking which one to take. I handle them and analyze the netting. The other day I smelled the stem end of one, not knowing what I was smelling for, but somebody said do it. Me, the professional cantaloupe picker, still baffled by it all, finally choosing one to take home at random.

Decisions and gambles. It's life. A friend of mine, who shall remain anonymous, ended up retiring early because his psychiatrist told him to find work that didn't require him to make decisions. At least that's what he told me. I suspect it's true.

Bottom line, here's what I think: If a CEO makes big bucks, it's because he or she makes the really big decisions. KNOX CITY-In a wild offensive showdown where the teams combined for 1,081 yards, the Knox City Greyhounds, ranked 13th among Class A Division I schools, bounced back in the second half to score an 79-75 victory over the Paducah Dragons, ranked No. 5 among Division II schools, here Friday night in a game delayed more than an hour and half by lightning.



Moguls' late upset bid falls a yard short, 30-27

MUNDAY-The Munday Moguls ran out of time with a late drive, falling inches short, allowing the Hamlin Pied Pipers, the District 7-2A favorites, to avoid an upset here Friday night, 30-27, at Scruggs Stadium in a game delayed an hour and 40 minutes by lightning and heavy rains.

The Moguls converted a fourth down for the fifth time in nine tries on a pass from Alfonso Nunez to Chandler McCombs for five yards to inside the Hamlin one-yard line with 25 seconds left. "If he had the ball in his left arm, it would have been a score," said Coach Patrick Corcoran.

Nunez was then stopped short of the end zone on first down. He spiked the ball to stop the clock. On third down, the Pied Pipers defense actually downed him before he got to the line of scrimmage to leave the smaller than usual home crowd disappointed.,

"I was proud of way our boys played," Corcoran. "They executed the game plan and held Tyrone Johnson in check for most of the night. He did get away for that one long gain."

Corcoran noted that a couple of big plays made the difference between winning and losing, pointing to Johnson's late run, an early pass where the defender was wide open and to the TD pass to end the first half. "They might not have been able to get that play off if not for an injury," he said.

The Moguls got on the scoreboard first after Holt Bivens intercepted a Caymon Georges pass to halt a Hamlin opening drive. Setting up shop at their own 30, the Moguls drove 70 yards in 12 plays with Nunez faking a handoff and going the final three yards on fourth and goal. The Moguls converted an earlier fourth down on a 15-yard Nunez pass to McCombs. Diegeo Reyes added the PAT kick for a 7-0 lead with 3:49 left in the first quarter.

The Pied Pipers didn't waste any time in matching this as Georges, scrambled to his right, and found Codie Perry all alone behind the Munday defenders for a 53-yard TD pass. Bailey Stegemoeller's PAT tied the game.

Using their time-consuming ground game, the Moguls drove 71 yards in 13 plays, converting another fourth down when Day'veon escaped for 15 yards to the four. Nunez hit Temerick Reagins three plays later, but Reyes' kick was wide left.

When it appeared Tyrone Johnson might be stopped on a fourth down short of the first down, he reversed directions to run 27 yards set up Hamlin with first and goal at the Munday 3. Georges faked on Johnson and ran into the end zone to tie the game. Stegemoeller's kick was low, but carried the uprights to put Hamlin up, 14-13. It appeared that's the way the half would end when Hamlin lost a fumble deep in Munday territory, but on the Moguls' first play, Nunez couldn't find a receiver and retreated back into

the end zone where a desperation effort to get rid of the ball led to illegal grounding and a safety.

Setting up at the Munday 41 after the free kick with only 61 seconds left, Georges went to the air, converting a fourth down pass to Perry for 15 yards and then throwing a perfect strike to Matthew Fields for 15 yards on the final play of the first half. Stegemoeller made it 23-13

Nunez left the field limping in the final minute and wasn't on the field for Munday's first possession of the third quarter that ran out of gas at the Hamlin 25.

Nunez returned after Hamlin had to give up the ball at the Munday 20 and showed no effects of the earlier injury, going 26 yards. Then Dockins found daylight around the right side for 54 yards and a TD. Faking a PAT kick, Bivins hit Reagins for the two-pointer to cut the deficit to 23-21.

Facing fourth and two from its own 34, Coach Corcoran rolled the dice with no luck, giving the Pied Pipers a short field at the Moguls' 35. The Pied Pipers moved into the red zone, but Georges failed on three pass attempts and then was sacked by Reagins.

Given new life, the Moguls covered 74 yards in 10 plays with Nunez going the final 10 yards. However, Nunez saw his pass for the two-pointer knocked down. The Moguls converted another fourth down near midfield when Nunez set up to punt, but got off a pass that Reagins tipped and then caught for a 26-yard gain.

Johnson, who had been held way below his usual rushing average, found room down the left sidelines, breaking a tackle near the Munday 25 to race 61 yards for what proved to be the winning points 19 seconds later.

Taking over at its own 36 after the kickoff, Munday moved into position to pull off the upset, but ran out of time as Hamlin's defense rose to the challenge.

In the game's final 10 minutes, the Moguls ran 25 plays to one for the Pied Pipers.

Elsewhere in 7-2A, Electra Tigers established itself as a definite title contender with a convincing 41-0 win over Haskell as Markesis Lee cothe, Harrold and Northside. scored on runs of 60, 44 and 25 yards and Petro-TD and four interceptions to hold off Seymour, 21-18.

The Moguls will have the challenge of trying to contain Lee this week on the road. "He's got great speed just like Johnson," Corcoran said, indicating that the Moguls needed to execute a similar game plan as last week's, keeping the Tigers' offense off the field as long as possible.



> Be certain that the mask does not obstruct vision or hearing.

Ensure that costumes do not impede walking or driving ability.

Tips for Pedestrians (children and adults)

Before crossing a street, stop at the curb or edge of the road and look left, right and left again to be sure no cars are coming. Continue to check for traffic while on the street.

To qualify for ELAP, eligible livestock must be: Alpacas, adult or nonadult dairy cattle, beef cattle, buffalo and beefalo as well as deer, elk, emus, equine, goats, llamas, poultry, reindeer, sheep or swine.

Additionally, the livestock must ELAP provides emergency assis- have been owned 60 calendar days prior to the beginning of the drought

due to drought. Adequate livestock watering systems or facilities must have existed before the drought occurred and producers are only eligible if they do not normally transport water to the livestock

Livestock that were or would have been in a feedlot are not eligible for livestock losses resulting from transporting water and ELAP does not cover the cost of the water itself.

"I encourage livestock producers to contact the Knox County FSA to make an appointment to sign up for ELAP and to learn more about eligibility, application and documentation requirements," said Birkenfeld.

Drinking water exceeds MCL for trihalomethanes

MUNDAY—The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) has notified the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority that the drinking water being supplied to customers, including the ones in Goree, Haskell, Knox City drink water containing trihalomethanes in and Munday, has exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for total trihalomethanes.

Trihalomethanes are a group of volatile organic compounds that are formed when chlorine added to the water during treatment process for disinfection reacts with naturally-occurring organic matter in the water.

"You do not need to use an alternative water supply," said David Kuehler, general manager of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. "However, if you have health concerns, you may want to talk to your doctor or get more information about how this may affect you."

Kuehler added that some people who excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their livers, kidney or central nervous systems and may have an increased risk of getting cancer.

"We are taking the following steps to address the issue," Kuehler said. "Lowering tank levels to increase the water turnover rate and reduce water in the distribution system."

The cities are joining the North Central Texas Water Authority in posting notices for their customers.

The Class 3A competition will match Henrietta, Bowie, Breckenridge, City Vied and Holliday.


In the 4A marching contest will be Vernon, Graham, Hirschi, Iowa Park and Burkburnett.
