

Munday sweeps regional track titles

LEVELLAND—The Munday High School track teams swept the team titles in the Class 1A regional track meet here last week at South Plains College and established themselves as definite contenders for the same honors in next week's state meet in Austin by qualifying foursomes in all of the relays carrying double points.

The Moguls compiled 95 points, finishing 35 points ahead of its nearest rival Happy, while Knox County neighbor Knox City finished third with

The Mogulettes scored 118 points to finish ahead of Follett with 82, Nazareth with 52 and

Ropesville with 46. Temerick Reagins led the Moguls, winning a gold in the high jump t 6-2 and a silver in the triple jump at 43-1 and running anchor legs on all three relays.

Day'veon Dockins and Holt Bivens also advanced to Austin with seconds in the long jump (21-9 1/4) and pole vault (11-6).

Rayshaun Dockins and Zac Huffman joined Day'veon Dockins and Reagins to win the 4x 100 meter relay in 51.89. With Alfonso Nunez replacing Rayshaun and joining the other three runners, the Moguls edged Earth Springlake at the wire to take the 4x200 relay with a 1:33.51 clocking. The Moguls' foursome of Day'veon Dockins, Nunez, Heath Bivens and Reagins had to settle for second in the 4x400 relay with a 3:35.02 clocking,

The Mogulettes swept all three relays. Kimberly Shahan, Karla Taylor, Charity Hunter and Kayla Hunter combined for a 51.49 in the 4x100 meters and a 1:50.35 in the 4x200 meters. Myca Flowers joined Hunter and the Taylor sisters for a 3:35.02 in the 4x400 meters.

Janie Salinas claimed golds in the 1,600 and 3,200 meters with seasonal bests of 5:43.71 and 12:32.70, beating Izabelle Smith of Spur who had beaten her in the area race a week earlier.

Flowers captured a gold in the high jump with a 4-10 effort, winning a tiebreaker because of fewer misses t 4-8, but missed advancing in the triple jump (eighth) and 800 meters (11th).

Hunter earned a silver in the long jump with a 16-foot leap to also earn a spot in the state com-

Other Moguls competing here were Kellen Redder, 16th in 800; Raylynn Dockins, seventh in the high jump; Mitchell Lowrance, fifth in the shot put; and Dee Hemphill, 11th in the triple

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

O'Brien accepting bids to improve water system

O'BRIEN — The City of O'Brien is accepting sealed bids for improvements to its water system until 10 a.m. May 21 at City Hall in Knox City.

The project incudes the complete reconstruction of the city's main pump station, which includes two 7.5 horse power pumps; a Chorine and LAS disinfection system; along with piping, valves, electrical and controls. In addition, the 10 foot by 14 foot metal bulding which houses this equipment will be replaced.

The replacement of 67 waterservice meters, the existing 3 horse power well pump and the liquid level indicator at the city's stand pipe will also need to be included in the bid.

TCEQ warns KC about monitoring water

KNOX CITY — The City of Knox City has been notified by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality that it has violated monitoring and reporting requirements for lead and copper in the public water system for Jan. 1, 2014 to Dec. 31, 2014.

The city is working to correct the problem and samples will be taken the first week in June.



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

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
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Vo Tech Roundup gives The Paperboy students ideas for future There is no stopping Apple



Highway 277 in Archer will get new lanes

AUSTIN — Continuing to use Proposition 1 funding for the improved safety, mobility and connectivity of our great state, the Texas Transportation Commission approved 23 more projects (out of 200 planned projects) encompassing nearly \$168 million worth of roadway construction, rehabilitation and restoration.

"The Texas transportation system will see needed improvement as a result of the projects approved today," said TxDOT Executive Director LtGen Joe Weber, USMC (Ret). "By working with community leaders and local planning organizations, we have selected these projects that will help address the transportation concerns of our citizens. Texans made a strong statement in voting for Proposition 1 last November, and it is now our responsibility to ensure these funds are put to use in the most efficient and effective manner."

Specific projects awarded this month include the construction of additional lanes on US 277 in Archer County; the reconstruction and widening of FM 1637 in McLennan County; and the addition of new passing lanes on SH 176 in Andrews

In total, the 200 Proposition 1 projects will result in more than 800 miles of rehabilitated highways; nearly 500 miles of new highway lanes; 114 bridges replaced, widened or rehabilitated; and an additional 159 miles of passing lanes on rural highways. Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) and TxDOT Districts worked together and with the public to formulate the list of projects.

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Thornberry, Cornyn seek protection for landowners

WASHINGTON—U.S. Rep Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) and U.S. Sen. John Cornyn (R-TX) introduced legislation last week in the U.S. House and Senate, H.R. 2130 and S. 1153 respectively, to protect private property rights along the Red River from federal ownership claims.

By providing legal certainty to landowners, the Red River Private Property Protection Act seeks to end questions about the federal government's ownership of disput-ed land along the Red River in Wilbarger, Wichita and Clay Counties.

'Private landowners deserve absolute clarity from the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and a fair resolution to this issue," said Thornberry. "Until that happens, we will not let up in our efforts to assure landowners that their private property rights along the Red River will be protected. Our bills should be a signal that Republicans in the House and Senate will continue to fight the federal government's intrusion into people's private property. This type of overreach seems to be happening more often, but we will fight it every step of the way.

In 2013, the BLM said there are thousands of acres along the Red River on the border between Texas and Oklahoma that may be considered public domain.

Thornberry and Cornyn have been pressing the case with BLM locally and with the agency's leadership in Washington. The new legislation reflects the input they received by listening to landowners, the Texas General Land Office and many others.

"Many of these affected Texans have owned land along the Red River for generations, but are now caught up in the confu-

sion and clouded titles due to the BLM's claims." Coryn said. "This commonsense legislation establishes a process to resolve the uncertainty, and protects these taxpayers' property rights from improper federal

Sen. Ted Cruz joined his fellow Texans in supporting the measures.

The legislation will provide legal certainty to property owners along the Red River by: Commissioning a survey of the entire 116-mile stretch of contested area along the Red River using the gradient boundary survey method developed and backed by the Supreme Court to find the proper boundary

between Texas and Oklahoma. • Ordering that the survey be conducted by Licensed State Land Surveyors chosen by the Texas General Land Office, and the final survey must ultimately be approved by

· Allowing landowners who hold the proper right, title, and/or interest in the contested area to appeal any further public domain claims by BLM through an Administrative Law Judge.

· Preventing any contested land from being included in the Resource Management Plan until the survey is complete and private land is no longer subject to an appeal.

· Requiring BLM to sell off the surface rights of the remaining publicly owned land at fair market value after the proper boundary line is located and settled.

The bill also explicitly states that the interest of the states and the sovereignty rights of the federally recognized Indian tribes north of the Texas State boundary line will not be





Alex Ledesma's ball lands closest to flag in helicopter ball



BENJAMIN—Laundry—nobody's faplus tumbling, twirling and musical theatre vorite task. However, it's even more difficult when stains won't come out in the wash. What should you do?

Lorrie Coop, Family and Consumer Sciences Extension Agent in Knox County, recommends that you start by making sure damp or wet clothes are not placed in the laundry basket and left for several days.

Warm summer temperatures, high humidity, and any remaining food on clothingespecially kids' clothes—creates the perfect conditions for the growth of mildew. Mildew is a fungus and appears as dark-colored spots and splotches on textile items. When the textile is left in a warm, humid location with little or no light or air circulation, you have created the perfect condition for very difficult

Prevention is the key, advises Coop. Experts at the International Fabricare Institute suggest drying any wet textiles before placing them in the laundry and certainly not storing them dirty. Some typical items might include infants' and children's clothing, sports wear, jackets, t-shirts, kitchen textiles, towels, and other common items. Avoid tossing damp clothing in a dark laundry hamper or closet. If you can't get to the laundry immediately, hang the item in an area with good air circulation until the item is dry. Or wash the item as soon as possible, treating the soiled area with a pre-wash enzyme product.

What removes mildew? Actually, only chlorine bleach removes and kills mildew growth and stains, recommends Coop. Since not all fabrics are safely treated with bleach, preventing the growth of mildew may be a better solution than trying to remove it later and possibly ruining the item.
