Munday teams state contenders

Bond proposal headlines ballot

Headlining Saturday's election for residents of the Munday Consolidated Independent School District will be an \$8 million bond proposal. In other voting, places on the city councils and school boards are at stake.

If passed, the bond would pay for the construction of a new gym and a new junior high building, using monolithic domes, along with adding two classrooms to the elementary school and making other improvements at the schools.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. at Munday City Hall.

More than 100 had cast ballots at the Munday CISD by last Friday. Early voting ended Tuesday.

Angela Herricks and Richard Don Thompson join incumbents Ryan Cottingham, Kar-

en Longan and Trey Singleton in running for three places on the Munday City Council.

Anthony Adkins and Fred Ledesma join incumbents J.R. Hodges and Gary Schnable in a race to determine three places on the Knox City council.

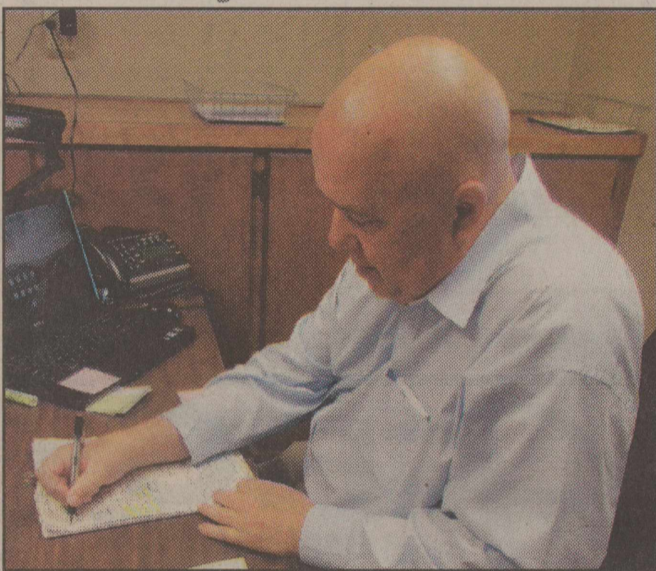
Randy Hibdon will run against current mayor Glenna Decker in Goree while Pat Wilde will have competition from Jonathan Ramirez for the place 5 position.

No election will be necessary in Benjamin after incumbent Ronnie White decided to not run again for mayor. Joy Lynn Pool was the only other candidate.

Jason Bowman, Chris Mendoza and Ida Jo Watson join incumbent Nancy Birkenfeld in running for two spots on the MCISD board of trustees.

No election will be necessary for either the Knox City-O'Brien or Benjamin school boards.

Taylor 8th in state golf

AUSTIN —Munday High senior Taylor Thompson posted 91-89-180 here at Lions Municipal Golf Course last

week to finish in eighth place in the Class 1A state golf tournament.

"I definitely didn't play how I wanted to, but that's just golf," she said. "You can't plan it. I'm thankful I had the opportunity to play at state the last two years and I am looking forward to playing at the collegiate level."

The rounds took more than six hours, but Thompson didn't think that affected her concentration. "I've played in many other tournaments that took just as long," she added.

"Taylor battled on a tough course both days," said Coach Scott Riley. "While she didn't post the numbers she had targeted, I was proud of her play. She showed some gumption by facing adversity and throwing down some marvelous shots, but ultimately couldn't grab control of the greens. I'm excited for her to build on her success as she starts a new chapter in her career at Hardin Simmons next year."

As expected, Shaley Goad of Fort Elliott repeated as the medalist, posting 77-75-152, 13 strokes ahead of Skylar Must of Richards.

Utopic claimed the team title with 395-394-789, 49 strokes in front of Robert Lee.

Happy captured the boys title with a 673 total, 51 strokes ahead of Douglas, while Luke Kinkaide of Blanket took medalist honors with 75-75-150, three better than Mitchell Downing, runnerup for the second straight year.

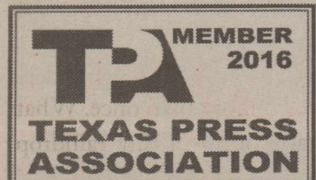

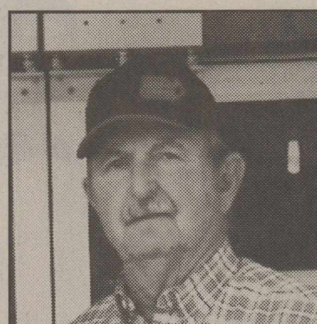

Estrada third in 300 hurdles Two Houndettes advance to state

LEVELLAND — Knox City's Anthony Estrada earned a bronze medal in the 300 meter hurdles with a 42.78, his fastest time of the year, here last Saturday at the regional track meet at South Plains College, but did not earn a wild card spot to state.

Estrada finished behind Karsten Bryan of Happy and Jonathan Michael Solis of Springlake Earth, who advanced to Austin.

The Greyhounds scored 23 points to finish 10th while their Knox County rivals from Munday claimed the championship by winning two of the relays and finishing second in the other one.

The Greyhounds' foursome of Preston Lynn, Skylar Neil, Elias Nevarez and Estrada claimed fourth in the 4x100 relay with their

fastest time of the year at 45.57, trailing Munday, Springlake Earth and Wellman-Union.

With Sheldon Baty replacing Preston Lynn and running with Neal, Nevarez and Estrada, the Hounds also placed fourth in the 4x400 relay with their fastest time of the year at 3:41.13, trailing Munday, Turkey Valley and New Home.

Ryan Heard finished sixth in the high jump with a 5-10 effort.

Three athletes picked up two gold medals. Jake Merrell of Turkey Valley won the 800 in 1:51.86 and the 1,600 in 4:30.49, Clendon Hill of Guthrie won the shot put and discus with throws of 52-9.5 and 149-5 and Martin Loewen of Wellman-Union claimed the long jump with a 20-10 effort and won the 100 in 11.26.

LEVELLAND — The Knox City Houndettes will send two athletes to the state track meet May 13-14 after finishing fourth in the regional event here at South Plains College last week.

Myca Flowers and Debra Alvarado claimed silver medals in the high jump with a leap of 4-10 and in the 300 hurdles with a time of 50.45.

Alvarado just missed qualifying in the 100 hurdles as her 18.47 earned a bronze medal. Temi Flowers also finished third in the high jump with a 4-8 effort. Neither earned wild card spots in state.

The Houndettes scored 49 points, finishing behind New Home (50), Munday (62) and Anton (83), thanks to 60 points from a sweep of the three relays.

"I was really proud of the girls and how they competed," said Coach Mindy Flowers. "All three relays ran their fastest times of the year, which is what our goal was. It has been a successful year for the program and we have many returnees for next year. We are looking to build on the successes of this track season for even more success next year."

The Houndettes' foursome of Temi Flowers, Brooke Jones, Myca Flowers and Zinziley McCrary finished fourth in the 4x400 relay with a 4:19.79 while Amy Harrington, Caitlyn Baxter, Kirsten Tuckness and Alvarado was seventh in the 4x200 relay in 1:51.21.

Other top 10 finishes for Houndettes included a fifth in shot put for Kaylie Steele, a fifth and sixth in the discus for Chloe Grimsley and Jordyn Eaton, a seventh and eighth in the 3,200 and 1,600 meters by Britney Hawkins and a seventh by Temi Flowers in the 800 meters.

Double winners for the girls were Isabelle Smith of Spur in the 1,600 and 3,200 and Mollie Mounsey of Follett in the discus and shot put. They loom as medal contenders at Austin.

The Paperboy Celebrating Cinco de Mayo

Like other days of celebration, Cinco de Mayo has grown to a party across the country.

Ever wonder what we are celebrating? The following is from his-
tory.com in regards to the Mexican National Holiday of Cinco de Mayo:

During the French-Mexican War, a poorly supplied and outnumbered Mexican army under General Ignacio Zaragoza defeats a French army attempting to capture Puebla de Los Angeles, a small town in east-central Mexico.

Victory at the Battle of Puebla represented a great moral victory for the Mexican government, symbolizing the country's ability to defend its sovereignty against threat by a powerful foreign nation.

In 1861, the liberal Mexican Benito Juarez became president of a country in financial ruin, and he was forced to default on his debts to European governments.

In response, France, Britain, and Spain sent naval forces to Veracruz to demand reimbursement.

Britain and Spain negotiated with Mexico and withdrew, but France, ruled by Napoleon III, decided to use the opportunity to carve a dependent empire out of Mexican territory.

Late in 1861, a well-armed French fleet stormed Veracruz, landing a large French force and driving President Juarez and his government into retreat.

Certain that French victory would come swiftly in Mexico, 6,000 French troops under General Charles Latrille de Lorencez set out to attack Puebla de Los Angeles.

From his new headquarters in the north, Juarez rounded up a rag-tag force of loyal men and sent them to Puebla. Led by Texas-born General Zaragoza, the 2,000 Mexicans fortified the town and prepared for the French assault.

On the fifth of May, 1862, Lorencez drew his army, well-provisioned and supported by heavy artillery, before the city of Puebla and began their assault from the north.

The battle lasted from daybreak to early evening, and when the French finally retreated they had lost nearly 500 soldiers to the fewer than 100 Mexicans killed.

Although not a major

strategic victory in the overall war against the French, Zaragoza's victory at Puebla tightened Mexican resistance, and six years later France withdrew.

The same year, Austrian Archduke Ferdinand Maximilian, who had been installed as emperor of Mexico by Napoleon in 1864, was captured and executed by Juarez' forces.

Puebla de Los Angeles, the site of Zaragoza's historic victory, was renamed Puebla de Zaragoza in honor of the general.

Today, Mexicans celebrate the anniversary of the Battle of Puebla as Cinco de Mayo, a national holiday in Mexico.

LEVELLAND—The Munday Mogulettes had to

Coach Cory Stephenson will have two individuals advancing to the state meet in Austin as Karla Taylor captured the gold medal in the 400 meters in 59.49 while sister Kayla earned a silver medal with a 26.91 in the 200 meters. The Mogulettes will have a pair of relay units competing in Austin, too.

The 4x100 unit of Skylar Gomez, Karla Taylor, Charity Hunter and Kayla Taylor clocked a 51.63 to finish second to Anton's 51.28.

The 4x400 foursome of Kayla Taylor, Hunter, Emily Scott and Karla also earned silver medals with a 4:16.02 clocking, trailing only Anton.

In addition, Kimberly Shahan, Hunter, Scott and Gomez picked up points for a fifth in the 4x200 relay.

"I am very pleased with the things we got to state," said Stephenson. "The girls are excited to go and run and see what we can do down there. The best I can tell the field at the state meet is as fast as its ever been since they split the 1A division. It will be fun to watch the teams compete."

Picking up points for the Mogulettes at regional were Hunter with a fourth in the long jump at 15-6.75 and Kristen Kuehler with a fourth in the discus with a throw of 111-1.5.

Top 10 finishes were accomplished by Shahan in the 100 meters and Kasey Lowrance in the shot put.

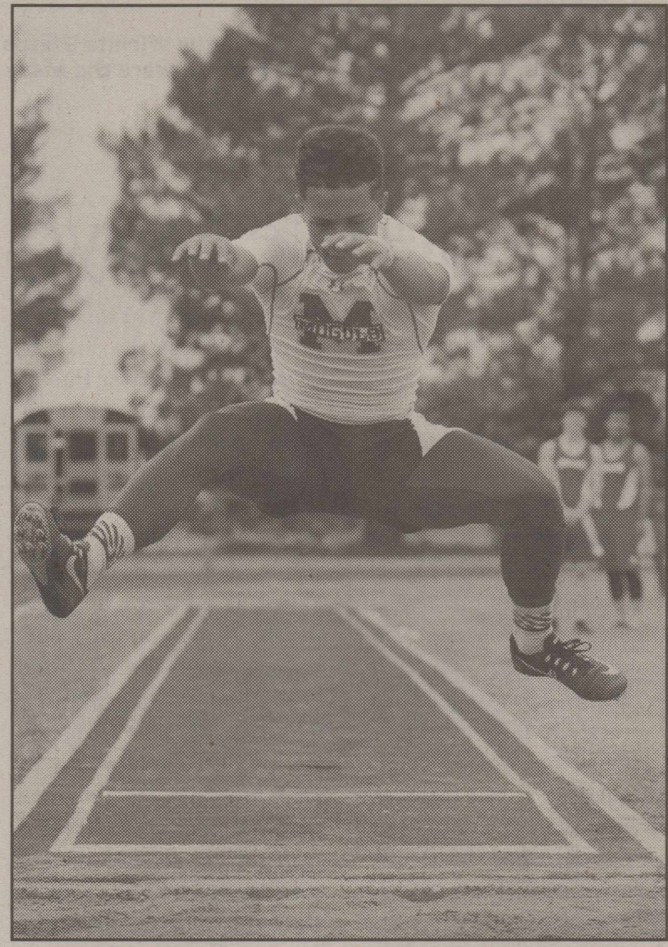
Double winners in the girls competition were Mollie Mounsey of Follett in

LEVELLAND The Munday Moguls established themselves as one of the contenders for the Class 1A state title when they claimed two of the relays and finished second in the other one here last Saturday en route to the championship of the regional track meet at South Plains College.

The Moguls finished with 79 points, 11 more than Turkey Valley and 12 more than Happy.

Bivens picked up a bronze in the pole vault at 11-6, but did not earn a wild card spot at state.

Also picking up valuable points for the Moguls were Hemphill with a fourth in the triple jump at 41-11.5, Reagins with a fifth in the high jump at 6-0 and Julio Vitolas with a fifth in the discus at 130-1.

Earning top 10 finishes were Kade Sanders in the discus, Christian Araujo in the 800 and Trevau Mitchell in the 300 hurdles.

Double winners at regional included Jake Merrell of Turkey Valley in the 800 and 1,600, McClendon Hill of Gaurie in the shot put and discus and Martin Loewer of Wellman-Union in the long jump and 100.

The 501 A toast to hoaxes

Pro golfers withdrawing from Olympics

While the Olympics is the pinnacle of most sports, such isn't really the case for golf.

Golf was added for this year's games in Rio Janeiro and most of the big names, including Jordan Spieth, Jason Day and Rory McIlroy, will be there playing for gold, silver, bronze medals or maybe just pride.

However, at least four major champions have indicated they will not participate because of family and scheduling issues. Included were Adam Scott, Louis Oosthuizen, Charl Schwartzel and Vijay Singh, all among the world's top 20.

There may be other international players to follow considering the tough travel schedules, but American Bubba Watson indicated he would participate despite

the likelihood that it would mean playing six events in a seven-week period.

"This is probably my only year to have that shot because I'm getting older," he said, pointing that it is another four years before the Olympics will be played again.

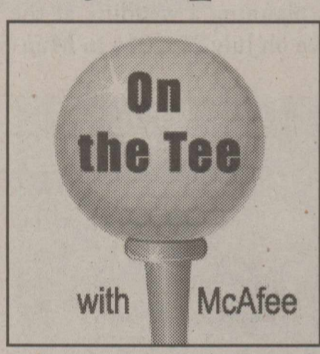
Such withdrawals would be rare in any other sport, but golf is different in that there are four majors and a Ryder Cup that are at its pinnacle, meaning more to the players in the long run. In other sports, winning gold in the Olympics is the ultimate achievement.

Perhaps it would have been easier for the stars who dropped out if the golf schedule wasn't so full during the summer and fall. Instead, the U.S. Open, the British Open and the PGA

Championship are scheduled within a six-week period from June through August. In addition, PGA Tour players only have a week after the Olympics before the start of the \$35 million FedEx Cup playoffs, featuring four events in a five-week period. Then there's the Ryder Cup, which the U.S. desperately needs to win.

Since the Olympic games are held every four years, maybe the powers of golf should have tweaked the schedule if they felt it was important.

Was it worth getting golf back in the Olympics? Absolutely! It does a lot of good in helping grow the game, especially in countries where it is seldom played. Who knows, maybe a few new stars will come out of the games.



Personally, I would have liked for some kind of team competition included instead of just another 72-hole individual tournament. That would have added some pride to be playing for your country. Let's hope this is considered in 2020.

In closing, I do miss the days when the Olympics was for true amateurs, not professional athletes.

Share the road with motorcycles

AUSTIN — On average, a motorcyclist dies in a crash on Texas roads every day. To mark Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month in May — and to remember the 455 motorcyclists lost in crashes last year — the Texas Department of Transportation is launching its "Share the Road: Look Twice for Motorcycles" campaign.

"Motorcycles can be dif-

ficult to see so it's important for drivers to look twice, especially before turning at intersections or changing lanes," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "Motorcyclists are extremely vulnerable because they don't have seat belts, airbags and surrounding steel doors to protect them."

Motorcyclists are nearly five times more likely than car or truck occupants to be injured in a crash and 26

times more likely to be killed. Besides last year's 455 fatalities, another 1,867 motorcyclists were seriously injured in 2015. About half of fatal motorcycle crashes result from a collision with a car or truck. Drivers cite not seeing the motorcycle or misjudging how fast it is traveling as the reason for the collision.

Each year at the end of April, many Texas cities issue proclamations that observe May as Motorcycle Safety

Awareness Month. During this period, TxDOT's "Share the Road: Look Twice for Motorcycles" campaign reminds drivers to:

Look twice for motorcycles, especially at intersections.

Use turn signals when changing lanes.

Check your mirrors before changing lanes.

Don't follow a motorcycle too closely.

Always assume motorcycles are closer than they appear.

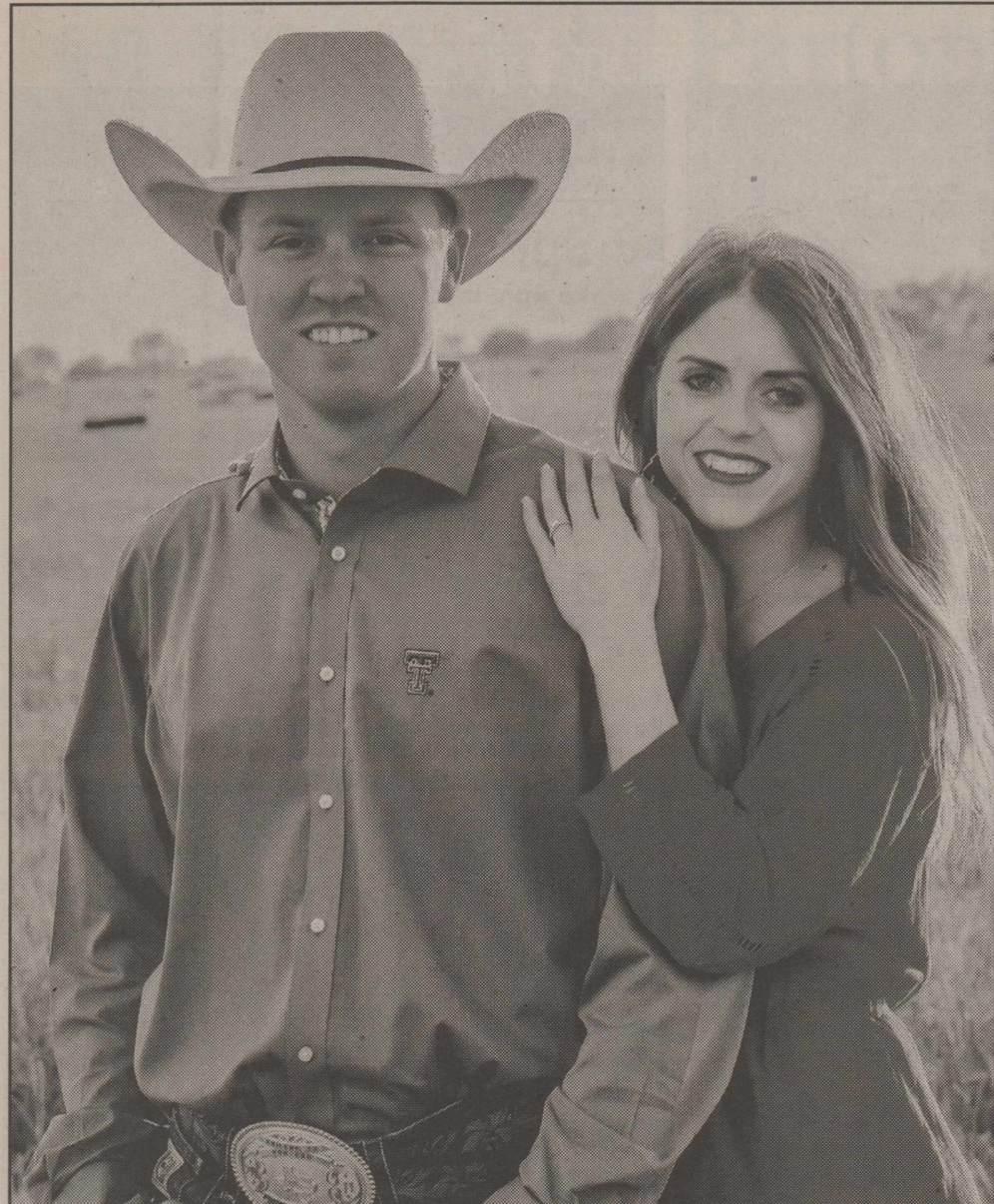

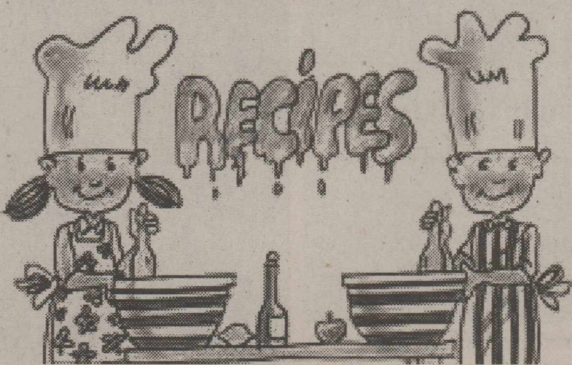

Vonda's Recipe Corner

This Sunday is Mother's Day, so I'd like to say Happy Mother's Day to my mom who lives in Fort Worth (I love you mom) and to all of the mothers here in Knox County and everywhere, why not. We have a lot of out of county subscribers to our paper. People who used to live here, or have family and friends who live here, or have a granddaughter and daughter who lives here and happens to work for the newspaper and writes this recipe column. I'm just saying!



Okay, okay yes I have recipes, don't be so impatient. I think you'll really like the ones I have this week. But alas, they do not involve the crock pot (sad face), but one of them does involve the barbecue grill, which I'm also quite fond of. So try these out and remember to make mom feel special this weekend.

Bacon, Pineapple, Chicken Kabobs

- 2 large boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 1 large pineapple, cut into 1 1/2 inch chunks
- 2 large red bell peppers, cut into 1 1/2 inch pieces
- 1 large onion, cut into 1 1/2 inch pieces
- 12 strips of thick cut bacon
- 6 long skewers (soak in water while prepping other ingredients, to avoid burning, unless using metal)

For Hawaiian Sauce

- 1 1/2 cups pineapple juice
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 tbsp. cornstarch
- 2 tbsp. soy sauce

To make the Hawaiian sauce: combine all ingredients in a medium saucepan and stir until the cornstarch is dissolved. Bring the mixture to a boil, reduce heat to medium and simmer for two minutes. Set aside until ready to use. Thread skewers: weave the bacon around each piece of chicken and pineapple, stick the bell pepper and onion together and weave the bacon around both of those. You'll need two strips of bacon per skewer if using four pieces of chicken and three pieces each of pineapple, bell pepper and onion. Brush some olive oil or vegetable oil evenly over each kabob. Grill the kabobs for 10-15 minutes, turning a couple of times, until done. Slather with hot Hawaiian sauce and serve immediately.

Potato Pasta Caesar Salad
