Usually, the names are released by mid-May with announcements in the papers

before commencement ceremonies.

Here is Supt. Troy Parton's explanation that I received Monday morning, saying the last finals were held Thursday morning before the awards ceremony:

"The students were informed as to who the top five or six were, the top two had speeches ready, and the others were informed to go ahead and get something written in case they moved up.

Normally, the top two are clearly the top. But our students were so close there was no way until final grades were in to for sure determine the valedictorian and salutato-
