Energy bill in jeopardy

WASHINGTON —A partisan dispute over oil drilling, water for droughtstricken California and a potential rollback of wildlife protections has put Congressional efforts to approve a major energy bill in jeop-

The Senate bipartisan bill that would boost oil and natural gas production while encouraging renewable energy sources, such as wind and solar power, and increased energy efficiency

was approved earlier. However, the bill's prospects dimmed after the House approved a series of election-year amendments in May that promote Republican priorities such as increased drilling for oil and gas and overriding protections for the gray wolf and other species under the Endangered Species Act.

The White House strongly opposes or has threaten to veto at least seven of the House proposals.





This week I'm giving you a recipe from my new friends Mike and Donna Nichols in Knox City. I told you about them a few weeks ago. They told me about this one and sent it to me, it sounds so good tried it"? Well, no I haven't but I am definitely going to and I giving it to you just as they sent to me because the cooking process is described perfectly. This recipe is not complicated at all, few ingredients and easy to put together. I thank Mike and Donna for sending it to me and hope they will send me more. That's it for now, you guys "Rock."

Italian Hot Sausage Sand-

1 package of hot or mild Italian sausages

2 green bell peppers

1 medium yellow onion

2 small cans of tomato sauce 1 teaspoon Italian season-

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder (to taste)

1 package of Bollilo rolls, sub rolls or similar

If you don't prefer the Hot (spicy) sausages you can use the mild ones, but be aware that much of the spicy quality of the sausages will transfer to the vegetables and sauce so they will not be quite as hot to eat when prepared this way. We find a hard crusted roll is usually better for these than soft buns.

outside, poking each of them several times with a fork to allow for the juices to escape. Slice the onion into thin rings and place in the center of the skillet. Slice the bell peppers into thin rings, removing the seeds and add to the center of the skillet. Add a half cup of water or a bit of cooking oil - we use light olive oil usually. Cover and bring the heat up on the skillet and allow the sausages and vegetables to cook so that the onions are starting to clear. Turn the sausages over after maybe five to seven minutes.


After the sausages have been turned and cooked another five minutes or so, add the tomato sauce to the center of the ingredients and the garlic powder and a teaspoon of Italian Seasoning. We have done these in many slight variations. Experimenting is fun when cooking something like this.

Cover loosely and reduce heat to simmer. If you can muster up enough will power to wait about 30 minutes then you can serve them. The aroma will often win out before that, but the longer you simmer and let the juices blend the better this will be.

Open your rolls and place a partial spoon full of the sauce on the inside, then place a sausage and using tongs or a fork put a good amount of the peppers and onions over the sausage. Close it up and enjoy. A napkin or bib may be a useful addition at this time. Serve with a simple salad, your favorite beverage and you will find this one fits into your "comfort food" category and is so easy to throw together using only one

Now, most recipes would be done at this point, but this one continues to give. As most packages of the sausages have five links, and we usually eat only three or four, we often have one or two sausages and some of the peppers, onions and sauce left over. We usually cut the remaining vegetables into smaller chunks, slice the meat into bite sized pieces, then add a half cup or one cup of water. Bring to a boil then put in the same amount of minute rice. Cover and remove from the heat. Five minutes later stir and serve a very tasty single dish dinner. Optionally you can put the leftover sausages, sauce and veggies over fresh pasta and serve. This basic recipe is from my wife's family from the Pittsburgh, PA area, and I love it as it's so easy even I can do it.

USDA extends deadline to July 1

WASHINGTON- Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack recently announced a one-time, 30- day extension to the June 1 deadline for recording farm organization structures related to Actively Engaged in Farming determinations. This date is used to determine the level of interest an individual holds in a legal entity for the applicable program year. Farming operations will now have until July 1 to complete their restructuring or finalize any operational change.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) issued the extension in response to farmers and ranchers who requested more time to comply, and to assure that everyone has enough time to provide their information under the new rules.

"Most farming and ranching organizations have been able to comply with the actively engaged rule," said Vilsack. "This one-time extension should give producers who may still need to update their farm structure informa-

tion the additional time to do so."

The 2014 Farm Bill provided the Secretary with the direction and authority to amend the Actively Engaged in Farming rules related to management. The final rule established limits on the number of individuals who can qualify as actively engaged using only management. Only one payment limit for management is allowed under the rule, with the ability to request up to two additional qualifying managers operations for large and complex operations.

The rule does not apply to farming operations comprised entirely of family members. The rule also does not change the existing regulations related to contributions of land, capital, equipment or labor, or the existing regulations related to landowners with a risk in the crop or to spouses.

Producers that planted fall crops have until the 2017 crop year to comply with the new rules. The payment limit associated with FSA farm payments is generally limited annually to \$125,000 per individual or entity.

COLLEGE STATION -USDA Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, Judith A. Canales, reminds producers that FSA offers targeted farm ownership and farm operating loans to assist underserved applicants as well as beginning farmers and ranchers.

"Each year, a portion of FSA's loan funds are set aside to lend to targeted underserved and beginning farmers and ranchers, " said Canales. 'Farming and livestock production are capital intensive business ventures and FSA is committed to helping producers start, expand and maintain their agricultural operations."

USDA defines underserved applicants as a group whose members have been subjected to racial, ethnic, or gender prejudice because of their identity as members of

the group without regard to their individual qualities. For farm loan program purposes, targeted underserved groups are women, African Americans, American Indians and Alaskan Natives, Hispanics, and Asians and Pacific Islanders.

Underserved or beginning farmers and ranchers who cannot obtain commercial credit from a bank can apply for either FSA direct loans or guaranteed loans. Direct loans are made to applicants by FSA.

Guaranteed loans are made by lending institutions who arrange for FSA to guarantee the loan. FSA can guarantee up to 95 percent of the loss of principal and interest on a

The FSA guarantee allows lenders to make agricultural credit available to producers who do not meet the lender's normal underwriting criteria.

The direct and guaran-

teed loan program provides for two types of loans: farm ownership loans and farm operating loans.

Farm ownership loan funds may be used to purchase or enlarge a farm or ranch, purchase easements or rights of way needed in the farm's operation, build or improve buildings such as a dwelling or barn, promote soil and water conservation and development and pay closing costs.

Farm operating loan funds may be used to purchase livestock, poultry, farm equipment, fertilizer, and other materials necessary to operate a successful farm.

These loans can also be used for family living expenses, refinancing debts under certain conditions, paying salaries for hired farm laborers, installing or improving water systems for home, livestock, or irrigation use and other similar improvements.

Producers of handharvested crops must notify FSA of damage or loss within 72 hours of when the date of damage or loss first becomes apparent.

USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) also can help producers with damaged agricultural lands caused by natural disasters such as floods. The NRCS Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) provides financial assistance to repair and prevent excessive soil erosion that can result from high rainfall events and flooding.

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
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
