Showers Continuing As Paper Being Prepared

As the Briscoe County News was being prepared for printing Tuesday afternoon, showers were continuing to fall on the area. Fred Strange, who records the official rainfall measurement for Silverton, was not available due to the illness of his mother-in-law, but it was estimated that more than 3½ inches has fallen on Silverton since the last report.

Several funnel clouds were sighted in the area Saturday evening, John Crowell reporting seeing two in the vicinity of the C. L. Sutton home southwest of Silverton, and Gary Weaks reporting two sightings from his

home west of town. Apparently no funnel ever touched the ground.

The warning sirens were activated so that everyone would have adequate time to seek shelter, but the funnel clouds apparently passed to the west and north of town.

Hail in Silverton has been light.

Mrs. Angie Martin Receives Degree At Tech

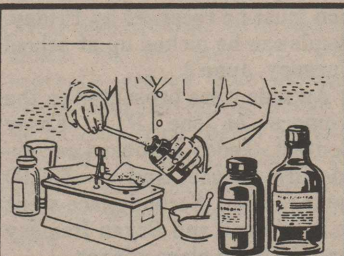
Mrs. Angie Martin received the bachelor of science degree in agriculture education in ceremonies at Texas Tech University Saturday, May 16.

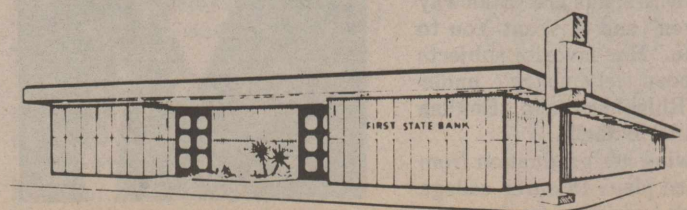

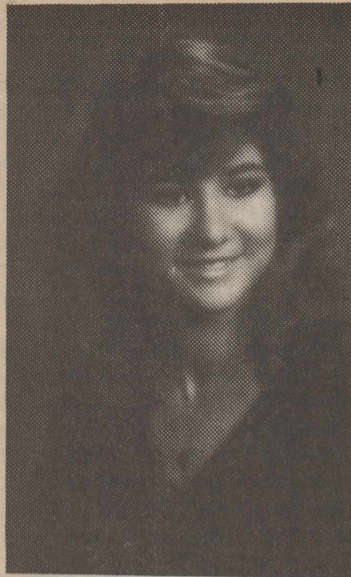

She was Most Improved Player her junior year, and has been in the pep squad four years. She participated in track as a freshman.

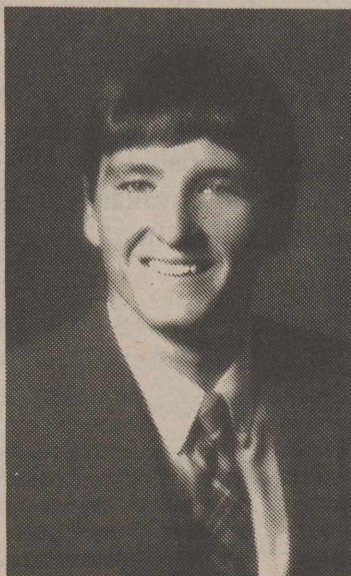
Toni has played basketball four years, received an All-District honorable mention as a junior and was elected to the All-District team her senior year.
