LONDON - (AP) - A Reuters dispatch from the viss-Italian frontier said Monday that Count Galeazzo Ciano, former Fascist foreign minister of Italy and Benito Mussolini's son-inlaw, was shot Monday morning by a firing squad, according to reports reaching the frontier.

Time To Report Again

Well, here it is almost the 15th of December. Thanksgiving is past, thank goodness. Christmas is just around the corner, and after that comes the New Year.

Probably you're busy trying to find gifts for the youngsters, the relatives, and those friends who just must be remembered even in wartime. You may even, like some others of us, be wondering how you are going to finance Christmas at the current "stabilized" level of prices without suspending war bond purchases or going short on food

It's a shame to add to your worries, but between now and Dec. 15 you had better take time out to look over that income estimate you filed in September, and see whether it still holds up. If not, you know, you must file another estimate by midnight of the 15th. In any event, you had better scurry around and find money to pay an installment on the tax.

In the good old days, income tax returns had to be filed only once a year. The worst that could happen to you on July 15. September 15, and December 15. you on July 15, September 15 and December 15 was to have to write an installment check.






